## Ed Gossett Declares Individual "Must Be Uppermost"

Reported in The Wichita Daily Times Sat., January 10th

Former Congressman Ed Gossett, now general counsel for Southern Bell Telephone Company, told some 220 guests at the annual Burk Burnett Chamber of Commerce banquet Friday night, Jan. 9, that "the individual must remain uppermost in our way of life."

Gossett told the Texans and Oklahomans in the Burk Burnett Town Hall that "regimentation and over-urbanization must be offset by a rebirth of individualism to preserve the principles which make democracy work."

Prior to Gossett's intense plea for a return to the "old-fashioned ways of doing things," G. C. Gresham was installed as president for the Burk Burnett Chamber for 1953.

At the Ceremonies B. W. Gresham, minister of the Church of Christ, introduced Gresham as the new president and introduced the following new officers and boards of officers which had been elected by Tom Britton.

The officers of the 1953 chamber are: Will Teal, 1st vice-president; J. C. Roye, 2nd vice-president; J. V. Brookshear, president; and A. R. Hill, secretary.

Continue in Office Secretary Manager Ray Hill and Secretary Marjorie Hosenberger continue to hold office from the former group.

Gossett introduced guests from the banquet from Oklahoma, Randlett and Walling, Okla.; and Wichita Falls, Texas, Devol, Electra and Iowa.

Gossett, a North Texas country boy who made his way to Washington Congress and held his position there until he resigned his present job, warned his subject rapidly.

The Ten Commandments and the Ten on the Mount are just as true in the scientific civilization they tell us we live in today as in any other time."

Gossett big government and labeling business men "political cowards," Gossett said they—like most of the nation—were too much concerned with making everything "modern," but not necessarily any better.

Good Year Ahead Britton said a profitable year to come under the new officers. He said he was proud to live in a place where people are discontented and want to improve what they have.

In his acceptance talk, Gresham said the new president, said he was the chamber post because of the realization that citizens must fulfill their obligation to the community and this was one way he could do so.

## Highway 240 West of Burk To Be Widened

This week Commissioner W. T. Holman has been busy securing additional right-of-way along Highway 240 West of Burk Burnett, prior to widening and surfacing this road.

The present right-of-way is only 100 feet, and since Federal funds will be used on the road, 120 ft. of right-of-way must be secured.

Looking to the future, Federal aid roads need the wider right-of-ways. They reason that in a few years four and six-lane highways will be common, and to buy right-of-way after extensive improvements are made near the highways would be too expensive.

The State Highway Dept. has assured Mr. Holman that Federal aid money for the project is available, and when the right-of-way is secured the work should be started in the near future.

Highway 240 is the only Federal-aid road in Wichita County which is only 16 feet wide. The new road will be widened to 24 feet. The dangerous curves just west of the Doc Goins home will be corrected along with the widening job.

## Background of Football Speaker Murray Evans



Murray Evans, a former Bulldog star football player, will be the principal speaker at the annual football banquet sponsored by the Quarterback Club Friday night, January 16th.

The following information was obtained from Hardin-Simmons University at Abilene, where Murray is head coach:

Head foreman of the Hardin-Simmons University football corral is Murray Evans, former Cowboy star, professional footballer, and the type of man you like to know.

Slow, easy going, the personable Evans lettered on the 1939, 1940 team which plowed through a tough season to tack up an undefeated and untied record, and the 1941 team which tied for the Border Conference championship.

He will use the Wing-T which features unorthodox line spacings, set flankers, baffling spreads, and the concentration of amazing power over holes created by a shifting line gap.

He first mastered the Wing-T in 1941, when he blossomed into one of the Border Conference's greatest backs. He was one of the most effective passers in the conference and his "homerun heaves" to end H. C. Burris, which helped bring the Cowboys many touchdowns, is still a topic for discussion by many of the H-SU armchair quarterbackers.

He was named head football coach after many prominent names of the football circle had been dealt with. He served a total of five years as assistant under Warner B. Woodson, now at Arizona.

