## Super Atomic

On May Day, America will celebrate Child Health Day for the twenty-fifth time since this occasion was made official by act of Congress, and which occurs, logically enough, during the observance of National Baby Week. Commemories, we understand, will also parade and whoop and holler as usual in our big cities on May Day.

At the same time, we can expect the record breaking 1952 crop of 3,885,000 babies to be doing some hollering too—which ought to drown out the Reds, especially since we never knew a baby who was a communist. In fact, as your grocer can tell you, the average baby is the darndest free-enterpriser we have. Collectively, babies provide the great American grocer with 8,000,000 of his most important customers. Now-a-days they demand their own special food—and lots of it. Every day the Gerber people, whose huge factories produce nothing else but out carloads of strained baby foods, chopped juicer foods and special cereals for the very small fry. Now they've even got special non-crumbling biscuits for teething, patterned, you guess it, after puppy biscuits!

And these same squirming, snoozing, squalling and squealing millions are big business for the druggist and all of main Street. Toy factories work overtime to amuse them. Furniture factories make an ever-increasing variety of bassinets and cribs and tables and chairs and dressers and wardrobes to fit their dimensions and tastes. (That right, you can eat the paint without a pain). Miss America 1970 has more dress-makers than Paris, and her brother has a nobby wardrobe too. And you know about the boom in the baby-sitter industry.

According to Dan Gerber, who ought to know, babies are America's not-so-secret weapon, and Child Health Day, at national recognition of our important job. This anniversary, which is also Gerber's twenty-fifth, is a good time to realize that babies are what makes families, and families are what make a strong nation, not just in numbers, but in spirit and in mutual devotion to each other and to the liberty that allows growth.

## This Is What WE Ordered

Two to three thousand Truman hold-overs occupying top level confidential and policy making jobs in the Government are to be shaken loose from their cherished Civil Service protection and replaced with people who are considered more sympathetic and cooperative toward the Eisenhower Administration, or better qualified. This action will be taken under an executive order that uncovers the dank April breezes the Fair Deal faithful who were "blanketed in" by the Truman regime.

Or, as sundry cynics describe the shift, Democrats will be turned out to make jobs for Republicans. The Eisenhower record of bi-partisan appointments up to this writing, we think, pretty well refutes that idle charge. These chief-leutenants are powerful people in their little bureaucratic worlds. Their obstructionism, or mere apathy can keep 150,000,000 of us from getting that "change" we voted for.

The old saying that there are "none so blind as those who will not see" applies to those who will be replaced, and also to those who see in this shift only the kind of politics to which we have been so long accustomed.

#### Questions and Answers

Q—I meet all the eligibility requirements for training under the Korean GI Bill. However, I've recently gone back on active duty. May I take a correspondence course under the program, even though I'm now in uniform?

A—Even though you meet all the eligibility requirements the law requires that you be a civilian when you take your training. Veterans back on active duty may not train under the law.

Q—Is there any time limit I have to meet, in starting training under the Korean GI Bill I have just received my discharge.

A—You must begin your training within two years of the date of your discharge. Veterans discharged before August 20, 1952, however, must begin by August 20, 1954.

Q—I have quite a large number of bills, I'm trying to pay. One of my creditors is getting impatient, and has threatened to take my disability compensation, until his bill is paid off. Can he do this?

A—No. Disability compensation payments—as all other VA benefits payments—are exempt from the claims of creditors, under the law.

Q—Is a service connected disability, incurred since Korea, enough in itself to entitle me to vocation training under Public Law 16? I have an honorable discharge.

A—No. In addition, you must have a need for training to overcome the handicap of your disability.

### YOUR HEALTH

Many people put off seeing their physician, when they suspect cancer, because they are afraid. And yet, this fear, resulting in delay, causes many deaths from cancer. One-half of the lives now being lost to cancer could be saved if sufferers would see their doctors in time, declares, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The sooner cancer is found the less likely it is to have spread to other parts of the body, making sure impossible.

Most people are familiar with the danger signs, such as a small sore on the skin, lip, or tongue that does not heal quickly, a mole, wart, or birthmark that suddenly changes in appearance a painless lump or thickening especially in the breast, lip or or radical changes in normal bowel habits; any unusual bodily discharge or bleeding; and persistent hoarseness lasting more than a few weeks. When any of these symptoms show up between physical check-ups, go quickly to see your doctor. They are common indications that cancer may be starting.

