## 'Blind' Application Of Roll Roofing Conceals All Nails

Asphalt roll roofing, often used for garages, farm service buildings, and other utility structures, can be applied so that all nail heads are concealed. "Blind nailing" is an excellent method of application wherever roll roofing is used and is particularly recommended for use in windy areas. Where one strip of roofing laps another, the edge of the bottom sheet is nailed to the roof deck while the overlapping edge of the top sheet is cemented with quick-setting asphalt cement. Full instructions are included in packages of roofing material.

## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

TELL CITY, IND., News: "Too many people are looking at this war situation merely from the standpoint of finances, they have more money in their pockets than at any other time during their lives—Why can't these people realize that eventually they are going to have nothing. Their pockets have money in them that is coming from the government and being gradually built up into a debt that will bankrupt the once richest country the world has ever known."

BALTIMORE, MD., Daily Record: "Why not review, calmly and without political bias, the whole process of governmental participation in fields which used to be solely the prerogative of private enterprise."

FAIRFIELD, IOWA, Daily Ledger: "It appears the CIO unions are changing some of their positions on socialistic ventures. In their Sixth Constitutional convention held recently they adopted this resolution: 'No federal agency should construct or operate, except for national defense or where private industry fails or refuses adequate service, any project the sole purpose of which is the generation of electric energy' — it has been our opinion all the time that both labor and management have the same stake in the future welfare of the country. Whenever times are prosperous for management they are also prosperous for labor."

## BABY-KILLER AT LARGE

Most Americans, we believe, are convinced that they live in the safest country in the world. Not only our drugs but our foods, our drinking water and even the air we breathe are the concern of various public bodies, local, state and Federal.

We insulate our electric wires and require protective devices on almost every machine that serves mankind, in the factory, the home, on the highways, the rails, on the sea and in the air.

Yet, confident as we are that every poison that may find its way into our medicine cabinet bears the skull and cross bones for those who can't read, and the red warning label "POISON" for those who can, boric acid, a baby killer, remains at large and unrestricted. Boric acid, a deadly substance, for which there is no known antidote, masquerades as a benign and useful drug product. Borated powders and salves, specially recommended for babies, are in use in millions of homes at this moment! Too often deaths due to boric acid have been attributed to other causes, such as meningitis and pneumonia, where the symptoms are similar. And during the past several years, while doctors issued warnings against boric acid in medical journals which the public doesn't see, women's magazines unwittingly continued to advertise anxious young mothers to apply liberal doses of boric acid or borated talcum to relieve the many irritations that beset young babies!

The situation is particularly pitiful since a useful and therapeutic drug, diaphenone chloride, has been developed which is miraculously effective against the infant afflictions for which so many thousands of uninstructed mothers use the deadly borates.

Almost four years ago, Dr. Harold Abramson, of New York, writing in "Pediatrics" said: "It (boric acid) is a lethal agent and responsible for many unnecessary fatalities." Since that time the volume of similar professional testimony has steadily grown. How long, then, must we wait, how many helpless young citizens must die, how many anguished mothers must suffer the tortures of unwittingly guilt before our Federal Food and Drug Administration labels this killer for what it is?

## ZOO'S ARE SECURE

This brief but significant little item appeared on the editorial page of the Coatesville, Penn., Record: "Four zoo reared timber wolves, members of a normally proud and resourceful species, were reduced to raiding garbage cans when released on a wooded island in Lake Superior recently. The security of life in the zoo apparently had deadened their initiative and they could no longer depend on their hunting instincts to provide food. Which should teach a moral: 'People, too, can be pampered and petted too much.'"

That is a telling commentary on the "cradle to the grave" security philosophy. What it always produces is the deadly security of the zoo or the jail.

## President's Home Due Re-Working

President Eisenhower's birthplace recently termed a firetrap is going to be made as fire-resistant as possible.

Fred Conn, publisher of The Denison Herald and a leader of the effort to preserve the two story frame house where the President was born, has asked two of Texas' ranking fire prevention engineers to inspect the birthplace and recommend the steps necessary to make it fire safe.

