Francis and his crew spent some three or four days on Dynamite Hill working on the huge 29 by 8 foot sign.

CONFIDENTIAL GET-TOGETHER

"The conduct of foreign affairs and the business of war and peace are, under our Constitution, the responsibility of the Federal Government. But, in times like ours, the danger to our country involves the civilian population in the cities and towns and on the farm of our states. The responsibility of all local government is immense."

This was the greeting with which President Eisenhower welcomed to a secret White House briefing the governors of 44 states and five territories. "Quite beyond the matter of responsibility is the matter of counsel and judgement", the President continued. "All political wisdom does not reside in the White House, nor in the Executive Branch nor in Washington itself."

Beyond the opening remarks of the host, there was no report on what was said by the governors or the long list of high officials who addressed them. But considering that the "briefing" was conducted by the top foreign affairs and defense officials, including Central Intelligence Director Allen W. Dulles and Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., the guests doubtless went home fairly bursting with highly classified information.

And if there should be a great wave of Civil Defense activity sweep the country, it would have one amusing aspect. The National Capital, presumably an enemy's number one target, has not yet had an air-raid drill that affected others than Government workers.

WHAT'S IN A NAME

Secretary Oveta Culp Hobby, of the new, formidable-sounding Department of Health, Education and Welfare, has said that she is opposed to socialized medicine, and that President Eisenhower agrees with this review.

It is her own belief, Mrs. Hobby says, that all of us can get proper medical attention by "expanding and perfecting the system of volunteer, non-profit, privately operated health-insurance programs."

This, we think, is good news, even though we would not be averse to allowing the health-insurance programs to make a dollar or two on us. We hope the Secretary means what we think she means, but that name, Department of Health, Education and Welfare still gives us a twinge. If the Russians were ever to take us over—they'd love it.

TEST CASE

The Suez Canal, long famed as the "life-line" of the now disintegrated British Empire, may be no less essential today to the free nations that are standing off Communism. But General Mohammed Naguib, dictator of Egypt, has told the British to get out. The British have said they will defend themselves and Naguib has retaliated with an embargo shutting off supplies from the garrison of 80,000 men on this largest military base in the world.

A few days earlier, following a conference with Naguib, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles (on his twenty day fact-finding tour with Mutual Security Administrator Harold Stassen) reported from Cairo that he and the General had fixed everything up. There was to be a "phased withdrawal" of the British, but the base would be kept in working order and available to the free nations "in the event of future hostilities."

It looks now as though hostilities are not very far in

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the future—even if the belligerents are not the ones Mr. Dulles had in mind. And since no one else seems to know what to do, we suggest the matter be turned over to the United Nations. This case should be made to order for it. And it's about time we found out what this outfit really can do if they take hold before the shooting starts.

MIGHT BE GOOD PRACTICE

Harry F. Guggenheim, winner of the annual award of the American Meteorological Society made a speech to the annual meeting of the society in Washington the other day. "It may be a long way in the future, but it is not impossible to believe that we can some day control the weather over Russia. We could withhold moisture from them or else drench them in torrential rains by seeding clouds."

But what we'd like to know is, why doesn't he start improving on ours? Does he think it's perfect?

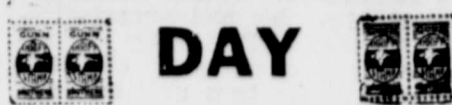

Logan Attends International Truck Meeting At Dallas

employees to be gained from possible price reductions in those categories of trucks. We decided to take the bold step of planning increased production at our Springfield, Ohio, plant and other Harvester plants, where these lighter trucks and components are built.

"This will have the beneficial effect of helping our customers with a better price on a better quality truck and our employees with better employment opportunities."

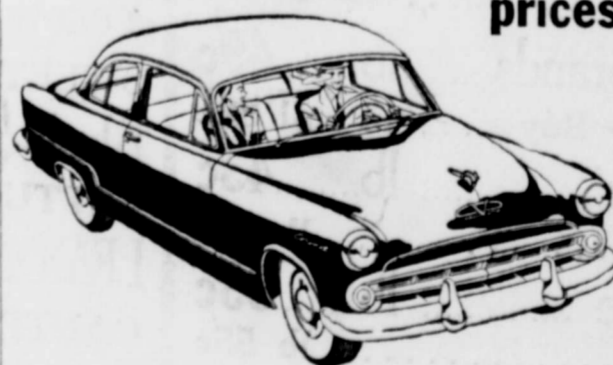

rice, peanuts, berries, oats, onions, flaxseed, cabbage.
 Many manufactured products made in Texas also depend heavily on foreign outlets. Included on the list are aircraft, and parts, oil field equipment, numerous chemicals, refined petroleum products, iron and steel foundry products.

