## A REVOLUTION BEGAN IN 1840

In 1840, according to Bureau of Agricultural Economics figures, one farm worker could produce enough to support 4.49 people. In a recent year he could produce enough to support 15.30, and the figure is undoubtedly higher today.

That little set of figures describes one of the great social and economic revolutions of recorded history. And the cause of it can be described in two words: farm machinery. Barely 100 years ago agricultural methods had changed but little through the centuries. Hard and slow human and animal labor did practically all of the work. Then in 1840, the production of labor-saving, cost-reducing machinery began, and the revolution was underway.

That revolution has been of enormous benefit in time of peace. But has been a life-saver in time of war. For instance, the Bureau estimates that had farmers in 1944 been compelled to go back to the equipment and methods of 25 years before, it would have taken 4,500 more workers to produce the same amount of food. The catastrophic affect that would have had on our manpower supply for industry and the military can be imagined.

To summarize Bureau figures once more, the tractor alone is credited with saving the incredible total of 1,700,000 manhours in the single year of 1944. Machinery has transformed all enterprise. Probably nowhere, however, the transformation been more dramatic and far-reaching as in agriculture.

## GOT \$5,800 TO SPARE?

## THERE'S NO PROFIT IN CHAOS

G. Keith Funston, President of the New York Stock Exchange, recently answered the old communist cry that American "capitalist" and American big-business are war mongers, for the reason that war means more and more profits and they aren't worried about how much blood is spilled so long as those profits keep coming in a golden stream.

Mr. Funston said, "War is utterly destruction — and business cannot make a profit out of chaos. Can you find a sane businessman who has a good word to say for these by-products of war, these enemies of productivity and profits: Inflation, soaring corporate and personal income taxes, price fixing, material shortages, loss of personnel, governmental red tape, and disruption of essential long-range business planning?"

He then dealt with the fact that stock prices declined abruptly at a time when the peace outlook in Korea seemed to brighten. This drop, he observed, "reflected change and the introduction of factors defying immediate measurement—The market will always respond to shock treatment." It is a fact of record that the market broke much more severely in mid 1950 when the Korean war started.

The American business community, like all Americans wants peace and hates war.

**Ordinance No. 317**

An ordinance giving City Council of the City of Burkburnett, Texas authority to prohibit the use of water from City Water Mains for Irrigation of Lawns, Trees, Shrubs, Grass and Gardens; In Air Conditioners which do not have a Circulating Pump; For Washing Cars or other motor vehicles within or outside the City Limits of the City of Burkburnett, Texas:

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Burkburnett, Texas:

**Section 1.**

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to use water from the City Water mains to irrigate, sprinkle, or wet down any lawns, gardens, trees or shrubs within or outside the City Limits of the City of Burkburnett, Texas; or for such persons to use said water in Air Conditioners not having a circulating pump; or for such persons to use said water for washing cars or other motor vehicles within or outside the City Limits of the City of Burkburnett, Texas.

**Section 2.**

The City Council shall have the authority, and does by these presents, have the authority, in order to conserve the shrubs and trees of the Citizens of Burkburnett, to zone the City of Burkburnett, and through Proclamation to allow the people of Burkburnett in those zones to use water for specified purposes set out in the proclamation.

**Section 3.**

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. If any part of this ordinance is held to be unconstitutional, it shall not affect the rest of the ordinance.

**Section 4.**

Any person, firm, corporation or association who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance or suffer or allow the same to be violated, shall upon conviction therefor be subject to a fine of not more than Two Hundred dollars. (\$200.00).

It being deemed by the City Council that an emergency exists, this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its passage and publication according to law.