The experts are A. Sidney Briggs, manager of the Fire Prevention and Engineering Bureau of Texas at Dallas, and Hugh V. Keepers, the assistant manager. Their organization is the engineering and fire prevention arm of the capital stock

fire insurance industry in the state.

They'll be in Denison Friday, July 17, to examine the Eisenhower home from floors to rafters. Then they'll recommend ways and means of making the six room house as fire safe as possible.

The condition of the house was first made public last April during city-wide fire hazard inspection of Denison conducted by the North Texas Division of the Texas Insurance Fieldman's Association. At that time the

inspectors ordered the tourist mecca closed to visitors until some of the more dangerous hazards could be corrected.

During the check, the inspectors found a serious gas leak in an antique kitchen cookstove, two open flues capable of spreading a fire throughout the building in a matter of seconds, and other hazards.

It was then that Denisonians decided to get expert help. The insurance engineers agreed to make the thorough inspection set for July 17 as a public service.

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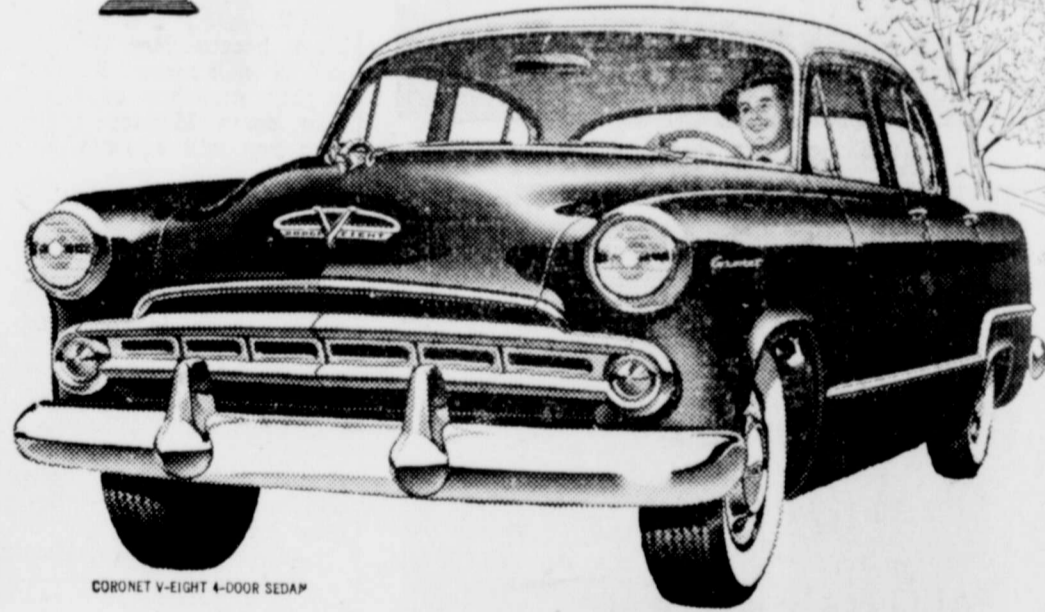

