National Debt Of Honor

Every normal American wants to do his duty — by his family, his faith, his community and his country. But nobody wants to be a veteran — to kill or be killed — to be crippled, or blind, or helpless, or sick — or to live henceforth in the special purgatory of mental derangement.

To be "taken care of" is not a goal for fighting Americans. To be "rehabilitated" by the world's finest medical brains and facilities does not square the nation's debt to the man who put aside his own career and gave his youth and health and strength to his country. But care and rehabilitation are the least we can provide, and yet — as of now — we are failing to meet this debt or honor.

National Commander Lewis K. Gough, of the American Legion, has charged that repeated reductions in the Veterans' Administration operating budget have resulted in "violation and evasion" of the nation's obligation to disabled veterans — and that:

As of now, there are some 10,000 empty beds in VA hospitals, with 30,000 veterans on the hospital waiting list.

As of now, Korean battle casualties have passed the 131,000 mark — and are still rising.

The Legion's recommendations, established by a nation-wide survey conducted by its 600 rehabilitation officers, and presented to a House appropriations subcommittee by Commander Gough, are best summed up in his own words: "We are not asking any tremendous, new commitments from the Congress. We are asking the Congress to make possible the honoring of commitments previously made."

In addition, numerous Legion spokesmen at the state level have presented their Congressional delegations with detailed and documented evidence of impaired hospital and medical facilities back home.

But the matter should not rest there. After all, this is the people's battle that the Legion has been fighting so valiantly. And the question will be decided in the budget-fixing months of April and May by 538 senators and representatives. Three of these men are concerned with what you think. They are concerned with the national debt, and so are you.

Perhaps you should remind them that all Americans are concerned, too, with the national debt or honor to their battered defenders, which at best can only be repaired in small part.

What Are We Saying

Secretary of Commerce, Sinclair Weeks has the distinction of being the first Eisenhower cabinet officer to announce that he had succeeded in cutting his departmental budget by 15 percent. On the heels of the Weeks announcement came word from Defense Secretary Wilson that he was busy with his spring pruning. It was not going to be easy he said, and he felt that material reductions could only be accomplished by cutting manpower. Accordingly military personnel are to be shaken loose from desk and other nonmilitary jobs wherever they can be spared, and it was planned to cut the draft July first from 50,000 per month to 37,500.

At the Interior Department, Secretary Douglas McKay has his scotch blood up and is stalking waste and needless frills. He will make some real savings, he says, but is not promising as much as ten percent. Agriculture Secretary Erza Taft Benson, however, stole the economy show with the announcement that his housecleaning would save 130 millions and without reduction of any farm price supports.

It has also revealed that one casualty of Secretary Weeks' shears is the 30 millions earmarked for a pet Truman project, the Grandview airport, near Independence Mo.

We also hear whispering that the proud project of the Eisenhower official family may not be able to make their noble intentions stick. But, we shall ignore that gloomy sibilance for the moment, and just sit back and enjoy the first good news of its kind we have heard in more than twenty years.

Ear-le Place

Regardless of the Senate's enthusiasm, or lack of it, for Chip Bohlen as Ambassador to Russia — we fail to understand his eagerness for incarceration.

Writing in The Washington Star about our new two million dollar embassy, now nearly finished, Constantine Brown explains how every office and every room will be gimmicked by the Russians with concealed radio-controlled microphones; since we buy the ground and pay for the building, but the USSR is the contractor. (we can inspect our embassy only by permission and escorted by secret police).

All in all, Mr. Bohlen will probably occupy the most elegant prison yet devised, and what is known in the trade

as a "maximum security" stir. And his celebrated command of their language should make it easy for the monitors. After all, it would hardly be diplomatic to speak English when they're listening.

Capt. Houston Tuel Destroys Enemy Jet Fighter

Capt Houston N. Tuel of Tacoma, Wash., an F-86 Sabrajet pilot with the US Air Force 4th Fighter Interceptor Wing in Korea, shot down a MIB-15, Saturday, March 21. It was the fourth score against the Russian-built enemy jets for Capt. Tuel, who previously had shot down two MIG and damaged one. His latest victory came on a day when Sabrejets pilots shot down six MIG's and damaged seven. Since the start of the Korean war, Far East Air Forces aircraft have destroyed more than 635 MIGs. Capt Tuel wife lives at 4928 101st St. SW Tacoma. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie F. Tuel, live at 629 E. Main St. Burkburnett, Texas.

