## Local Telephone Office to Hold Open House Friday and Saturday

Open house will be held April 24 and 25 at the Burkburnett telephone building, R. B. Peterson, district manager, announced today.

Hours for the open house will be from 2 to 5 p. m. and from 7 to 9 p. m. on Friday and Saturday.

Burkburnett telephone people will serve as guides for visitors and will explain the operation of the telephone system. Visitors will tour the building, seeing the operating room, switching equipment and special exhibits.

They will be able to watch Burkburnett operators as they make both local and long distance calls.

Special exhibits will enable visitors to "see and hear" their voice, by means of voice recording equipment, and an oscilloscope on which the sound patterns are shown. Other exhibits will give visitors a look at a gainet overseas radio telephone tube and a tiny transmission tube, models or early telephones and many other pieces of telephone equipment.

"We are looking forward to this opportunity of showing Burkburnett people through our building. We believe it will be of interest to everyone," Miss Sadie Beth Tevis, local service representative for the telephone company, said.

## -YOUR FARM BUREAU- BY MARYE ECKELKAMP

In last week's article, I mentioned that the farm industry must be developed to the extent that our young people will look upon it as a desirable occupation with a stable economic future.

The Department of Labor has recently compiled a book listing 465 jobs, the opportunity for advancement, and the lucrative value of each one. Farming was listed amid the least desirable job opportunities. This book was published for the purpose of assisting our high school and college students in selecting the type of work they wanted after graduation.

Even with 90 percent price support and high production, the farm income is still considered too unstable as to be a good choice for our young people.

Why is the farm income so unstable. One of the big reasons stems from the lack of control the farmers hold over the markets. It would seem almost ridiculous to picture a large manufacturer standing with his hat in his hand asking a wholesaler what he will pay for his products. The picture looks natural when the manufacturer is replaced by a farmer.

A manufacturer sets his prices to guarantee his margin of profit. The farmer has no such guarantee. If he is lucky, he may sell his farm products at a profit; it just as easily could be to us on The Hall of Fame.

Through a farm controlled market, farm prices could be stabilized. This in turn would help to stabilize the national economy. Many of the farmers that I have talked to on this subject have expressed optimism and pessimism, the latter being the more prevalent. They all agree, however, that the idea of farm controlled markets was an interesting one. While it may be interesting, it can be done.

If the farmers ever want to have a guaranteed future in farming, they are going to have to put there hats on their heads and do some revolutionary thinking. The present system of marketing farm commodities is as

## Kentucky Orchids

Among the countless items of pioneer Americana which radio's John Lair is assembling at Renfro Valley, would appear to be the cradle of American Journalism.

Last year Mr. Lair initiated a "Country Editor's Conference", inviting the editors of America's oldest weeklies to visit his snug little retreat in the Kentucky hills. And now America's weekly editors are again invited to Renfro Valley to attend the "second annual" event of its kind over the week-end of May 8th, 9th and 10th. This year, guests of honor will be the editors of the "second-oldest" weeklies published in the twenty-nine states where Mr. Lair's "Renfro Valley Sunday Gatherin'" is heard on the air; also winners of the NEA "better Newspapers" contest, and of all things, movie stars.

Hollywood will be there to attend the World Premiere of the first movie ever to present the tribulations — and the devotion of the man "and his wife" who run the nation's country papers. This is Universal's film interpretation of Editor Jane McIlvaine's book, "It Happens every Thursday."

Key to the proceedings, other than the box supper and barn-dance, the pioneer breakfast and the outdoor barbecue, might well be taken from a speech of Mrs. McIlvaine's heroine (the editor's wife) in the movie: "It takes a special kind of man to make a good country doctor — or a country editor — a whole man. It's not like treating one lone organ of the anatomy or holding a job in one department of a big city newspaper — You've got to be interested in the whole thing — in people because they're people. And you can't have just an interest — you've got to have love."

