The finance committee, with D. C. Dodson as chairman, is composed of J. V. Brookshear, Paul Browning, H. A. Mills, Leo Dudley and H. C. Preston. Their job is to raise the \$20,000 to \$30,000 necessary to complete the facilities.

J. C. Hinkle, Newt Anthony and Jack Alexander were appointed on a baseball committee to work with the planning committee in arranging space for a soft-ball and hard-ball diamond on the grounds.

If restrictions do not prevent, work will begin immediately on construction of the rodeo chutes, fences, arena, seating, and baseball playing field.

The purpose of this survey is to determine how many and what kind of low rent housing units are to be built in Burk Burnett.

A local interviewer will call on you at your home and ask questions about your home and your income. It is very important that you give the interviewer all the information as accurately as possible. The sole purpose of this survey is to determine how many low rent units Burk Burnett will have allocated to it. Even though you personally have no intention of moving into one, it will help those people who do if you cooperate.

The information secured is strictly confidential. It will be used to make up statistical tables. You will remain completely anonymous. This information is NOT made available to any other government agency for purposes of taxation, regulation, etc.

The low rent housing program can result in hundreds of thousands of dollars being spent in Burk Burnett. Your co-operation will materially help.

## Modern America -- Transparent

"People who live in glass houses," they used to say, "shouldn't throw stones." But times have changed. Today it all depends on the kind of glass your house is made of. Take those new glass doors that make the newer shops and stores so inviting. You can stop worrying about them, definitely. We have word from the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company that a piece of this glass—which is called Herculite—only 1-4 inch thick survived five weeks in a testing machine in their laboratory where it was hammered 1,200 times an hour with two steel hammers . . . and never showed a mark. It is tempered, the Pittsburgh people say, just like steel.

And those big new "view windows," that give extra glamour to new homes, are something special too. They're really two windows in one; in fact, are called "Twindows," and because of their insulating properties, help keep fuel bills down as well as providing that wider outlook.

Airport control towers and office buildings are now using a new glass that helps keep interiors cool. And now the glass wizards have come up with a bomb-proof window, which is a special development of Flexseal glass, widely used for aircraft windows.

It's hard to believe that common, ordinary window glass is still considered a luxury in many civilized nations, when we are so lavishly supplied with so many types of glass for so many purposes, including the satisfaction of looking at ourselves almost wherever we go.

## "FOR WANT OF A NAIL"

"Twelve million motorized American farm vehicles, tractors, trucks and cars, make up the 'red ball' express to a free world," says Royce G. Martin, President of The Electric Auto-Lite Company. "If this express line is allowed to break down, the entire free world could collapse, become a push-over for its watchful enemies."

Never before in our history has the responsibility of the American farmer been so great, for he must now feed most of the free world as well as our own country. Thus, his concern for his machinery is a vital concern to all of us, to our friends abroad and to our sons in military service all over the world and in training at home. Those three and a half million tractors, and more than twice that many farm trucks and cars, had better be in first class condition . . . and be kept that way.

"Don't wait. Do it now . . . if you want to farm next year," is Mr. Martin's advice on repair and maintenance work. Spare parts are not critical, but everyone should realize that they are in short supply due to the need for restricting civilian use of copper, brass and other essential defense materials. And there are bound to be sections of the country where you will not be able to get just the parts you may need at the time you want them.

Do not let these supply dislocations catch up with you and do not put up with makeshift repairs. Inspect your equipment for signs of future trouble, and forestall it with preventive maintenance.

"Regard every machine as precious, and if you lay it up for the winter, take special pains this year. Take good care of batteries, especially when put in storage. Check spark plugs, crank case, radiator, tires and electrical systems both before and after storage."

Mr. Martin's warnings remind us of that old piece from the school book, "For want of a nail the shoe is lost, for want of a shoe the horse is lost, for want of a horse the rider is lost." And when the rider has a charge to lead, he should certainly look to his nails. The coming battle for food production is one we dare not lose.

Mr. Fewin is with the U. S. Navy and is stationed at San Diego, California.

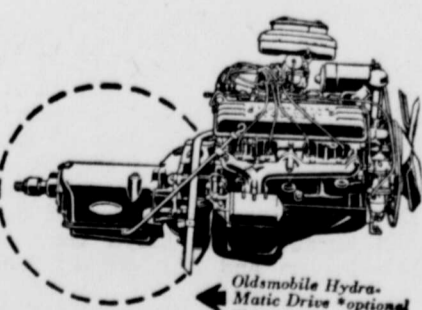

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## Marines Fighting In Korea Receive Winter Clothes

New and improved winter clothing and equipment have been issued to all Marines in Korea, Eighth Marine Corps Reserve Headquarters at New Orleans announced today.

Among the items are an improved warming tent, a different type of stove, and a new kind of insulated rubber boot that has been tested to ward off frostbite at 45 degrees below zero.

On October 1, every Marine in the Far East Command was issued the following:

A wool sleeping bag with water-repellant case and two wool blankets; or, three wool blankets and an inflatable sleeping bag.

A heavy cap with ear-flaps; heavy wool drawers and undershirt; leather gloves with wool inserts; field jacket with hood; wool trousers and water-repellant, windproof trousers to fit over them; wool sweater, wool socks with heavy cushion sole and flannel shirt.

On November 1, the following additional items were issued:

Mountain type sleeping bag, pile lined field jacket, heavy mittens with inserts, alpaca lined vest, parka type overcoat with hood and the new cold weather boots.

Replacements leaving the United States for the Far East Command are equipped with winter gear by the Marine Corps. Except for special items such as the new boots, winter clothing in Korea is being supplied by the Army.

Replacing the "shoe pac," hitherto considered the best foot gear for extreme cold, the rubber boot is the result of research by the Army, Navy and Marine Corps.

"Guinea pig" Marine officers tested the boots by putting on frozen socks and freezing a cup-

ful of water in the boots before putting their feet into them. Then they walked in them, both outdoors and inside sub-zero testing chambers.

According to the test reports, the feet were painfully cold for the first eight minutes, but thereafter the ice melted and the feet were comfortably warm.

As long as a man moved once an hour to maintain normal circulation in the feet, no ill effects developed.

The boot operates on the thermos bottle principle of sealed insulation. Experts in Arctic exploration have praised it as the best protection against wet-cold such as is encountered in Korea.

The sealed-in insulation extends completely around the foot and up over the ankle, to where underwear and trousers protect the leg. Tests showed that the feet would not freeze in sub-zero weather even if the man broke into an icy stream and water seeped into his boots.

## Stanley E. Coslett Advanced In Rate Boatswain's Mate

Stanley E. Coslett, USN, husband of Mrs. Dorothy J. Coslett of Box 184, Burkburnett, Texas, has been advanced in rate to aviation boatswain's mate, third class, aboard the seaplane tender USS Pine Island.

Coslett, who enlisted in the Navy in February, 1944, participated in action off Leyte and Okinawa during World War II. He is a former student of Midwestern University, Wichita Falls.

The Pine Island returned to the West Coast in mid-September after a 10 months tour of duty in the Far East. It is now at the Long Beach Naval Shipyard undergoing extensive overhaul before returning to the Far East.

While in the Orient, the vessel served as an advanced base for the Navy's huge PBM "flying boats," engaged in reconnaissance missions over Korea and Chinese waters.