Of Interest To Reserve Officers

Air Force Reserve Officers in Burkburnett and surrounding areas will be entitled to new uniform clothing allowance ranging from \$50.00 to \$100.00. Colonel Jerry W. Davidson, commanding officer, 8708th Pilot training Wing, Hensley Field, Grand Prairie, announced today.

The new allowances are divided into three categories:

1. Active duty allowances — not to exceed \$100 to officers entering on active duty or active duty for training for more than 90 days (on or after 25 June 1950) when two years elapse between such periods of active duty.

This allowance is not payable if the officer serves on active duty as an officer in a regular component of the armed forces within the previous to two year

period. Nor will the officer receive this \$100 allowance if he received an initial uniform allowance of more than \$200 during his current tour of duty.

2. Maintenance allowance — Not to exceed \$50.00 for each four years of satisfactory service in a reserve component which include 28 days of active duty or active duty for training.

Extended periods of active duty of 90 days or more cannot be computed toward the four years of eligibility. The four year period may have started prior to July 9, 1952, but must be completed after that date.

3. Separated officers (Not military status) — payments of active duty or maintenance allowance may be made to those individuals in this category provide they meet the above requirements, which they accrued prior to separate from the Air Force.

All claims for allowances by interested reserve officers may be made to the personnel officer of the unit to which assigned or to the Fourteenth Air Force if not assigned to any reserve unit

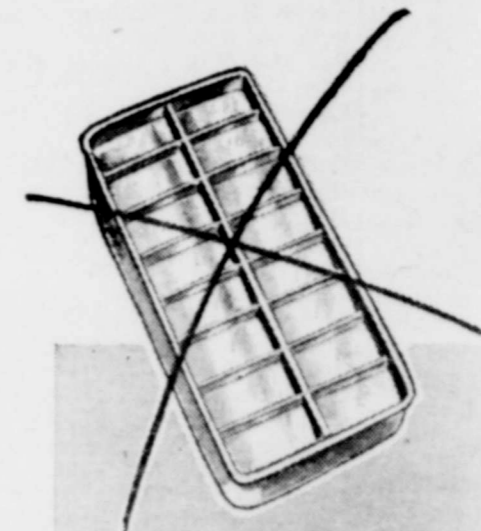

Complete, year-around medical treatment for patient at the Wichita Falls State Hospital is the goal of the Social Service Department of the Woman's Forum, which this week announce a one-month fund drive to air condition the institution Chapel Hall.

The appeal for \$12,000 to make the all-important building usable during the summer months is being made to citizens in the North Texas counties from which the hospital's patients population comes. At present the hospital is treating 2780 North Texans — young-aged and old men — young-aged and old men.

Allowing themselves not a cent of profit, Wichita Falls air conditioning companies made the \$12,000 estimate on the basis of actual cost of material and labor.

"Summer heat brings recreational therapy almost to a full halt," explained Mrs. Nell Hutchison, department chairman, in announcing the drive. "Air conditioning the Chapel Hall will not mean just comfort. It will mean that a very vital therapeutic treatment can be continued during the hot months."

"During the summer patients have been deprived of their very important parties dances and motion pictures because the hall becomes a sweat box. Taking them there has not accomplished the recreational therapy goal-getting them to forget themselves and their worries, enjoy activities and learn again to be sociable with other people. The heat in the hall destroys the purpose."

Mrs. Hutchison asked that all donations be forwarded to the Social Service Department, Woman's Forum, 2120 Speedway, Wichita Falls.

Texas State Dept. of Health

Diphtheria is a disease of neglect, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state Health Officer. If all babies, beginning at three months of age, were taken to a physician or clinic for immunization against diphtheria, the infant deaths from this disease would cease. Such immunizations may be given in conjunction with whooping cough and tetanus vaccine for triple protection.

