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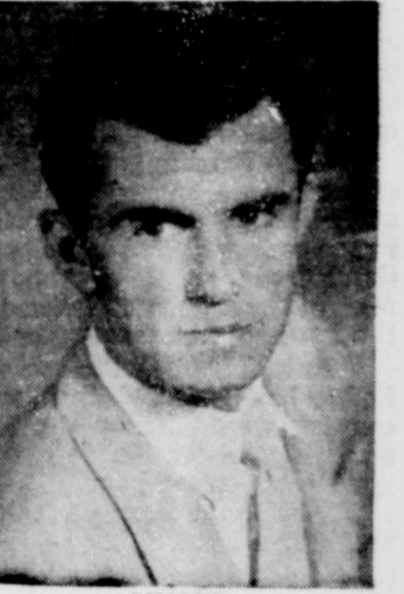

## Laying It On The Line

Delegates to the General Assembly of the United Nations returned from their "Christmas recess" to be confronted at last by the facts-of-life. Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., the new United States representative (with the rank of ambassador) was the speaker in the Political and Security Committee of the Assembly. Without giving the long idle earphones a chance to warm up on the familiar gobble-de-gook, Lodge lashed out at the Russians, declaring that they were "determined to carry on the (Korean) war to the Chinese."

There will be no compromise with Communist aggression, he said, nor did we plan to submit any resolution on Korea at this session — after the "monstrous answer" of Russia in vetoing the Indian compromise proposal at the last session.

It is Russian aid that has kept the war going, he said and that "the rulers of the Soviet Union can stop the war whenever they want to — and Mr. Vinhinsky knows it."

Mr. Lodge proceeded to cite "ten facts" which he challenged the Russians to disprove. They included the charges that Russia instigated the war, has maintained a "constant and steady" flow of equipment, including aircraft, artillery, tanks, automatic weapons and mines — that the enemy now has 2,500 planes, half of them jets and all supplied by Russia—which has supplied an estimated total of 4,400.

Mr. Vinhinsky said he would answer Mr. Lodge — but seemed in no hurry to take up the challenge. For this we are genuinely sorry since it deprives us of the opportunity of reporting his comments here. As the session closed, the Korean debate was postponed, which will give time for another debate, between Vishinsky and Stalin over the long suffering telephone wires.

But they didn't close up for the day till after Mr. Lodge had revealed another morsel of news — that this country would honor the \$15,000,000 pledge of the Truman Administration to the UN, but made no pledge beyond the current year.

"Warm in here, isn't it?" one delegate remarked to another.

## No Cause For Alarm

When Senator Taft was asked the other day what he thought about President Eisenhower's statement that he would, under certain conditions go halfway to a meeting with Joe Stalin, the Senator thought long and hard, and then said, "No Comment."

This is probably the best answer to this question to date. And it should probably be an example to your humble servant. But we would like to suggest that a great many people may be unduly exciting themselves over a highly improbable event. To begin with, the President was answering a double-barrelled question of INS reporter Robert E. Clark: "Stalin was quoted a few weeks ago that he would look favorably on a face-to-face meeting with you. Do you think anything could be accomplished at this time and would you be willing to go out of this country to meet Mr. Stalin?"

The President answered that he was being asked in advance to say that he thinks there is a good chance or isn't a good chance . . . He would meet anybody anywhere if he thought there was the slightest chance of doing good as long as it was in keeping with what the American people expect of their Chief Executive — He would go to any suitable spot, let's say half-way between, and talk with anybody and with the full knowledge of our allies and friends as to the kind of thing he was talking about. Because this business of defending freedom is a big job and not just one nation's business.

Our own comment would be that Ike was saying that he would be very glad to sit in on a peace conference — if he thought it might succeed. As who wouldn't?

## Flurry Of Freedom

In its fourth decontrol action, the Office of Price Stabilization, turned loose candy and cigarettes, dry groceries, aluminum and some steel items, and told retailers they could take down those price charts from their walls. With \$11,000,000,000 more of annual purchases freed from controls, only 14 1/2% of the items on the consumer's price index remain under wraps. In the food department, only bread, beer and coffee were still under the OPS' wing, as were household appliances, laundry and dry cleaning services.

Cigarettes celebrated their new freedom with a one cent rise, crackers and cereals were expected to go up, rice perhaps twenty percent, but confectionary (candy bars, at least) would not.

Cooper rose three and four cents, so you can be sure here will be new price tags on automobiles when they are freed April 30th. The gasoline to run them is already up.

But, before you get too disturbed, or start pounding the boss' desk for a raise, remember that prices that are free to go up are equally free to come down. A higher price is pure fiction — if people don't buy.

WHEREAS the esteem in which his neighbors held him is well expressed in an editorial in the 'Wichita Daily Times' of October 24, 1951, as follows: "Bill Bundy, the citizenship used him in many tasks. He served as school trustee, as county commissioner, and legislator who served from 1939 through 1947. As relief administrator in the depression period he carried out an arduous, exacting task."

