## Ordinance No. 315 AND DETERMINING RATES AND CHARGES TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BURKBURNETT, WICHITA COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATES AND CHARGES MAY BE CHANGED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF BURKBURNETT, TEXAS:

Section 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered after the date of passage and approval of this ordinance the rates and charges for sales of natural gas and natural gas service rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Burk Burnett by Lone Star Gas company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, are hereby fixed and determined to be as follows: First 600 cu. ft. \$1.87 per c. c. f. gross; \$1.53 per c. c. f. net. All over 600 cu. ft. \$7.833 per m. c. f. gross; \$7.05 per m. c. f. net.

Net rate applies on bills paid within ten days from the date of monthly billing.

The above rates and charges are applicable to each domestic and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

Company may also charge and collect for setting, resetting and changing meters, or connecting, disconnecting, or re-summing service upon special request of consumers, or when service has been discontinued because of failure of any consumer to pay any bill or to comply with company's reasonable regulations, an amount not to exceed the cost of labor and material used in performing such work, plus 10 per cent additional therein, provided such charge shall be not less than \$2.00.

SECTION 2. The rates and charges set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or the company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall take effect from and after its final passage and approval as provided by the City Charter.

## "You Never Had It So Clean"

Since there seems to be considerable confusion in the public mind regarding tax-cutting and promises of tax-cutting, this should be a good time to make it clear that nothing can or will happen to make your income tax payments any less this year than they were last.

Representative Daniel A. Reed, Rep. of New York is still insisting taxes should be cut now, and the House may even have passed his tax cut bill 10 percent off for about 50 million of us, by the time you read this. But, in view of Senator Taft's recent comment, "I don't think you can cut taxes before you cut the budget" and the Administration's announced belief that budget-balancing should come before tax-cutting, the Reed legislation is unlikely to receive Senate support. And, even if it did, there would still be the detail of a Presidential signature.

And, even if it became law, the Reed measure would apply on 1953 income, beginning June 30th, not on what you earned last year, and pay for March 15th. Thus, that new quip that is gaining a place in the vernacular should describe perfectly the national pocket-book, come the Ides of March — "You never had it so clean"

However, if the Administration's drive to check inflation bears fruit, we're going to find a dollar that buys more is just as good as a cut in taxes, an a cleaner start in living up to campaign promises.

## Knife-And-Fork Diplomacy

At noon-time, for the next month or more, the White House will be a busier place than many Washington lunch room. The well known "spokesman" has announced that luncheons with members of Congress, which were begun by the President on Friday the Thirteenth of February are to be continued until Mr. Eisenhower has broken bread with all of the more than 500 members of the House and Senate.

Twenty guests at the initial luncheon included ten Republicans and ten Democrats and the conversation no doubt included the President's golfing practices in the White House back yard, the weather, and perhaps a casual reference to what the Chief Executive has in mind for the boys to do. There may even have inquiries as to when he thinks he may be able to get away for a rest.

It all reminds us, somehow of that remark of the late, great, Will Rogers: "I never knew a man I didn't like."

## OVER - DUE

Realignment and coordination of the Government's supervision of the trucking industry may become a part of President Eisenhower's program of streamlining the Executive department.

And it's about time we had some such bureau as a federal Motor Transport Commission, according to the Trucking Industry Defense Committee, which recently sent a delegation to present its case to the President.

member AFL Teamsters' Union, disclosed that trucking is now the nation's second largest industry, that trucks and trailers now carry 75 percent of all the freight in the US about nine billion tons. Candon, attorney for the Committee, point out that the Government could save money and better serve both the public and the truckers if the regulatory activities that are presently divided among various different bureaus could be brought together under a specialized trucking industry body, such as the railroads have in the Interstate Commerce Commission, the aviation industry in the Civil Aeronautics Board and shipping in the Maritime Board.

In this way, the same people perhaps fewer who are now working on trucking problems could be brought together to work more cooperatively and effectively. Under such an arrangement, it may even be possible to establish uniform laws on maximum loads, sizes and weights, so that the US might become, even for truckers, "one nation indivisible, with liberty and justice for all."

