School Census Starts Monday, March Second

School Census start Monday, March 2nd. Annual school enumeration of all school children living in Burk Burnett Independence District will get under way Monday through the home-school teachers. It is urged that the parents cooperate in the census because all funds are allotted to this district on the basis of school enrollment. School children between ages of 6 and 18 as of Sept. 23 are to be listed. The Gilmer-Akin law passed several years ago made average attendance the basis for aid above the minimum. It was a great boon to the Burk Burnett Public Schools, but census aid still is based on scholastic population as determined by the enumeration for this reason, it is important that every child within the age limit be counted in the census. During the latter part of the year, faculty members will be asked to house canvases. Students not reached by the regular home room teacher. BOMBAST?

Washington, D. C., January 1953 — Out Independence way, the Secret Service seems to have been superseded by what you might call the "Notoriety Service." At any rate it would seem that as long as newspaper men are on hand to meet our care-free ex-President at his back door at seven am, and fall into stride with him on his matutinal work out, he will have headline bits to feed them—and vice-versa.

He has confirmed that he told his fellow hikers: "I am not convinced Russia has the (Atomic) bomb." And when three members of the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy stated there was "indisputable evidence" that Russia did have the bomb—our Harry characterized them as "pin heads" and "squirrel-heads", who think they "know more than any body else on any subject."

In Akron, O. Chairman Gordon Dean of the Atomic Energy Commission said "Mr. Truman must have misunderstood," and in Washington an AEC spokesman called attention to Chairman Dean's flat statement of Jan. 2, 1951: "Russia does have the bomb."

So we wonder just when Citizen Truman was seized with these doubts. Was he in doubt on Sept. 23, 1949 when the White House announced an "atomic explosion" in Russia on Oct. 3, 1951, when the White House announced "another atomic bomb" had been exploded in the Soviet Union—on Oct. 22, 1951 when the White House announced another atomic explosion in Russia, "apparently as part of a test series"?

Was he in doubt last June 8th, when he told a reunion of the Thirty-Fifth Division at Springfield, Ill.: "You remember that the Soviet Union had set off its first atomic explosion in the fall of 1949. Shortly after that, I directed the top officials of our Government to make a new study — taking into account the fact that the Soviet Union now had the secret of the atomic bomb." And was he in doubt as late as this January 8th, when he said in his last State-of-the-Union Message to Congress: "Historically, it was the Soviet atomic explosion of 1949, nine months before the aggression in Korea, which stimulated the planning of our program of defense mobilization."

WE LIKE IT FINE

The French, we read, are shocked at Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' first speech to the American people — the speech in which he calmly outlined the progressive encirclement of the free world by the Reds who already outnumber us seven to one — and in the same mater-of-fact tones observed that NATO came unstuck, we'd have to change our European policy. It was "brutal" it was a "threat", said the French press. But next day the French cabinet submitted to the Parliament the European Army treaty and the Germon Peace Contract which had been gathering dust for eight months.

Actually, we think Mr. Dulles speech was written for Americans, to explain to them the world situation and the foreign policy of the Eisenhower Administration. And we think they liked it. The fact that it moved the French off dead center, was merely an incidental piece of luck, and perhaps a valuable discovery of what-it-takes.

America, we think, is more than ready to applaud a Secretary of State who can say: "— I want to make it abundantly clear — that I consider that it is my job to work for the people of the United States. I am part of your government; it's you that have hired me and pay me and you're entitled have me do the best that I can for you. And that is going to be the spirit of the State Department and of our ambassadors. You needn't be afraid that we are working against you and for other."

And we can stick out our chests again, and throw our hats in the air for a leader who says: "— I believe that our foreign policies should be open so that you can know what they are, and they should be sufficiently simple so that you can understand them and judge them, and they should be sufficiently decent and moral so that they will fit into your idea of what you think is right."

Behind Books and Petticoats

Selective Service Director Lewis B. Hershey says he's going to ask President Eisenhower for an executive order cutting draft deferments of college students and fathers.

He wants to end deferments of men who become fathers in college, and then after graduation seek further deferments because of their dependents. He would also limit deferments of freshmen to those in the upper quarter of their class, rather than the upper half, and who score 75 (instead of the present 70) on the Selective Service Qualification Test.