"He was called into the services because there was recognition of his common sense, his integrity, his ability to be useful to his people."

"He had little knowledge of the intricacies of politics, but he had the public's interest at heart and was willing to serve them. He knew as did few others, the importance of listening, of getting all the facts."

"The citizenship salutes the memory of a man who had a passion for usefulness."

Sunday night during the regular meeting of the MYF, Mr. and Mrs. Payne told in detail the life in Arabia. Mr. and Mrs. Payne are visiting her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Tarr. In their discussion on Arabia, Mr. Payne related the fact that in the year 1934 the King of Arabia gave commission to four major oil companies in America to drill and refine Arabian oil. At the present time there are 6,000 Americans living in camps in Arabia. They are gathered 3,000 at each camp. The camps are enclosed by wire and to secure admission to the camps people are required to wear badges as passes for entrance. The American homes in the camps are furnished by the oil companies, also the furniture for them. They are most modern for the American children, and their school term is three months of school and a month of vacation, then three more months of school and so on throughout the year. Due to severe hot weather, this is the procedure that is always followed. Due to heavy sand storms, the side walks are built up 18 inches above the ground. The native people still carry on the same customs that their forefathers did. The native women are never seen, and are restric-

ted to their home by husbands. It is permissible for Arabian men to have four wives. Occasionally the native men invite the American people to have meals with them, and then it is required for the American to have the natives in for meals. The Americans serve them their own American dishes and the natives serve their own Arabian dishes. At this time of the year it is winter in Arabia, therefore is vacation for little Ronnie Payne, who is with his parents visiting in America.

### Soil Conservation NEWS

Accomplishments of the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District during 1952 were announced by J. T. Pace, chairman of the Board of Supervisors. During the year the number of farmers and ranchers cooperating with the District totaled 1313.

The following is a summary of the practices applied during 1952 through the assistance of the Soil Conservation Service of cooperating farms: Contour farming, 11,577 acres; Cover cropping, 9,050 acres; Stubble mulching 27,432 acres; range improvement, 2,633 acres; Pasture improvement, 2,748 acres; seeding of range, 234 acres; seeding of pasture, 516 acres; Wildlife area improvement, 25 acres; farm and ranch ponds, 101; Terracing, 190 miles; field diversions, 23 miles; farm drainage, 431 acres; open drains, 4 miles; land leveling, 467 acres; improved water application, 212 acres; water facilities, 15; farm waterways, 27; rotation hay and pasture, 3751 acres; and conservation irrigation systems, 469 acres.

The supervisors recognized the assistance to District from the following groups and agencies: Extension Service, County PMA Soil Conservation Service, Bridwell Awards program, District Agricultural Workers Council, daily and weekly newspapers, Chamber of Commerce and Service Clubs, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Wichita County Water Improvement Districts.

The supervisors would like to express their thanks to all students and teachers who assisted in the essay "Save the Soil and Save Texas." Students from Wichita Falls, Iowa Park, Valley View, Electra, Harold, Burkburnett, and Wichita County 4-H club members, wrote more than 300 essays.