The Texas Farm Bureau will give recognition to the beauty, charm and vivaciousness of farm and ranch girls this year by sponsoring a state-wide Queen Contest, according to President J. 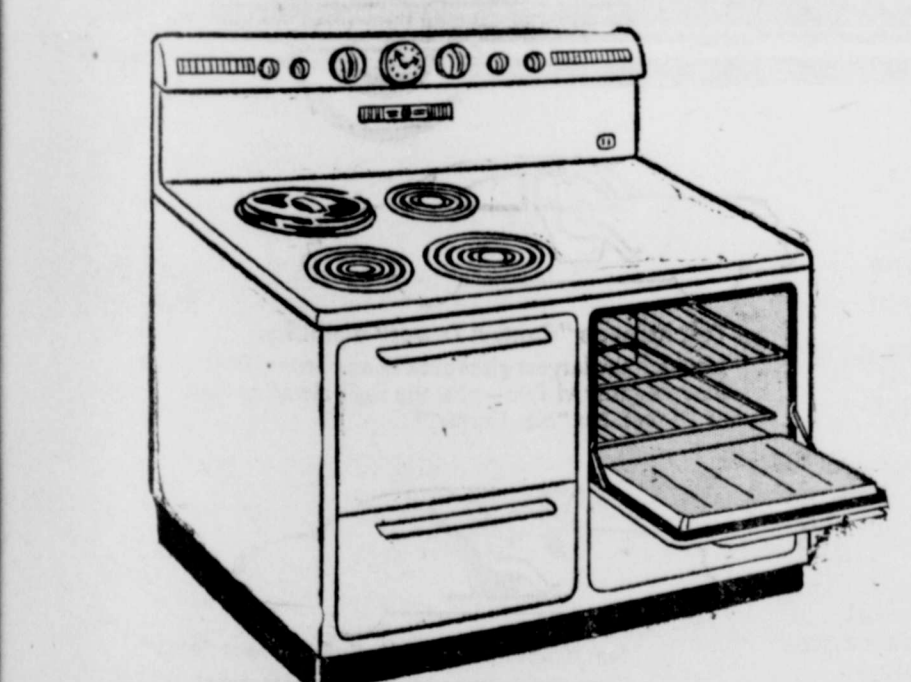

### News From the CONGRESS

During this season of Congress, I expect to use this means of making weekly reports to you, thus giving a weekly summary of the happenings in Washington.

February 17 will mark the beginning of hearings on the "Tidelands" bills in Congress. Next Tuesday the Subcommittee of the House Judiciary Committee headed by Congressman Louis Graham, of Pennsylvania will begin the hearings and on the same date a Committee in the Senate will also start to work on bills dealing with the Tidelands. It is my hope that these hearing will be limited in their scope and will not consume a lot of time because of the fact that both the Senate and House Committees have, in time past, held extensive hearings and the fact concerning the Tidelands are generally well-known to Members of Congress. Extensive reports have been filled on these hearings which are available. It seems to me that long-drawn out hearings in which a hundred or two hundred witnesses would be allowed to appear and testify would make no real contribute at this time, but would only serve to further delay Congressional action. As I am sure you know, the Tidelands question has been before the Congress a number of times within the last six or

seven years. On July 22, 1946, the Senate passed a so-called Tidelands bill by a vote of 44 to 34, and on July 27 of that year, the House indicated its approval of Tidelands, voting 188 to 67 in favor of the States. On July 30, 1951, the House again passed a bill favorable to State ownership of the Tidelands by a vote of 265 to 109 and the Senate passed a similar bill on April 2, 1953, by a State ownership of the tidelands by a vote of 247 to 89. Therefore, in view of the fact that this matter has often been considered by the Congress and extensive hearings have been held in years past, it is my hope that the Committees considering the Tidelands question will see that no great deal of time is consumed in hearings and that this legislation is reported favorably out of Committee so that the Congress can act on it at an early date.

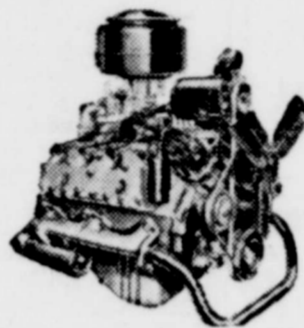

**Senator Johnson Introduces Bill On Flood Control**

Whether or not the Tideland will be returned to their rightful owners, the States, is one of the most important issues facing this Congress. To all Texans it will mean the return to our State the lands that are rightfully ours and also favorable action by Congress will be a victory for those who believe that the rights of the state are just as sacred as those of the Federal Government. I expected to do all within my power to see that this question is favorably settled at the earliest possible date.