Since we must have a draft, the General should go further. Fatherhood, perse, is a shameful dodge, and scholarship deferment entirely undemocratic. Neither should provide immunity.

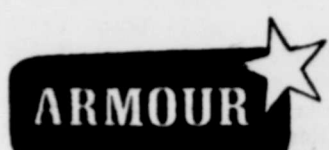

A. H. Lohofener Has Enviably Good Record As Red Cross Representative

an angel of mercy is in our midst. A boastful remark any of Burk Burnett can make. Why? The American Red Cross has a representative with and among you. A lady who is capable of solving problems through and through service that is needed. She is Mrs. A. H. Lohofener. She has given many hours of her time in helping the members with their problems which are caused or closely related to active servicemen and dependents or veterans. A service connected disability first compensation check may wish to know why a veteran is not eligible for financial assistance, when he is in his country although he is not injured in active service. Neither did he develop a physical illness. If he was a healthy man he was a civilian with only excuses to remember of and he was living with and his "Uncle Sam"! The American Red Cross is not a

loan agency therefore it strives to meet emergency needs of those who have given a portion of their bodies and health while serving in any branch of military service. A veteran of World War I and World War II, who served ninety days or more and suffered no ill effects from service is not eligible to apply for a pension when his health breaks and he is physically unable to meet his needs. It is always necessary to present to the Veteran's Administration verifications from a physician to prove the veteran is suffering a physical disability. This is greater than 10 percent the moneys he receives varies with the degree of disability which he has and is known as compensation. A compensation is compensating him for his disability. After he receives his first compensation check he is not eligible for financial assistance unless the check is not received for some reason not caused by any actions of the veteran. The Wichita County Chapter has assisted five veterans living in Burk Burnett in the following ways: Making first application for service connected disability or non-service connected disability, obtain hospital care in a Veteran's Administration Hospital, also making loans to meet check received from service connected disability and checking with Washington, D. C. regarding insurance dividends or surance. It often takes much correspondence and preparing affidavits to establish service

connections in many applications. These forms and affidavits are not completed by the worker in Burk Burnett or any other towns in this country other than in the chapter in Wichita Falls. This requires much typing and notary service which the county office is prepared to give without cost to the individual. Many airmen who are stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base live in Burk Burnett. If the wife's allotment check is not received because of no fault of the wife, the airman of wife contact the chapter. Financial assistance is given, at the same time the chapter starts an inquiry regarding the check. Usually the delayed check is soon received. About seventy-five airmen residents have been assisted financially to provide food and rent because of this happening in their families — three have been assisted in paying hospital expenses for wife or children, who have been given medical care in Military Hospitals. Many parents are dependent upon the son in the service. To establish dependency is no small task as all branches of military service require verifications and information to establish dependency. The parents receive forms that require accuracy and true information. It is wise for any parent receiving these forms to contact the county chapter for assistance in completing same. Nine families in Burk Burnett have had this assistance in 1952. Four wives have been assisted in making inquiries about their allotment checks.

There have been many relatives in Burk Burnett, either wife, children, mother, father, or grandparents who have been critically ill or have passed away the past year. Many, many telegrams have been sent verifying the illness or death and requesting the serviceman's presence whether he is in the United States or on foreign soil. The American Red Cross wires

the verification of the illness or death and silently prays military will understand the need of the serviceman's presence. for various reasons such as when the serviceman has disobeyed rules and regulations of Military and is to be given consideration for his future or perhaps the serviceman cannot adjust himself to military life, these requests have been received for two parents or wives living in Burk Burnett. Extension on leaves is a daily routine in your chapter office. Many Burk Burnett servicemen have been granted extensions when home on leave because of the service given them. The past year approximately \$1,000.00 has been used in Burk Burnett for those eligible for financial assistance.

News From The Congress

Washington, D. C., February 26, 1953. This week the House provided funds for the operators of many of its standing committees including the Un-American Activities Committee and other investigatory committees. The House also acted favorably on legislation that increase the FHA Title I Loan Authorization and provides for the repayment of some Eight million Dollars by the FHA to the Treasury on or after July 1st of this year.

