Formal Statement Of Ed Luecke, In Judge's Race



Ed Luecke was in Burkburnett this week in the interest of his campaign for judge of the 89th District Court. While here he came by the Star office and left the following formal announcement:

There are no political issues in a judicial race, for certainly each judge must hear the facts and the law applicable to each case before attempting to render a fair decision. In a judicial race the character and ability of each candidate is the primary concern of the voters, and such character and ability of the candidate is very largely the result of the background of the person concerned. It is with the foregoing in mind, and the fact that this is my first political campaign, I am taking the liberty of giving the citizens of this county an inside in and to my personal background.

Family Background

I believe that all who knew him will agree that my father, Henry C. Luecke, was a good blacksmith and a good man. Two of his sons became preachers, a third a doctor, a fourth an electrical engineer, a fifth a geologist, and a sixth a lawyer. My father, Henry Luecke, was a man of little formal education but he stood firm in the belief that men should live honestly and fairly together as dignified individual human beings. With this same belief in mind I have sought the honor of becoming your judge of the 89th District Court.

The Christian philosophy of my mother, Emma Luecke, has had a profound influence upon my life. Naturally, such a mother who has raised, cared for, and educated nine children would have a profound influence upon the conduct of those children throughout their entire life. I am still guided by the principles instilled in me at an early age by my mother who preached honesty and fairness to all, without discrimination.

Early Life and Education

As a boy helping in my father's blacksmith shop and on the farm, and through the influence of my father and mother, I decided that I wanted to become a lawyer. With that idea in mind I worked in the harvest fields, in the oil fields, as a roughneck, on pipe line crews and other work connected with the oil business, and as a filling station attendant. From those earnings and with such help as my family could give me, I attended the University of Texas and Law School there.

Since 1933 I have been engaged in law practice in Wichita Falls, except during the twenty-two months that I served as an enlisted man and twenty-two months additional as an officer in World War II. Upon my discharge I again returned to law practice in the year 1945.

Qualifications

I feel that because of my background and 19 years of active law practice that I am qualified to understand the problems of all the people of Wichita County and can make a fair and impartial judge. As a lawyer active in the practice of law in the courts of Texas, I have seen miscarriages of justice, many of which occurred because of the delay that seems so ever present in our courts. I have also observed that respectable and busy men are taken from their jobs and asked to serve as jurors, but in-

As your judge it will be my purpose to decide fairly and impartially those questions that will come before me without fear or favor, to see that equal justice is done alike to all who may come before my court, and to handle the business of the court with such dispatch: as our laws and circumstances permit.

As a lawyer without previous political experience, it has been encouraging to have so many people endorse my candidacy without any solicitation on my part. However I have called, and will continue to call, upon as many of the voters of Wichita County as time permits, for I believe that you are entitled to know as much as you can about the men who seek political office.

I want to be your District Judge; and, if you believe that I can and will serve you fairly and faithfully, I earnestly ask for your vote, your support, and your influence in my behalf.

Unproved Theories Can Be Dangerous

Diet is a science of relatively recent origin. In late years, a tremendous amount of new knowledge has been gained. At the same time, there are many frontiers in the broad field of diet which are as yet unexplored. And there are many theories which are no more than theories, and whose validity is unproved.

As an example, much has been written recently concerning the proper diet to be employed in treating atherosclerosis—the condition which is the forerunner of hardening of the arteries. Some have suggested that the food sources of cholesterol—a fat-like substance—be eliminated from the diet in these cases.

In answer to this, the Department of Nutrition, Harvard School of Public Health, published a critical editorial review in one of the leading medical journals, Postgraduate Medicine. It pointed out that the elimination of cholesterol from the diet would mean the elimination of "our best protective foods"—including meats, milk and eggs. To deny these foods, the editorial continued, "would mean to impose nutritional handicaps on the patient which might be more serious than the condition under treatment." Moreover, cholesterol is manufactured by the body itself, regardless of the individual's dietary habits.

The editorial said that there is no proof that withholding the animal foods exerts a favorable influence on atherosclerosis, and concluded, "There certainly is no evidence that meatless, milkless, eggless diets should be recommended as desirable to the general public." These foods are a major source of mental and physical energy and well-being and are needed in substantial quantities by the vast majority of people of all ages.