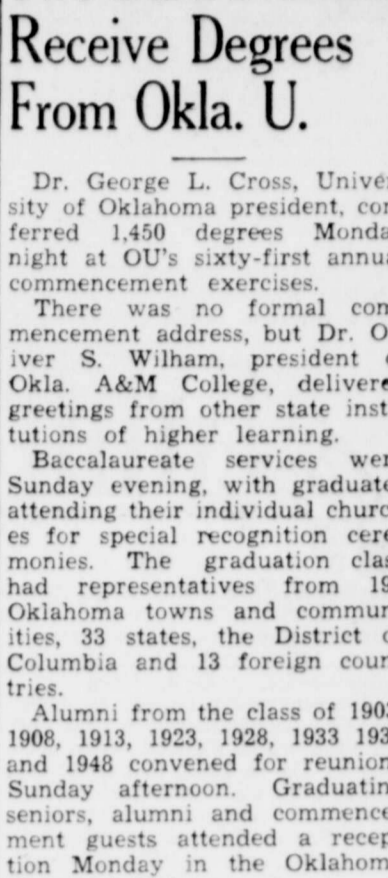

**Camera Movement—Arch Enemy of Good Pictures**

WHEN you get a fuzzy or blurred picture back from the photographer, do you realize the probable reason for it is one of the commonest mistakes in picture taking—camera movement?

Usually the taker's immediate reaction is to blame the subject for moving. This can be true, but not always is. It can never be used as an excuse for scenic shots or pictures of immovable objects which are not clear. It's easy to forget that one must hold a camera absolutely still while snapping a picture.

Some cameras, because of the way the shutter release works are more susceptible to movement than others. If you feel that movement of your camera is due to this, take it to your photo dealer. He can show you how it works and the best method of releasing it smoothly.

But, actually, it's more likely to be your fault than the camera's. So the best thing to do is be careful in the way you use it.

Work the shutter release on your camera slowly and smoothly. If it's a button don't punch at it, and if it's the lever type, don't pull it down with a jerk.

There are many ways of steadying your camera. A tripod, of course, is excellent, and quite nec-

essary for time exposures. You can also steady it by bracing your arms against your sides instead of having them stuck out at angles. This is sort of a natural tripod and can be used with cameras which have an eye level or waist level viewfinder.

If you hold your breath while you release the shutter, you'll have additional steadiness. And with eye level finders, pressing the camera against your face is a help.

So, while camera movement is a very common mistake among picture takers—with a little thought it's very easy to avoid. If you follow the above suggestions, you should have no problem with it.

**Survey Shows Bread Advance Less**

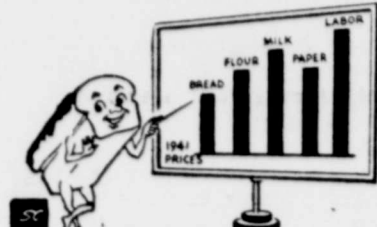
While the costs of ingredients and labor have more than doubled in the past 12 years, bread prices have been held down—on a percentage basis—actually less than the advances in the costs of production, a recent survey shows.

Discussing the advance in general food prices at a meeting of bakery engineers, E. E. Kelley, Jr., President of the American Bakers Association, pointed out that whereas bread prices have

min and iron being added to white bread. Leaders in medicine and nutrition have declared that the enrichment program was one of the greatest boons to public health ever recorded.

Further testimony to the importance of bread in the diet came from another source recently. A leading national magazine devoted 14 pages to a variety of uses for bread, closing the section with statements on bread's virtues.

A. A. Schaal, head of the magazine's research department, declares that bread is important because:



advanced 73% since 1941, flour has doubled, milk more than doubled, paper has increased more than 100% and labor costs in bakeries has gone up 155%.

He reported a survey of newspaper advertisements in 1941 and in 1953 which showed bread selling at 11c in 1941, and at 19c in 1953; milk was advertised at 8 1/2c per quart compared with more than 20c in 1953; sugar was 4.6c per pound, against 10.1c this year; family flour was advertised at 3.9c per pound in 1941, currently at 9.4c per pound.