The report of the Livestock Subcommittee of the Committee on Agriculture was adopted by the full committee, and the recommendations made in the report will be submitted to the Secretary of Agriculture. The essence of the four point program to bolster cattle prices recommended by the Subcommittee was: (1) Military procurement of beef and agricultural products to be speeded up and expanded so as to provide at least a one hundred and twenty day inventory as recommended by President Eisenhower; (2) Where controls for the regulation of imports exist, to pre-

vent, during this period of declining agricultural prices, importation of beef and other agricultural commodities which directly compete with our domestic agricultural products. To take action to strengthen credit available to cattle men to avert forced sales; (4) To review purchases of the School Lunch Program immediately and use the utmost vigor to procure meat and other agricultural products which are suffering most in the present decline in farm prices and to step this program up to the greatest possible extent.

The Civil Aeronautics Board has notified me that hearings have been set for March 12th to consider oral arguments concerning the applications of Pioneer, Trans, and Central Airlines to come into Vernon and Wichita Falls. I expect to participate in these hearings. I am hopeful that the CAB will act favorably upon these applications.

It is traditional here that on Washington's Birthday, his fare well Address be read in both the House and the Senate. I think it would do us all good to occasionally re-read this for besides being beautifully written, it displays the character and foresight of our first President, and it is amazing how many of

the things that he said apply directly to our conditions today. Another Member of the House called my attention to the following prayer that was written by George Washington. I was so impressed with it that I thought possibly you would like to read it.

A PRAYER FOR OUR COUNTRY

"Almighty God, who hast given us this good land for our heritage, we humbly beseech ourselves a people mindful of Thee that we may always prove Thy favor and glad to do Thy will. Bless our land with honorable industry, sound learning and pure manners. Save us from violence, discord, and confusion from pride and arrogance, and from every evil way. Defend our liberties, and fashion into one united people the multitudes brought out of many kindreds and tongues. Endue with the spirit of wisdom those to whom in Thy name we entrust the authority of Government, that there may be peace and justice at home and that through obedience to Thy law, we may show forth Thy praise among the nations of the earth. In the time of prosperity fill our hearts with thankfulness, and in the day of trouble, suffer not our trust in Thee to fail; all of which we ask through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

Representative Vernon Stewart Reports On Bills

The following is a schedule of public hearings to be held on bills pending in the House of Representatives for the week of March 2-6.

H. B. 239 Monday, March 2 7:30 p. m. A bill pending in the House providing that there will be one Presidential Elector from each Congressional district and the remainder apportioned to the State will be elected at large. Each party at its State Convention will nominate electors.

H. B. 364 Monday, March 2 7:30 p. m. A bill authorized incorporated towns and cities, counties and state departments to purchase group insurance on employees. 75 percent of the employees to be covered in the particular department must desire coverage and there must be at least 25 members in the particular group to be covered. If the city or county governing body is paying the cost of such program and the said governing bodies decide to discontinue paying premiums they will be obligated to continue paying the premiums of their employees currently covered until their employment is terminated.

H. B. 102 Tuesday, March 3 7:30 p. m. A bill providing for a state compulsory minimum wage law. The bill pertains to all businesses and would set the minimum wage at 75c per hour. A \$15 fine would be exacted for each violation. The employee would be entitled to a double recovery for the amount underpaid provided he sued within two years.

H. B. 246 Tuesday, March 3 7:30 p. m. A bill forbidding anyone to charge a fee for a medical examination where it is a condition of employment.

H. B. 222 Wednesday, March 4 2:30 p. m. A Congressional redistricting bill which would change the composition of the 13th Congressional district as follows: Take away Cooke and Denton counties; add Stonewall, Kent, King, Dickens, and Parker counties; keep Hardeman, Board, Wilbarger, Wichita, Clay, Montague, Knox, Archer, Throckmorton, Young, Jack and Wise.

H. B. 212 Wednesday, March 4 7:30 p. m. A bill providing for the issuance of 30 day temporary registration permits for non resident truck owners transportation grain to market.

H. B. 48 Wednesday, March 4 7:30 p. m. A bill which limits the length of motor vehicles, truck tractor, trailer or semi-trailer to 35 ft. or to 45 ft. if used in a combination. This bill does not apply to vehicles used exclusively in city limits. City owned vehicles, vehicles in tow for repairs, or motor busses which have air brakes and 4 tires on the rear axle.

each \$3.00 spent by the state, as compared to present contribution of approximately twenty one percent (21 percent).