The export market is of tremendous importance to Texas. Most opposition to extending the Reciprocal Trade Act comes from members of the President's own party. Democrats are almost solidly for the extension.

OIL IMPORTS — All Texas owe thanks to General Ernest O. Thompson and the State Rail way Commission for their efforts to solve the problem of competitive oil imports. Due to their work, many large companies are voluntarily restricting imports. I hope they will continue and step up this cooperation with General Thompson and the Commission.

It seems to me the oil industry would not want Federal control because of a temporary maladjustment. Federal control inevitably is imposed at the price of some loss of State sovereignty and individual freedom. I hope we can work out a solution to the very real problem within the framework of this philosophy.

VET INTEREST RATES — A veteran who buys a \$10,000 house under the VA guaranteed mortgage program now has to

vice charge.

Rains Slow County Census Taking

Although rains of the past week have slowed census work for the Wichita Rural-Suburban Directory, the gathering of information is on schedule over most of the county. Workers have visited around three thousand homes and businesses of the rural and suburban sections, and several large areas are complete but for absences. These prove difficult and time consuming in rural area as workers must retrace many miles in an effort to find these residents at home. Following the second check, if there is no one to give information, word is left asking that the information be called in or otherwise furnished to the local representative or county office at Wichita Falls.

Mr. S. B. Spence, publisher, says much interest is evidenced in the Directory, particularly in the fact that all rural residents can be pinpointed on the county map included in the Directory by using numbers and directions given in the location Section and Road Guide.

As cards come in, they are set up by roads or subdivisions, under the heading of their post-office towns. Thus, all roads in precinct two will be set up under Burkburnett, in precinct 3 under Iowa Park, and in Precinct Four under Electra. In this location section, grid numbers enable persons to be located on the map while mileage from the post office town and nearest route will also be given. Then all cards will be set up alphabetically, county-wide, and under this heading the usual directory information will be listed.

Roads other than state and farm to market roads are neither named or numbered on the maps of the county, so it was necessary for Mrs. Spence to spend some time conferring with county commissioners and other officials, postoffice personnel and county residents in an effort to find names in common usage for the roads. These were adopted for the Directory, though not official and subject to change. Space will also be devoted to history and statistical data on the county and towns, a list of schools and principals, churches and pastors, county officials and agricultural agency personnel with locations of offices and phone numbers, and other information of interest.

Each home in the rural and suburban areas of the county may have a directory free but for a few cents handling charge. These will be available in late June at points to be announced later.

YOUR NEW Social Security

Social security payments totaling \$79,838 went to 2,168 people in Wichita County in December 1952, according to Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office.

The men and women 65 or over who had worked long enough to qualify for old-age insurance benefits made up the largest group of beneficiaries and received larger amounts than dependent and survivors. Numbering 1,031 they received \$45,582 for the month. Most of them were from 65 to 74 and received payments after meeting the test of retirement given in the law; those 75 or over could receive payments even though they were still working.

In the smaller groups, 145 aged widows and dependent widowers received \$5325, 318 wives and dependent husbands received \$7,398 and 7 dependent parents received \$281. Not all of the people in Wichita County entitled to payments were 65 or older. Monthly checks went to 637 mothers and children — some of them dependents of retired men, but most of them survivors of those who had died. The payments to 116 mothers amounted to \$4,118 in December and 541 children received \$17,134.

In the Nation at the end of December, monthly payments amounting to \$205,179,000 were being made to 5,025 people. Among them, according to Tate were 2 out of 5 the retired aged. About 80 percent of civilian jobs are covered by the law; 4 out of 5 of the mothers and children in the country can count on monthly survivors insurance payments in case of the death of the family breadwinner.

Changes made by the 1950 and 1952 Amendments to the Social Security Act accounted for a considerable part of the increases, both in the number of people receiving benefits and in the amounts of their payments. In both 1950 the law was changed to include millions of people not covered before, and to make it easier for them to qualify for payments. Among those newly covered were self-employed people and regularly employed household and farm workers.

