Weekly Defense Stamp Days Set In Local Schools

We believe that you will be interested to learn that ALL of your local public schools have agreed to install a Weekly Defense Stamp Day for the 1952-53 school year, as their part in a national campaign to make Defense Stamp purchases available to at least 15 per cent of all students enrolled in each state. It is estimated that there are 1,425,000 students enrolled in public and non-public schools of Texas. At the close of the 1951-52 school year, weekly Defense Stamp Days were available to approximately 69,894 Texas students.

This means that we must resume all previous installations and make Defense Stamp purchases available to 143,856 more Texas students for 1952-53 to reach our quota.

Rites Held Tuesday In Burk Burnett for Arthur Ramming

Funeral services for Arthur Ramming, 38, farmer and dairyman of the Cooper community, were held here Tuesday at the Grace Lutheran Church.

Ramming died Sunday at a Wichita Falls hospital after a long illness.

At the services the Rev. R. L. Young, pastor of the Burk Burnett church, and the Rev. R. H. Frenking of St. Paul's Church, Wichita Falls, officiated.

Ramming had been prominent in North Texas agricultural activities, particularly soil conservation, for many years. He won several soil conservation awards on his mile square farm. At the time of his death Ramming was chairman of the Wilbarger-Wichita soil conservation board of directors. He also had served as director of the state soil conservation board.

Married in 1936
Ramming attended schools in Wichita Falls. He later lived in the Clara community before moving to the Cooper community.

In 1936 he married Sylvia Kaiser, daughter of the late Paul Kaiser and Mrs. Kaiser. Ramming was active in the Grace Lutheran Church, Burk Burnett. He was chairman of the church building committee which helped to erect the present structure. In addition, he served the church as chairman of the congregation, treasurer and secretary. At the time of his death he was an elder and Sunday School teacher. Ramming was a member of the Burk Burnett Rotary Club.

First Bale Cotton Brought In Thurs. By Leon Lindsey

The first bale of 1952 cotton to come to Burk Burnett was brought in Thursday morning by Leon Lindsey from Oklahoma. Mr. Lindsey has been farming near Devol, Oklahoma, for the past 30 years.

The first bale was brought to the Farmers Co-Operative Gin, and weighed 447 pounds, with 920 pounds of seed.

The Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce paid Mr. Lindsey a \$25.00 cash premium for the first bale of Oklahoma cotton, and the gin took care of the ginning and other courtesies usually extended the first bale.

Phillip says he is a retired rodeo performer (he is probably 18, and has a sprained ankle), and took up the microphone to tell the fans just what is happening every second. For instance, when a cowboy misses his first loop in calf roping, Phillip booms out over the public address system: "One loop and no soup." Other such remarks keeps the spectators in high spirits all during the show.

The price of admission is only 25c—so bring the whole family and come on out for one of the biggest nights of the week.

The grand entry makes its appearance promptly at 8:00 P. M. Don't be late—the bucking stock is turned out of the chutes immediately after the grand entry.

HANKINSON, N. S. NEWS: "The newspapers of the United States continue the long awaited quest to define completely the meaning of the Labor Contract. CAPTAINS OF THEIR SOULS

Members of Wylie County, Virginia, who raise cattle annually, and who have lost 75 per cent of their corn crop and somewhat less of the hay crop through the drought, are turning a deaf ear to the radio broadcasts urging them to apply for Federal loans.

The 100 to 150 farmers of the county will need \$200,000 to \$300,000 to take them over, and there is \$11,000,000 in the Wylie County bank, so some independent, substantial attempt to take care of their own problems is their own way.

The *Southwest Virginia Enterprise*, of Wytheville, sums up the county attitude this way: "The Santa Claus form of government is the only type of government that a farmer is at least one probably two generations. Each year, millions of people believe that Uncle Sam owes them a living."

"Until the day arrives that the people of America awaken to the fact that 'you don't get something for nothing'—even though it comes from Washington—every child that is born will be heir to a debt of approximately \$1,000,000,000 or the one-cent's proportional share of the National Debt that now stands at about 290 billion dollars."

"Maybe those Uncle Sam's got something!"