However, according to statistics which I have obtained from the Texas Education Agency you would receive a gain of \$38,849.33 for Wichita County from the increased teacher's salaries paid entirely out of state funds, which money in all probability would be spent locally (It is figured this way:)

(a) Wichita County had 551 professional employees under the Foundation program in 1952-53. Multiply 551x \$240.00 (the amount of salary increase proposed by H. B. 3) and this product is \$132,240.00.

(b) Increase in local funds assignment for WICHITA County would amount to \$93,390.67. Subtract this amount from \$132,240.00 and the net gain for Wichita County is \$38,849.33. (This gain shows the greater extent to which Wichita County would be entitled to participate in the Minimum foundation Program.

Other provisions of House Bill Number 3 provide for a reallocation of funds from the Available School Fund to the Minimum Foundation Fund. The bill specifies that the funds to be reallocated are those obtained

through tax on Stock Transfers Radio Sales, Cosmetics, Playing Cards, Cigarettes, Liquor, Wine, Ale, Beer, and Motor Vehicles Sales. This reallocation will reduce the Available School Fund by an estimated Fifteen Million Dollars (\$15,000,000), and reduce the per capita from \$68. to an estimated \$58. Therefore under the provision of House Bill number 3 you will receive \$58.00 per child instead of \$68. However, it should be noted that loss through this reduction will be regained by greater participation in the Minimum Foundation Program.

I invite your comments and ideas on the merits of this proposed legislation.

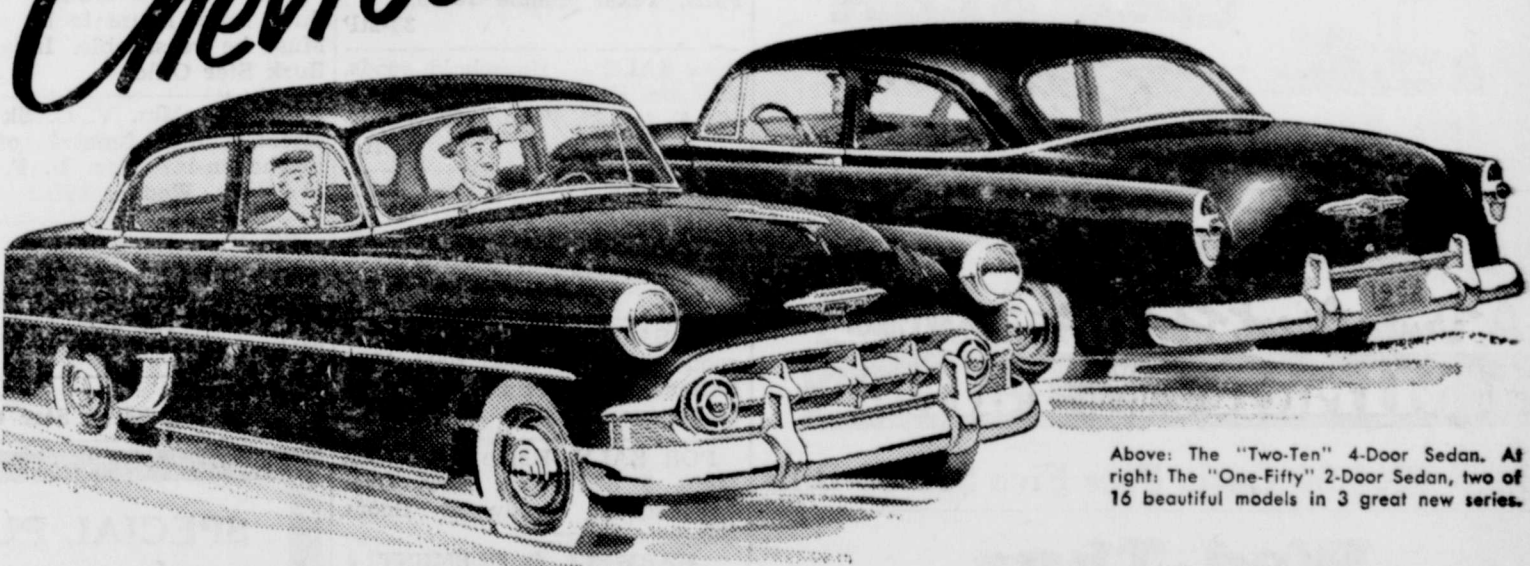
