That Old Black Magic's Here Again

There's a special magic about October — a magic that touches the leaves with vibrant color — gives the days a crisp, cool zest—makes the world seem more alive. But October spins a reverse kind of magic, too — a Black Magic that steals across streets and highways at early dusk—shrouding familiar objects in darkness—casting deceptive shadows across the motorists' and pedestrians' paths—luring them to DEATH. The thing that makes this black magic so potent is that it catches pedestrians and motorists unaware. Accustomed to the long, light evenings of a Texas summer, they're not prepared for the shorter fall days ahead. So in the early evening hours people proceed at the same speed and with the same amount of caution as they did in the summer months. The result is often disaster. Whenever visibility is decreased, danger is increased. In an average year the Texas Safety Association estimates that—on a mileage basis—two to three times as many traffic accident fatalities occur at night as in daylight. The only way to cut down on the high traffic accident toll during the early evening hours is to combat lowered visibility with decreased speed and increased vigilance. "Wake up and Slow Down at Sundown" is a slogan that will keep you safe.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

MANNING, Iowa, Monitor: "There are a lot of controversial opinions advanced regarding the preaching of Ezra Taft Benson, Secretary of Agriculture, but no one can question the truth of a statement he made recently when he said: 'A lot of youngsters have been raised in the past 20 years with the idea that government support is a normal thing for farmers to expect at all times. That kind of thinking can lead to socialism. We've got to get back to depending on ourselves in normal times.'"

LEADS NATION IN NEWSPAPERS

The Lone Star State has more newspapers in its 250 counties than does any other single state in these United States. And, believe it or not—almost as many as the entire Dominion of Canada.

There are 656 daily and weekly newspapers in Texas. Of this group exactly 100 are daily newspaper establishments. The balance is composed of 543 weeklies, 12 semi-weeklies and one tri-weekly.

Five out of seven of the dailies, weeklies, semi-weeklies and tri-weeklies belong to the only statewide business organization representing both groups—the Texas Press Association. Headquarters of the TPA are in the capitol city, Austin.

CONSERVATION IS THE THEME

This year Oil Progress Week will be observed October 11-16. Special emphasis will be placed on conservation—on what the industry is doing to obtain maximum benefit from our petroleum supplies. The strictly negative approach in which a hole is drilled and then pumped until it goes dry has been out of date for over 50 years.

One of the best conservation methods was hit upon by accident in Pennsylvania when water trickled into oil-bearing formations and pushed oil into old wells which were supposedly dry. Since that time water has been pumped back into oil fields with amazing results. Often the second crop of petroleum has exceeded the first. Natural gas is used instead of water to repressurize some fields.

Largely, as a result of such conservation methods, more than half of the oil wells drilled in this country since 1859 are still producing. New methods of recovery are being developed which promise even greater results.

Today in oil company laboratories all over the country some 15,000 researchers are constantly at work on the other important phase of oil conservation—getting the most out of the oil we take from the ground. More than \$100,000,000 a year is spent on such research and it has resulted in new petroleum by-products which are the source of drugs, plastics, resins, varnishes, wrapping materials, fabrics and many other valuable commodities.

The oil industry is less than 100 years old. It is a monument to the effectiveness of competitive free enterprise.

THE RIGHT TO WORK LAWS

Fourteen states have passed right to work bills, Alabama being the latest. These bills vary in details, but all of them provide, as the Los Angeles Times expressed it, "that no worker may be denied employment or discriminated against because he is or is not a member of a union. The right to join a union is thus protected, and the corollary right not to join is also protected."

Both of these rights are vitally important to free labor, union or nonunion. Under the closed shop or the union shop, the individual is powerless—if he is to hold his job and support his family he must stay in the union and pay it dues whether he wants to or not, and regardless of what he may think of the caliber and policies of union officials. Under the right to work idea on the other hand, where union membership is voluntary, union officials must please their members and give good service if they are to maintain the organization and hold their own jobs.

In signing Alabama's bill, governor Persons pointed out that there are many national and regional organizations which have performed signal service for veterans, farmers, business groups, and others—and that in no case is membership compulsory. Then he said, "In my opinion all of our labor unions will be far stronger and the members in them will have a far greater interest and respect in the organizations if membership can be shown to be desirable and they are not forced to join." In short, both fundamental individual rights and the cause of sound unionism itself are given basic protection in the right to work bill.

Questions and Answers

Q—I'm a teacher and a World War II veteran. I've been spending my summers going to school under the GI Bill. This coming summer I wonder if I could take a course to get credits I need in order to renew my teaching certificate.

A—No, you could not. Summer GI training by teachers is not to be taken just to renew certificate or keep it in force. It may be taken if it will result in a higher or more advanced certificate than the one you now have.

Q—I understand that under the Korean GI Bill a veteran can take a course leading to a certificate he's already received. Does that mean I wouldn't be allowed to enroll in a bar review course I've never taken one, and that's the only course I want.

A—You would be permitted to take a bar review course under the Korean GI Bill, to reach the objective of a lawyer. Such a course generally is accepted as necessary to fulfill the requirements of that objective.

Q—I've gone back on active military duty, and my National Service Life Insurance policy is under waiver. Will I collect dividends during the period the waiver is in effect?

A—No. Dividends may not be paid on policies during the period when the premium waiver is in effect.

