His complete mastery prevented the administration from using the law passed by Congress which could have given his union members a chance to decide for themselves whether they wished to strike or to return to work. The suspension of production for so many weeks set back the defense program, caused unemployment in other lines, and interfered ruthlessly with the nation's normal activities . . . It is monopoly whenever one man or a few men can stop many thousands from working and can shut off necessary materials with no regard for the welfare of

the whole country. "A change is needed to rescue the nation from these new monopolies."