Following graduation in 1942, Evans played in professional ranks with the Detroit Lions for two years. He had one of the best passing records in the league as a freshman. He later served with the United States Navy, and while at the Naval Bainbridge Station in Maryland, starred in football. Evans returned to take over H-SU line coaching duties in 1946 and that year, the big, stout, Cowboy line was rated the best in the Border Conference.

Originally a center in his underclassman days at Hardin-Simmons, Murray was shifted to quarterback during his senior year. He also earned a letter as a fullback.

As a high schooler, Murray was a star on the Burk Burnett High school eleven of the late 30's.

Although football naturally takes up much of his time, Murray is also interested in the entire athletic program. While at H-SU he has also served as baseball coach and boxing coach.

Murray is also interested in the affairs of the community and of his church, and has put many a mile on his automobile driving to and from banquet speaking engagements.

Murray is married to the former Ma Mae Johnson of Abilene. The 33-year old coach is the father of an eleven year old son, Roger Mac.

No Extension of Time This year there will positively be no extension of the deadline for paying city taxes without penalty and interest. Under the City Charter, it is not permissible to make an extension of the deadline for paying taxes.

So, after January 31st all City Taxes become delinquent, and will carry a penalty and interest charge.

## TIME TO GROW UP

The United States of America, considered very generally to be the most powerful nation of our time, and certainly the bulwark of freedom in the world, now has a Congress in session. In spite of the fact that this nation is supposed to be a Republic, and run by the elected representatives of the people, those representatives have not been functioning as a law-making body, or as a brake on our overstaffed, overworked, overweening executive department, since July fifth.

Remember how they spent the last night turning out laws like link sausage so they could hiper to the national conventions?

From the standpoint of law and precedent there's absolutely nothing wrong with this procedure. And it should be specially noted that by no means all of our senators and congressmen have been on vacation since the Battles of Chicago. Committee work, hearings and investigations have gone on pretty steadily. Since the campaign, organizational work has proceeded feverishly, especially among the incumbent Republicans. But, there has been no Congress for half a year. The tripod of American Government has teetered on two legs, lacking the stabilizing third one that represents us, through six months of war, of crisis, of UN finagling, or mounting Communist pressure and perplexities.

In 1853 this half-time routine worked fine. In 1953 it's just plain reckless. Certainly Congressmen should have vacations, just like anyone else who works for a living. But nobody, except Uncle Sam, shuts down the plant when it's loaded with business. Didn't we hear someone say, "It's time for a change?"

## SCHOLASTIC REVOLUTION

Even the die-hards who cling to the hand-saw and the brace and bit as symbols of true craftsmanship, are having to admit that wages are too high and hours too few to get our work done without power tools. Accordingly, American educators, from grade school level up, have realized that "manual training", is no longer quite what the name implies, that most any craft instruction intended to help a boy or girl make a living must now be "machine training".

As a result, the school shoo, the country over, is in a state of flux as the mallet and chisel are retired for the jointer, dada-cutter and milling attachments of the versatile, modern electric tools. You might think this change-over a simple matter, once the school board had found the money for the new equipment. But the matter of what tools to buy and how to place them is puzzling many an instructor at this moment.

In order to make the best possible advice available, the Delta tool people conducted a prize contest on school shop planning, which brought entries from all over the world, Canada, South America, Europe, South Africa and Puerto Rico as well as our own 48 states. The top prize, his own selection of \$1,000 worth of Delta tools, went to Anton M. Sevcik, of El Campo, Texas, for his

plan for a high school general shop. Six Divisional awards of \$350 worth of Delta power tools went to Armand G. Rehn, of Newark, N. J., elementary school division; E. H. Miller, of Jal, N. M., high schools; Howard Sherman, Oswego, N. Y., junior high schools; Joseph A. Williams, Lovejoy, Ill., senior high schools; Edward Saks, Philadelphia, Pa., technical high schools, and G. Edward Shofner, of Memphis, Tenn., technical institutes. Honorable Mention Awards went to 30 other contestants.

Especially interesting, we think, is the fact that the top award and two of the regional awards were won by small-town schoolmen. This is indicative not only of the alertness of grass roots educators, and the marvelous job they have done generally in bringing rural education up to metropolitan standards, but suggests too that the nation's great inventors, craftsmen and constructors may continue, as in the past, to come from the country.