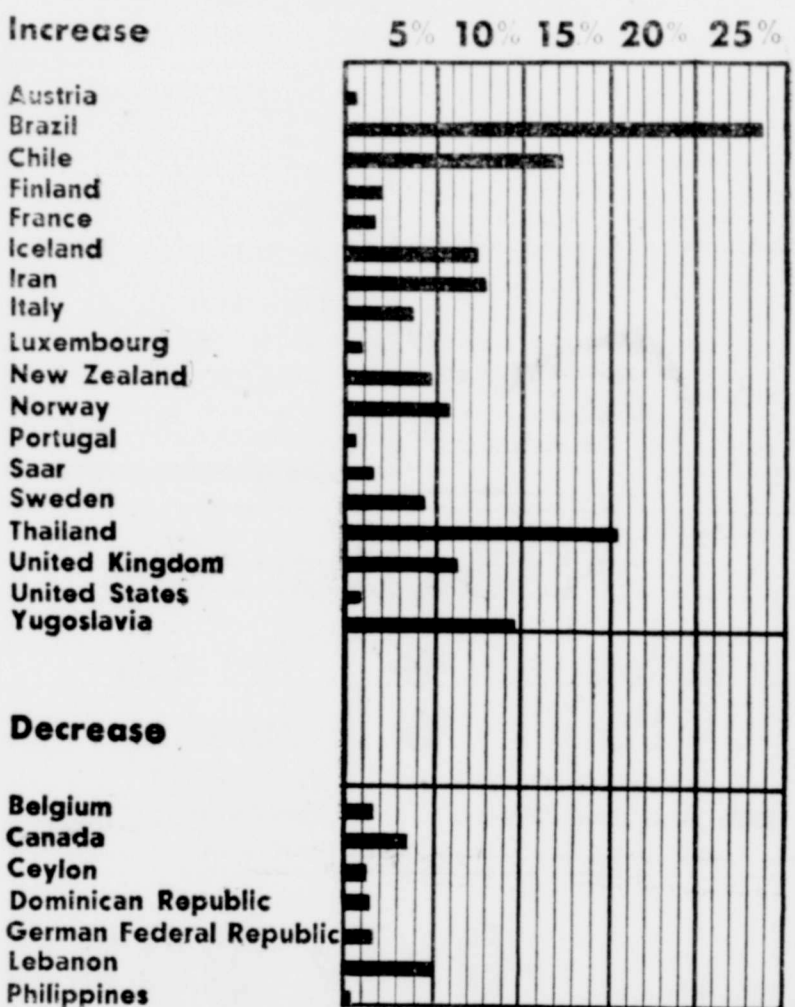
"And of great significance," he said, "is the fact that in this 12 year period, only two products have been improved from a nutritional standpoint—bread and enriched flour. The enrichment program started in 1941, B vita-

