Q—If a veteran gets additional disability compensation for a dependent parent, is that additional amount sent directly to the parent, or is it part of the check that the veteran gets?

A—The additional amount becomes part of the single monthly check that the veteran receives. It is not paid separately to the parent.

Q—I have been rated 80 percent disabled by the VA. I have five children. Will I get additional compensation pay for each one of my children?

A—No. You will receive the extra amount that is paid to veterans with three or more children. There are no additional rates authorized for children in excess of three.

Q—I made out a check to VA for my National Service Life Insurance premium, and my bank returned it to VA, stating there weren't sufficient funds to cover it. Meantime, it turned out the bank made a mistake VA gave me the chance to make up the payment without jeopardizing my insurance protection?

A—Yes. VA will give you an additional period of 31 days from the date of its letter notifying you of non-payment, to make up all back premiums through the current month.

Q—I have just been discharged from the Armed Forces Is there any time limit I have to meet, in starting training under the Korean GI Bill?

A—You must begin your training within two years of the date of your discharge. Veterans discharged before August 20, 1952, however, must begin by August 20, 1952.

They're Listening Now

Senator Harry F. Byrd, the cost-conscious Democrat, whose lone voice has been heard for years crying out in the new Deal-Fair Deal bewilderment for Federal economy has found support at last. Then fellow Democrats and 35 Republicans have joined him in sponsoring a bill by which "Congress could regain control of annual obligations for Federal expenditures."

Under this bill, which also has the support of Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey and Budget Director Joseph M. Dodge (and hence the White House), all appropriations would be wrapped up to gether and presented to Congress as a package. By this means it is hoped that the expenditures might be considered in relationship to the budget, and at the time that action is taken on the budget. Up to now, appropriation bill have been unrelated, presented piecemeal — and unusually when Congress is breathlessly anxious to knock off and go home.

Another exceedingly significant provision of the Byrd bill, that has put the Capital, and especially the Pentagon in a spin, would give Congress control over the unspent portions of previous appropriations and the authority to establish the expenditures for each given year.

What the effect of such legislation could be in adding the Administration's determination to balance the budget is indicated by the fact that the Pentagon now has an unspent hoard of 62 billion dollars — which it might not have if the Virginia Senator has his way.

The brass hats are screaming that the money is not "unspent", the greater part is "obligated" for all the things a vast war machine requires. But Defense Secretary C. E. Wilson is not talking, and presumably will back the President to the hilt in implementing his announced policy "to eliminate waste and duplication of effort in the armed forces."

Scattered about the other departments are some more unspent billions. Giving them a hard look and rechecking the shopping lists should go a long way toward balanced budget that Ike says is "the first order of business."

Die Hard

Congress is reflecting public sentiment in taking step to see how it can get the government out of business which private capital should perform — and at not cost to the taxpayer.

The proposal of Charles Wilson, former Defense Mobilizer and business executive, to sell these competitive enterprises to the public through investment of government bonds has been widely applauded. As a result, several resolutions are under congressional advisement which would enable this transfer to private enterprise to be accomplished. Their value is variously estimated at from 10 to 25 billions, and they range from the liquor business to vast electrical installations.

But a joker has come up among the proposals to get the federal government out of the electrical business. That was made by Dr. Paul J. Raver, a public power exponent and manager of the vast Bonneville power output in the northwest. He proposed that a study be made to get the government out of the power business, all right.

Where did he propose to place it? In the hands of another public agency, a regional board beholden to the states.

The question arises, if kilowatts and politics don't mix with any laudable results if the managers were state politicians instead of the federal variety? Dr. Raver's proposal winds up with the same problem — how to get government — any government — out of business.

The Casual Freedom

We have been thinking about a remark we heard recently, that nothing has done more to remove class distinctions in America than the automobile. The man who said it was Ivan L. Wiles, a vice president of General Motors and the general manager of the Buick Motor Division. Mr. Wiles was looking back over the 50 years of his Division and it seemed to him that the automobile had done a lot to equalize both social and economic opportunity.

We agree with him. For instance, he said that in the early days only the rich could afford to travel, and a trip of 25 or 50 miles was a major event in a family's life. Today most folks think nothing of driving 50 or even a hundred miles to go to the movies or do some shopping.

