The appointment of Fred Massengill, Jr., publisher of the Terrell Tribune, as state publicity chairman for the 1952 Heart Fund Campaign has been announced by Ben H. Wooten, chairman of the Texas Heart Fund.

Mr. Massengill, immediate past president of the Texas Press Association, will be in direct charge of all releases to Texas newspapers and radio and television stations. Mr. Wooten said. Rent stabilization became effective in the Wichita Falls defense rental area Monday, January 14th. Maximum rent date is September 1, 1950. The area is officially defined as Wichita County.

Russell S. Stephens, associate regional director of the Office of Rent Stabilization in Dallas, said Andrew E. Gilbert, rent director of the Borger defense rental area, will serve as acting rent director until a permanent director can be appointed.

Gilbert will be assisted by Arch L. Propps, field representative from Dallas, in opening the office and obtaining personnel.

The area rent office will be located in Rooms 318-19 of the Federal Building in Wichita Falls. The office will be open next week to receive landlord registrations. All owners of rental dwelling property must register their units before February 29, Stephens said.

The original announcement that the area had been certified as a critical defense rental area was made several weeks ago. Such certification automatically requires rent stabilization.

## PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK

Thousands of Texas adults will go back to school during the week of March 2-8 in observance of the Second Annual Public Schools Week, which has as its theme, "Democracy in Action."

Governor Allan Shivers today proclaimed March 2-8 as Public Schools Week in Texas. In his proclamation the Governor said:

"One of the basic institutions upon which we rely for the furtherance of our American ideals is the public school system. Public schools, by enabling every child to gain a liberal education regardless of station in life, promote recognition of the responsibilities of citizenship and constitute a major bulwark against subversive doctrines."

"We in Texas are proud of the school system that has been developed in our state. Its success has been due to many factors—the interest of mothers and fathers in their children, the co-operative efforts of state and local spirited men and women who are devoting their lives to the teaching of our children."

"The continued progress of our school system requires increased public understanding of the importance of education and the greatest possible encouragement and support of our teachers."

Governor Shivers' proclamation follows a resolution adopted last summer by the Texas State Board of Education designating the week of March 2-8 as Public Schools Week. The resolution urged that every citizen visit a public school during the period to become personally acquainted with the programs and accomplishments of the state's system of public schools.

The Texas Education Agency has requested local public school officials throughout the state to invite the citizens of their respective communities to visit classrooms, and to plan programs with the purpose of giving the pupils and the citizens a better understanding of the school program.

Public Schools Week was observed officially for the first time in Texas last March. In hundreds of communities thousands of citizens visited their public schools in groups. Many visitors had not been inside schools in years. Statistics compiled by the Texas Citizens' Committee on Public Schools Week following the first Public Schools Week program revealed a great awakening on the part of the public to the problems of their local public schools.

**MORRISON, ILL., NEWS:** "Horrible to contemplate, isn't it, that America is running, not walking, toward a totalitarian dictatorship? So what are we who cherish our freedom going to do about it? 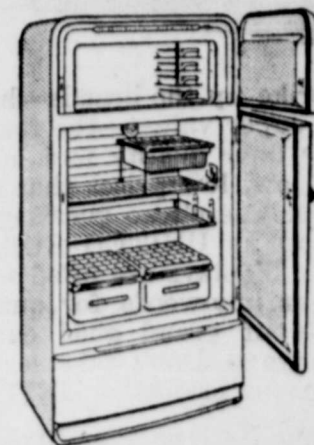

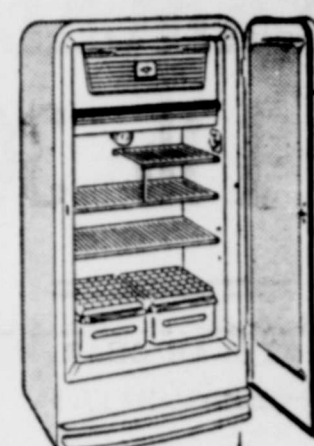

### Tufares Asked Special Session On Inspection Law

State Representative Deno A. Tufares of Wichita Falls was one of the first members of the legislature to speak to the Governor in regard to the automobile inspection law. Tufares wanted a special session of the legislature to amend the law so that restrictions would be loosened up and an extension of time for inspection be granted.

"I think that all cars should have their brakes, lights, steering mechanism, horn, windshield wipers and windshields inspected for the safety of the people of the State," Tufares said.

"By keeping in constant contact with the Governor and Col. Garrison, I knew that they anticipated asking the Attorney General for an opinion, granting an extension of time and I have waited to make a statement until this opinion was given. Now that the time has been extended and the Department of Public Safety has loosened up on some of its inspection requirements I think the situation will eventually take care of itself," Tufares said.

Tufares stated that he has reports from over the state that some of the inspection stations are making adjustments or repairs on some of the cars without approval of the owner. Any stations doing so should be reported to the Department of Public Safety. Any car owner

may make the repairs himself if he wishes to do so and will not be barred from passing inspection because of that one fact.

At the time of the passage of this bill the matter was discussed in regard to making the inspection stations separate and apart from any repair station, but this would place an undue burden on the State Treasury and the inspection program would be unable to pay for itself and also this law was passed to protect the people of Texas and not to make money.

### Tufares To Run For Re-election Representative

State Representative Deno A. Tufares of Wichita Falls announces he will run for re-election to the House of Representatives from Wichita County, in the same Place 1 but in a different numbered district.

Re-districting by the 1951 Legislature changed Wichita County from the 111th to the 81st District.

Tufares said he will file with the County Democratic Chairman while he is home between semesters at the end of January. The lawmaker is a law student at the University of Texas.

In the 52nd Legislature last year, Tufares secured passage of his bill requiring rental boats on Texas lakes and rivers to carry a life preserver for each passenger.

Tufares said he is "very concerned" over the selling of narcotics, and he is preparing a bill to impose stiffer penalties on dope law violators.

Looking back to the devastating drought of 1950, the Wichita Falls Representative declared his belief that Texas should take care of its own future water storage needs, in preference to what he termed Federal control over future dams built in the State.

Now the senior House member from Wichita Falls area, Tufares was a candidate for Speaker of the 53rd Legislature before withdrawing on account of his young son's illness.

His committee assignments last session were: Aeronautics, public health, game and fish, judicial districts, and chairman of Commerce and Manufacturers.