Diphtheria occurs most frequently in early childhood. It is caused by a germ that grows in the nose and throat and throws out a toxin or poison into the blood stream. This poison may attack the heart muscle or it may cause a paralysis known as peripheral neuritis.

Diphtheria is a dangerous disease for a child to have and it is highly infectious to other children. It starts with a sore throat, fever, and sometimes croup and hoarseness.

Adequate immunization early in life is the main defense against diphtheria. It helps the body build up immunity against the dangerous malady.

About a year after completion of the initial triple immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus a booster injection may be given and another at four to six year of age.

altogether the death rate from diphtheria has been markedly reduced in the past twenty years infants were unsafe without immunization. It is only when all babies are immunized early in life that the conquest of diphtheria will be accomplished.

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More Highway Markers Needed On Texas Roads

Additional route marker signs are urgently needed in Texas and should be installed to meet the needs of a record volume of motor travelers, declared Paul R. Kulp, general manager of the Texas Division of the American Automobile Association, in a statement issued here today.

Kulp said that despite extended use of luminous paint many directional signs need to be made more effective at night. A survey made by the AAA, he added, shows wide lack of signs indicating route direction, such as "Northbound," thus hampering travelers unfamiliar with a territory.

"Special attention should be given to guiding strangers much more effectively through urban areas," Kulp urged. "Signs ought to be located where they will do the most good for visitors and should be made oversize where it is necessary."

"In many cities there ought to be more liberal use of advance indications of route turns. Another problem is the lack of uniformity in signs, signals and markings. These discrepancies cause not only confusion and irritation, but constitute a definite safety hazard. In this connection, the Texas division of the AAA strongly urges general adoption of the signs and signals in the Manual on Uniform Control Devices."

I am writing this before it happened, but I was scheduled to have the honor Tuesday of this week of being host at a luncheon for Col. Royal N. Baker of McKinney, who returned recently from Korea after shooting down more Communist MIG than any other man in the world. Colonel Baker is a great Texan, a fine example of the men who stand ready to fight for our freedom.

Other guests who accepted invitations to the luncheon included Senator Price Daniel and Texas members of the House of Representatives; our fellow-Texans, Federal Security Administrator Oveta Culp Hobby and Navy Secretary Bob Anderson Air Force Secretary Harold E. Talbot, Air Force Chief of Staff Hoyt Vandenberg, Senator Dick Russell of Georgia, and Senator W. Stuart Symington of Missouri.

Thirty representatives of the Brazos River Electric Co-Operative were here last Wednesday for a luncheon with Senator Daniel and me, members of the House from district in the area served by the Co-Op and REA officials. These men who have done so much had work to bring the benefit of electric power to the farms and rural areas of Texas are concerned about the future of the REA. They were disturbed by the recent forced resignation of Claude E. Wickard, well and favorably known in Texas, as REA Administrator. They fear a crippling of the REA program.

As my friends know I have fought for the REA ever since I came to Congress, and I told these men I have not changed my mind about the necessity and value of its work.