The tribute and appreciation that are implicit in John Lair's "Country Editor's Conference" will be gratefully received by weekly editors everywhere. But even more significant is this annual opportunity of reminding readers of all papers, little and big that the weekly paper as the major source of the nation's great editors, is still the cradle of American Journalism; that it is still the most unreconstructed defender of freedom of the press, and as the faithful interpreter of public opinion is still the main spring of public action.

## Another Wrong Guess

"Combat operations in Korea will be concluded by June 30 1951."

It was this assumption, passed on to Army brass by General of the Army George C. Marshall on the second day after he became Secretary of Defense, together with twenty other supplementary ones that guided the virtual sit-down on ammunition procurement by the armed forces.

This was the recent testimony of Lieut. General Geo. H. Decker, Controller of the Army, before the Senate Armed Service subcommittee investigating ammunition shortages. General Decker also testified that it would be eighteen months after a contract is signed before a new contractor can be expected to start delivering ammunition. But it's nice to know that the General also said that the ammunition supply in Korea is now satisfactory (for a truce perhaps) and that the depleted US stockpiles were being restored.

On the same day, the Defense Department issued the June draft call — for 32,000 men. This is 21,000 less than will have been called during the preceding four months. The Pentagon explains the Army is entering a period of lighter demands due to the two year induction cycle.

## Do-Better Dept.

There are more and more voters over 65 each year (now over 13 million), and each year less and less of them are working, and the old Federal Security Agency has been promoted to the US Department of Health, Educa-

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tion and Welfare, and its boss, Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby has been made a cabinet officer. This chain of events is leading directly to bigger and better social security.

New rules, which are not likely to be acted on until next year, are expected to follow one of three possibilities extending the present plan to more people, a new pay-as-you-go system in which payroll taxes are adjusted so that the amount paid in is no more or less than that paid out, and lastly to replace the present system with a flat payment to all on reaching 65.

In a way, we're sorry they haven't more plans to kick around, but no doubt more congressmen and bureaucrats will think up further schemes to toss in the hopper. While that new USDHEW is kept busy on pension problems, it may lay off Socialized Medicine, and it may continue to let American communities run their own schools.

### Texas State Dept. of Health

By Geo. W. Cox, M. D.  
 State Health Officer

Early spring is the best time for a community to start a fly control program, declared Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer. That is before the fly population has a chance to multiply. It is estimated that one fly of flies, under favorable conditions, could have countless progeny before winter.

Every time you kill a fly early in the season, and destroy breeding places, you stop whole families of flies before they can start. The most effective way of preventing swarms of flies is to destroy or make inaccessible to flies the organic material which attract flies by their odors, and which are essential to them as food and breeding places.

Individual householder should take their responsibility to clean up their own back yards. Garbage cans should have a tight fitting lid and they should be leak-proof. Inadequate facilities for storage of garbage

refuse usually result in widespread fly breeding. Uncovered or partially covered garbage containers produce odors that attract a large number of flies. Good window screens will do a lot to keep flies out of buildings, thereby protecting food from contamination by fly-borne disease organisms.

There is no substitute for good sanitation in fly control. Every spot in town must be cleaned of garbage and trash. If a few dirty places are left, swarms of flies will breed. A neglected stable on the edge of town will furnish a plague of flies for the entire neighborhood. After garbage and trash have been removed, insecticides will help to reduce the fly population in local spots. It is a temporary protection, however, and should be regarded only as a supplemental or emergency means of control. Insecticide spraying will be effective only if sanitary conditions are maintained throughout the summer.

VA vocational counselors on the job before the new standard were announced will be encouraged to take further training to meet the new standards, VA said.

Vocational counseling is a "must" for all disabled World War II and Korean veterans planning to take vocational rehabilitation training. It serves the purpose of guiding a man into a field where he stands the best chance of making good in spite of his handicap.

### Texas Game And Fish Commission

The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said field reports indicate Texas waunted stock of wild turkeys is faring well.

"Our information from the men on the scene is that the big birds go into the nesting season with conditions favorable up to now," he said. "This simply is a progress report covering the pre-hatched period. What happens here after cannot be foretold because so many factors affect turkeys as well as all other species of wild life."