BREAD BEFORE BOMBS

In spite of atomic bombs, H-bombs, guided missiles and our plans for the conquest of inter-stellar space, Man has not yet licked the gravest problem that faced his remotest cave-dwelling ancestor, which is briefly . . . how to get enough to eat.

This was the down to earth message of Dr. R. R. Baldwin, noted biochemist, to 250 graduates in biochemistry at the University of Pittsburgh. "Even at this late date in man's struggle to make the earth an agreeable habitation," said Dr. Baldwin, "sixty percent of its people are still undernourished."

"Unfortunately, perhaps," said Dr. Baldwin, who is director of biochemistry research at General Foods Central Laboratories in Hoboken, N. J., "articles and books on health foods, reducing diets, chemicals in foods, natural and synthetic foods, food fads, food concentrates, substitutes and supplements have confused the major problems and objectives of food research."

Even though the food industry constitutes the world's biggest business, the Americans alone spend 57 billion dollars a year on food, the nation's 6,500 food researchers are devoted to the task of finding "more palatable, more convenient to use, more economical and more nourishing foods." As evidence of this continual

investigation into possible nutrients, both old and new, and in all parts of the world including the seven seas, Dr. Baldwin told his audience that General Foods alone had introduced nine new food products last year and presently has 100 more at various stages of development. Such news, we believe is more significant, and more reassuring than the latest bulletin on the siege of Berlin. However formidable, a human enemy is susceptible of defeat . . . but in the long and bloody history of the world, Old Man Hunger has never yet been licked. And Uncle Sam's Agricultural Research Administration reports that by 1975, when we will have 190,000,000 people in the US, we will be short, by 23,000,000 acres, of enough land to feed them. Certainly Dr. Baldwin and his co-workers have a man-sized job ahead of them.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

WAURIKA, OKLA., NEWS-GLOBE: "We will have taken just about the last step to socialism, when we turn the schools over to the Federal government. The first appropriations might be with few strings, but gradually the powers at Washington would take over, telling the schools what to teach, how much to pay, where to build schools."

SOMERSET, PA., DAILY AMERICAN: "The primary issue of the moment is: Shall this democratic Republic be turned over to Philip Murray to be ruled as Hitler ruled Germany and as Mussolini ruled Italy? The time, Congress has said has not arrived when all the people have abdicated in favor of some of the people."

KNOXVILLE, IOWA, EXPRESS: "Our government experts say that many foreign countries could be made into self-supporting nations. Perhaps, like charity, these things should start at home. Even in this country nothing appears able to support itself without government help . . . here we are in far away foreign places telling them how to become self-sufficient."

ITALY, TEXAS, NEWS-HERALD: "Had Congress refused to go along with presidential requests for more power . . . had Congress held a tight rein on governmental expenditures; had Congress been more careful about approving presidential appointees, this nation would never have slipped as far along the road to socialism as it has."

State Bar For Loan Law to Get Rid of Sharks

Declaring that loan sharks in Texas "in numbers and nuisance are now more in evidence than ever before," the State Bar of Texas has thrown its support behind a proposed small loan law.

The measure, modeled from laws already in effect in almost all other states, provides for licensing and supervising the small loan industry, with both civil and criminal penalties, and for a maximum charge for loans "that will be fair to both borrower and lender."

Action by the State Bar at its recent convention in Houston was based upon a year's study of the problem by a special committee headed by District Judge W. S. Barron of Bryan and Tom Reavley, Lufkin attorney. Hearings were held and attorneys and executives of lending companies were heard.

Why Children Under 15 Are Not X-Rayed for T-B

To avoid disappointments to youngsters and also to mothers and fathers who hope to have their small children X-rayed during the 1952 County survey, Miss Margaret Hall, Executive Secretary of the Wichita County Tuberculosis Association, said she felt that an announcement as to the reason for the 15 year age limit should be made prior to the survey.

Emphasizing that the 15 year age limit is not a "whim" of the agencies conducting the Wichita County Survey, but is the practice throughout the U. S., Miss Hall explained that national statistics show that "unless there has been exposure, like a child living in the same house with the disease, or being in close contact with it otherwise, tuberculosis usually does not begin to manifest itself under 15 years.

The cost of taking thousands upon thousands of X-rays (an expensive process) with the probability of finding a few cases of tuberculosis is considered too great for the agencies to undertake, she explained.

