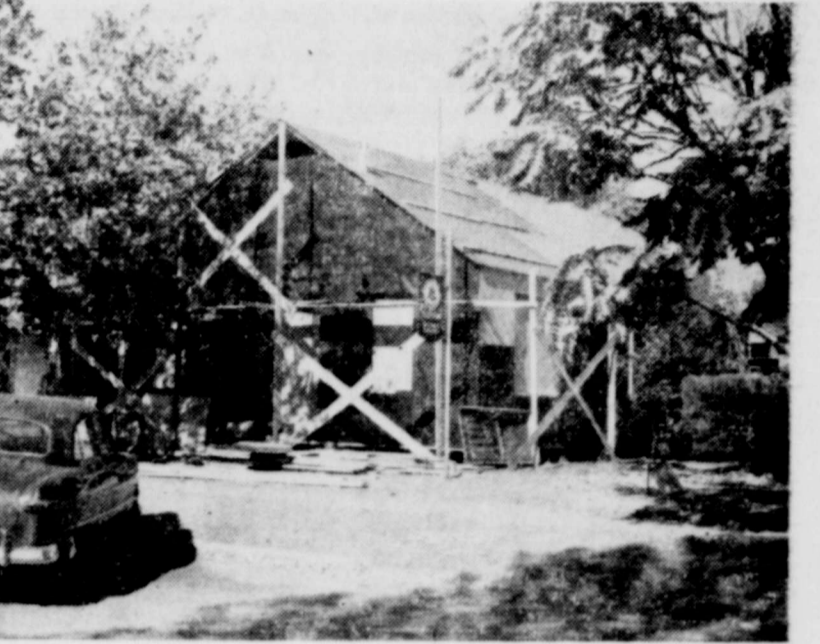
B. H. Johnson Honored Guest At Birthday Party

Protection for 90,000,000 Citizens

By the first of next year, more than 90,000,000 Americans will be covered by some form of voluntary health insurance, according to an American Medical Association official.

This is a fact in which every one with an interest in the public health may take pride. The first voluntary plan came into existence only 30 years ago, in Seattle. Now every state in the Union has voluntary health insurance, sponsored either by medical societies or lay organizations. In late years their growth has reached the spectacular stage.

There has also been a remarkable growth in community health councils. In 1943 there were but 48 of these councils in the entire United States. Now there are 1190.

Here is one of the compelling reasons why the scheme for compulsory government health insurance—a scheme which, incidentally, President-elect Eisenhower is solidly against—failed to gain a sizable following either in Congress or among the public at large. No one argues that the voluntary plans have solved all our health problems. But they have solved many of them, and the extent of their coverage has been steadily broadened. The remaining problems—some of which, such as catastrophic illness, are extraordinarily difficult—are being extensively studied and experimental efforts at solutions are being tried.

It is also significant that the medical profession warmly supports soundly-conceived and administered voluntary plans. Thus the battle to mitigate the economic impact of illness and accident forges successfully ahead.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE

An interesting sidelight on the enormous difference between a free competitive economy and a controlled, politically-bossed economy is found in a New York Times news item concerning a change in the British government's policy on selling gasoline.

There has been no competition in the sale of gas in England since 1939—all of it has been marketed under a pool arrangement. The new policy will mark a return to competition so far as premium grades are concerned. Brand names will be authorized and the consumer will again have the right to take his pick.

The Times story said, "Now that competition is about to be reintroduced, the oil companies have started courses in training their employees in service and courtesy." The inference here is certainly plain. In the absence of competition, there is no need for service and courtesy—and if the customer doesn't like it he can lump it.

This also provides a revealing contrast with the way gas and other oil products are sold in the U. S. When the customer drives in his windshield is cleaned, his tires are inflated, his battery is checked, and it's all done with a smile. If a dealer fails to come up to scratch, he soon finds that the cars are going right by instead of driving in. This is true throughout all American industry, big and little. Competition forces enterprise to give us what we want, when we want it, at a fair price.

BIG JOBS WANTED

According to many politicians and bureaucrats, the tremendous electric power needs of this nation can only be met by putting the government into the power business on a huge scale. In other words, tax-free, tax-subsidized socialism is their answer.

Fortunately for the country, one of the most important government agencies doesn't seem to share that view. That agency is the Atomic Energy Commission. It has announced approval of an agreement with 15 private power companies, known collectively as the Ohio Valley Electric Corporation, to supply the 1,800,000 kilowatts of electric power required to operate the uranium-235 production plant being constructed in Pike County, Ohio.

The participating companies are being given the responsibility of providing the largest single block of power ever supplied in this country. They will build two new plants for that purpose, and the total power requirement is to be available by the middle of 1956. The

present estimated cost of the plants and transmission facilities is \$400,000,000 and every nickel of it will come from private sources—not from the public treasury. Most of it will be raised by the sale of first mortgage bonds to institutional investors.

Impressive as this is, it is by no means unique. The investor-owned power companies have carried on the greatest expansion program in industrial history since the end of World War II. The new plants which have been built have doubled our power capacity. No needed job has been too big or too difficult. It is an ironical fact that they have been blocked from taking on a number of big new jobs by the Washington bureaucrats who are promoting the Federal power socialization program. That has been true on the Niagra River in New York, on the Snake River in Idaho, on projects in California, Virginia and elsewhere. Private enterprise is ready to spend hundreds of millions on any needed project. Socialist-obstructionism, which puts an alien ideology ahead of the interests of the nation, is all that stands in the way.

Private enterprise has been, is, and will be the greatest and most constructive force for progress the world has ever known.

Taxes Cost More Than Food

Ask the average man what his chief family expense is, and he'll probably reply food.

But he'd be wrong. The Chamber of Commerce of the United States points out that the average family's tax bill is greater than its combined food and clothing budgets.

For fiscal 1952, the total tax bill is around \$86,500,000,000, of which \$62,100,000,000 consists of Federal taxes and the rest state and local levies. That amounts to \$500,000,000 more than the Department of Commerce says we spent for food and clothing in 1951. Prospects paint a darker picture for 1953 when the Federal tax alone may jump \$7,000,000,000.

So many of our taxes are collected as a hidden part of the cost of all the things we buy that most people don't realize the magnitude of the load. In 1939 all taxes averaged less than \$400 per family—today the figure is close to \$2,000.

The Federal debt now totals \$260,000,000,000, which means that the average Federal mortgage on each family is \$5,860, in addition to state and local debt mortgages. We will never be able to reduce our debt mortgages and tax liability until government cuts wasteful spending and keeps expenditures within the limits of its income.

L. W. Harvel, area conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service from Vernon, told the members of the District Board that a new work unit located at Burkburnett would be opened. Loyd Ladd, work unit conservationist from Canadian, will be in charge of the office. This move was made to better serve the conservation needs of the District co-operators farming near Burkburnett.
Henry Vaughn of Burkburnett was elected supervisor from sub-division 3 of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District to fill the unexpired term held by the late Arthur Ramming. Joe Bradley, Wichita County Agent, was in charge of the election, while J. C. Porter, Agricultural representative of the First National Bank of Wichita Falls, was the speaker. T. J. Pace, of Iowa Park, represented the District governing body.
Oscar Klinkerman, district co-operator farming north of Clara and Iowa Park, practices conservation because it pays.
Klinkerman has an average of 24 bushels per acre during 10 years. His lowest has been 18 bushels. Conservation, contour cultivation, the rotation, and management is his key to success.
