

Toppers Topple Tigers 15-7; To Meet Hamlin Here Friday Night

The Haskell Indians, attempting to stay in the upper half of District 7-AA, came up with two touchdowns in the final half to topple Anson 15-7 at Anson Friday night.

The Tigers had taken a 7-0 lead with 35 seconds left in the first half before Haskell turned on the power for a second-half comeback.

Tiger quarterback Jim Rye zeroed in on Bob McLaren five yards deep in the end zone for a 42-yard scoring pass, and Eddie Linder booted the "point-after" for a 7-0 Anson lead.

That tally held up until midway in the third period when "Heap Big Indian Chief" Wayne Reeves shifted into high gear and went on the war path. Reeves carried every play as the Indians drove steadily goalward, and Ivy on a keeper, scored from one yard out, Ivy passed to Tommy Patterson for what proved to be the winning two points.

"Fleet-footed" Charles Franklin put on quite a show in the fourth quarter for an insurance touchdown. Franklin returned a Tiger punt 20 yards, then broke for a 55-yard gain, and then hit pay dirt from 20 yards out on the next play. Bob Aycock kicked for the final 15-7 margin.

Haskell, now 2-21 in district, rolled-up 190 yards rushing from Franklin, and 104 from Reeves.

In the last meeting held November 4th, the twelve member Board of Directors of the Community Action Program elected its officers as follows: Felipe Arredondo, chairman; Rev. Isaias Longoria, vice-chairman and Mrs. Don Mullins, secretary. Other board members are Basilio Andrade, Manuel Casillas, J. W. Foster, Rev. Andy Plien, Rev. Troy Culpepper, Rev. R. D. Williams, County Judge Beverly O. Roberson, Mayor H. V. Woodard and City Secretary, Ira Hester.

A committee composed of Buster Gholson, Jack Pippin and W. O. Holden, was appointed to secure a suitable building.

The Community Action Program is the administrative and managerial arm of the Federal Office of Economic Opportunity, and stimulates disadvantaged citizens in the county to help themselves become advantaged and to show them how.

In addition to securing a building to house the CAP Center, a coordinator and two aids must be hired. Persons interested must have extensive knowledge of the community and a deep interest in its betterment. Men and women may apply preferably from the ranks of those the program is to benefit. Applications for Employment forms are available at the Haskell City Hall. Applications must be received in the city secretary's office by November 18 at 5:00 p. m. Salaries are \$350.00 per month for co-ordinator, \$278 per month for the two aids.

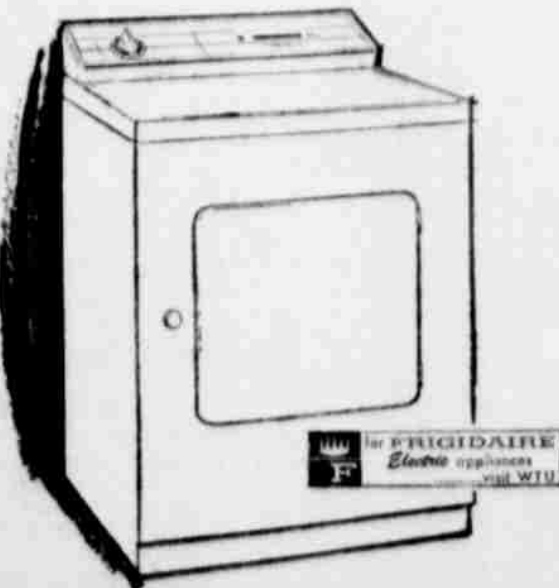

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Record Quail Harvest Expected

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is urging landowners and hunters to join forces this year for what could be a record quail harvest.

"The conditions are right. High quail populations have been reported in most areas of the State and each county has a season ranging from 20 days to three months," says Robert G. Mauermann, deputy director of the Department.

Quail is the one wildlife species that dramatically points out that wildlife cannot be stockpiled or "saved" from one season to the next. Game managers of Texas have been saying this since the first research on

Cotton Classing Report

Receipts dropped off slightly when cloudy skies and rain in the southern area slowed or stopped harvesting, according to A. D. Peebles in charge of the U.S.D.A. Consumer and Marketing Service Office.

The week's classing amounted to 14,847 samples, bringing the season's total to 43,452. There were about 7,500 samples carried over which is equivalent to 3 days classing.

Grades continue to be high with an increase in the amount of white cotton received. White grades made up 69% of the week's classing with 57% being Middling. Light Spotted grades dropped to 28% with 22% being Middling Light Spotted.

Staple lengths remained about the same with 14% 29/32, 38% 15/16; 13% 31/32; 9% 1 inch; 6% 1 1/32, 12% 1 1/16, and 5% 1 3/32 and longer.

Micronaire readings increased this week with 68% falling in the 3.5-4.9 range. Twenty-three per cent was in the 5.0-5.2 range and 8% was 5.3 and/or higher. Pressley test results continued high with little change from last week.

Market activity continues to be slow and prices dropped slightly. A few mixed lots were bringing from 140 to 225 points above CCC loan price.

Stitching And Stewing

By Ruth Ann Fanster County H. D. Agent

Take a tip from the professionals about the best and easiest ways to launder your ready-made draperies.

Commercial laundries use certain laundry techniques when they clean Fiberglas draperies. Many of the tips used by the professionals will be helpful to the homemaker.

A professional launderer carefully inspects all draperies for damage before washing, and makes repairs at that time. All hooks and weights are removed or covered with rubber protectors.

For excessively soiled draperies, the professionals pre-rinse in warm water for a few minutes; drain; then add enough warm water for the draperies to float freely; a low suds detergent, and wash. A homemaker should gently squeeze and dunk the fabric. Scrubbing and agitation are not necessary with Fiberglas.

Extremely soiled white draperies are treated by adding one-half teaspoon sodium perborate or safety-type bleach per gallon water with the detergent. For cigarette smoke or similar type soil, soak draperies after washing in a solution of one teaspoon ammonia per gallon of water for 5 to 30 minutes. However, do not use the ammonia soak if you have used bleach in the washing procedure. And as with all fabrics, use ammonia and bleach with discretion. Use only the amounts recommended. Careless use of these products can result in the removal of color from the fabric. Make certain bleach or ammonia is dispersed through water before adding draperies.

If a persistent stain remains, saturate the stained area with concentrated detergent, rub gently with soft sponge and rinse with clear water. Fiberglas draperies should be rinsed in warm water until water is clear.

Commercial laundries use the same drying methods for Fiberglas as homemakers. The draperies are hung on poles or rods. While still damp, the seams and hems are gently rolled to insure smoothness. Fiberglas never needs ironing or pressing.

The professionals all agree the key word in handling Fiberglas draperies is gentle. Fiberglas products require a minimum of care, and that should be done delicately. For continuing elec-