During the Wichita County Survey, if an adult is found with the disease, Miss Hall pointed out, "then every person, young and old, who has been in close contact will be

given a free chest X-ray at the Wichita Health Unit.' Follow-up X-rays at the Health Unit will be easier than in former years. The Tuberculosis Association has recently spent about \$2,000 modernizing its X-ray machine, located in the Health Unit. There, free X-ray service is carried on throughout the year for food handlers, tuberculosis "contacts," nurses, school teachers, high school graduates, and for all families unable to pay for X-ray service.

Figures released by the State Health Department for last year's survey revealed: 12 cases of tuberculosis, one cardiac and one "other" chest pathology were found in the Burkburnett Survey.

Don H. Wilson, County chairman, wishes to remind everyone that the X-ray machines and technicians are provided by the State Health Department. The equipment was bought from tax money and nobody should feel that the project is for charity patients." The service, he said, is for every person 15 years old and over and everyone regardless of his station in life, should be X-rayed.

Dr. Joseph A. Davey is chairman for the 1952 Burkburnett survey. Mrs. C. E. Lundberg is in charge of the volunteer workers. The X-ray machine will be stationed in The Corner Drug Store on July 29th. The machine is capable of taking approximately 2,000 X-rays a day.

A recent admission by the U. S. Department of Agriculture that its 1951 cotton crop estimate was "too optimistic," has verified a claim by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

White, who now seeks his second term in office, said the U.S.D.A.'s over-estimate by two million bales last year resulted in a serious break in cotton prices. His own correct estimate of the Texas crop as early as last August, and his advice to farmers to hold their cotton saved them millions of dollars, he said.

The commissioner cited his cotton report, which was upheld last week by the U.S.D.A. annual bulletin, as one of the services rendered by his department during his first term in office. He is actively campaigning this year to repeat his 1950 victory at the polls when he unseated J. E. McDonald, veteran politician who had held the post of Agriculture Commissioner for 20 years.

The son of a Clay County tenant farmer, White was formerly head of the Division of Agriculture at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls. He and his wife and three sons have now established their home in Austin.

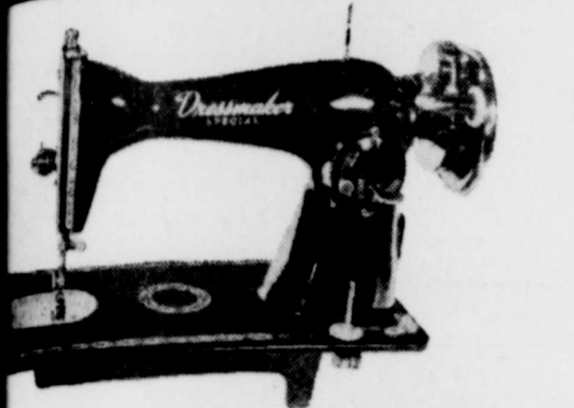

Twenty-five States Pay Teachers More Than Texas

Twenty-five states, including traditional competitors like California and Florida, now are paying their public school teachers more than Texas does, Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association, announced today.

In Texas the average classroom teacher is paid \$2,960.00 a year, whereas in New York she makes \$4,500 a year. California, the number two state in the nation, pays an average salary to teachers of \$3,900.00.

Others that rate higher than Texas are Maryland, New Jersey, Delaware, Connecticut, Michigan, Washington, Arizona, Massachusetts, Oregon, Illinois, New Mexico, Indiana, Rhode Island, Nevada, Montana, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Wisconsin, Utah, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Iowa.

Tennyson pointed out that teachers' salaries in Texas have not kept pace with the inflationary dollar. In 1939 teachers' salaries averaged \$1,420, and the salaries of all employed persons, including laborers, was 1,269. Thus teachers were 12 percent above the average. And since then the national average

for all workers has climbed to \$3,390 a year—\$430 more than the average teachers get—leaving them 12 per cent behind the national group.

This trend is making it increasingly difficult to retain good teachers and to recruit new ones, Tennyson added. College graduates trained to teach are turning to industry where salaries and wages match their professional knowledge.

In an effort to equalize present conditions, the Texas State Teachers Association will ask the next legislature to increase the minimum beginning salary for public school teachers to \$3,000 a year. The legal minimum now for teachers is \$2,403 a year.

