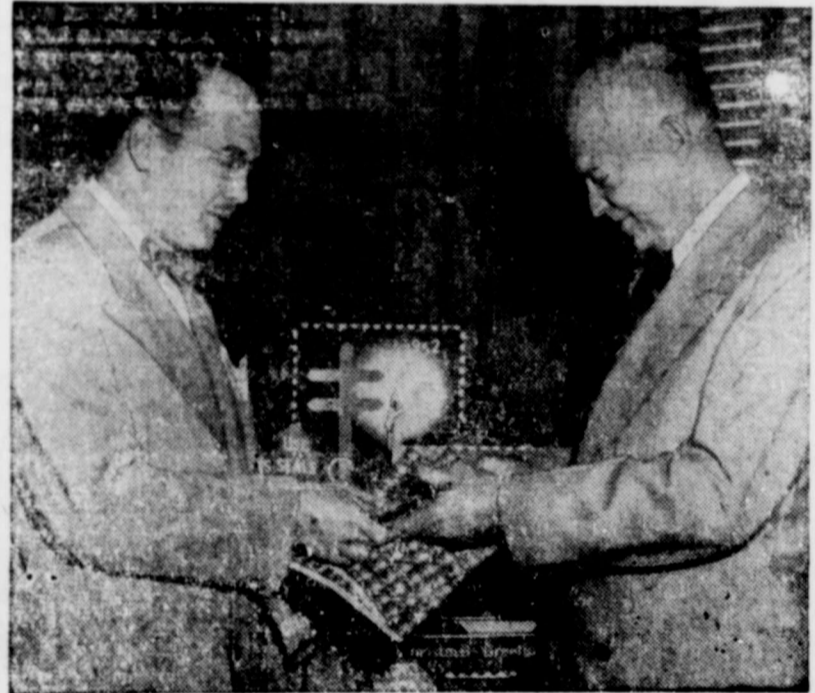

### Local T-V Fans Get San Francisco On Direct Program

Last Monday night, local T-V enthusiasts received the thrill that comes once in a lifetime by receiving a television program direct from San Francisco, Calif. It all took place about 6:30 P. M. Pacific Coast Time, when Frank Parker, local T-V set owner called Johnnie L. Herring at Herring's Radio and T-V Service, the local Motorola dealer, and told him that he had San Francisco on Channel 4, with his antenna to the West and called other set owners in town. The picture and sound was of excellent quality and lasted for a period of about 45 minutes.

Occurrences of this nature are extremely rare, especially at this time of the year. In May and June of each year, it is quite common to receive stations as far distant as 1500 to 2,000 miles, because of the ionized atmosphere above the earth's surfaces depending upon the radiating station's power and antenna height. Under "freak conditions" however, T-V signals are bounced back to earth from the layer above the earth and back again many times, similar to echoes of sound or reflections of light from mirror to mirror. When this happens the distance stations can be received, varies for many miles.

As all local T-V viewers know, the problems of interfering stations on the same channel sometimes gets monotonous under certain conditions and times. Channel 4, located in Oklahoma City is the local favorite, because it can usually be received at certain hours every day. Sometimes however, KRLD-TV in Dallas also a channel 4, comes in with the other station and causes the screen to show everything but a program. Since chan-

## COGENT QUESTION

The oil industry as a whole has been the subject of consistent political attack. And much of it has been directed at the foreign operations of American oil companies which have spent vast amounts of money and effort abroad in order to provide the Free World with oil vitally needed. The high point is found in a staff report to the Federal Trade Commission entitled "The International Oil Cartel," which names seven American companies. The whole inference is that the activities of these concerns and their foreign associates have been bad.

Few people can understand the legalism involved. But certain facts can be appreciated by all of us. One fact is that, due in large part to the success of American private enterprise in finding and developing oil resources in the far corners of the world, the Free World today is producing some 11,000,000 barrels of oil each day as compared with 1,000,000 by Russia and her satellites.

Another is that in 1919 American companies produced about 19,000 barrels per day in foreign operations, of which all but 5,000 came from Mexico. Today their concessionary interests abroad account for 2,500,000 barrels a day. U. S. Domestic oil production has risen from about 1,000,000 to 6,250,000 barrels a day during the same period of time.

It has been cogently asked "whether this record of production, which has kept ahead of rapidly rising demand and has made it possible to keep oil prices low, fits your concept of what a cartel is supposed to do. What is your answer to that question."