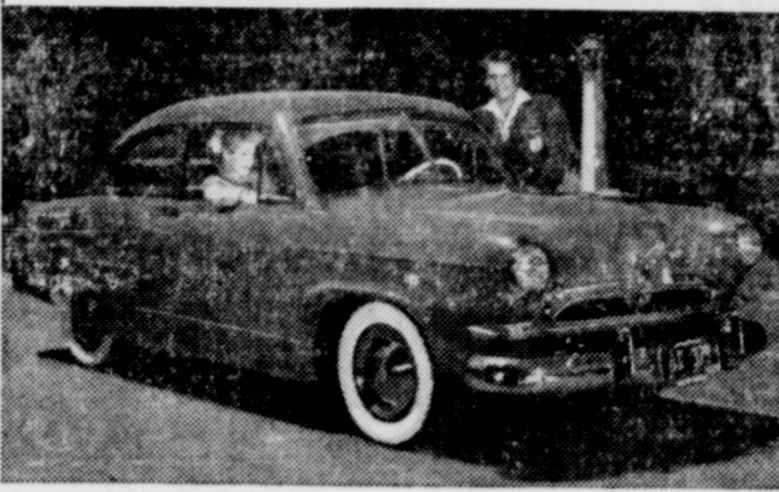

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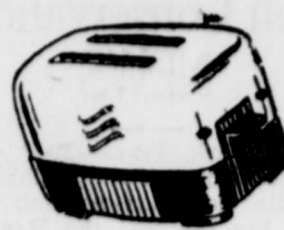

Soil Conservation NEWS

Iowa Park, Texas—T. P. Pace vice-chairman of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District, has received the Hancock legume seeder. This is a row seeder that is designed to fill the needs of farmers who grow row crops such as cotton and need to seed their cover crops before the completion of harvest.

Jack Walsor, supervisor living in the Electra area, reports that good numbers of District Cooperators near Vernon are making plans to start using one of these machines when moisture is available. Farmers wanting to use the machine located at Iowa Park should contact Mr. Pace or the Soil Conservation Office at Iowa Park. A rental rate has not yet been determined.

Similar drills seeded about 15,000 acres of winter cover crops during 1951 in Soil Conservation Districts. Some of the advantages claimed for this drill are: seeds any legume and fertilizers at the same time, seeds in middles without crop damage before harvest is complete, and seeds 3 middles at the same time.

Since time of seeding winter cover crops will be in about a month, farmers are urged to make arrangement for their seeds, fertilizers, and equipment now.

C. J. Bryan of Wichita Falls completed enlargement of a farm pond. Due to long drought and silting of old pond his storage was no longer adequate.

Glen Bear has completed about five miles of channel type terraces. Farmers are finding that terraces constructed by removing soil from the upper channel to make their ridge, are easier to farm. Also no dirt removal from the lower side reduces soil movement between terraces.

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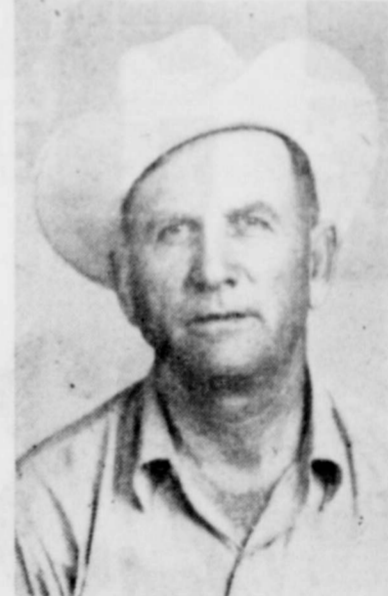

NURSES RESPOND TO RED CROSS APPEAL TO SERVE IN CRITICAL POLIO AREAS

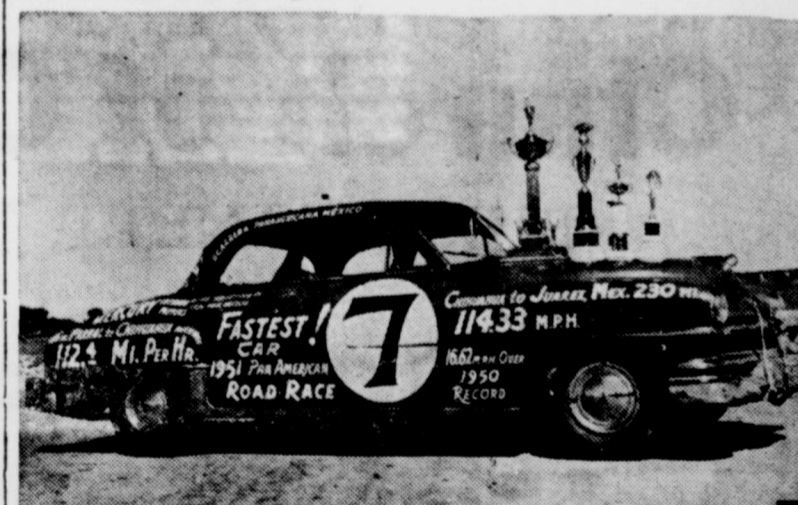

Gilbert, local rent director, announced today that such a commitment is known as a "prior opinion" and that he has been instructed by the Office of Rent Stabilization in Washington to issue prior opinions with realistic rentals, in order to bring more units on the market, and to encourage

improvement and rehabilitation. "The rent office is bound by federal regulations to state in writing the amount which may be charged, and to stand by the prior opinion if the landlord goes ahead with his plan and later files a petition or registration on the property," Gilbert said.