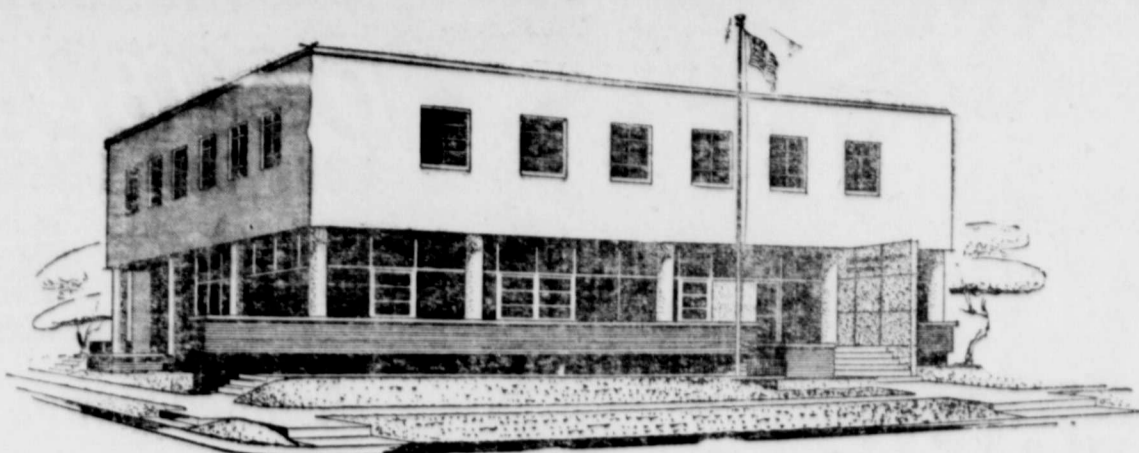

News From The Congress

By FRANK IKARD

This week, the House acted on legislation that would provide additional credit to the farmers and ranchers in the drought disaster area. This bill would make available 16 million dollars immediately for loans, and authorizes the appropriation of additional funds for that purpose, which are expected to be at least a hundred million dollars. This bill authorizes 5 per cent loans above \$2500.00 to farmers and ranchers who are jeopardized by drought-disaster prices and who cannot obtain credit through ordinary channels.

These loans will be screened by a local committee and farmers and ranchers applying must have, in the opinion of this committee, a good chance of working out their difficulties. There are also other loans provided for which would be for any agricultural purpose, and any farmer or rancher in the disaster area is eligible. There is some doubt in my mind as to whether the program provided in this bill will really go far enough to meet the need in the drought-distressed area unless there is a very broad interpretation given the law by those who administer it and unless there is sufficient money made available to carry out the program. I do not feel that 16 million dollars will do the job in the six states that are affected by the drought. Personally, I would have favored a guaranty loan program which would have been handled locally and would have cost the government a whole lot less money. I still feel that there is some chance that such a program will be enacted, for during the debate on this bill in the house, Congressman Hope of Kansas, who is the Chairman of the Agriculture Committee of the House, assured us that after a reasonable trial of two or three weeks, if it were shown that this plan of credit did not work, then he would join with other interested Congressmen in seeing that some additional action would be taken, with regard to this matter, before Congress adjourns.

People here are becoming increasingly conscious of the fact that in addition to feed and credit, there must be something done to stabilize the livestock markets. The present government buying program is a step in the right direction, but it does not go far enough in that the purchase of 200 million tons of beef is sufficient to have the effect of really stabilizing and raising the cattle market. This program must be stepped up. To give you an idea how little some people understand about the drought problem, during the debate on the credit bill yesterday in the House, while I was speaking on the bill, a congressman from an Eastern State asked me if I didn't think it would be just as well if we would let five million head of cattle starve to death. He also expressed the opinion that the best way to handle the farm program would be to let all the farmers go broke and the farms grow up in weeds. He further stated, as follows: "I grew up in this disaster area and most of my relatives still live within that area. I think it is an excellent place to be from and it would be good for a great many people if there were more people from there."

This sort of ridiculous reactionary thinking makes it extremely difficult at times to get an effective program enacted into law. Thank goodness, people of this sort make up only a small minority of the membership of the Congress.

Texas State Dept. of Health

You don't have to be a Mickey Mantle of a Babe Zaharist to be eligible for athlete's foot. You're qualified just by being human.

This ringworm foot infection can come to either sex at any age or at any time, although it is probably more prevalent during summer months when feet are more apt to perspire.

You'll know you've got it when you feel itching and blistering, and when you see the soggy dead skin between the toes and on the sole. Take action then, and you can usually get rid of it in a hurry. But neglect it and you're in trouble.

Here are some suggestions from State Officer George W. Cox which will prevent athlete's foot or help you get rid of it if you have it now:

Dry carefully and thoroughly between your toes after bathing and as often as practical during the day. The disease is caused by a fungus which thrives on damp, perspiring feet.

Massage your feet with a mild rubbing alcohol. This will help prevent spreading the infection from one spot to another.

Swab all cracks or soggy areas between the toes with one part iodine diluted with ten parts of alcohol.

Wear absorbent socks and put a piece of cotton on areas between the toes where cracks or soginess are evident.

Don't use remedies which have been sold for eczema. Consult your physician if the cracks and blisters and soginess do not yield to these measures.