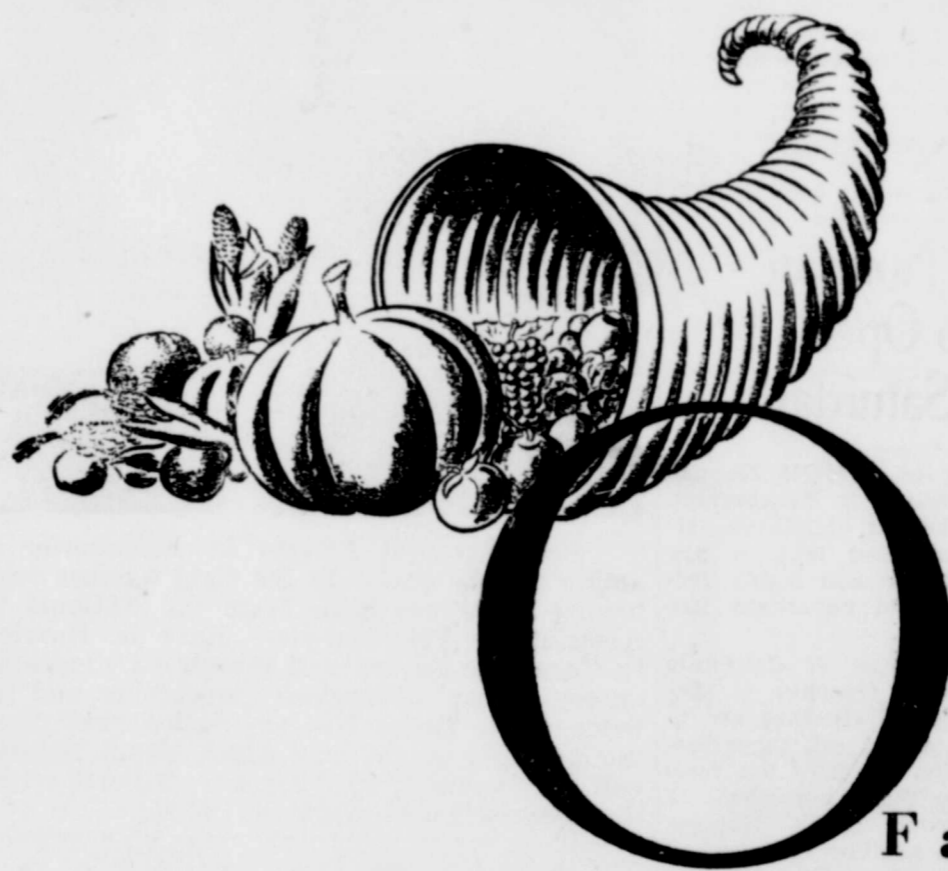

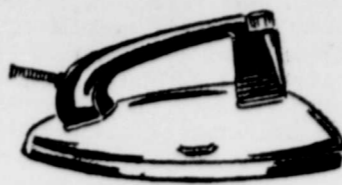

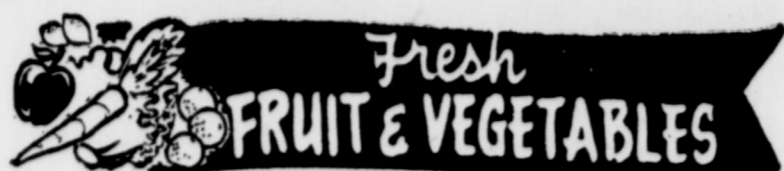

**Write To Remove Rent Controls**

The Wichita Falls Rent Advisory Board voted Tuesday, November 19, to recommend removal of all rent controls in the entire Wichita Falls defense tract area.

H. L. Hodge, Jr., chairman of the board, announced the recommendation was based on the results of a survey made by the local and regional office of real estate stabilization, construction and the Washington office. The survey indicates that the peak of continuing maximum rent in this area no longer exists, the said due to construction of new housing accommodations.

The rent advisory board represented the entire area, including Wichita Falls, Electra, Iowa Park and Burkburnett.

The recommendation of the board now goes to Washington where it is expected to be approved by the critical area advisory committee. When this approval is announced, rent controls will be removed in the area.

Hodge advised, however, that until the area is officially notified of decontrol, rent stabilization is still in effect and landlords and tenants must continue to observe the law.

Results of the ORS survey were presented to the board at the Tuesday meeting by Donald S. Stephens, regional director of Dallas.

The survey, made during the week of November 12, covered a population of 214 families. It took into consideration the number of family units in Stephens; Mt. Vernon; Hill; Wilton; and other areas by the Wichita Falls Housing Authority, and the building of other houses in various parts of the city.