You cannot tell if you have cancer without seeing a doctor. A regular, thorough physical check-up by your family physician is your best guard against cancer, plus examination when one of danger signals, or warnings appear. The first symptoms of cancer are scarcely noticeable. You may notice just a slight change from the normal. But do not wait until you feel pain to see your doctor. It is characteristic of cancer that there is no pain in the first stages. Pain is usually a late symptom and when it comes, the growth is often far advanced.

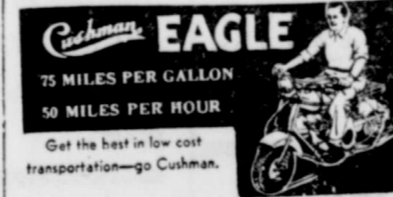

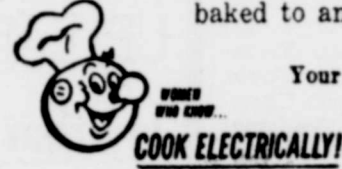

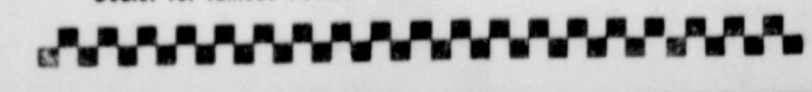

Lone Star Agriculture

There is an old farm maxim which states: The harvest is no better than the seed.

You don't have to be a Biblical scholar to recognize the insight and wisdom of that saying and right now is the time to prepare for sowing good seed in order to reap a high production this fall.

When you buy your seed from a dealer (the Tented Seed Tag required by law on all bags, tells you what to expect in germination and quality of seed purity.)

Yet what about that last year's crop of seed stored in the bin on your farm? Wouldn't it be a good idea to know at much about the quality of your farm grown seed as that which you buy at the store?

If you plan to sell some of that stored seed, the Texas Seed Act says it must be state inspected and tested. But whether you intend to sell it or plant it a comparative test of the seed will pay dividends at harvest time.

Two laboratories are operated by the Texas Department of Agriculture for purity and germination tests. No charge is made for testing field seed of Texas residents but a fee of 25 cents per sample is levied for all vegetable and flower seed. To expedite testing operations a few suggestions are offered to the grower:

1. How To Take Samples. Only samples of re-cleaned seeds can be accepted. When you have

five bags of less of seed, take a sample from each bag. If there are more than five bags, send from at least every fifth bag, but never less than five bags should be sampled. In sampling bulk seed thrust your hand on a long probe into the bin in at least seven uniformly distributed spots.

2. Size of samples. Send 1 sq. ft. of small seed like white or light clover and most grasses; 5 pounds of red or crimson clover alfalfa, lespedeza, ryegrass, broms, millet, flax, rape or seed of similar size; 1 pound of Sudan grass, sorghum, proso and like sizes; 2 pounds of cotton, cotton, certain vetches, cowpeas or legumes.

3. Information needed. Print your name and address, include the kind and variety of seed (the lab does not make varietal identification); and the lot number or stock identification; the month and year of harvest and where grown; the test desired (whether purity, germination or both). If the seed has been treated, give name of material and rate of application.

4. Forwarding Samples. Samples should be mailed in cloth bags or strong cardboard containers. Paper bags and ice cream cartons are unsatisfactory since they usually burst in transit. Depending on your location samples may be sent to either of the following addresses: Seed Laboratory, Texas Dept. of Agriculture, Austin, or Seed Laboratory, 116 Agriculture Bldg., Texas Tech College, Lubbock.

5. Tented Seed Labels. Labels are 1 cent each and one tag must be attached to each bag of seed offered for sale, showing the complete analysis and other information. Tags cannot be issued for seed tested for germination only. Include your order for tags along with the samples.

Wayne R. Kelly On USS MIDWAY

Aboard the Midway, is Wayne R. Kelly, aviation electronics technicians Second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. M. Kelly of 307 West, Second St. Burkburnett, Texas, and husband of Mrs. Helen C. Kelly of 226 E. Monument Ave., Hatboro, Penn. "Operation Rendezvous" was a NATO maneuver designed to maintain a standard of readiness and battle efficiency of General Ridgeway's European Defense Forces Naval forces of France, Greece, Italy, Turkey, the United Kingdom, and the United States participated in the operation.