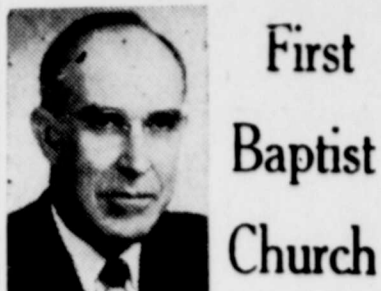
The 1952 changes, effective in September, raised the amounts of practically all benefits, gave social security credits for military service after the end of World War II, and provided that a person can be considered "retired" even though he is earning as much as \$75 a month. Since the first of 1953, the Wichita Falls office has received an additional 670 claims, which is about twice as many as the office received during the same period in 1952. The majority of this increase was due to claims filed by self-employed individuals, Tate concluded.

Money to pay social security benefits comes from the social security taxes paid by employees, employers and self employed people, on earnings up to \$3,600 a year. The tax is now 1 1/2 per cent each for employer and employee, and 2 1/2 per cent for self-employed people. Under the law, the rates are scheduled to increase to 2 per cent each for employer and employee, and 3 per cent for self-employed people on January 1 1954.

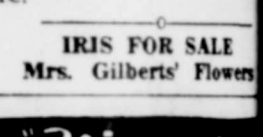

News From The Congress

By FRANK IKARD

The recent request of the Administration for a law that would allow 240,000 additional immigrants from Eastern Europe to be admitted into this country has been met with a lot of opposition on Capitol Hill. Along with a great many others here, I feel that the United States has already done more than its share in taking in these so-called refugees under the old Displaced Persons Acts. We absorbed more than 1-3 of the displaced persons' pool in Europe. We are simply not in a position to continue to absorb the greater portion of the overflow of the population from the rest of the world. To try to do this would be an impossible and endless task. Equally as important is the fact that under these special laws where we take in masses of people, we acquire a great many undesirables that cannot gain admission into any

other country. Only last year, we revised our immigration laws in such a way that many of these undesirables can be kept out of this country, and now we are asked to throw open our doors to 240,000 Eastern Europeans. There would be no way of preventing all sorts of subversives from coming into this country under such a program.

Final action by the Senate on the Tidelands Bill brought to an end one of the longest debates in recent Congressional history. It is somewhat amusing when you think that the Senators who carried on this filibuster are, in many instances, the same ones who cried so long and loud about the use of the extended debate of a filibuster when the so-called Civil Rights Legislation was before the Senate. The Tidelands Bill passed by the Senate is in some respect different from the one passed by the House; therefore, it will be necessary for the bill to go to a conference committee. However, I am sure that the differences between the bills passed by the two Bodies will be worked out, and that by the time you read this, the President will have signed the bill, and it will have become law.

The prolonged debate of the Tidelands Bill in the Senate has dimmed considerably the chances of Congress adjourning by the 1st of July. We still have most of the major appropriation bills to act on as well as many

other important pieces of legislation.

Twice a month the Texas Delegation in Washington has a luncheon. These are always very interesting meetings and give the Members of the House and the two Senators a chance to meet and have lunch together with their guests. This week we had a decided international flavor at our luncheon due to the fact that two men from the British Embassy were there, as well as the famous Dutch Admiral, C. E. L. Helfrich, who, you will remember, made such a magnificent record as commander of the Allied Naval Forces in the Southeast Pacific in World War II. The Ambassador to this country from Mexico was the principal speaker. All of these men, even though they came from different parts of the world, were well acquainted with Texas, its geography and

history, and to my great surprise they even knew some of our "tall tales".

I received notice this week that John Wilkinson, of Wichita Falls, and Brooks G. Bays of Denton, have qualified for admission to our military and naval academies; John Wilkinson to enter the United States Military Academy at West Point, and Brooks Bays will enter the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis for the terms beginning in July of this year. Both of these young men are of the highest type mentally and physically, and I know they will give us every reason to be proud of them in their chosen careers.

Questions and Answers

Q—Is it still possible for a disabled World War II veteran to start training under Public Law 16?

A—Yes. However, under the law, he may only take training that can be completed by July 25, 1956, the termination date of the World War II Public Law 16 training program.

Q—I am planning to take graduate college training under the Korean GI Bill. What does the VA consider as full time training at that level?

A—At the graduate level, there are no minimum number of hours that are required. Instead, VA will accept the word of a responsible official of your school who certifies that you are pursuing your training on a full time basis, in residence.

Q—I am entitled to three years of training under the Korean GI Bill, and I'd like to train on the job. The program I've chosen is not an apprenticeship. Are there any time limits set by the law on job training?

A—Yes. Under the law, the job you are training for must require a period of training of not less than three months and not more than two years. These limits do not apply to apprenticeships.

