75 Per Cent Wheat Crop Harvested In Burk Territory

Yields Averaging About 18 Bu. Per Acre

With approximately 75 per cent of the Burk area wheat already cut, it appears that the harvest will be completed by the middle of next week. To date some 335,000 bushels have been brought into Burkburnett's three elevators. The grade of wheat this year is exceptionally good, and farmers are, for the most part, surprised at the 18 bushel per acre yield as an average. Drouth some weeks ago made the wheat situation here very gloomy. A guess of some 5 to 12 bushels average was the most any one would make then.

Double Talk Is Not Cheap

Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall, who complains that he has been "badgered" by various grocery interests to increase ceilings on various food items, has "reluctantly" authorized increases that are expected to take from \$100,000,000 to \$150,000,000 more a year out of Mrs. America's grocery money.

But the same food store groups that the Administrator charges with badgering him, express unhappiness at his action. They charge that OPS is trying to perpetuate controls and to persuade the public that much higher food prices are in prospect.

"The public should understand," says a joint statement of the National Ass'n. of Food Chains and the Super-Market Institute, "that competition is the factor today that is keeping prices down. O. P. S. has little or nothing to do with it. More than 50 per cent of all the foods sold today in grocery stores are below ceiling prices."

"If they don't want these new price levels," retorts Arnall, "they don't have to charge them."

But if we don't want price ceilings, we'll have to put up with them anyway . . . or Mr. Arnall and thousands of co-workers, will be out of jobs.

The Nation May Be Safer, At That!

"It's always been somewhat of a mystery to me why the draft law provides liberal deferment policies for college men, while dealing less gently with farmers and working men," writes Managing Editor William J. Steiner, in the WEST BEND (Wis.) NEWS.

"The answer, judging by the late news from a dozen campuses, is that college boys have been deferred in order that there might be someone on hand to take care of the vital task of disposing of discarded ladies' underwear. Surely, there is a job that must be done in these trying times, and apparently, the average college boy of 1952 has just the mentality for the assignment. We apologize to the draft officials for wondering if there was a good reason for setting up two standards by which to determine who shall have the privilege of dying for his country and who shall not."

No Wonder We're Punch Drunk

Prime Minister Churchill, speaking in the House of Commons, and his defense minister Earl Alexander, addressing the House of Lords, have told Britain that the enemy in Korea has already doubled his strength and can now launch a major offensive at any time and sustain it over a long period. Churchill also said he never believed the Reds wanted peace, even when the Truce Talks started last July.

At almost the same time, America's elder statesman, Bernard M. Baruch, testifying before the Senate Preparedness sub-committee of the Armed Services committee, blasted the American leaders who "picture us winning the 'cold war' one month, and in mortal peril the next". We are losing the arms race with Russia, he said, and pointed out that the Administration had decided on stretch-out of defense goals from 1954 to late 1955 or 1956, while "our highest military authorities have stated . . . that from now through 1954 will be the period of maximum peril for this nation."

Some weeks ago, General J. Lawton Collins, Army Chief of Staff, told the Senate that if fighting continued in Korea or there should be an attack in Europe, we "would have no reserves of some of the most important types of ammunition, and our frontline troops would have to limit their ammunition expenditures to what came off the production line." He went on to say that some of the "most important" types of ammunition had already been rationed on the front lines in Korea because "production still does not equal normal battle expenditures."

In Panmunjom, the enemy adds threats to his insults and arrogance, while we struggle to "contain" our own prison camps. In Berlin, a city-wide armed camp is walled off, East and West by barricades of steel and stone, and the Reds have thrown a three-mile buffer zone around the 375 mile border of East Germany, in protest to the signing of the Allied-West German past.

At the time President Truman announced our intervention in Korea, he boasted that America had never lost a war. Today, we can't be so sure.