There's practically no place else in world where a man has that freedom, which we take casually for granted. An there's no place else in the world where the butcher the banker, the farmer, the lawyer, the executive of the clerk can all afford to drive good automobiles.

That's why we agree with Mr. Wiles, and why we agree with him that nothing is more typically American than the automobile. That too, is why we think the when an automobile manufacturer, such as Buick this year, celebrated its golden anniversary, it's worth a note in our history.

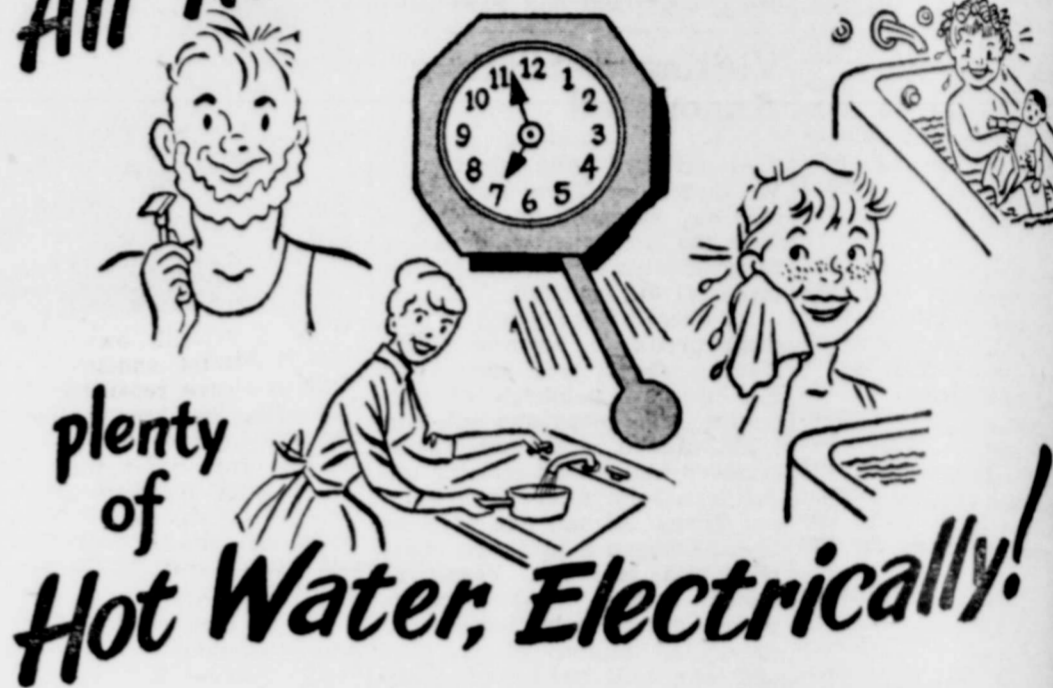

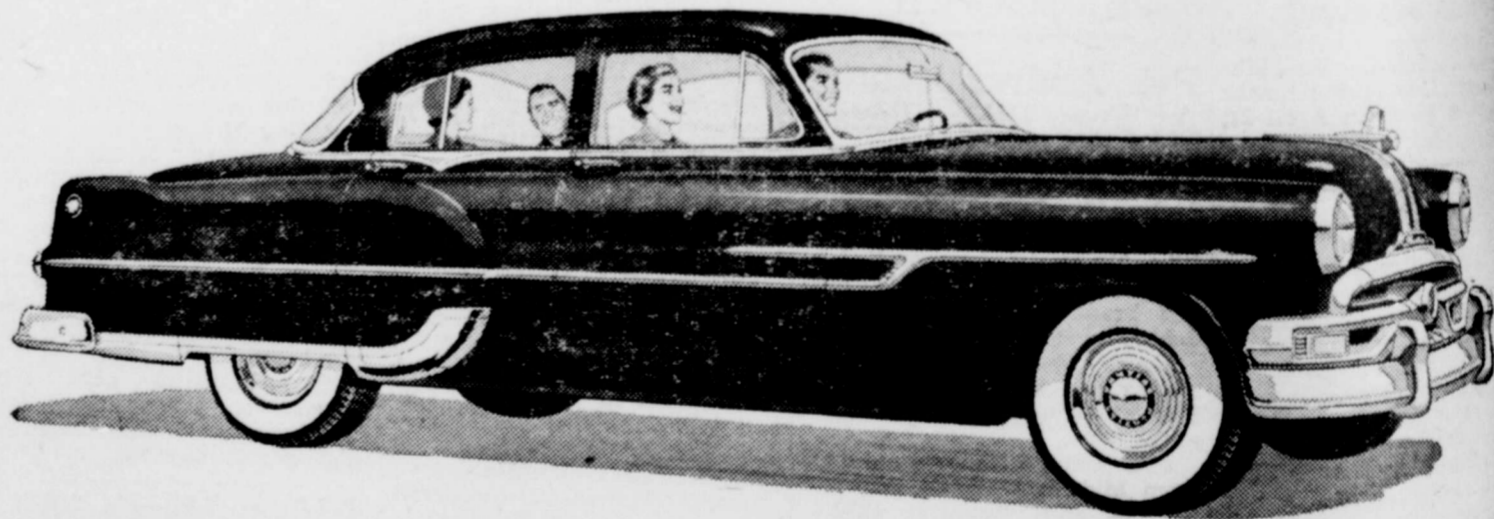

-YOUR FARM BUREAU-

BY MARYE ECKELKAMP

The Food and Drug Administration has been requested by the American Farm Bureau to postpone for at least one year its "grain sanitation program." This program deals in part with insect damaged grains, and carries with it the possibility of condemning such grains.

In a letter to Senator George D. Aiken of Vermont, chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, the AFBF suggested that "hasty action at the time might great interfere with the educational programs now being conducted" in this field. It recommends that "an intensive service" to make farmers more aware of the problems of insect damage and to work methods for controlling and determining the extent of such damage.

With the possibility of grain that has been damaged by insects, blight, etc. being condemned for consumption, it is to

every farmer's advantage to seek expert advice from an entomologist. Wichita county is fortunate to have Mr. George Davis from Vernon to serve the farmers in this capacity again this year. His services have been secured by the effort of interested individuals, business concerns, and civic organization in cooperation with the Extension Service. Mr. Davis will be in this county each Wednesday.