So far during this session, most of the time of Congress has been spent in getting organized. There was very little that could be done until after the inauguration and since that time, everyone has been busy getting their Committees organized and getting working machinery set up so that Congress can go to work on legislative matters. The only legislation that has been acted on by Congress during this session was the continuation of the power of the President to re-organize the Executive Branch of the government. However, the work of all the Committees should be in full swing by not later than the first of next week, and shortly thereafter, I know that we will begin to get reports of bills that have been acted upon favorably by the Committees and will require Congressional action. It is everybody's hope here that Congress can get down to work at an early date so that it can adjourn, or at least recess by mid July.

If there are any specific matters that you would like for me to discuss in these reports, or if there is any particular information you would like to have me give in them, I would appreciate hearing from you.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson has introduced a bill which prevention programs in small, would authorize direct local-Federal cooperation on flood prevention program in small upstream watershed areas.

The measure is sponsored in the House of Representatives by Representative W. R. Poage. An identical bill passed the House during the last Congress but failed of passage in the Senate.

Under the terms of the bill, the Agriculture Department would be authorized to assist local agencies in land treatment and flood prevention programs in watersheds not exceeding 250,000 acres in area. The local agencies must take the initiative in proposing programs.

Once the Secretary of Agriculture has approved a program it will be submitted to appropriate Committees of Congress. If they do not disapprove within 60 days — or if they grant affirmative approval — actual work can get under way as soon as funds are available.

The text of Senator Johnson's statement in the Senate: Mr. President:

Among the most pressing of the problems that face our people is that of controlling the water resource of our country.

In Texas — as in so many other states — water is all too frequently a feast or famine proposition. In times of flood, water falls upon our land by the ton, washing away precious topsoil and smashing property and equipment. In times of drouth, we turn to our reservoirs only to find that they are too few and depleted to rapidly.

Both national and local governments have taken important steps to meet this problem in the past two decades. Huge works have been authorized constructed. But there is an important gap in the programs thus far set under way.

At present, there is no authority for direct local-Federal cooperation on flood-prevention programs in small, upstream watershed areas.

I am today introducing legislation which is designed to close that gap. It is similar to legislation sponsored in the House of Representatives by my good friend, the Honorable W. R. Poage. It is the same bill which was approved by the House of Representatives during the last Congress.

The Senate was unable to consider this measure last year. But it is my earnest hope that we can get an early start in this Congress and bring it to the floor for action.

Mr. President, I submit this bill for appropriate reference.

For a period of years, this country, the United States, has slowly drifted toward socialism. The people have been lulled by a false sense of security. It is very easy to be lulled by a false sense of security when they have money in their pockets and plenty of food on the table. The men of the soil, farmers and ranchers, have led the way for continued individual freedom and individual freedom in America. Your Farm Bureau has been in the midst of a battle to determine whether the philosophy of "centralization", advocated by many in Washington, or whether the philosophy of "decentralization", as provided for in the Constitution of the United States, is to prevail. This issue isn't settled! It remains to be a live one in

Have you ever really taken a real good look at what socialism could and probably would do to you, me, and our children? For many years, the Indian was supreme ruler of the plains and the mountains. Gradually, the white men pushed them farther and farther toward the Pacific Ocean until finally conquering them completely. They are now living on reservations completely subsidized by the United States Government. Many of the Indians fared well. A greater number did not. The next time you are in New Mexico, Arizona, or Nevada, drive into the interior of their reservations. You find land, that only cacti and desert flowers can grow on. Here the cattle graze. Rainfall is almost nonexistent. They have few hospitals, fewer doctors. They exchange what they can manage to make for the food and the

clothing on their backs. They live in misery and squalor under a socialized government program. These people are the only true Americans.

The government has offered to sell thousands of acres in this same area for as little as a dollar an acre. Why? You couldn't grow ragweed on it. It is considered worthless by the agricultural experts. Perhaps this is the reason that it was so graciously conceded to the Indians for their reservations.

I don't think you would like living like our red brothers do. Your Farm Bureau has seen the trend and is fighting "centralization." Silence may be golden, but it won't win a fight. A good philosophy for Farm Bureau members is this, "To sin by silence when they should protest, makes cowards of men."

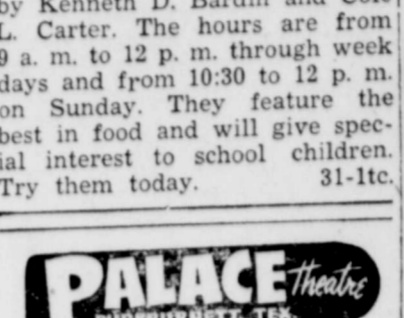