News From The Congress

Restoring title of the State to the submerged lands within their historic boundaries moved a step closer to realization when the House passed the so-called tidelands bill by a vote of 285 to 108. The effect of this bill is to confirm and establish the title of the States to the submerged lands within their historic boundaries which, in the case of Texas, is ten and one half miles. The Senate will immediately begin consideration of a similar bill, and I feel certain that the action there will also be favorable.

The debate on the bill in the House reflected the fact that probably no issue to come before Congress in recent times has been so widely misunderstood. Many have seen fit to beat the drums of prejudice and charged that this bill was nothing but a gigantic give-away. This has done much to spread the widely held misconception that the so-called tidelands matter was purely a sectional issue that affected only three or four states and that the other States and the vast majority of the people would have everything to gain and nothing to lose by taking of the tidelands by the Federal Government. Of course, this is not true for the tidelands issue is not a sectional one. Rather, it is a question that involves the fundamental concept of State and private ownership of property, and as such, is a matter in which every man, woman, and child in the United States has a vital stake. It exemplifies the familiar spectacle of the federal government usurping more and more power from the States, and it strikes at the very heart of the historical organization of our government.

The real question to be decided was one of principle which was whether individuals and States that make up this Union have rights and property that are sacred and deserve protection or whether all of our owner-

ship is subject to the whims of an all-powerful Federal Government that might divest us under the ill conceived theory of "paramount right" as pronounced by the Supreme Court.

This time of year marks the beginning of the annual Spring pilgrimages to Washington. It is estimated that within the next month over 500,000 school students will visit the Capitol. I wish that it were possible for every high school student in the country to spend a day or two here going through the Capitol, the monuments, and fine public buildings. It would certainly be an inspiring experience, and no one can see our Capital city without having a deep sense of pride in being a part of such a great country.

15 People for Dinner

A farmer today has to feed himself and fifteen other people. Back in 1930 he had to supply food for 11 other people. By 1975, experts predict, for each farmer there may be 25 at the dinner table.

It would be nice if there were more land. But last year there was only 1% more land under cultivation than prewar.

What's more, there are fewer farmers. 17% fewer man-hours were spent in agriculture last year.

Yet the farmer in 1952, with less help and about the same acreage, managed to produce 40% more livestock, vegetables, cotton, grain, milk than before the war.

### Advisory Group Studying Plans For Nurses Home

The newly organized County Advisory Committee plans to study the Student Nurses Residence Building Project being sponsored by the Wichita Falls League of Nursing Education.

Mrs. Wilma Shirk, president of the League, discussed the proposal with Mr. H. D. Smith Friday morning. Mr. Smith is chairman of the Public Building committee in Precinct No. 2, (Burk Burnett).

Preliminary plans were made to present the project to the other groups in Burk Burnett after it is formally presented to the County Advisory Committee.

The project calls for the erection of a new student nurses residence for the Wichita General Hospital School of Nursing. The new dormitory would make it possible for the school to be expanded to enroll one hundred.

The hospital offers clinical facilities for teaching that many but the school has housing for less than forty students and thus cannot expand until a new residence is built.

The need for nurses in all types of nursing in this area far exceeds the demand and enlargement of the school would help meet this need.

The project calls for the remodeling of the present nurses home into classroom space at a cost of approximately \$20,000. The new fireproof, air-conditioned dormitory would cost approximately \$308,000. Furnishings and linens for the school would bring the estimated total cost up to \$376,681.00.

If the project is approved by citizens of Wichita County the enlarged school will be able to graduate about twenty-eight professional nurses per year instead of about eleven. It is estimated that 4 registered nurses are needed for each 1000 people. Wichita County, with a population of about 103,000 has less than half the recommended number.

Various nursing and medical groups have endorsed the building project and believe that the enlarged school of nursing will be of considerable value to the area.

The Wichita General Hospital, a city-county hospital, operates the only school of nursing in this section of the state. Since nurses tend to remain in the

section where they receive their nursing education, more nurses can be obtained for this area if the school is graduating more students each year.

Estimates made on the cost of operating the enlarged school in comparison with costs of operating the present school of forty indicate that a saving can be made since larger classes will give more nursing service to the hospital without increasing the expenses for the school proportionately.

The contest will run for two weeks beginning May 18th, ending at 9:00 o'clock May 30th. Be sure and vote for your favorite candidate.