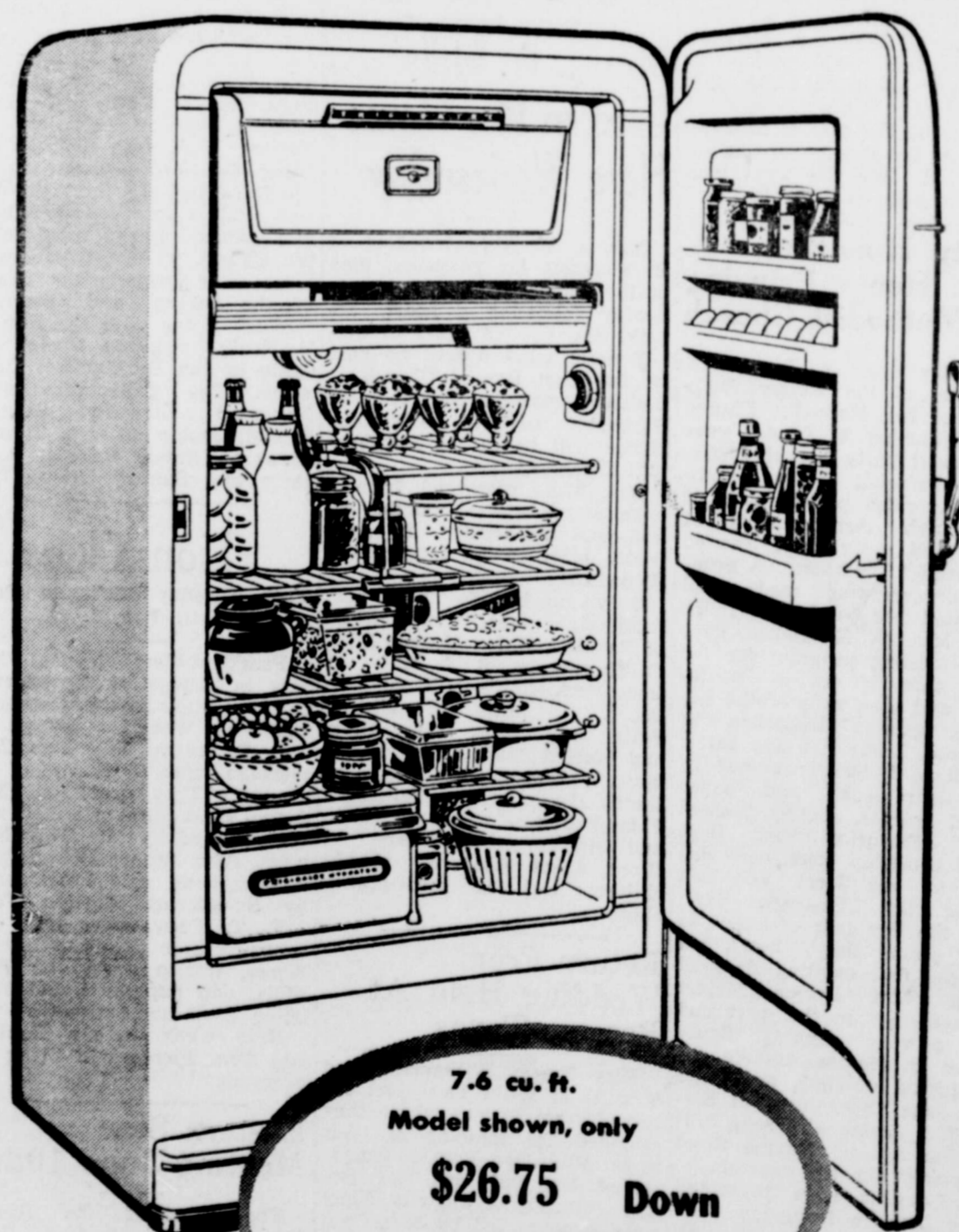

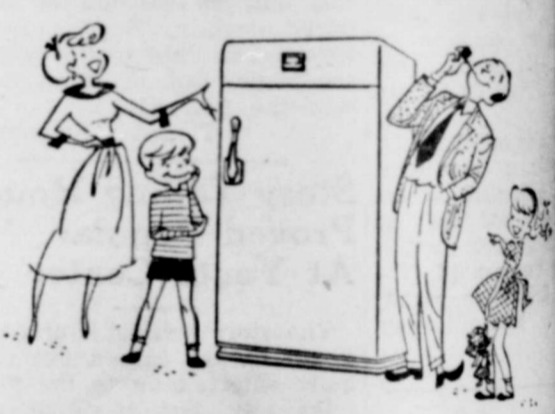

Springtime Is Kite-Time

YES, there's no surer sign of spring than when the boys (young ones and some not so young) take to the wide open spaces with their kites.

It's also a sure sign that a new snapshotting season is with us. Once again, we can go out of doors without winter clothing—the grass is getting greener by the hour—and there's something in the air that makes you glad to be alive.

Whether the kite is an elaborate commercial design, or of the simple home-made variety it offers sport for Dad and Junior to share. This means that it's mother's turn to play cameraman.

There's no special trick about taking pictures of kite-flying. However, just as in making shots of any activity that involves motion, you have to pick the right moments for snapping the picture. If your camera is fast enough for you to "stop" the kite in flight, that's fine. But if your camera is of the non-adjustable type (the kind we

often call a box type camera, no matter what its shape is), look for the instances of stillness that express an idea of moment.

A picture such as the one above indicates movement almost as surely as though the kite were actually soaring to meet the clouds, Junior is all set. And with your camera you've captured that thrilling moment of anticipation just before the big action takes place.

There are many other things which recommend this as a picture to be treasured in a family snapshot book. Any mother would be proud to have snapped it for it shows the men in her family having a good time. There's nothing stiff or self-conscious about it. It simply shows two people who are having fun—and, therefore, shows them at their natural best.

When spring comes we're always so glad to be engaged in outdoor activities again that it makes an ideal time for picture taking.

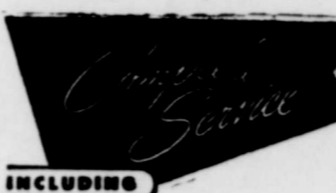

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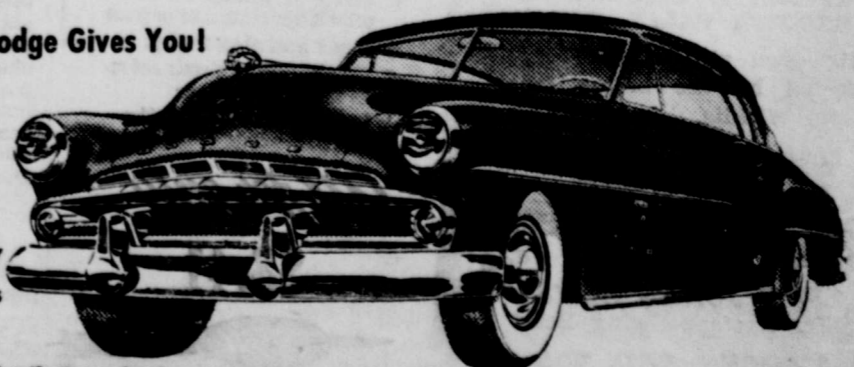
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