Pvt. Gilbert R. Walkup, Rt. 1, Iowa Park, Texas, has arrived at North Fort Hood, Texas, where he will be assigned to the famed First Armored Division for basic training.

Pvt. Walkup is the son of Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Walkup, Burkburnett, Texas. He attended Lovington High School, Lovington, New Mexico, and was active in football.

Famed as a combat division in World War II, the First Armored Division was reactivated in 1951 under Major General Bruce C. Clarke, and is at present undergoing combat training at Fort Hood, Texas.

## Marion C. Chadwick On USS Manchester

Participating in the largest training exercise held by the Pacific Fleet since World War II, aboard the light cruiser USS Manchester, is Marion C. Chadwick, boatswain's mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William O. Chadwick of Burkburnett, Texas.

The vessel is a unit of the 26-ship task force, composed of cruisers, destroyers, destroyer escorts, submarines and service support ships. They are shooting at surface and air targets; repelling simulated enemy submarine and air attacks; exercising at replenishing and refueling underway; and executing intricate battle maneuvers.

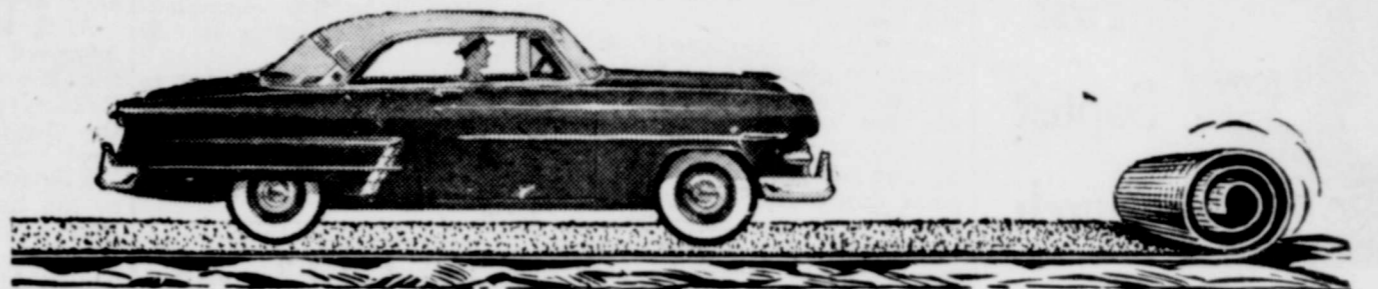

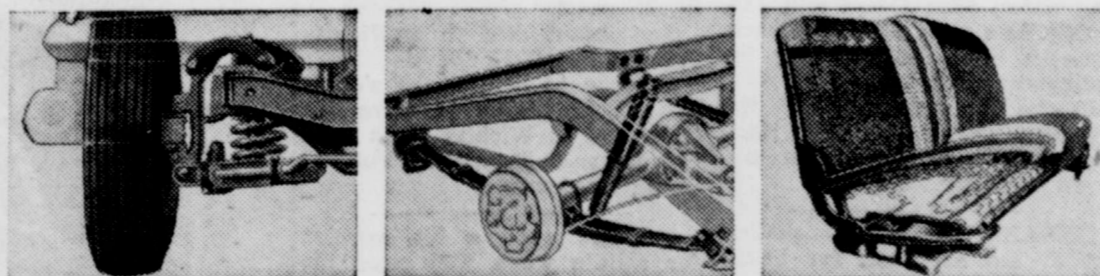

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Seeding Time This Is Grass

This Information Furnished by Local Soil Conservation Office Over the 1st Nat'l Bank

The time for seeding of native and adapted pasture grasses is just about with us, in fact, those of you that have good sorghum stubble from the previous crop year can start seeding the native grasses now.

If you have sandy land, and want native grasses, the following mixture is recommended: Bluestems 55 lbs., Sideoats Grama 20 lbs, Switchgrass 10 lbs, Sand lovegrass 15 pounds.