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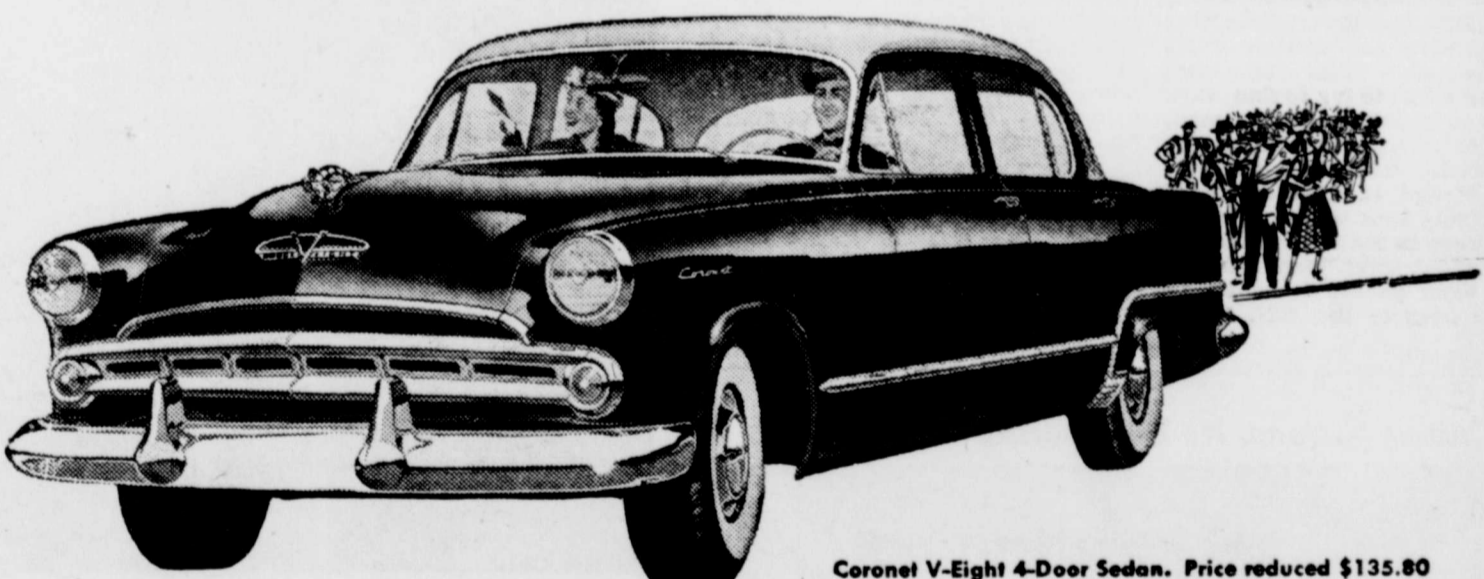

