Rotary Dist. Gov. Addressed Local Rotarians Tuesday

Tuesday noon, District Governor of Rotary Ernest H. Hereford, President of Arlington State College, Arlington, visited the local club and delivered a very inspiring address. A part of the address follows:

"It is a real pleasure that I experience today in meeting with the Rotary Club of Burk Burnett, and attempting to recall to your minds some of the program of Rotary. I shall mention some of the basic principles on which the organization is founded and the various ways to apply these principles. I shall try to give you a glimpse into what could be if we have faith in the future and a willingness to serve.

"A little over one hundred years ago a man resigned from the United States Patent Office because, as he said in his letter of resignation which is still on file in the archives at Washington: 'All of the great inventions have been accomplished and there is no future in this job.' Since that foolish individual, who was without faith in the future, resigned, what has happened? We have discovered the steam engine, the diesel engine, the jet propulsion engine, the telephone, motion pictures, radio, radar, submarine, airships, insulin, sulfa drugs, penicillin, and atomic power.

"A little over sixty years ago, a government official in Washington announced that all the canals and railroads had been built and that progress in transportation in the United States was at an end. When this statement was made from the lips of an individual who was blind to the possibilities of the future, Thomas Edison was 39, Henry Ford 23, Steinmetz 21, Orville Wright 15, Marconi 12 and Einstein 7.

"How easy it is for us to smile, if not laugh, at those statements.

"Rotary, like anything else worthwhile, demands of us, as officers and leaders of the movement, that we put first things first.

"What is needed now is inspired work. Use the machinery to secure, with the help of the membership committee, the right men.

"Before a man is finally accepted as a member, he should be interviewed by one or two members. This is a fine opportunity to utilize past presidents.

"Having the new member, remember that neither fire nor flood can kill the good will created by friendship but neglect can.

"The future of our respective races is not in the minds of statesmen, legislators, or the judiciary but in the minds and hearts of the mothers and fathers of today.

"What will happen in twenty-five or fifty years time is being inculcated in the minds of the children of today by the example of the fathers and mothers of this generation.

"Let us extend Rotary by bringing in new members, striving for quality always and not quantity, and by seeking to establish clubs where none exist now. Get more members in Rotary and more Rotary in members.

"Continue to stress the four lanes of service. President Brue, of Rotary International, urges careful attention to Vocational Service and International Service. I know of no better way to exemplify the ideals of Rotary than through Vocational Service.

"Just remember that our organization has two words in the name: Rotary International. You have no right to use the name Rotary unless you know and follow the International plan and organization. If Rotary is to succeed on the international level, each club, everywhere, must follow Rotary policies and present a united front. Stress attendance, the classification principle, vocational service, and other basic principles of the organization."

The fighting Burk Burnett Bulldogs go into their first conference game of the season as underdogs. They meet the big team from Quanah, also playing their first conference game.

The Bulldogs are crippled by the loss of some key players, and the doubtful starting ability of some others.

Wendell Hale is out for the remainder of the season with a broken leg received in the Nocona game two weeks ago. The injury list also includes Lloyd Muhlinghouse, McCabe, Bean, Byron Key and Donald Gee. Gee, an all-district candidate received a severely bruised leg on a hayride last week. The remainder of the team is in fair shape, but they will miss the services of the regulars.

Despite the injuries, many Burk Burnett fans feel that with anything like even breaks, the Bulldogs will come out on top Friday night. They will be at the game several hundred strong, yelling all the while.

Large Quanah Crowd
Quanah is showing their boys just how strong they believe in them by coming some five or six hundred strong. The Quanah school was sent more than 300 tickets last week, and in a day or so they phoned to send them at least 300 more seats. They got all of Section D and E on the West side of the stadium.

If the Bulldogs play with the same determination to win they did against Nocona, the Quanah Indians will know they have been to a ball game, and they may go home carrying the short end of the figures on the score board.

AIDING THE COMMUNISTS

At more or less regular intervals, the oil industry is attacked on one political pretext or another. That is the case today—with special emphasis on the operations of American oil companies abroad, despite the fact that they have performed miracles in developing once-primitive nations, have brought new concepts of civilization to native peoples, and have produced huge quantities of oil desperately needed by the free world.

The layman can't be expected to understand all the complex ramifications of the political attack. But he can understand certain truths. For instance, Fortune magazine recently quoted this observation by Walter Levy, an authority on world oil: "Oil in the ground in the underdeveloped countries of the Middle East or elsewhere is of no value to no one. It required the capital and skill of the American and British companies to bring it out of the ground—a skill and an investment that cannot presently be duplicated in the underprivileged countries. It also requires the markets of the importing countries to translate the oil resources into an economic value."