If you have hard land, the following mixture of native grasses is recommended: Blue Grama 50 lbs, Sideoats Grama 30 lbs, Buffalo grass 20 lbs. Some District Cooperators prefer to cut about 5 lbs from each of the three above grasses and add 15 pounds of Little Bluestem.

The amounts as given in both of the above mixtures will seed 10 acres.

Last year's drought cut the harvest of native grass seed severely and seeds are scarce. Buy your seed now, even though you do not plan to plant them until March.

King Ranch Bluestem seeded alone in 36 inch rows should be planted at 0 to 1-4 inch depth, using approximately 3 lbs of seed per acre. This grass should do well on all types of soil in the Burkburnett trade territory. It can be seeded now, or as late as June.

Blue panic is a fairly new grass that seems to be well adapted to this section of the state. It is drought resistant and under favorable growing conditions, a height of 7 feet has been reached the first year. One pound of seed per acre in 36 inch rows and at 1-4 to 1-2 inch planting depth. Early cotton planting time is about right for this grass.

All grasses mentioned above should be planted on a firm seed bed, preferably in sorghum stubble that will give "blow" protection. The Soil Conservation District has grass drills that will plant any of the above grasses.

If you prefer other grasses, call at the Soil Conservation Service office (over the bank) Burkburnett, Texas, and we will give you the information that we have on them.

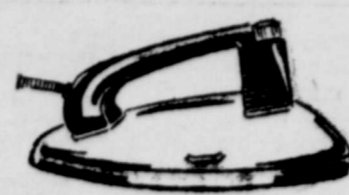

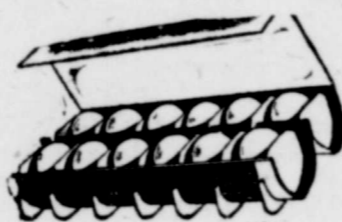

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# Babson Outlook For Year 1953

This is a continuation of Babson's Business and Financial Outlook for 1953, which was begun in the Star January 1st.

### Price Forecasts

19. Barring World War III and severe droughts, the supply of most raw materials, farm products, and manufactured goods promises to be adequate during 1953. Even the so-called invisible inventories in the hands of consumers are high as a result of heavy buying since the outbreak of the Korean War. I anticipate few shortages next year.

20. Do not forget that there is always a big IF in the supply situation with regard to farm products. Severe droughts could cause havoc. One is already long overdue. Scan closely weather reports from the nation's "bread basket."

21. The demand for goods will be stronger in the first half of the year than it will be during the last half. Disposable income will hold close to current high levels during the first half of 1953.

22. Total pay rolls will hold well, with prospects favoring a slight drop during the late months of 1953.

23. Farm gross income will strengthen along seasonal lines during the first four or five

months of 1953. If we then avoid drought, I look for a lower farm income during the second half of the year.

24. The trend of wholesale commodity prices will remain in a basic long-term downswing. Look for temporary price recoveries in many groups during the early part of 1953, but do not let them fool you.

25. Unless more international troubles or drought strike hard, living costs should average some lower in 1953 than in 1952. Here again, the tapering-off will occur late, not early in the year.

### Retail Trade

26. Over-all trade in 1953 will be close to 1952 levels as far as physical volume is concerned, with a moderate decline in dollar totals. The most attractive merchandising investments should be: (1) Super-market groceries; (2) Variety chains; (3) Mail order stores; and (4) Department stores, excepting a few in the largest and most congested cities.

27. Demand for capital goods will hold strong during most of 1953. A definite slowing, however, will take place at some time. 1953 sales of consumer durables should about equal 1952's total sales, which were restricted by the steel strike.

28. Movement of soft goods during 1953 should be about the

same as during 1952. Some re-freshing of demand in the early months may be offset later by a renewed lull.

### Real Estate

29. Barring World War III, rent controls will be a thing of the past in most areas by the end of 1953.

30. Home building will be less in 1953. Prices may weaken during the latter part of the year. Building costs should edge lower. Only small new houses will be in demand.

