## Fire Hazard Inspection Made Here Wednesday, Oct. 15th

### Chicken Barbecue Climaxed Day's Activities

A chicken barbecue supper at Town Hall Wednesday night climaxed the day's activities of fire inspection for fire hazards, when more than 100 gathered to hear the final report on the findings of the inspection teams.

J. Frank Kelley, Chief of the Burk Volunteer Fire Department, was in charge and called the meeting to order at 7:30. After invocation by the pastor of the Church of God, chicken, brown beans, potato salad, etc. were served buffet style and guests were seated at prepared tables. After the meal Kelley, who said "Most fires are man-made, and they can be man-prevented," introduced Virgil Hooks, president of the Texas Insurance Fieldmen's Association, who reported 12,518 persons killed by fire in 1951. Also, \$731,000,000 property damage resulted for the same year by fires.

Hooks introduced Julian Speed, organizer of the inspection here, who in turn introduced Dick Irvin, president of the Western Field Club, and Judd Stiff, chairman of the Public Relations Dept. of the Texas Insurance Fieldmen's Association. Speed praised Chief Kelley for the work he did in making the inspection here a success. Next Speed presented awards to three school children who returned the most completed home inspection blanks.

The winners of the awards were:

Sally Wulbrecht, who returned 31 and received \$15.00.

Annie Mae Morgan completed 11 reports and received \$10.00.

Close behind with 10 returns was Mary Ann Elliott who received \$5.00.

The Field Club and the Burk Burnett Fire Department each contributed one-half the prize money.

Principal speaker for the evening was Chief Grady Burns, Fire Marshal of Dallas, Texas. Mr. Burns, using illustrations of fires he has inspected recently, brought a very informative address to the gathering. Mr. Burns said: "Your firemen are here to extinguish the fires you people start. They are not here to prevent fires—though they will do everything they can to help—and they are not here to make corrections of the hazards pointed out by the inspection. The responsibility of making those corrections rests squarely upon the shoulders of the owners of the places of business where the hazards exist."

**Inspection Teams**  
All day Wednesday inspection teams were busy in down town buildings, searching out fire hazards and tagging them with red tags. There were 32 inspectors, 14 Boy Scouts, and eleven firemen. When hazards were found, the Boy Scouts tagged them. In all, 148 places of business, churches and school buildings were inspected. A total of 336 hazards, most of them electrical, were tagged and suggestions made for removing the hazards.

**Two Burk Boys Back After Tour In The Far East**

Two Burk Burnett, Texas, men Mitchell W. Gee, fireman, USN son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis N. Gee of Route 1, and Elmer G. Tyler, electrician's mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wyley J. Tyler of 613 Park St., recently arrived in Long Beach, California, aboard the heavy cruiser, USS Bremerton after a tour of duty in the Far East.

While the Bremerton was in the combat zone, she fired more than 12,000 rounds of ammunition into enemy targets destroying 268 bunkers, 44 mortar positions, 4 large supply dumps and 5 large fuel and ammunition depots. She ranged from front line positions to within a few miles of the northern border of Korea, blasting the enemy at every opportunity.

This water is much softer and has less salt content than the water gathered near the pumping plant. Additional wells will be drilled on Prescott and also at the pumping station this winter, according to Mr. Carver.

### Burkburnett Blasts Temple, Oklahoma By a Score of 33-7

Donald Gee gave Bulldog fans an idea of what was to happen when he took the opening kick-off and raced 83 yards to score at Temple last Friday night. Unfortunately, the play was called back for a clipping penalty against Burk. Five plays later Burk scored on a 38 yard ramble by Jerry McClure. Knox tried for the extra point, which was wide.

After the kick-off the Burk line held Temple on downs and took over on the Burk 15 yard line. McClure ran the end for 25 yards. Maben passed to Gee who made a good catch, and the play covered 35 yards, putting the ball on Temple's 25 yard line. Jerry McClure then turned his left end behind good blocking for a T. D. Bowden Maben's kick was good for the extra point, and Burk led 13-0.

As the first quarter ended, a bad kick by Temple resulted in Burk's third score of the game. The Tigers punted from their own 15 and the ball bounded back to the 14 yard line. Maben picked up 4 yards around right end and Donald Knox ran off right gaud for 10 yards and a score. Maben missed the try for extra point and the score at the half was 19-0, Burk.

Burk held Temple on downs after the kick-off, starting the second half, and on the first play, Knox went through left guard for 27 yards. Maben made 4 to the 14. Jerry McClure ran his left end for 9 to the 5 yard line, where Knox plunged over. Maben's kick, with Ragsdale holding was good and Burk led 26-0.

Temple fumbled on the 50 yd. line and Burk recovered. McCabe passed to Gee for 18. Bryant ran his left end for 30 yds. after McCabe had been thrown for 13 yd. loss. Knox made five yds. off tackle and then turned the other side for 4. Knox again rammed the line for 3, and then carried to the 1 ft. line, from where he went over on the next try. Maben's kick was good and brought Burk to 33-0.