Texas, which has more turkeys than any other state, had a few bad seasons for its precious birds. Last year, for the first time in four seasons, a decline attributed mainly to the drought, was halted and the flocks began increasing again.

"Now as the flocks break-up and the birds begin laying, with a few reported nesting, it seems that the gains made last year may be held this season," said the Executive Secretary.

Game Warden Bill Garrett of Comfort, in the heart of the hill country turkey area, said spring rains have provided the "green stuff" needed when wild turkeys turn from the mast crop.

He said turkeys are laying in his area with a few setting. Game Warden Adolph Heep of Fredericksburg said his observations indicated the best stock of wild turkey in Gillespie County "in six or seven years".

Game warden Jack Gregory of Kerrville, county seat of Kerr County which harvested approximately 1,000 turkey gobblers last fall, said prospects were good.

But everybody emphasized that "everything depends on what happens during the delicate hatching and growing season."

Recent boating tragedies prompted the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission to urge greater cau-

tion by fisherman and others using watercraft.

He cited the fact that seven perished in two aquatic accidents in one weekend, just as the summer outdoor season was beginning. Four drowned when a boat powered by an outboard motor was upset. Three men died when their launch burned and sank. Two others barely escaped a similar fate when their boat capsized.

"We are just beginning seasonal enjoyment of our unmatched fishing and boating assets," said the Executive Secretary. "It behooves us all to obtain the maximum pleasure but without losing sight of the dangers resulting from thoughtlessness carelessness."

He said the increasing development of aquatic spots in Texas naturally heightens the hazards, particularly because boats propelled by modern motors often times deceive the operators.

The Executive Secretary suggested that persons might well make a few exploratory runs with their new equipment before risking the lives of others going along as passengers. He counseled that persons unable to swim should always be equipped with life preservers.

Many boats, according to the Executive Secretary, are considered unsinkable but when burdened with heavy motors might not remain buoyant especially with boat occupants clinging to them. The recent near tragedy involving two fishermen was attributed in part to the fact that the motor was too big for the boat, both as to power and as to buoyancy when the craft upset.

He said most boating tragedies usually develop from some form carelessness such as faulty maneuvering of overloading or from persons standing in the craft.

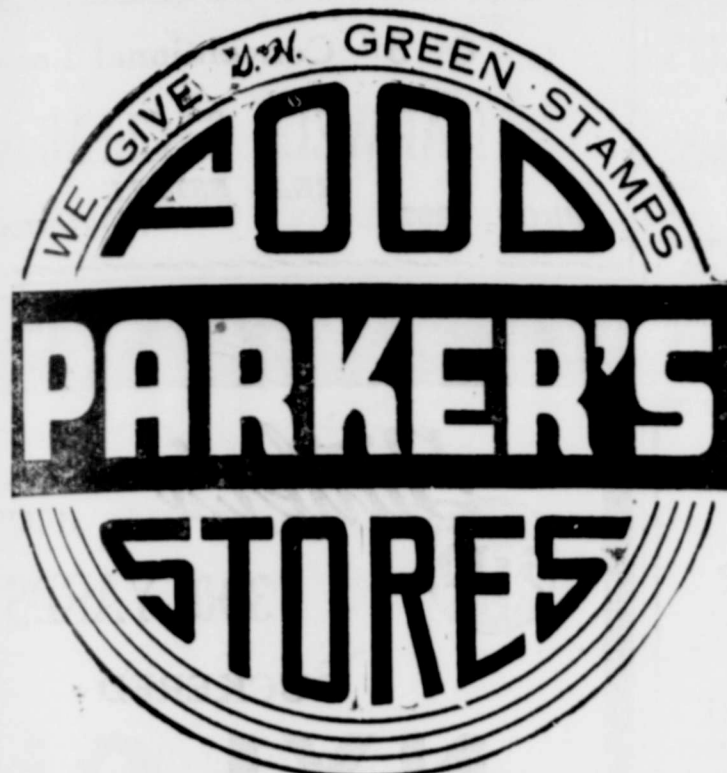

### Our Water Problems

By R. D. L.

