In plain language, it is the job of every man who works to work a little harder. That is the only way to make our fifty-cent dollars worth sixty cents — then seventy, eighty—perhaps worth 100 again! If our leadership is sound, only the supporters can fail.

## BENEDICTION

In his farewell address to the nation over radio and television networks, President Truman reviewed his seven years in the biggest job in the world, at which he had put in 17 hours a day, signed his name 600 times a day, and had to take time out to greet thousands of people. "There is no job like it on the face of the earth," he said. "I want you to realize how big a job it is, not for my sake, I'm stepping out; but for my successor."

He was speaking, he said, from the historic presidential desk in the White House, where, as he worked, he had not felt alone. "You," he said, "were working with me." He wanted his hearers, and all Americans, regardless of party, he declared, to pledge their fullest support to President Eisenhower—as he had done.

As President, he said, he had traveled 135,000 miles by air, 77,000 by rail and 17,000 by ship—"but," he added, "the mail always followed me." No matter how long documents of state might travel around the Government bureaus, they finally came to him. "There is no place else for them to go." The decisions must be made by the President.

"I have no political statements to make," said Mr. Truman. "I just want to say good-bye." But he followed this with a somewhat reminiscent outline of the Truman triumphs and policies that could hardly fail to suggest that Missourians may yet have another chance to mark a ballot for him.

In closing, he referred again to the job of being President. "I tried," he said, "to give it everything that was in me."

The Football Rules Committee of the National Collegiate Athletic Association, after a three-day hassle in St. Petersburg, Florida, outlawed by unanimous vote the "two platoon system" in organized school-boy mayhem.

While the new regulation is too involved to go into here, the net result is that a college football team can now be just one team instead of two. Coaches at a number of the big schools were screaming in pained surprise when the news broke, but some of them were more philosophical, reflecting the attitude of Coach Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma. "It will be a disadvantage to us," he said, "but a definite advantage to smaller schools . . . The two-platoon system has a tendency to make big teams better and little teams weaker."

But regardless of the attitude of coach or spectator, or player for that matter, something was wrong with "good clean American sport" to cause more than fifty colleges to abandon football in recent years. It had simply gotten too rich for their blood. With football—you had to be in business . . . or else.

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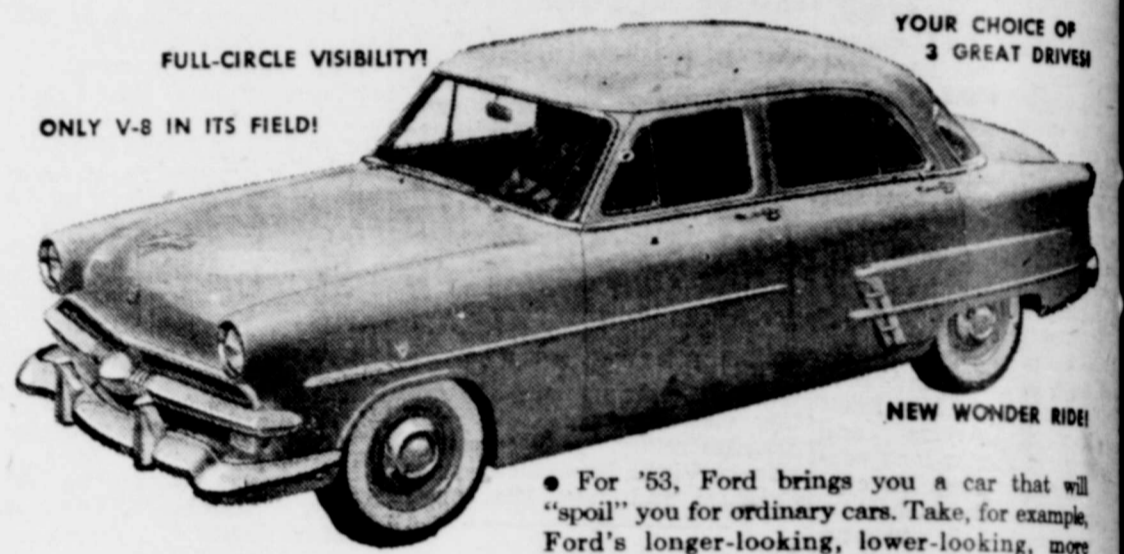
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### Above & Beyond" Stirring Love Story Palace Sun. - Mon.

**New Sulphur Plant To Be Built At Damon Mound**

A \$450,000 sulphur plant financed by a group of Eastern investment bankers and Texas businessmen, will be built at Damon Mound in Brazoria County as a major expansion of the state's sulphur industry, it was announced today.

A new firm—the Standard Sulphur Company, headed by Gilbert B. Ebarb, Sr., of Rosenberg, will start construction on the plant within 30 to 60 days. It is anticipated that the plant, with a daily capacity of 150 to 200 tons of sulphur, will be in operation by summer.

The Standard Sulphur Company has 800 acres under lease in the center of one of the country's most active sulphur mining areas. The company's president is one of Texas' best known sulphur production executives, having been prominent in the field since 1928.

The financing of the plant is being underwritten by two New York investment houses, Gearhart and Otis, Inc., and F. L. Rossman and Company, members of the New York Stock Exchange. Gearhart and Otis, Inc., were prominent in the financing of Dumont Laboratories and Cinerama, Inc.

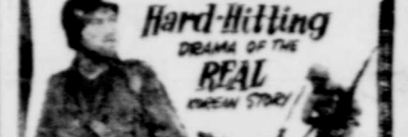
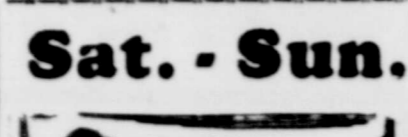

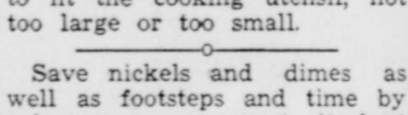