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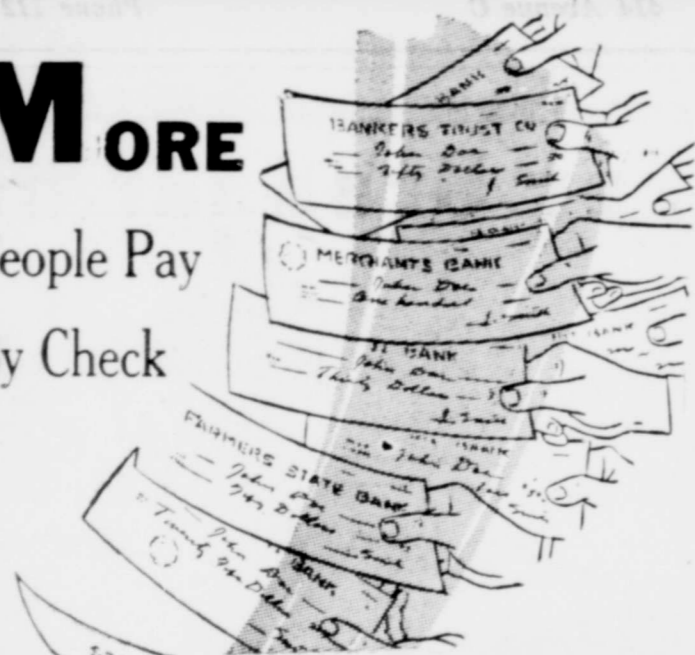