Many farmers may think that because of the light damage caused by cut-worms and green bugs this year, that there is no need for them to consult with the entomologist about insect problems. The old adage, "a stitch in time save nine," is very true where insects are concerned. The time to control these pest is before they get a toe-hold instead of afterwards.

Service centers have been set up in the county to afford the

best possible coverage for area farmers. A phone call or a post card to the Farmers Cooperative Gin in Burkburnett, the K&K Grain Company in Electra, or the Farm Bureau office in Iowa Park will be forwarded to the county agent's office. Mr. Davis will then visit your farm for a personal discussion of your insect problems.

With a mild winter and the prospects of a wet spring, the insects may invade our crops in full force. Let's be prepared for any of the little pests that decide to settle in Wichita county.

WILBARGER-WICHITA Soil Conservation News

Farmers signing an application with the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District for a conservation plan on their land the past week are A. L. Robb of Electra, Dan Peters and Ross Downing of Wichita Falls.

Mr. Robb who owns three farms north of Electra, plans to retire about thirty acres of land now in cultivation and return to native grass. The land will be seeded to sudan grass this spring, leaving the crop residue on the land, and seeding to grass next winter or spring. The crop residue left on the soil will greatly aid in securing a stand of grass as it will help in preventing cursting and soil movement during early spring.

Mr. Robb who owns three about 80 acres of river bottom land to coastal Bermuda beginning his springing this spring. He also will prepare 40 acres during the summer to seed to alfalfa this fall.

Mr. Dan Peters who recently purchased 320 acres east of Kamey, plans to retire most of his cropland from cultivation and seed or sod it to grass.

Mr. Downing plans to install checks in his irrigation ditches for better water distribution, and to seed eight or ten acres to Madrid Clover.