Rent Controls Unchanged Here By Amendments

Administration of federal rent stabilization in the Wichita County area is unchanged by amendments in the new Defense Production Act which affect the operation of the Office of Rent Stabilization, Andrew E. Gilbert, area rent director, has announced. The new act became effective July 1st.

"The strong eviction protections for landlords who improve their property, and the role played by local unpaid rent advisory boards all remain as important provisions of rent stabilization," Gilbert said.

The new bill continues federal rent levels and eviction protections until April 30, 1953 in this area and in 112 other critical defense housing areas throughout the country. In critical areas, federal rent levels are effective on virtually every type of residential rental housing.

The new law provides under certain conditions for the right of appeal by the landlord or tenant to the United States

Emergency Court and from there to Court of the United States. Rental or purchase accommodations, being a feature of rent program maintained until August 1st.

Domestic Help Wages Should Be Reported to SS

Housewives employing domestic help to work on at least some part of 24 days in a calendar quarter and paying \$50.00 or more in cash wages now know how important it is to report the correct name and social security account number as well as the cash wages paid to their domestic employees, states Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

The Federal Security Agency, Social Security Administration, Baltimore, Maryland, is now mailing housewives who reported incorrectly or incompletely a request for the correct information. The request is Form

OAR-1094H, "Request for Social Security Account Numbers" and is to be answered promptly because wages reported by household employers will be used to compute the monthly social security benefits to which the domestic will be entitled upon retirement at 65 or later. These reportings will also be used when figuring the amount of any benefit payable to the family of a domestic in the event of an untimely death, Tate continues.

This procedure is necessary to properly administer the program of old-age and survivors insurance and to protect domestic employees by making sure that they receive full credit for their employment.

If you need any assistance in reporting your domestic

help's wages, be sure to contact the representative of the Wichita Falls social security office who will be in Burkburnett at the City Hall on Thursday, July 24, 1952, at 9:30 A. M.