Brown of Temple took the kick-off on his 10 yard line and after faking a hand-off sprinted 90 yards for the lone Tiger score.

The game was a hard fought affair, generously sprinkled with penalties for unnecessary roughness.

Leading ground gainer for the Bulldogs was Jerry McClure, who piled up 188 yards from scrimmage. The Burk line was again a driving, hard smashing unit that opened up huge holes for the ball carriers.

## FORMULA FOR PEACE

Earthly power girded by prayer is The American Legion's 1953 formula for peace and a secure America. This was the statement here today of Lewis W. Brocker, Commander of Frye-Vaughn Post No. 264 of The American Legion of Burk Burnett as he called upon eligible veterans of World Wars I and II and of the Korean conflict to actively support this program.

"Every honorably discharged war veteran of this community can and should support this realistic program of The American Legion for world peace through American strength," Commander Brocker declared. "By joining The American Legion and contributing his individual interest and energies, every ex-service man and woman of Burk Burnett can help to restore decency and law and order to this chaotic world."

Commander Brocker pointed out The American Legion recognized the futility of relying upon the United Nations as it is presently constituted to be effective for world peace and to assure American security.

"Fundamental changes must be brought about before this international organization can become a compelling force for global law and order," he said. "Until such a time, The American Legion is convinced that only American strength—not on paper but in being—can prevent the tragedy of World War III. To this end The American Legion urges the immediate build-up of American moral, economic and military strength within the limits of our economy to give fighting weight to our leadership of the free world toward a new era of enduring world peace."

## Well Done, Good Neighbor

President Rafael L. Trujillo of the Dominican Republic (formerly Santo Domingo) has just stepped out of office to become an elder statesman and advisor to his industrious, friendly people. In his 22 years at the head of his country, Trujillo lifted this nearly bankrupt, one-crop nation by its own boot straps from dire need to a commanding position among the few progressive, prosperous, debt-free, multi-crop nations of the world.

From the beginning of his first term as president in 1930, when a hurricane all but leveled the capital city and killed 4,000, Trujillo, in the face of great odds, slowly built his country in modern fashion into perhaps the cleanest, healthiest country in this hemisphere. Now pure water is piped everywhere and visitors may have complete confidence in sanitary conditions.

The favorable trade balance of the country in the last fifteen years has exceeded \$250,000,000. Thrifty, hard-working depositors through the banks and people enjoy life in a land where food is reasonable and plentiful, and labor is happy.

Trujillo, from the outset, dictated a policy for his country's future development and adhered strictly to it. He now leaves a desk over which he toiled peacefully and honestly to establish the nation's economic independence . . . to rest and look on as the country's natural resources are further developed to assure continued security and contentment for his 2,100,000 people.

## SUSPENDED CITIZENSHIP

We have it on the authority of The Wall Street Journal and the Movers Conference of America, that 36 million Americans will move from one home to another during 1952.

That is nearly a quarter of our population. It means nearly a quarter of our voters won't be eligible to exercise their franchise in this critical presidential election. There's no way, in a free country, to make people stay put. But why not extend voting privileges under the old residence until the nomads have qualified at the new one?

OIL PROGRESS WEEK



# Progress 1952

Texans have a natural interest in the oil industry, which is so important in our State, and in the progress made since Oil Progress Week was last observed. Here are a few quick facts:

**New Wells**—During the twelve months ending August 31, 1952, the Texas oil industry drilled 17,000 new wells, at a cost of over \$700 million. Most of the heavy expense of drilling these new wells was paid from earnings plowed back into the development of the State's oil resources.

**Transportation**—The total mileage of Texas' trunk pipe lines for oil and finished products is over 29,000. This low-cost transportation system is a major factor in the maintenance of the low prices you pay for petroleum products.

**Production** has reached a record level. Texas currently is producing about 46 per cent of all the crude oil produced in the U. S. In the year ending August 31, Texas production totaled about 1,015 million barrels. There are now 133,800 producing oil wells in Texas.

**Reserves**—Proved oil reserves in Texas of 18 billion barrels represented 57 per cent of the U. S. total at the beginning of 1952. During 1951, the last year for which figures are available, proved reserves increased two billion barrels. These are developed oil reserves and the figure is important: developed reserves supply our needs currently and provide reserve capacity that is immediately available when we need it.

**Refining**—The Texas refineries will have a big year. They now employ, in round numbers, 46,000 Texans, and process about 28% of all the oil refined in the U. S. The daily refining capacity of all Texas refineries exceeds 2,000,000 barrels. A program to expand and improve these facilities has been general throughout the industry.

**Taxes**—The Texas oil industry continues to be the largest tax-payer in the State. Through the year ending August 31, gross production taxes alone on Texas oil and natural gas amounted to more than \$130 million; in addition, the industry pays large amounts in other taxes.

In brief, the Texas oil industry during the past year continued to do its part in meeting the demand for oil. It has expanded pipelines to provide low-cost transportation. It has improved facilities for making more and better petroleum products for your use. Today, two gallons of gasoline do work that required three gallons in 1925; and the gasoline costs no more than it did then.