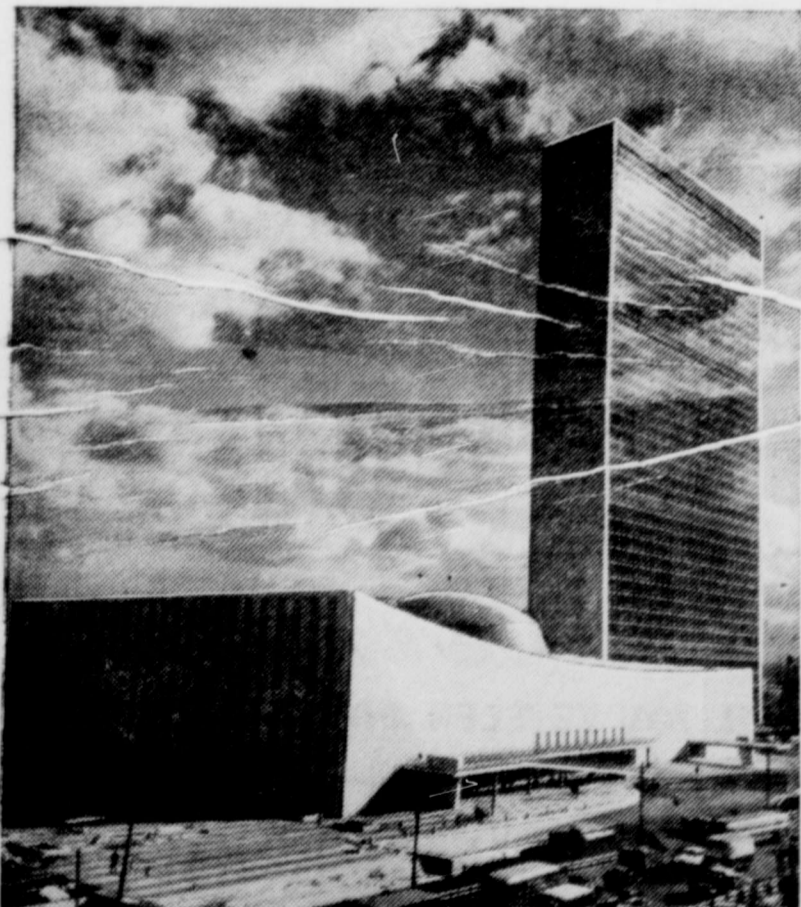

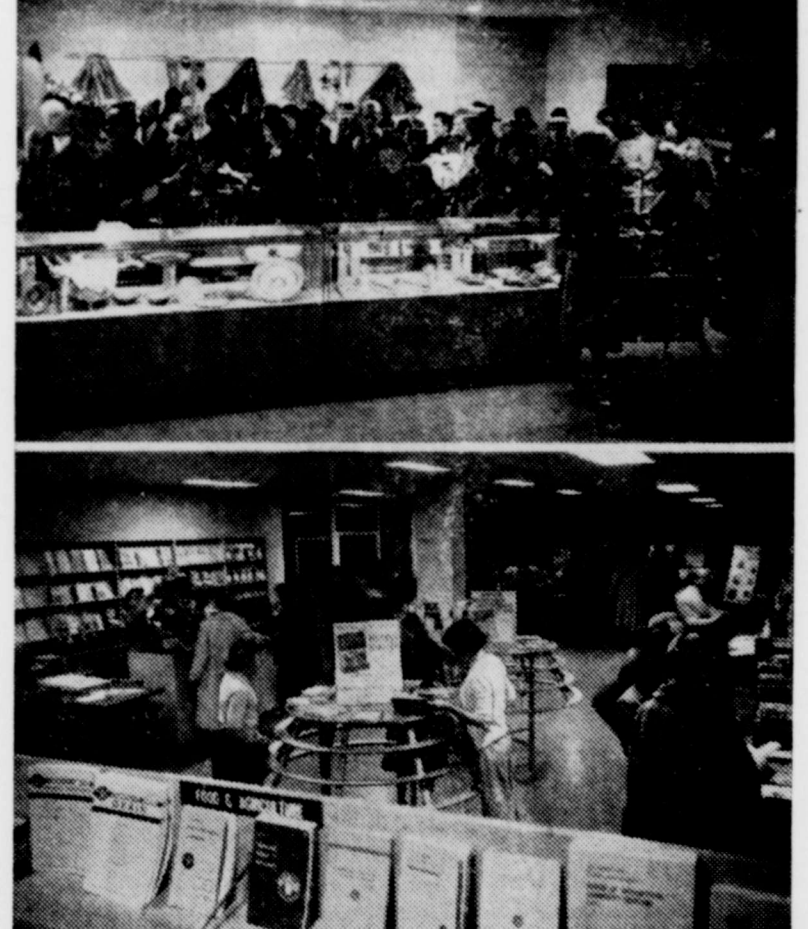

Chances are it would cost a lot more money to get the new agency organized and going than it would to simply let the old agency continue in business.

Texas School Needs

Charles H. Tennyson

This is the first series of articles on the state of our schools, written by a man who has been in public school work for more than half a century.

Secretary, Texas Teachers Association fifty-five hundred public school teachers in Texas have been unsatisfied and should be abandoned as soon as possible. They are either structurally unsafe or have non-combustible fire hazards.

tend classes in them. This fact was among many disgraceful ones discovered last year in a survey of school buildings made jointly by the state and federal governments.

The survey also showed that 93,349 Texas school children go to schools that have outdoor privies; 2,760 go to schools that do not have toilets; 6,609 go to schools where no water is available; 7,690 go to schools that have no artificial lighting; 49,408 go to schools that have no fixed washing facilities; and 706,651 go to schools that have cold water only for pupil use.

We cannot brag about our schools as long as these conditions exist. Most of the local school districts in the state are doing everything they possibly can, under the present circumstances to correct the situation. Unlike

thirty-four other states, Texas gives no state money to local school districts for construction of school buildings or for maintenance and repairs.

That job is left entirely up to the local schools. Under present state law, these local school districts cannot levy taxes of more than 50 cents per \$100 valuation to finance construction. Bonds may not be issued for longer than 30 years for a fire-proof building.

Even the buildings we do have which are considered satisfactory are greatly over-crowded. Approximately 33,000 of the children in our elementary school attend classes now for less than a full day because their schools are so overcrowded they must operate in shifts.

Texas needs 10,461 new classrooms, which would cost an estimated \$71,156,000, to relieve over crowding, take care of constantly increasing enrollments and to replace obsolete buildings.