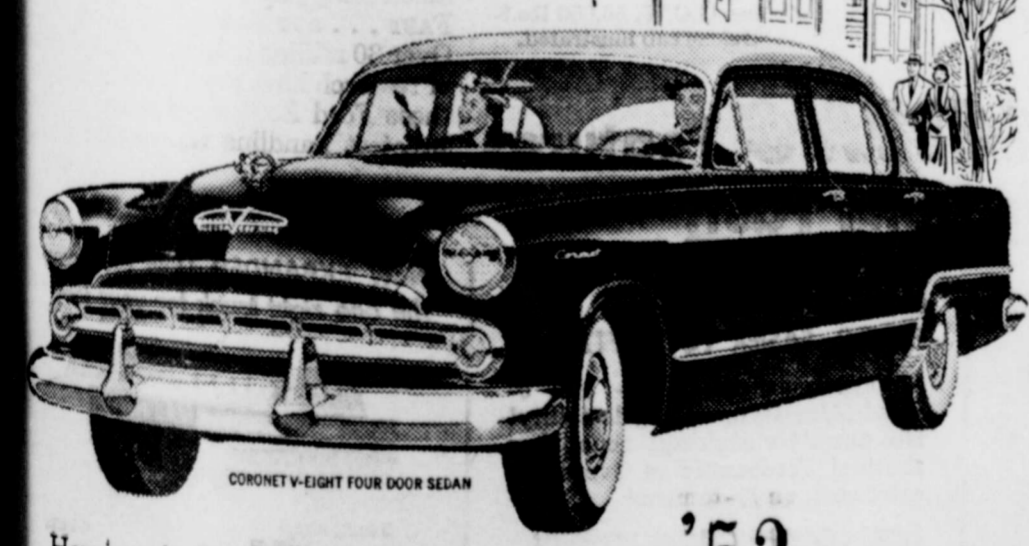

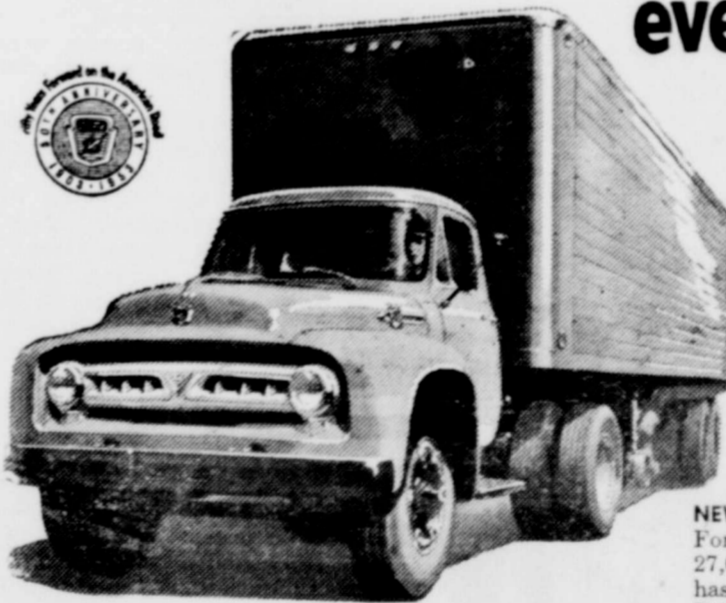

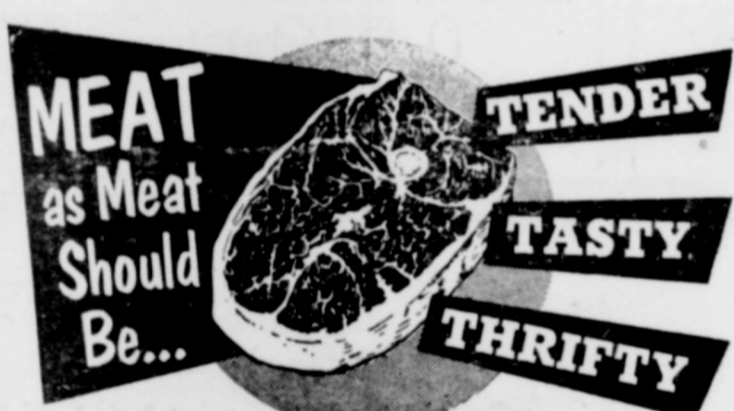

### Reminiscence Of Spring

About as far back as I can remember I had a job that was necessary to supplement the family exchequer and used up all the spare time a boy had. In these halcyon days a day was a day nominated by the Biblical pronouncement that "Six days thou shalt labour". The seventh was dedicated to Sunday School and Church, and then some more preaching. Such frivolous and allegedly sacrilegious things as exploring a singing stream dancing in a summer's sun watching billowy clouds lazily across an azure sky, listening to the chatter of squirrels, the song birds commuting with nature, observing all of God's creatures and marveling at His handiwork — all these things on Sunday were snares of the devil to lure the unwary from the paths of righteousness.

But, there did come a period in middle life when a rebellious soul found time on its hand through circumstances unpredictable and beyond control.

I tried sitting on a creek bank with a pole in my hands—for a few minutes, that is. Then I got some wading boots, a rod and reel, some fancy lures and stalked small-mouthed bass until I finally hooked one, got both boots full of water, the seat of my pants wet and my line snarled in the willows. The fish flopped back into the water and rigging went the same way. I have not been fishing but a couple of times since I left the farm. It has become a chore now. You have to buy tackle, learn to cast, worry about transportation, and knock yourself out in general. But in those days, it was a simple matter, and fun. All you needed was a

pole cut from any of the willows that grew in the bottom, about ten feet of line, a sinker or two, a hook and a couple of worms.

There was a big Elm tree overhanging the fishing hole, and the roots just formed a natural chair where a boy and his dog could sit and dream about all things that boys and dogs have dreamed about since the world began. The big white clouds would make mottled pattern on the hills and the water, and in the clear mountain stream you could watch the fish worrying the bait. Of course, you never caught anything but chubs and sun perch, or maybe an occasional goggle-eye; the aristocratic bass disdained anything as proletarian as worms, being used to a more noble diet of minnows. But minnows were too much trouble, and so the bass stayed on the outskirts. I used to dream that someday I'd have a real fishing outfit and go after those impertinent bass. Years later I tried, it just isn't worth it — I'd like to go back and try for the chubs and perch again.

Well, apparently those boys are beyond recall. The older I grow, and the more I see, I feel awful sorry for boys so unfor-

tunate as to have to grow up in the city.