The number one problem of some cities in Texas is that of an adequate municipal water supply, and the number two problem is that of storage and distributing systems necessary for the proper delivery of this vital necessity of normal living to its inhabitants. With the installation of a new 250,000 gallon water tank, Burkburnett has solved a part of its problem number two.

A number of cities in Texas are dependent entirely for their water supply from rains. The increased population of such cities, and the deficiency of the usual normal rain fall for the past two years has produced a problem, if not vital, to say the least, is a most disturbing element to the officials of such cities.

Burkburnett's water problems, in the past, have been many and at times apparently unsolved to the mere citizen. The crisis was each time overcome by the persistent efforts of its officials, and for this service the citizen should be grateful for their continued effort until the problem was solved, at least temporarily, and probably permanent.

Some water consumers are not very happy nor sympathetic to a request sometimes made by

city officials for a temporary conservation of water when this becomes necessary. "You can't have your cake and eat it", and the same saying would apply to, "you can't have your water and waste it."

In order to solve this problem without taking some drastic action to enforce it, some cities passed a temporary emergency rate for the consumption of water, wherein a reasonable rate was made for a number of gallons of water known as the minimum, the amounts consumed above the minimum, a rate was charged which was almost prohibitive to the consumer, and it was stated that the method was very effective.

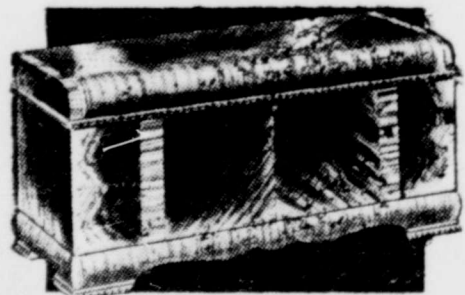

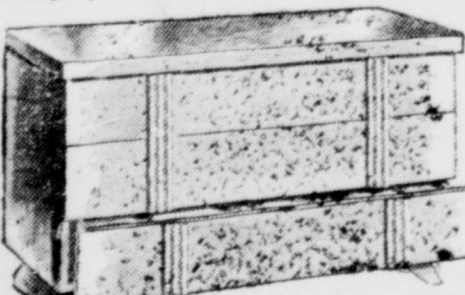

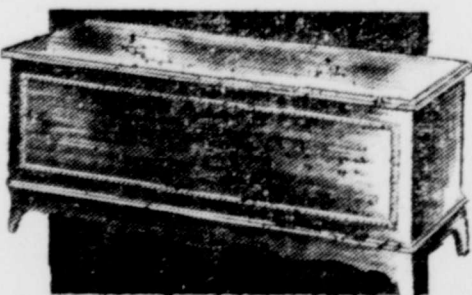

### Texas Cancer News

Vigorous local Cancer Crusades over the state have helped Texas score a new record this year for passing the halfway point of the Crusade financial goal.

For the first time in the seven-year history of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division more than one-half of the state goal was achieved by April 15. As of that date, a total of \$325,750.72 was either pledged or in the bank. This figure is 54.29 per cent of the 1953 state goal of \$600,000.

The total represents funds reported by Crusade Chairmen, memorial contributions and other gifts received at state headquarters during the year (to be credited to county Crusades) and funds either pledged or received from federated "one-fund" drives.

**Outlook Encouraging**  
All in all, the outlook is encouraging for the Texas Division to reach its goal this year, according to Division President Travis T. Wallace of Dallas. However, he cautioned against over optimism.

"At this point in the Crusade, much of our total is due to funds pledged by county units which participated in united fund drives last fall. That money was pledged before we began our April Crusade," he said.