Office of Rent Stabilization regulations state that "Prior opinions may be requested on the comparable rental value of housing accommodations before they are brought on to the rental market or on the rental value of contemplated major capital improvements or increase in the services, furniture, furnishings and equipment."

For example, a landlord who desires to make a capital improvement on his property can easily find out how much additional rent he will be allowed, Gilbert explained. His letter requesting a prior opinion should explain fully the nature and cost

of the improvements or services to be supplied and should state in detail the terms of the contemplated rental agreement.

A landlord who requests a prior opinion on a proposed change from an unfurnished to furnished apartment, should state the location of the apartment, number of rooms, the furniture the landlord plans to install, whether the furniture is new or second-hand, the cost of the furniture, and whether the furnishings will include an ice box or mechanical refrigerator.

"The rent office will give specific dollars-and-cents answer, in advance, that will be binding when the expenditure has been made," the area rent director assured. "Thus, the owner doesn't have to gamble on a proposed investment, but can weigh the increased return in terms of what the new features will cost."

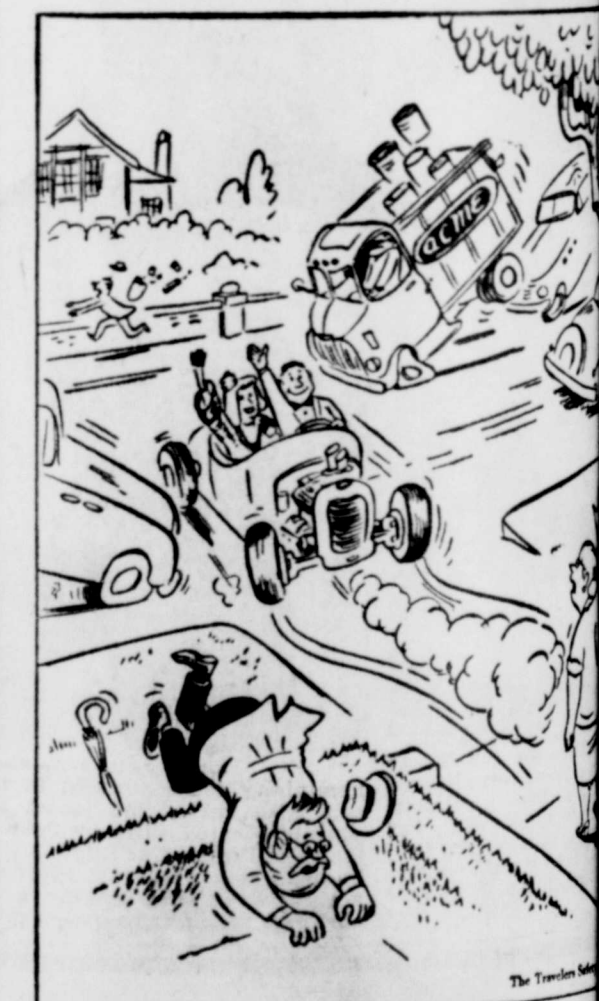

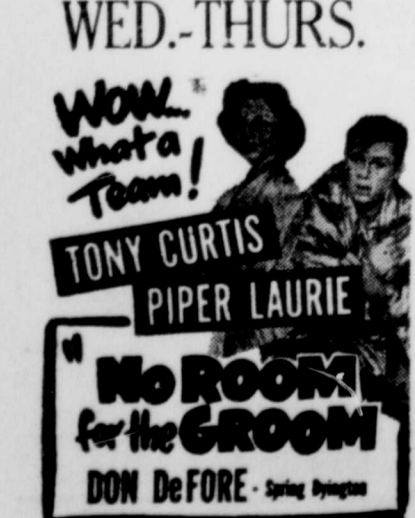

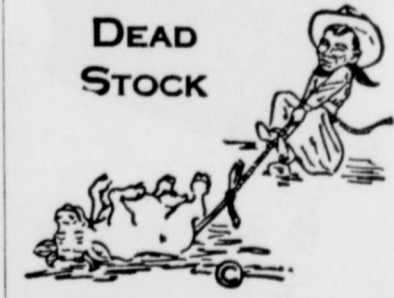