Your Senator Reports



Senator Gordon E. Johnson, writing from Washington, gives a weekly report on happenings in the National Capital as they affect Texas and Texans.

The Senate took up last Wednesday the legislation converting Social Security to a contributory system. It is an independent Republican and which we discussed when we entered the United States.

The so-called Volstead Bill, which Senator Price Daniel and I are co-sponsors, Senator Daniel and I work without very close cooperation to get this bill out of committee. Forty Senators are co-sponsors of this bill and

it has the support of the administration. The House-passed similar legislation last week.

Texas institute boundaries will be removed.

I understood that bills are to be introduced in the Senate and House to reorganize the Farm Credit Administration and make it an independent agency. I have not yet seen copies of the proposed bills, but the principle involved seems sound. The legislation would bring control and participation in all functions of the agency down to local levels within the 12 agricultural credit districts throughout the country. I hope the agency should also be permitted to make economic emergency loans for any agricultural purpose, as well as for the disaster type loans now authorized.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson called a grain shipment advisory conference late Tuesday of last week. Purpose was to review the present grain shipment situation and to consider measures to help stabilize price and production. Invited from Texas were E. J. Galt, Abilene, Jack

E. Greenman of Ft. Worth, and Bill Neager and Mike Trippett, both of Amarillo.

The FIC reorganization bill, main effect of which is to make Texas Cattle Hobby of Houston the first Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, passed through the Senate last week. No party registered a negative vote.

Remember the "Bookie Law" that the S-B from which the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima exactly eight years ago. This party, which is now the property of the National Air Museum, is in most halls at Fyvie Air Force Base. The Air Force informs me that the last plane will be on display at Fyvie Air Base on May 14 for an Armed Forces Day Open House celebration.

I have given Senator William Langer, Chairman of the Committee on the Judiciary, additional information on the work load in the Eastern District of Texas, which has only one Federal Judge. I am pressing for action on my bill to provide an additional judgeship in this district.

The 1959 Texas Cancer Crusade is now under way with Art & Underwood, Lubbock, as chairman. Financial goal is \$600,000. Every day over 600 Americans die of cancer — John E. Clark, El Paso, has been named project manager for a \$100,000 subcontract for electrical work on the Atomic Energy Commission's new gaseous diffusion plant in Ohio. Mrs. E. E. Weimer, Beaufort, Democratic welcome visitors at the office. Mrs. Weimer attended my luncheon for Col. Royal E. Baker, McKinney's jet air set. In this Holy Week, a time of remembrance and hope, all our prayers are for an end to the fighting in Korea—and for lasting peace in the world.

Vern Sanford Honored By Appointment



Vern Sanford, general manager of the Texas Press Association, has been named chairman of the 1960 National Newspaper Week committee to plan the annual observance, October 1-4.

Announcement of the appointment was made by Stanford Smith, president of Newspaper Association Managers, which sponsor Newspaper Week. Smith is manager of the Georgia Press Association.

Other members of the committee will be Theodore A. Sherrell, manager of the Pennsylvania Newspaper Publishers Association, who was 1959 chairman; John E. Long, California Newspaper Publishers Association; William F. Cardfield, Indiana Daily Press Association; Gene Alteman, Michigan Press Association; and Ben Blackstone, Oklahoma Press Association.

The committee will work with representatives of other newspaper associations in planning the observance of National Newspaper Week by all departments of newspapers. As the organization of executives of publishers' association, Newspaper Association Managers has sponsored Newspaper Week since its inception in 1934.

The permanent slogan adopted in 1951 is "Your Newspaper Lights the Way of Freedom."

Vern Sanford has 18 years service as a state press associate manager. He has been general manager of the Texas Press Association for five years. Previously he was manager of the Oklahoma Press Association for 12 years. He began his newspaper career at the age of nine as a carrier boy and worked through circulation, news and advertising departments of Oklahoma newspapers.

The central office of the Texas Press Association was established by the daily and weekly publishers of Texas with Sanford as manager on December 1, 1947, in one small hotel room in Dallas. It moved to Austin in 1948 and today occupies its own nine-room building.

Reminiscent Of SPRING

Almost as far back as I can remember, the Springs that now come to the better part of Texas, are not of the spectacular kind that was witnessed during the halcyon days of the '30's, where one day a blue norther may be blowing and the next the prairies would be covered with bluebonnets. There is no flower anywhere to be found to compare with the bluebonnet, nor are the broad spaces available for its abundant growth and beauty.