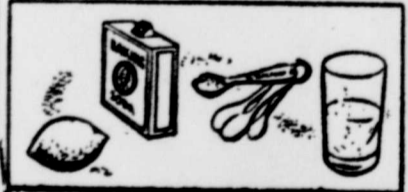

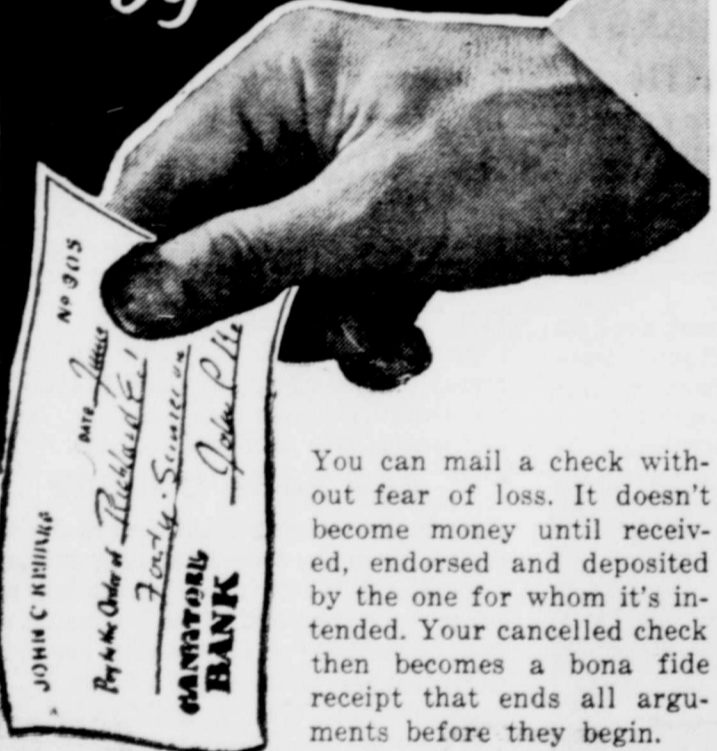

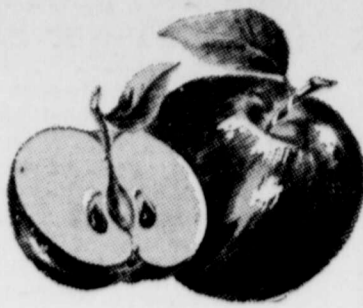

Growers Planning Spring Flower Show

With the remembrance of last summer's intense heat and dryness we must take a backward look. What stood the drouth best? The hardy little vincas, the periwinkles, kept blooming with the minimum of water. They do not require rich soil, and they make a lovely low border, or a drift of white or pink.
 The easiest way to plant them is to grow them in a cold frame or a flat, or buy plants from a seedman and set them out into the garden when danger from frost is past.

Almost as hardy as periwinkles, are verbenas. Once established, they take care of themselves. They have been known to keep blooming now and then all winter, when weather is mild.
 The fragrant little dianthus (pinks) also comes through a mild winter without harm. Plant the red ones, where the color combines with other plantings.
 Perennial phlox requires little care. Hollyhocks, balsam, Petunias, cosmos, cockscomb, hard asters, zinnias and marigolds thrive without too much water and care. Then there is the low growing portulaca, or moss, as the old timers called it. It not only thrives under adverse conditions, blooming proficifically, but serves as a living mulch for roses and other garden flowers.
 And given a thick mulch, roses require little water during the summer. The showiest and hardiest are the floribundas. They put on a show of color, and keep blooming when more delicate types are resting.
 Two of the finest flowers for this climate the two that put on the biggest show for the least effort on the part of the gardener are iris and day lily. No garden should be without them. See you Next Week.

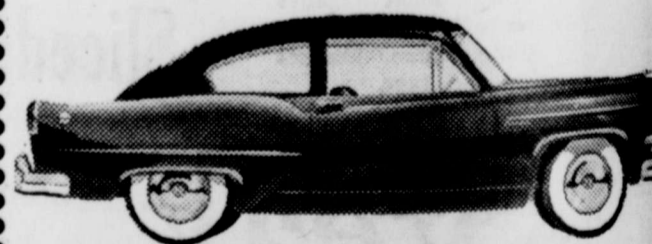

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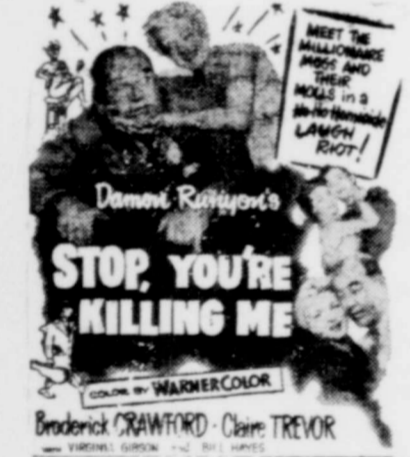