31. In my opinion, the cost of mortgage money will tend somewhat higher during 1953.

32. Construction of municipal and public works should rise moderately in 1953 as compared with 1952. This may be stepped up sharply late in the year if business falters. There may be a surplus of tax-free bonds.

33. A moderate slide-off in the sale of commercial farm properties can be expected. No bad break, however, seems likely in 1953. Fear of World War III, moreover, should help farm prices.

34. Population trend is away from the big cities. Fear of possible bombing and automobile overcrowding will continue as a drag on city realty values. Continued migration from the urban centers will help suburban properties.

35. For those who plan buying new homes in 1953, I strongly urge the purchase of acreage in suitable suburban areas. Surely, the H-bomb experiments should quicken the trend toward subsistence farms.

36. As public housing programs are far behind schedule, the new Congress will not promote such in 1953 unless the need for pump-priming becomes much greater.

### Tax Easing Will Be Slight

37. Tax relief will come mostly from expiration of present laws rather than from a new enlightened tax program. Barring further international problems, the present corporate excess-profit tax will be permitted to expire at the end of June, 1953.

38. If the need for new taxes continues high, after expiration of the excess-profits tax, the new Congress may consider additional excise or manufacturers' sales taxes. These may also serve to discourage consumer spending, if the war danger becomes acute.

39. State and local taxes may be increased moderately here and there during the year 1953. However, I do not look for total advances in such to be so great in 1953 as they were in 1952.

40. There will be no increases in capital-gains taxes during 1953; but read paragraph 46 below. Income taxes may be reduced.

### Foreign Trade Outlook

41. Exports will fall again in 1953. The drop in imports will be much less than in exports. The new administration will be urged to promote foreign trade instead of foreign aid. Only by buying our neighbors' goods can we get them off the relief rolls. To save ourselves, I predict, we will buy more abroad, although this will be hard on some United States manufacturers.

42. I look for no change in the official United States buying price for gold. We won't "monkey with" the mint price of gold until the nation gets really "hard up."

### Conclusion: Profits Prospects, Stocks and Bonds

43. For the year as a whole I look for business profits to be slightly lower than in 1952. Earnings will be better during the early months, with a decline occurring later in the year. Profit margins will be cut by stiffer competition from both domestic and foreign sources.

44. Recently upped wages, plus some additional 1953 boosts, will also put heavier cost pressure on profits.

45. Some companies that have been hard hit by excess-profits taxes may show improved earnings when the excess-profits tax expires June 30th.

46. There will be a cushion under falling profits provided by the current very high tax rates. If profits slide, Uncle Sam will share the heavier loss. This very fact, however, will make it difficult for Congress to reduce the rate of taxation.

47. Stocks are high historically. We are approaching the end of a long period of prosperity, much of which is based upon artificial measures. Therefore, sometime during 1953 I forecast lower stock prices than exist today.

48. Yet, do not forget that the stock market was at about the same price point when President Hoover won by a landslide in 1928. With business prospects good for early 1953, confidence might again cause a temporary boom. If an "Eisenhower bull market" develops, I strongly urge readers to take profits and build up reserves. Within 12 months after Hoover entered the White House the Industrial Averages fell 100 points.

49. New Administration will not favor "soft money" policy. Therefore, some further rise in interest rates seems probable. For this reason, I favor high-grade, short-term bonds, rather than long-term.

50. Finally: Wise investors are taking no action unless prepared to follow a carefully planned and supervised investment program. The keystone of this program will, in 1953 as in 1952, prove to be a policy of diversification and selectivity. Among those groups which offer safety and good yield are certain fire insurance stocks, bank stocks, variety chain store stocks, food processing companies, and telephone companies. **Even these may fail us unless our nation has a real spiritual awakening. This much include both you and me.**