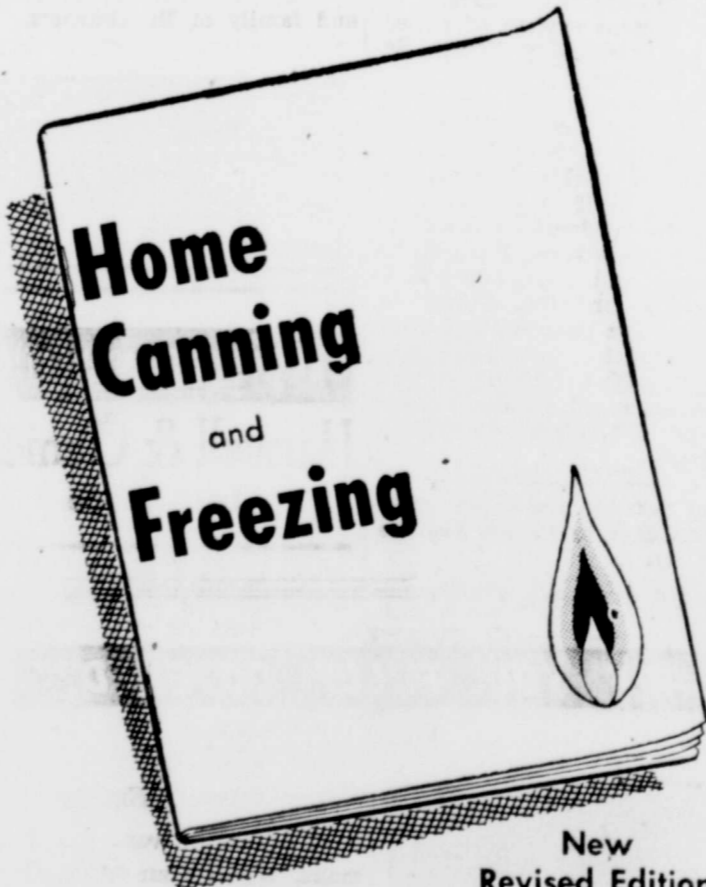

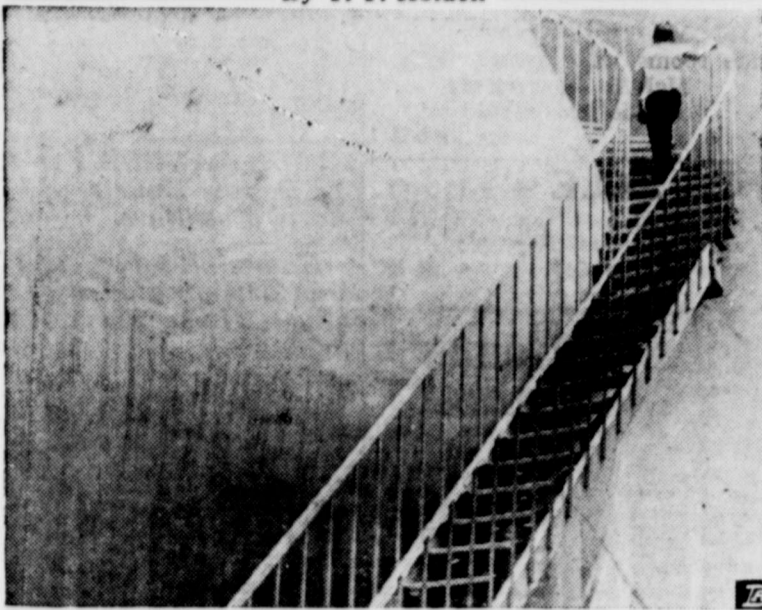

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CAMERA TOPICS

By T. T. Holden



There is material for a prize-winning picture all around you. Remember it's not what picture you take, but how you take it. This one won a prize in the annual Grallex Photo contest for W. P. McMillan.

HOW TO WIN A PHOTO CONTEST

Aside from being technically acceptable the pictures that win prizes in photo competitions are those that contain ideas! A prize-winning picture, contest judges agree, is more than a record of an event—it tells you something about the subject or scene. How much it tells depends entirely upon your ingenuity and skill as a photographer.

Some of the "don'ts" which contest judges urge you to avoid include: That "posed" snapshot of someone staring directly in to the camera. The picture that doesn't tell the viewer something. The rushed or carelessly planned picture.

A good photographer must train his eye to "see" pictures, for his camera can only photograph what the brain behind the camera plans. Study the work of professional photographers and try to discover what made a cameraman take each picture in the manner he did. Why a particular angle? Why only a certain area? Analyze good photography in this way until you begin to "feel" the elements behind the picture's success. Then start looking for pictures in your own surroundings.

Use your camera viewfinder for composition and concentrate on studying different subjects from all angles. Watch backgrounds—bad ones may spoil an otherwise good picture.

Study newspaper photos carefully if you want to develop your story-telling ability. News photographers must tell a story in every shot. Note particularly their so-called "topical feature" shots: summer's hottest day, school opening, school closing, the first blizzard.

One good exercise is taking some simple object or view near home and photographing it from many angles. Try pictures at various times of day, with and without figures, in sun and even rain. Then analyze these pictures carefully to see which ones capture the scene best. Crop the pictures, try re-shooting—practice until you learn all the picture possibilities inherent in that one scene. You'll be amazed at the simple material that can make a fine picture. These are only some tips culled from the desks of contest judges—you can add embellishments of your own. Good luck!

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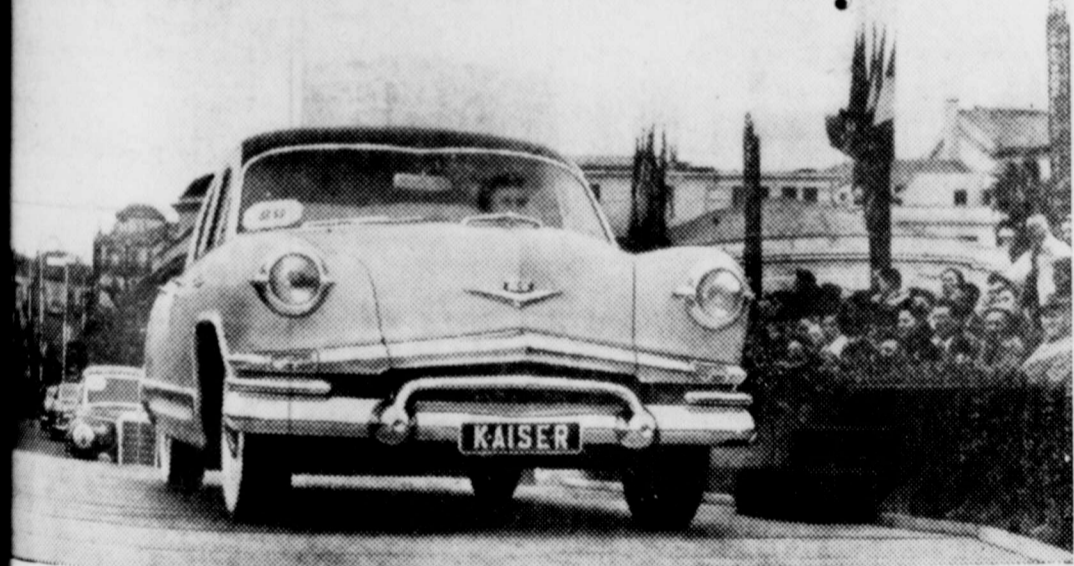
