THINGS ONE REMEMBERS

In these days when some people in both high and low positions would sell the United States short for the purposes of promoting restrictive socialism, it is well to pause and take stock of what this country has offered the individual—unlimited opportunity.

Recent news reports cite one more example of what opportunity means. J. C. Penney, merchant and agriculture expert, has just given to the University of Missouri 250 head of purebred Guernsey cattle for breeding, research and educational purposes, together with a 750-acre farm, and stocks and bonds to assure working funds, having a combined value of \$725,000.00.

Penney, who is now Chairman of the Board of J. C. Penney & Company, has demonstrated what a man can do with opportunity. He started as small as a man could in 1902 with an idea and a little store in Kemmerer, Wyoming. He believed then, as he does now, that what is needed is ability and the will to work hard toward the achievement of a goal—any goal which is right and clean and decent and worth while.

He had the ability; he had the goal; he had a sound program. Above all, he lived in a country that offered individual opportunity. Today there are over 50,000 full-time employes in over 1600 Penney Stores.

Records such as this should cause any red-blooded American to turn thumbs down on opportunity-destroying schemes which remove the chance for each individual to advance according to his ability, as did Mr. Penney.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

CORVALLIS, OREGON, Gazette-Times: "The Tax Foundation, a non-profit private organization, in a study of the extent and effects of Federal aid, points out how the states are getting into the habit of taxing and spending and spending, in order to take advantage of the grants from the Federal government. It's a vicious vise with the taxpayer caught fast between."

COATSESVILLE, PA., Record: "We, too, are anxious to see citizens have their costs reduced, but we have yet to find a satisfactory answer to the question: 'Why should the owners of rental properties make up the only group forced to take a licking?' We might ask just what costs, which the landlord must meet, have been kept down to the figure in effect when rentals were frozen?"

MESABI, MINN., Daily News: "Almost all of the people of the United States have an indirect stake in the success of the business and industrial concerns of the nation through ownership of life insurance policies."

COATSESVILLE, Pa., Record: "If you went to the bank every working day—five days a week, 52 weeks a year—and deposited \$2.04 to the credit of the United States government, you would just about be paying your proportionate share of the \$85,444,000,000 budget on a population basis."

BIG SPRING, TEXAS, Weekly News: "What high Federal taxes and inflation are doing to family incomes in Texas and other states is brought out today in a re-

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port by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce The study pointed out: A family in the \$3,000 net income group today has \$2,866.80 for living expenses after Federal income taxes. This has a purchasing power of \$1,519.40 in 1940 dollars. A family of four today must earn a net income of \$4,165 to equal a 1940 income of \$2,000.00."

LAKEWOOD, N. J., Citizen: "The 'long arm of the tax collector' is no idle expression when the tax collector is Uncle Sam . . . Total Federal government internal revenue collections for the fiscal year, which ended June 30, 1951, exceeded 50 billion dollars. This compared with slightly under 39 billion dollars the year before."

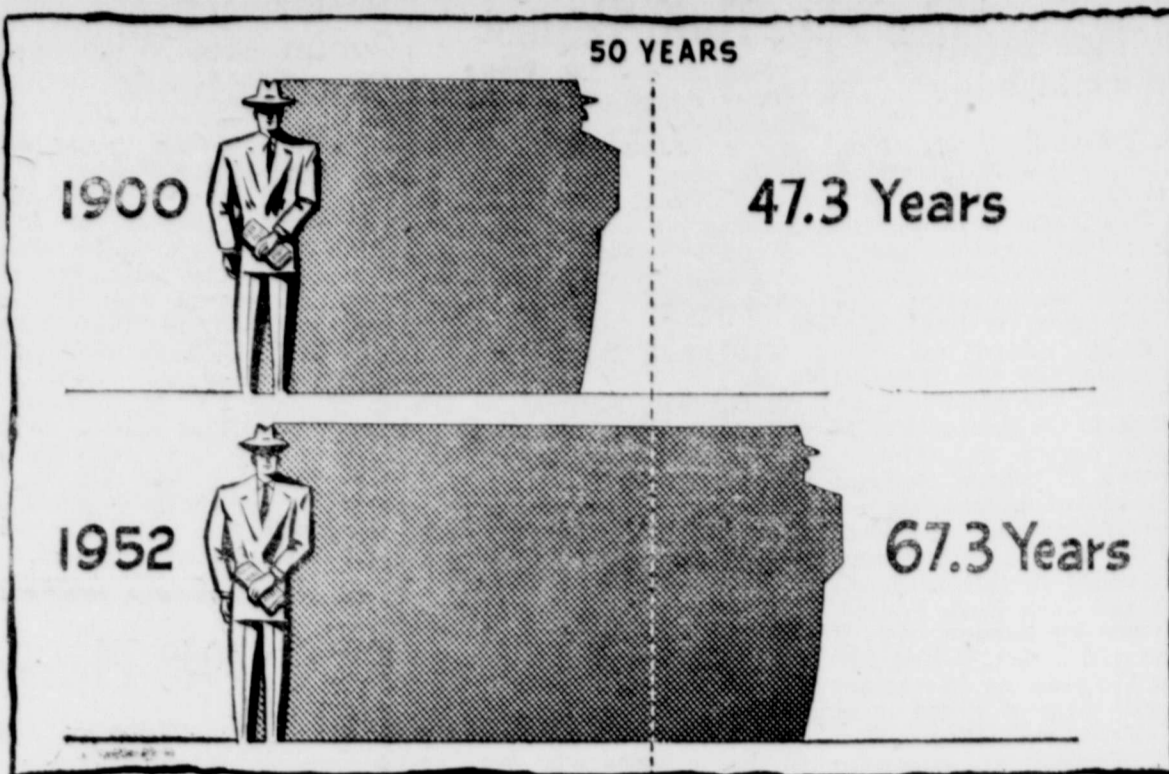

school children from the grade school through the high school will meet for short talks by a noted fire prevention expert, and will also view films pertaining to fire prevention.

Prior to the inspection day, blanks will be distributed to all home owners through the schools and other sources. The school child that returns the greatest number of these blanks, properly filled out, will receive a \$10 award, and the one returning the second largest number will receive a \$5 award. The awards will be made following the chuck wagon feed during a short program, when a noted expert will bring a brief fire-prevention address.

During the day, inspection teams will inspect all downtown business houses, seeking fire hazards. When a hazard is found, a red tag will be tied to or near the hazard, stating the nature of the hazard. No inspections will be made in the residences. Each resident is supposed to make his own inspection and properly fill out the blank which will be picked up by a school child.

The inspection scheduled for Wednesday, October 15, does not in any way have any connection with basic insurance rates. The purpose of the inspec-

tion is to eliminate as many fire hazards as possible in an effort to save human lives, as well as property. All the work is on a voluntary basis. Local Firemen and Boy Scouts will assist the inspections teams, and no effort will be made to force anyone to correct any hazards that may be found.

At 6:30 the chuck wagon feed will be held at Town Hall. Each person is to pay for his own meal, with the price probably not over \$1.00. Following the feed will be a short program and awarding prizes to students returning the most inspection blanks from residences.

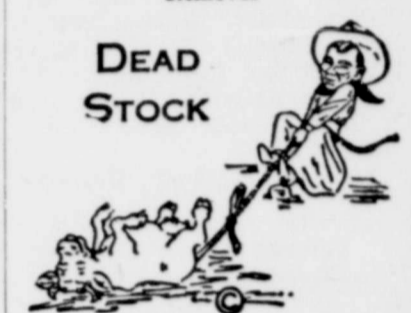