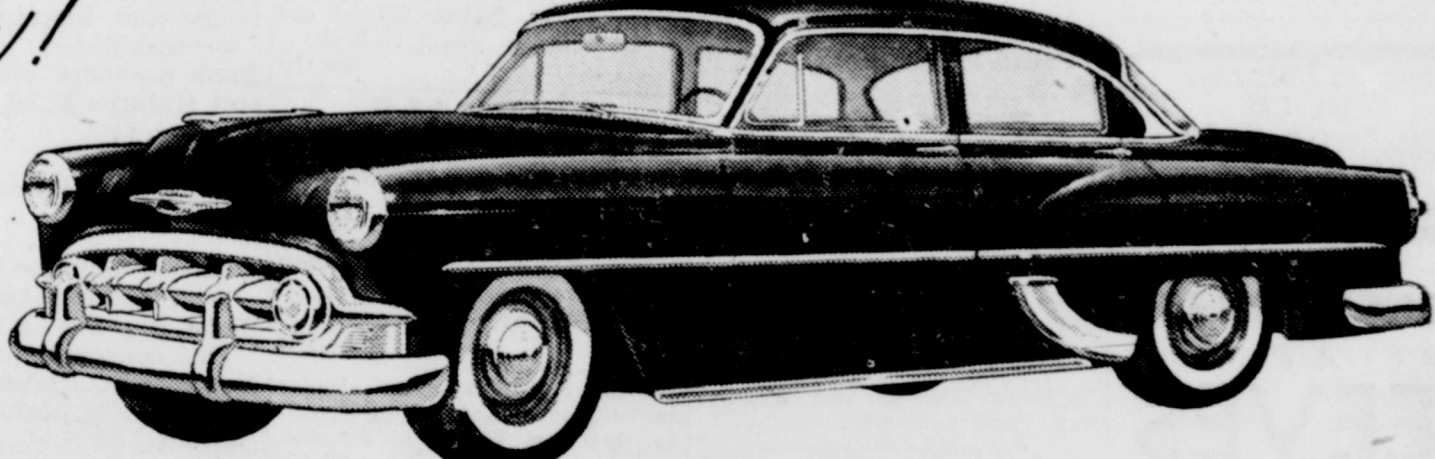

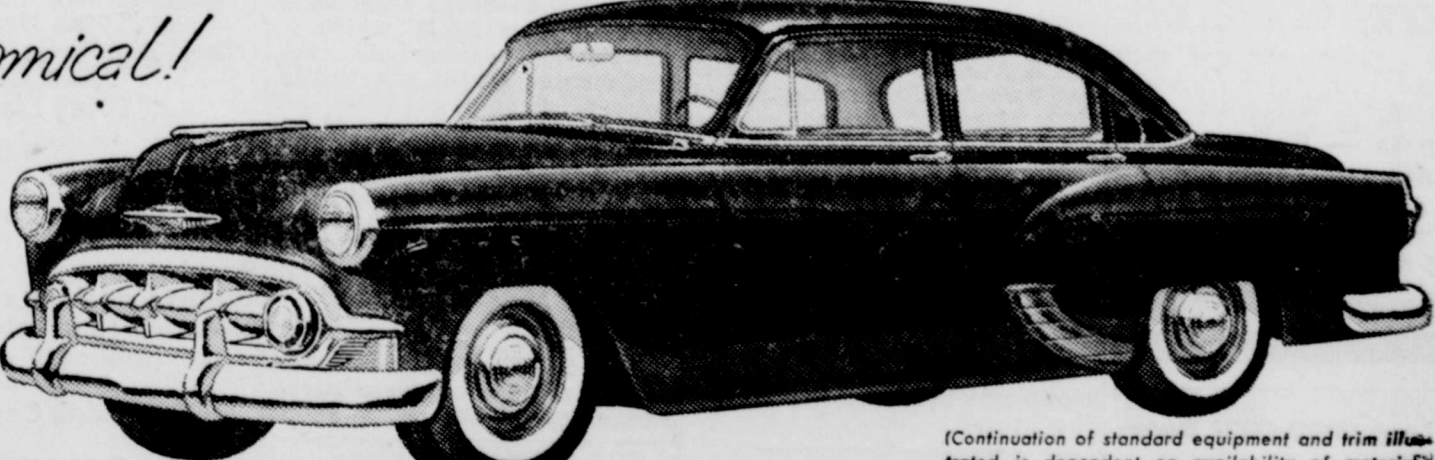