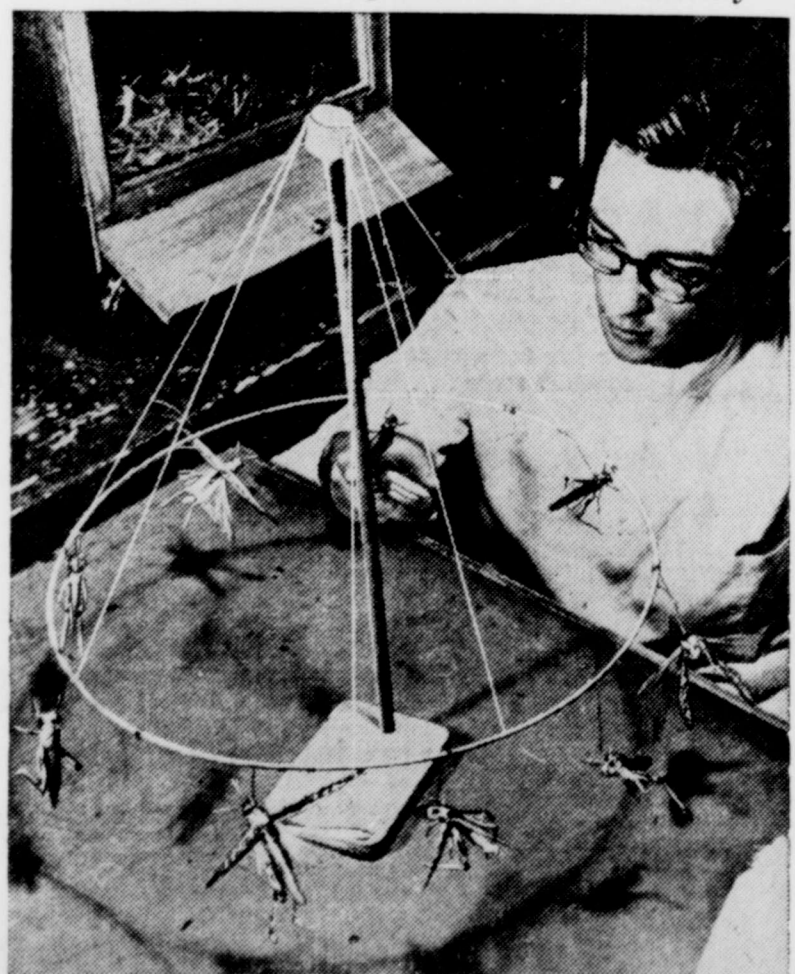
**Cost of Living Around the World**

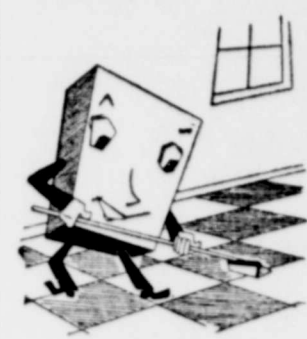

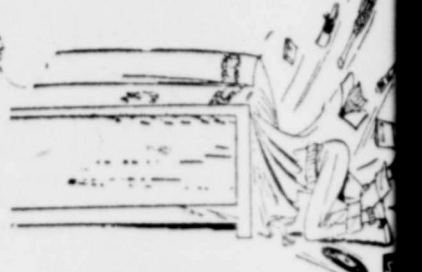

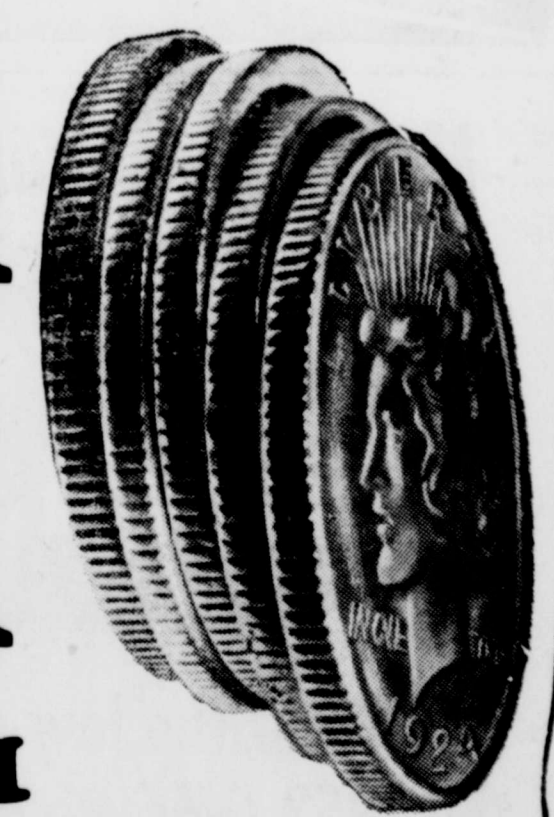

### VETERANS Administration

Q—About two years ago, VA asked a veteran to come in for a physical examination on a claim he had filed for disability compensation. He never showed up. Now he has decided he would like to follow through on his application. Can he do so?

A—He can't follow through on his original claim. His failure to get in touch with VA within one year after he was asked to report for an examination constitutes an abandonment of his claim. In order to get further action, he'll have to file a new application. Should his claim finally be approved, compensation may begin from the date he filed his new application not his original one.