And keep this in mind: If athlete's foot is neglected, it can spread readily beyond the feet. The lesions will go deeper and deeper, and may cause critical damage.

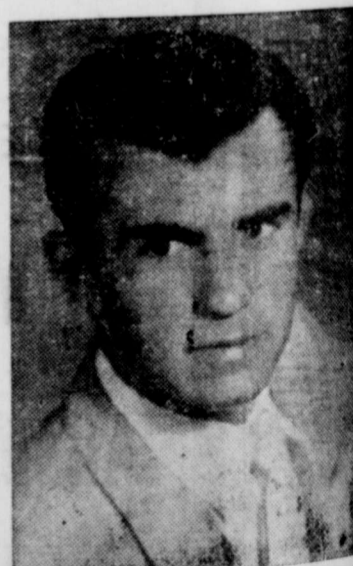

the basis for a far reaching program of water conservation and use. Texas uses about 7.7 million acre-feet of water per year. But the report points out this represents only about 15 percent of the average annual discharge of streams bordering or originating in the State. Texas uses two and one half times as much water as in 1940.

As I have said time and again water is more important to us than oil. The future of our state depends on how we conserve our water. We will need it long after our oil is gone.

**FARM PRICES, INCOME:** Mid-June index of prices received by Texas farmers for their products dropped 5.7 percent from the previous month, according to the Department of Agriculture.

Texas farmers received \$120,000,000 less income the first five months of this year than during the first five months of 1952, reports the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. That's a drop of 18 percent.

**PLAYBACK:** From a speech by Lyndon Johnson, delivered in Texas in October, 1952: "My father was a farmer—He never got into the big money, but most of the time he made a pret-

ty good living. There were three times that Dad went broke. The first time was when Theodore Roosevelt was president — The second time was when Warren Harding was President — The third time was when Herbert Hoover was president — That was when we finally had to give up the farm—

"Maybe it was just a coincidence that farmers went broke only under Republican Administration. But that's stretching coincidence pretty thin."

**EISENHOWER PARK:** We passed and sent to the White House the bill authorizing the Secretary of the Army to turn over land to be known as Eisenhower State Park. The 160 acres of land, which the Federal Government would convey to the State by quitclaim deed, lies within the Denison Dam and Reservoir Project.

**NEWS BRIEFS:** Had a nice visit with Navy Secretary Bob Anderson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Anderson of Godley, and his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Anderson of Burleson.

Additional loans to two Texas colleges have been announced by the Housing and Home Finance Agency: \$402,000 to the University of Texas for construction of a cafeteria and \$386,000 to Hardin Simmons to build a dormitory for women students.

Two Texans made outstanding speeches recently and I had them inserted in the Congressional Record. One was by Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby dedicating the Clinical Center of the National Institute of Health, the other by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, on water control problems of Texas.

Mrs. Lois B. Kilmer of San Antonio was here to receive the medal of Honor post-humously awarded her son, Navy Hospitalman John Edward Kilmer, who died a hero in Korea last August 13.

Lt. W. A. Sullivan of Kerrville, on his way home from overseas duty, was a late afternoon visitor in the office. He had eaten breakfast the day before in Paris, France not Texas.

Nothing has been heard recently of the proposal by Dr. John T. Hannah, Assistant Secretary of Defense, that would have had the effect of killing

the National Guard. This proposal, which Texans asked me to protect as vigorously as possible, seems to be either dead or sleeping very soundly.

Miss Joan Horn of Ft. Worth was a visitor, accompanied by Miss Hilary M. Jones of Dublin, Ireland. Miss Jones has just completed a three weeks tour of Texas and "fell in love" with the State. Who doesn't?

Pontiac Cars Establish Record

Pontiac's production of 1953 models through June has established a new all-time record, R. M. Critchfield, General Manager of Pontiac Motor Division, revealed today.

During this period, 268,641 cars were built, exceeding the previous all time high of 264,092 units produced through June, 1950.

The new record was achieved, Mr. Critchfield pointed out, in spite of materials restrictions in the early part of the year and while Pontiac was carrying out contractual obligations of four Defense projects.

Employment at Pontiac Motor Division is also at an all-time high with more than 18,000 employees on the rolls at the present time.