In Texas, Spring may come suddenly, spreading her beauty with a lavish hand, and for a few short weeks the countryside is vibrant with new life and color, then, just as suddenly she is gone, deserting us to a steaming summer. Or, she may enter demerely, almost shyly, there would be no sudden transition — just a growing awareness. The rains that for past months had been chill and drear become warmer, and the winds become gradually sweeter, until getting caught in warm showers becomes a pleasant relaxation. A few scarlet buds put forth from the japonica and the wild onions now begin to make green the once dead lawns and fields. Soon the rosebuds, pear and peach trees are in full bloom.

Through the open doors comes the song of the mockingbird, who is among the first birds in the Spring to sing, and reveals in the glory of his vocal strength, and shouts his ringing challenge to all who hear him, the very sky itself.

I am reminded of the summers that used to come sneaking up the valley, along about this time of year, when the sun would hit the top of the hill behind the place, and you would really notice for the first time

how everything had turned to a deep green. There would be an air of expectancy — a few days of sun to dry the fields and the years work would be done.

But to me, Spring was always the most evident in the woodlands of East Texas. But she is still beautiful, nevertheless. She comes with the same hope she brings everywhere. The ground seems a little fresher and the air a little sweeter, and she promises the crops will be a little better than last year. Of course she makes the same promise every year, but seldom keeps them.

After the partial dreariness of winter, a man may read more into her promise than is there, but if he didn't, what would be the use?

### Texas School Needs

More than anything else, our Texas public schools need public interest in education because such interest would provide the support necessary to solve most public school problems.

If the people of Texas were familiar with such problems as low teacher salaries and inadequate, unsafe buildings, they would not tolerate these things.

They would insist that our public schools have safe, sanitary buildings staffed by alert capable, conscientious teachers in sufficient numbers. They would take the initiative in raising the money necessary to provide the best possible education for the youngsters who face the task of preserving our American way of life.

Education is big business. It is the biggest business in which our people are engaged. The Texas Public Schools involve more than 3,000,000 parents, 60,000 teachers, nearly 20,000 non-professional employees and, above all, approximately 1,634,000 school children.

The latter figure is expected to increase by 300,000 by 1960. An additional teacher will be needed for every 26 children in averaging daily attendance.

The objective of the citizens of Texas should be to make it possible to secure the most able and best qualified teachers possible.

Texas is a fast growing state. It is becoming an urban state. It is receiving annually thousands of additional citizens from other states, bringing more children to be educated.

We feel that to provide second-rate facilities and second-rate teachers is inadequate, unfair to the children and un-

an. Our schools belong to the people and it is up to the people to do more than simply provide transportation and lunch money for their children.

How many times have you visited the school where your child spend almost half of his waking hours. Do you know the teachers? Are they good ones and does your school have enough. Do you know whether the classrooms are safe and whether they are overcrowded? Do you know whether the school has adequate sanitary facilities?

The answer to these questions should be on the lips of every parent.

In a monetary sense, our schools represent a multi-million dollar investment on the part of the people. In a more important sense, they represent a huge investment in America and in Democracy.

Education is responsible more than any other single factor for the high standard of living we enjoy. Education has made possible great production and marvelous inventions. Have you ever stopped to think of how much education went into your television set?

Texas has the framework, established by the Gilmer-Aikin bills, in 1949, for a first class educational system; but during the past four years, it has failed to keep pace. The state has dropped so swiftly, in comparison with other states, that it now ranks 26th in teacher salaries and 27th in the amount of money spent for each school child.

Since the people own our schools, only an alert, well-informed public can improve them.

### Ag.-Homemaking Classes Exchange At Burk High School

Boys with aprons and dish pans were a common sight at Burk Burnett High School this past week as Agriculture I and II students and Homemaking I and II girls exchanged classes. The purpose of this was to help the boys learn more useful manners and enable the girls to study gardening and parliamentary procedure.

Early in the week, in order to practice better table manners, the boys prepared a meal of fried chicken, baked potatoes, biscuits, salad, cake and iced tea. A few days later they prepared light refreshments and invited the girls to be their guests.

Meanwhile, the girls were practicing how to conduct a meeting using correct parliamentary procedure and gaining information on gardening to use in home project work.

By the end of the week the results of this experimental exchange seemed very good, and everyone was enthusiastic to try it again next year.