If it hadn't been for the willingness of free enterprise to take long risks, most of the foreign oil would still be deep underground in trackless wastes. Is that what the government would like? In any event, the current attacks are giving welcome propaganda to the communists and others whose purpose is to undermine every free nation and to eventually enslave the whole world. Washington politicians are playing conscienceless politics with a vengeance.

THINGS ONE REMEMBERS

Manufacturers of soft and hard bottled drinks could perform a public service and make many friends for themselves by one simple little act.

Anyone who drives the highways today has seen the shoulders of roads littered with bottles. Manufacturers of these products could stick a label on each bottle and a message in each case, warning drinkers of the danger to life and limb caused by throwing their "empties" on the highway.

Of course, it is against the law in most states to throw out bottles and refuse, but there cannot be a traffic officer behind each car.

Wayne Chambers entertained as his guest at Lions Club, his son-in-law, Sgt. Bowles.

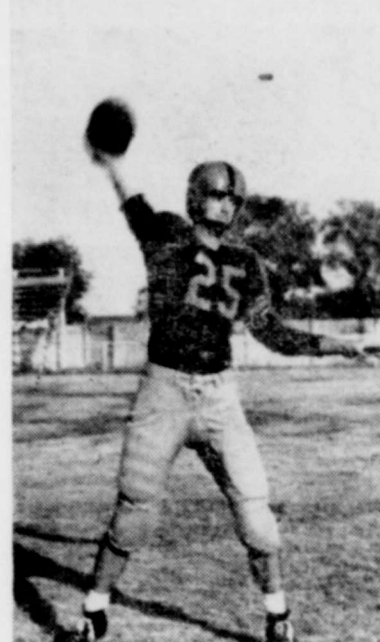
S. A. King, agent for the M. K. & T. Railroad, stated this week that his office has been designated as a receiving place for all tires over the limit allowed each automobile owner.

Raymond Wallace, of the Naval Reserve, has a new overseas address, according to word received here by relatives.

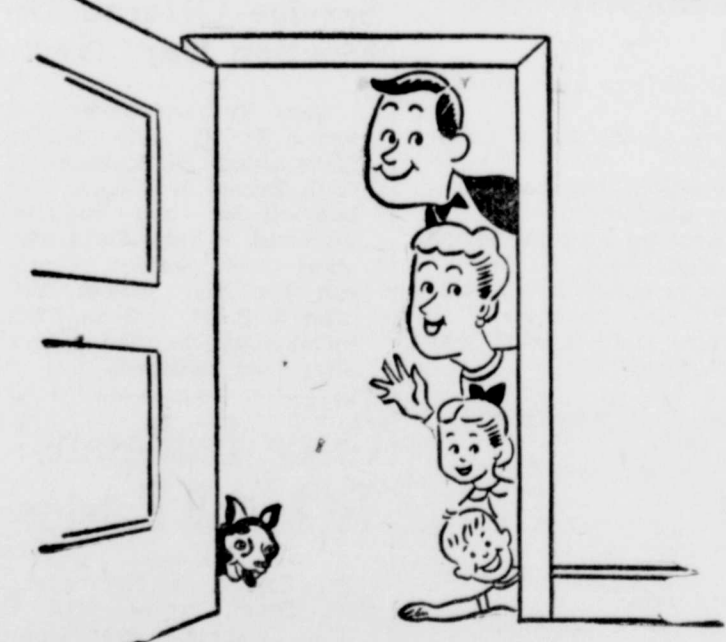

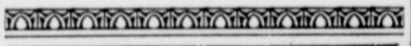

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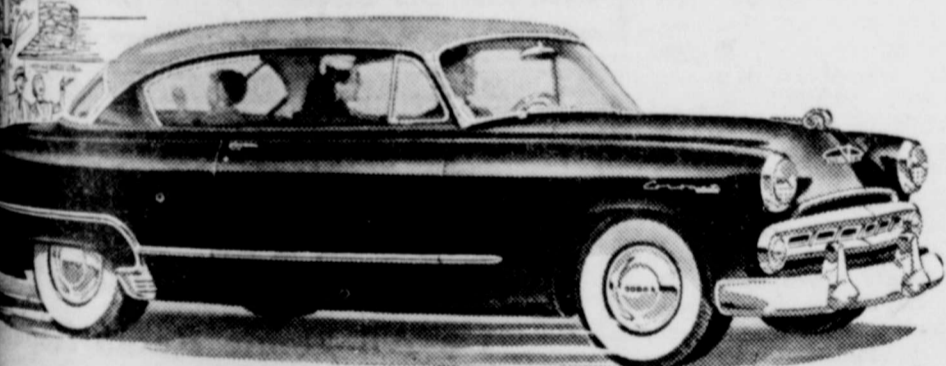