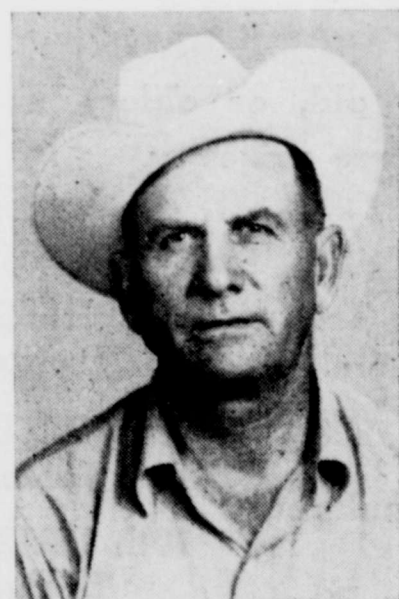

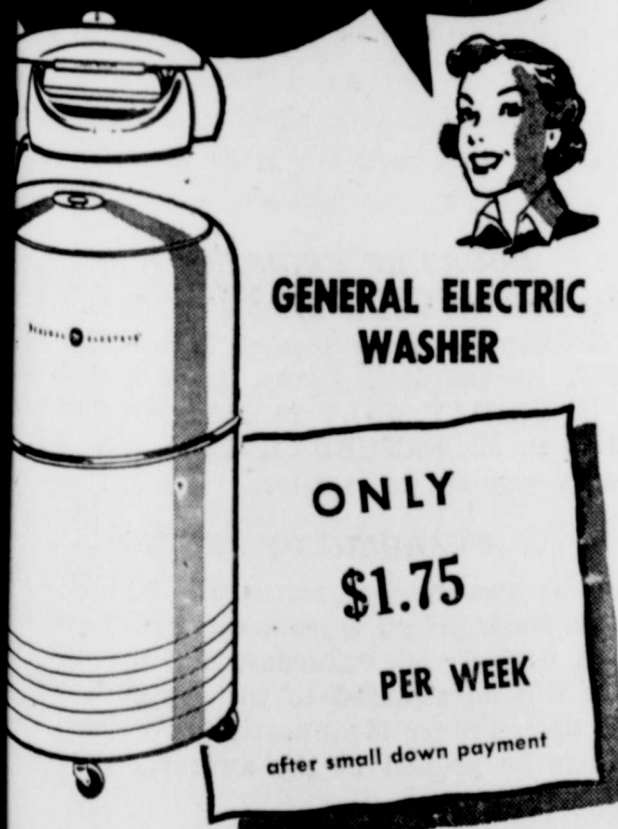

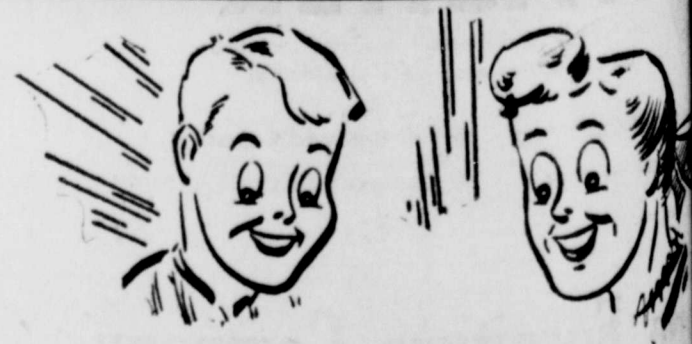

Chlordane spray and a two-bit paint brush from the drug store. Then take all the pots, pans, and dishes from the kitchen cabinet and wash them in soapy water.

Now paint the chlordane into all the cracks where shelves join walls, and around the drain and water pipes. That's all—don't paint the whole cabinet. While the spray is drying in the cabinets, paint in the corners and baseboards, behind the stove and the hot water heater where water pipes and gas pipes enter the house.

Take off the motor panel of the refrigerator, and treat the floor and corners of the motor compartment. Paint the walls behind the refrigerator, because roaches will hide any place they can find protection. Be sure to

paint around bathroom pipes, too.

In older houses it's possible that roaches will be hiding in cracks between the wall boards and door and window frames. So don't pass up a crack because it looks too small to harbor roaches. The young insects are mighty small.

After the spray in the cabinets has dried thoroughly, cover the shelves where dishes and food are stored with paper.

You can get a can of caulking compound for just a few cents, which makes filling cracks permanently an inexpensive process. But run some of the spray into cracks before sealing them up. This will kill ants, too.

All this will help you get rid of roaches, Dr. Cox emphasizes. But if you leave food exposed, they'll soon be back at the same old stand.

Walls Protected Against Wood Rot and Paint Failures

CLEVELAND, OHIO—These warm days, it is not unusual to see homeowners drill holes in modern but poorly ventilated outside walls, then insert aluminum vent-tubes which let walls dry out before painting. Moisture from laundering, bathing and cooking, seeks outlet by penetrating wallpaper and plaster into the outside wall stud space.



"No skill—just drill" and insert.

When this is tight, as in many modern homes, moisture continues into the siding and accumulates under the house paint. Here the sun turns moisture to vapor, which expands and raises paint blisters. When they crack, the paint peels. The painter or painter is usually blamed, though actually no paint can hold on wet wood.

The vent-tubes, called x-halers, are fireproof, inconspicuous, can be painted over, and reach well into the stud space to let moisture exhale. They cannot plug up from insulation. Their design prevents condensation where condensed moisture would stain interior decoration.

The makers, Cornwall & Co., recommend installing well in advance of painting, to allow walls to dry. They also suggest a moisture meter test where moisture in wood is suspected.

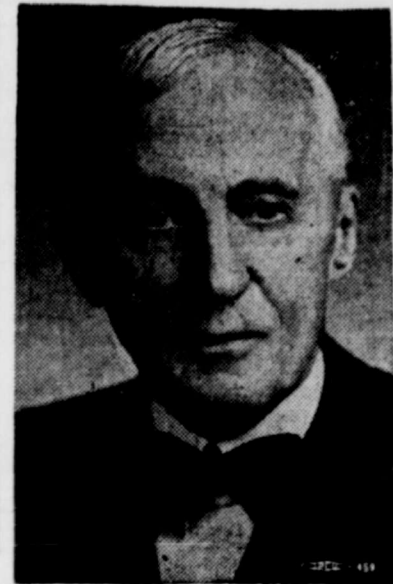

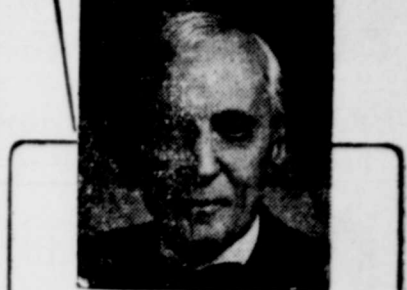