### Anti-Usury Offered Legislation

11 measures being loan sharks have introduced in the present session of the legislature is evidence that Texas is aroused as before to the need of legislation with this serious problem. The Junior Bar of the State Bar of Texas is now collecting 240 percent and more." House Bill 743 by H. H. Huffman or Maragan place a ceiling of one year on the total amount a lender may collect in interest and a jail sentence. In the entire loan would

be void and the borrower could collect double the excessive charges as well as attorney's fees.

"One of the chief subterfuge of the loan sharks at present is their requiring the borrower to take out credit insurance covering life, health and accident. The cost of such insurance is \$7 on a \$25 loan, with the lender keeping 80 to 85 percent of the premium as a 'commission.' Several bills hit at this.

"HB 754 by Hulen Brown of Midland sets the maximum commission on credit insurance at 25 percent. Under HB 724 by Bert McDaniel of Waco, when the agent is also a lender, the commission and net profit of the loan combined must not exceed 10 percent a year on the principal of the loan. HB 725, also by McDaniel, provides that the amount of a health and accident policy can not exceed the amount of the loan and, when

the loan is paid, the borrower will receive refund of unearned premium or it will be considered interest.

"Credit insurance can not be required (under HB 751 by LeRoy Saul of Kress) if the borrower already has either life or health and accident insurance. HB 748 by Henry Lehman of Giddings prohibits credit insurance for loans of \$50 or under and also for loans of six months or less.

"The attitude of the Junior Bar toward these and other bills introduced on the subject is this: we seek to decrease the cost of a loan to the borrower and so we look with favorable eyes on any measure which knocks out some subterfuge or puts teeth in the law. We believe, however, that the problem can be completely solved only when Texas has a small loan law similar to those which 33 states have found successful and to reach that goal, a special committee of the State Bar Association prepared a constitutional amendment and a comprehensive statute (HJR 28 and HB 604, respectively,) which have been introduced by Rep. William Kugle of Galveston."

### News From The Congress

By FRANK IKARD

Everyone, I know, is watching with almost breathless interest the exchange of sick and wounded prisoners in Korea. Having been a prisoner of war in World War II, I think I can, to some degree, know the feeling of men who will be coming home and appreciate the anxiety of their families. All of this, it seems to me should point up that the most important problem that confronts us as Americans is a solution of the Korean War and bringing to an early conclusion the terrific waste of the young men of this country.

The first thing we have to do to accomplish this is to develop a strong positive, bipartisan foreign policy. A solution of the Korean Conflict and a general settlement of our international problems certainly is above any party lines. The solution of these should be approached by all of us not as Republicans or Democrats but as Americans. The bringing about a cessation of hostilities on an honorable basis and the development of a crystal-clear bipartisan foreign policy is our great challenge. Every other issue that confronts us and everything that we discuss is secondary to the necessity of our real progress toward world peace.

It is too early yet to tell just what the real attitude of the new leaders of Russia is, and certainly we should approach their proposals with caution since historically, they have demonstrated that to rely on their promises can be fatal. However, if we in this country will develop a strong united foreign policy, then the chances are that our dealings with the Soviets will be greatly simplified.

Under our legislative system, just because a bill is introduced in Congress does not neces-

sarily mean that it has a chance of being enacted into law or that it will even be considered by the Congress. Each bill that is introduced is referred to one of the committees of the Congress, and there hearings are held upon it and amendments made. Many times a bill is amended in such a way in a committee that its original purpose is completely defeated, or it is changed to such an extent that it is hardly recognizable, and, of course, it is also subject to amendments after it reaches the floor. It is because of this possibility of change by amendment that it is difficult for a Member of Congress to say what his attitude will be when the final vote comes on a bill: for it frequently happens that you favor the principle of the original bill, but when the time comes to vote on it, it has been so amended that you can't vote for it.

It is of great help to all of us to hear from people in our District with regard to pending legislation. I know that many of you are interested in one or more of the bills that have been introduced during this session of Congress, and I hope that you will never hesitate to write me giving me the benefit of your views. It is most helpful when we get letters that point out specifically either objections or

points in favor of any particular measure.