Mr. Critchfield added that demand for the 1953 car continues to be very strong and that dealers in nearly every section of the country report a continuing shortage of all models.

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Veterans Administration Questions and Answers

Q—I am the widow of a World War I veteran, and I'm drawing Civil Service retirement benefits based on my husband's employment in the Government. Am I supposed to count this money, in figuring my annual income for the purpose of getting a VA pension?

A—Yes. The retirement benefits, which you get on the basis of your husband's employment, must be considered in determining whether your annual income comes within the ceiling set by law for VA pension.

Q—I've just gotten out of service and I've gone to work with an aircraft company as a special term insurance for Korean veterans, but first I want to know if the policy contains any restriction as the hazardous occupations.

A—Your GI insurance policy

contains no restriction as to hazardous occupations. You may engage in any job without altering the terms of your contract or the amount of your premiums.

Q—I understand that under the Korean GI Bill night law courses are counted as part-time training, and may not be measured as more than three-quarters time. Are there any exceptions?

A—Yes. Night law courses approved as full time courses under standards set by the American Bar Association may be considered as full-time training for purposes of the Korean GI Bill.

Q—How much money will VA pay a veteran taking correspondence training under the Korean GI Bill?

A—VA will pay the established charge which the correspondence school requires non-veterans to pay for the same course.

### New President For Loins International



S. A. Dodge, Detroit, Michigan, is the new president of The International Association of Lions Clubs.

Clubs, Lions International). He was elected by unanimous vote at the 36th annual convention of the Association which closed at the Chicago Stadium today. Dodge succeeds Edgar M. Elbert Maywood, Illinois.

He added that Loins International is the largest, strongest and most active service club organization in the world, with Lions Clubs in 45 countries on six continents.

Dodge, in accepting the presidency, said: "Personal integrity; codes of honor in our business and professions; a living faith; these my friends, are the ideals which I shall always encourage, these are the objectives toward which we shall ever struggle, to the end that in some distant day they may permeate the hearts and minds of all men everywhere and bring about a new day in which men shall beat their swords into plowshares and thoughts of hate and greed and power shall give way to thoughts of kindness, generosity and tolerance, that we, in truth, may become instruments of His peace, and where there is hatred, we may sow love; where there is injury pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; and where there is sadness joy. Dodge was graduated from the University of Michigan School of Business Administration in 1917 and became a Certified Public Accountant in 1922 after having served two years with the Air Force during World War I. He has been financially interested in various business enterprises since that time and is presently Vice-President and Treasurer of Solventol Chemical Products, Inc., Detroit. He is also a member of the Board of Directors of several institutions in Detroit and for many years has been a member of the Board of Management of the Detroit YMCA. He was one of the original incorporators of Leader Dogs for the Blind of Rochester, Michigan.

Lion Dodge is a Key Member

in the Northwest Lions Club of Detroit, and is a Past President of that club. He has also held various offices in his District, and was District Governor of the Lions Clubs of District 11, Lower Michigan, during the 1937-38 fiscal year.

President Dodge is a mason, a member of Lotus Lodge No. 549, AF&AM, and all Scottish Rite bodies in Detroit. He is married and resides at 14036 Robson Avenue in Detroit. He has two children, both married. Catherine, who resides in Detroit with her family, and John a Lieutenant in the United States Air Force.

Palenque, Mexico — (American Peoples Encyclopedia News Service)—A noteworthy recent archaeological discovery is that of the Mexican archaeologist, Dr. Alberto Rux Lhuiller. Deep within the pyramidal "Temple of inscriptions" at Palenque he exposed an elaborate sacrifice stone, surrounded by six skeletons. Beneath this "altar" was a burial chamber of an ancient priest or ruler, on whose head, neck, and chest was a wreath of jade. A jade mask with emerald eyes covered the face; in the mouth was a huge pearl; in each hand, a jade ornament; and, at his feet, were two figures, also of jade.

Two Burk Boys At Hensley Field

On the ground, according to Lt. Col. Edgar L. Pewitt, Grapevine, training officer, training charts, cut-away engine, mock-ups and diagrams and class books have been brought up to date to train non-flying airmen in more than 20 career fields during the fifteen days at Hensley.