Q—I am drawing compensation, and I feel that my disability has taken a turn for the worse. Will VA accept a statement to that effect from my private physician, in considering my claim for increased compensation?

A—Yes. A statement from your private physician may be accepted as evidence, but his findings must be verified by an

official VA examination.

Q—If a serviceman dies while on active duty, as of what date do indemnity payments to his beneficiaries begin?

A—Indemnity payments begin as of the date of the death of the serviceman.

Q—I am the widow of a World War I veteran, and I am applying for death pension from the VA. As of what date will the payments be effective, assuming VA approves my claim?

A—If you file your claim with in one year from the date of your husband's death, the pension payments will begin as of the day following the date of death. If you wait longer than one year to file, the effective date will be the date you filed your application.

### News From The Congress

By FRANK IKARD

Here in Washington, as all over the world, everyone has been closely watching the event in Korea. The feeling that the world might be approaching a more peaceful era as a result of the negotiations that are going on there have certainly raised everyone's hopes. Out of the confusion that has surrounded the negotiations so far, none of us know the exact details of the proposals that are being made nor what the results of them will be; however, we are all prayerfully hopeful that a truce will come and that it will be based on such fair and honorable terms that a lasting peace can follow.

Not since just before World War II has the world situation been so confusing. We are in a situation right now, it seems, of knowing less than we have ev-

er known before about what is likely to happen in the future, and this is a time when we desperately need to know more than we have ever known before.

France is in a political turmoil and is unable to establish a stable government. The election in Italy have revealed an almost unbelievable gain on the part of certain radical forces there, and the pro-American De Gasperi position is somewhat uncertain. Japan has been making trade agreements with Russia and Communist China looking toward an end to the fighting in Korea while all during the Korean War we have been boosting the economy of Japan. What is Communist China going to do? Will she take her soldiers that are released in Korea and move them to Indo-China and provoke trouble there? These are only a few of the perplexing problems in international relations that face us.

Congressman Omar Burleson of Anson, who serves on the Foreign Affairs Committee in the House, has proposed that we defer action on any foreign aid bill for several months for the reason that we now have substantial sums of unexpended funds that have been appropriated, and the continuity of the program, therefore, would not be broken if action is not taken within the next few weeks. He feels that by delaying action on this program, we would have an opportunity to approach the problem more realistically and find out just who our friends are, what they can do for us, and since this is supposed to be a mutual assistance program, what they will do for us in the case of an emergency. It seems to me that this proposal has

some merit and should be given our very serious consideration.

Recently, I have been reading a book which contains the prayers that Rev. Peter Marshall gave when he was Chaplain of As I am sure you know, Peter Marshall was one of the most respected and beloved men who has served as Chaplain of either House of Congress. It seemed to me that the prayer he gave on March 25, 1947, in the Senate is very helpful to us during these times. I thought you might like to read it.

"Our Father in Heaven, as we pray for Thy guidance and help we know that Thou dost not intend prayer to be a substitute for work. We know that we are expected to do our part, for Thou hast made us, not puppets but persons with minds to think and wills to resolve. Make us willing to think, and think hard, clearly, and honestly, guided by Thy voice with us, and in accordance with the light Thou hast given us. May we never fail to do the very best we can. We pray in the knowledge that it all depends on Thee. Help us then to work as it all depended on us, that together we may do that which is well pleasing in Thy sight. For Jesus' sake. Amen."

### Texas State Dept. of Health

Your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, a pinch of ordinary table salt in each drink of water you take will help prevent heat cramp. As advised by Dr. Geo. W. State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as Texas thermometer hits 95 and above.

Shoers, mechanics, farmers and other collar workers whose white collar workers whose causes them to sweat profuse are in danger of having body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramp or heat fog. Salt is a constituent of sweat; body may lose as high as 40 grams of salt during hot industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a pinch of pure salt of a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen's duties require muscular exertion should be especially increased to add more than the amount of salt to what is lost and drink.

Deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Prepared tablets of available table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for deficiency caused by sweat. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body Salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.