It would cost more than \$500,000,000 to put all of the Texas public school buildings in first class shape.

Local school districts can levy taxes on nothing but real estate in order to get badly-needed funds. Many of our schools have their tax rates now at the highest level permitted by state law and are bonded to the limit.

These local districts now are paying approximately 45 percent of the total cost of our Texas public schools. If they should be required to pay a larger percentage of the regular operating costs, their attempts to build safe, sanitary buildings for our school children will be thwarted

The Oil Boom In Burk Burnett

I have never seen a picture or a magazine article that came even close to painting an accurate picture of this event. There has never been anything like it before, and there hasn't been anything like it since. As I remember there was given a screen production styled, "Boom Town," which gave a hint of its glamor, its excitement, its color, but just what did happen during those exciting days, this production was no more than a hint.

The Burk Burnett Star of July 20, 1918, graphically depicts the excitement that prevailed when the Fowler well which heralded the Burk Burnett boom, was brought in. The writer of the article, like everyone else was connected with the boom, was unaware of the magnitude of the old pool which the well opened. Unable to grasp the full significance of the find, he attempted to interpret the meaning of the gusher which caused one of the greatest oil booms in modern times. Anyone who saw Burk Burnett in 1918 and 1919 will realize that his predictions, if anything, were on the conservative side.

While a gusher such as the Fowler well would cause a fever of excitement any time, at any place, the fact that it blew during the World War period caused the series of events which followed in its wake to be even more fantastic than might have been the case any other time.

So, when the 7,500 barrel producer threw its spray of oil over

the countryside, the country was ripe for just such an event. The Fowler Farm Oil Company brought in what promised to be one of the biggest producing wells in the Burk Burnett field at that time. The well was located at the north edge of the townsite of Burk Burnett and near the Fowler residence.

With the first flush of production, literally thousands of men and women swarmed into the oil capital. Oil derricks were built in back yards. Tents were pitched on all available places when the supply of houses became distressingly inadequate.

And the frenzy continued. Derrick reared from the townsite like a forest weirdly distorted trees. But, just as chaos had evolved from quiet and peace, the cycle of time softened the tone of activity and eventually the transits moved on to other and more lucrative fields. The city began settling back into resemblance of orderless, and the civic leaders laid plans anew to make a home-loving community out of the debris.

Thus, today, the visitor sees an attractive town, the streets lined with trees which, in a measure, symbolize the quiet which has followed in the wake of the hustle and bustle of boom days.

So, the future will be governed by the present generation and the past will live only in the memory of those of us, who are left and were participants in its drama.



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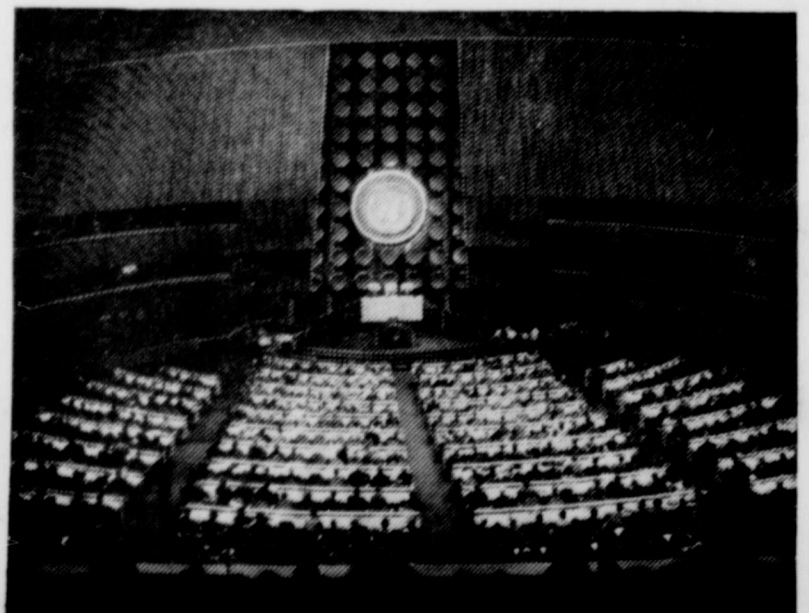
