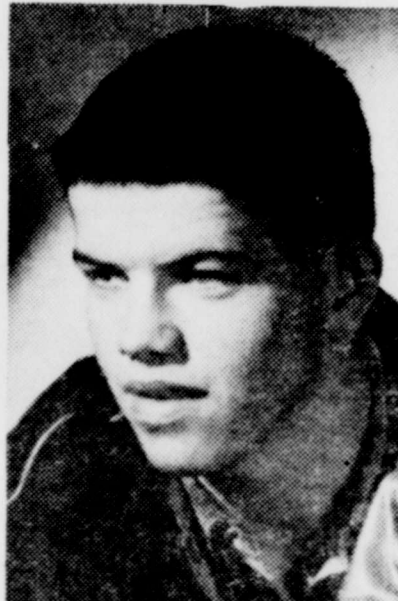
### Two Tie for Valedictorian At Burkburnett High School

## KEEPING MONEY AT HOME

BURKBURNETT, like any other small town which is located within an easy traveling distance of larger cities, is faced with a serious problem—a problem, in fact, which takes thousands upon thousands of dollars out of town each year; dollars which are needed in the town to help it continue to progress, yet which are lost and tend to help build another town.

These dollars are spent by people who depend on Burkburnett for a living; people who have their homes here and derive their livelihood from businesses, industries and professions in this town. Yet, they annually take the money they make and throw it into the pockets of businessmen elsewhere.

They do not stop to realize this is hurting their own town (or many of them do not care one way or the other). The amount of money spent outside of Burkburnett for items which can be bought right here in town would add to the economy of the town immensely. It could mean that many people could have better jobs.

Of course, the fault cannot be placed on the person spending the money altogether. Business places are to blame also. Their stocks do not compare to what the buyer can find in larger cities. Then too, their prices, brought about by the comparatively small volume they have, fail to come down in the bracket hit by some of the stores in larger cities. So the blame can as easily fall on their shoulders as it can on the spender.

Yet, if a check could be made, much of the goods bought outside of Burkburnett by its residents could have been purchased in Burkburnett as cheaply and much more easily.

Buyers will argue the point that their money is their own—they can spend it where they wish. True. No one can call them wrong. But there should be a matter of personal pride enter into the picture. A person living in a town, calling it home, and depending on a job in that town for the provisions for his family, should be interested enough in the town to want it to progress. And money spent in another town certainly has no good effect on Burkburnett. That money is in another man's pocket—another man who lives in another town and depends upon it for a living.

And as long as the citizens of Burkburnett put thousands of dollars annually in the pockets of businessmen in other towns, they can never expect their town to be as progressive as its neighboring cities.

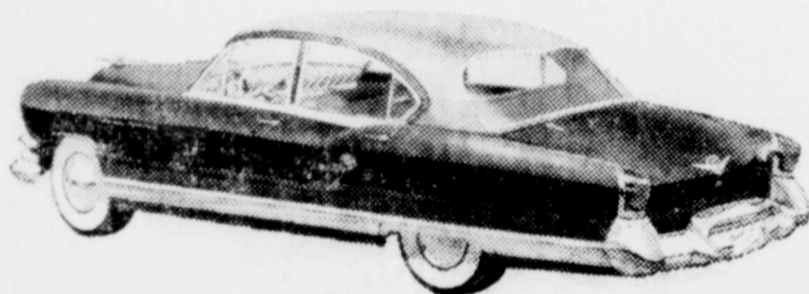

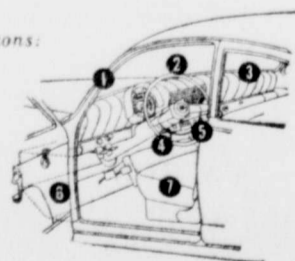

## Yarborough to Talk On Radio Monday Night

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough will make a state-wide broadcast to the people of Texas on Monday night, May 19th. "I'm going to take the issues in this governor's race direct to the people," the Austin attorney said. Yarborough's talk will be heard over Station KTRN at 7:30 P. M., 1290 on your dial.

Since announcing his candidacy two weeks ago, Yarborough said the mail response from every part of the state had been overwhelming.

As assistant attorney general Yarborough wrote the first opinion, in 1934, ruling that the Texas Land Commission could lease tidelands in the Gulf of Mexico. Yarborough wrote the first law passed in Texas protecting underground water resources.

For five years prior to World War II, Yarborough served as District Judge in Travis County, during three years of which he was Presiding Judge of the Third Administrative Judicial District, containing 33 central Texas counties.

Judge Yarborough saw combat service in Europe under General Eisenhower. During the occupation of Japan he served under General MacArthur.