Q—My National Service Life Insurance term policy has lapsed more than three months ago, but it has not expired. I want to reinstate it and convert to a permanent plan, at the same time. Is this possible. I'm not interested in back dating the permanent insurance; I want it to be effective as of the date I convert.

A—Yes, you may reinstate and convert at the same time. You must apply to the VA, and pay (1) one monthly premium at the term rate for the first month of lapse and (2) the first premium at the permanent plan rate. You'll also need a physical examination.

Traffic Hazards Increase Late In Evening

"Night must fall, but must countless pedestrians in Texas fall with it?"

That question was asked today by Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety Association, and Services Advisor for the Gulf Oil Corporation as he discussed the importance of the Night Traffic Hazards program currently sponsored by the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Col. Tilley said, "That from October through March, one-third of all pedestrian deaths occur between 5 and 8 p. m. hours that are usually dusk or dark during these months. He blamed a combination of darkness and carelessness.

"Unfortunately, we can't change the laws of nature," he said. "Darkness is here to stay. But we can do something as far as human nature is concerned. Many pedestrians meet their deaths in night traffic because of their own thoughtless walking habits."

He warned motorists that it is difficult for motorists to see them at night and urged them to observe the following safe walking rules.

1. Always walk on the sidewalk. If you must walk on roads that have no sidewalks, walk on the left shoulder of the road facing traffic. Wear light colored clothing or carry a flashlight or a piece of white or reflectorized material.
2. Always assume that the driver can't see you. Never cross a street or highway unless you are absolutely certain you have ample time to reach the other side in complete safety.
3. "Cyclists are in pretty much the same boat as pedestrians in the night traffic picture," Col. Tilley said. "Like pedestrians, they also are a great disadvantage in any encounter with a car. So it's just good common sense for them to be constantly on the defensive. Here are some tips for same cycling at night:
 1. A good headlight and tail light (or reflector) are musts.
 2. Add more visibility by trimming your bike with stripping or some type of reflectorized material.
 3. Wear light colored clothing or something trimmed with reflectorized material.
 4. Ride on the right side of the road, with traffic.
 5. Obey all traffic laws.

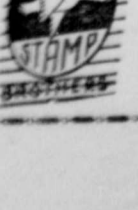

who are trying to out do each other in increased membership. Wichita County is no exception. Your Farm Bureau plans to give every farmer in Wichita County the opportunity to become a member of this farm organization, an organization set up by farmers, run by farmers, and financed by the voluntary memberships of the farmers. This means that not only does the county Farm Bureau depend upon membership dues for the financing of all its activities, but so does the state and national. No one ever asks the members to dig into their pockets to help with expenses or donate certain amounts for building funds, etc. It all comes out of the membership fee.

As a prospective member or an interested by-stander, let's take a look at what a Farm Bu-

reau membership pays for. Your ten dollar bill provides you with:

1. A family recreation program at the Farm Bureau Family Fun Nights that are held regularly.
2. A share in promoting 4-H and FFA programs that are sponsored and aided by Farm Bureau. The Personality Clinic, Recreation Club, and the coming Leadership awards are just a few.
3. An educational program designed to promote a more profitable agriculture in Wichita County by better marketing, etc.
4. An office centrally located for your convenience. Here your committees on livestock, taxes, policy development etc. meet with the Board of Directors to protect in every way possible your farming interests.
5. Representation at all important agricultural meetings in the county, district, state and nation that directly or indirectly affect you. Reports are given to you via Farm Bureau publications for your approval or disapproval as you see it.
6. Legislation representation at Austin and Washington. Something you could ill afford to pay for alone.
7. An active policy develop-

ment program with the ball being carried by the members in establishing the county policies for the delegates to promote at the state and national conventions.

The list could go on and on, because it doesn't include the WCFB Bulletin, the Queen Contest, Insurance Program, or all of the plans tentatively being formulated for 1954.

Right now, Farm Bureau is having growing pains. The leaders are getting more and more ambitious in planning a county program that will benefit all of us. You can help in the building of a sound agriculture for yourself and your neighbors by becoming an active member in the Wichita County Farm Bureau when your neighbor comes to see you about joining up. Check the list carefully, you will find that it pays dividends to belong to Farm Bureau.

The girls of this day are no doubt sick and tired of hearing their type of character criticized and analyzed. They are weary of being called flappers or bobbers and having their actions dissected and frowned upon. Many of them are led to adopt a flippant and don't care attitude in the face of all the severe comment and declare that it is no one's business how they act and they are going to do as they please.

Yet the reason why they are so much complained of, is after all that the community cares so very much for them, that people are so deeply interested in their development, and are so anxious to have them come out well. For, after all, it is the mothers of these girls, rather than their fathers, who mould their characters for the next generation. The kind of example they set and the kind of teaching they give these girls, is what will determine the future of society during the next decade.

No power can break the spell which a good mother throws around her daughter. No doubt thousands of girls have been kept back from ruin by the halloved influence which a fond mother had thrown around them in their early teens. If the mother be true and pure, and interesting and gentle, she will ever live in the memory of the child as a model of all that is to be desired in the female character. And mothers should never forget that they wield a power which can lead the daughter to future life of happiness, or vice versa.

The complaint is often heard that teen-agers as a rule are frivolous and restless in their pursuits of thrills and excitement. This is true of a large class of them. It has always been true of many girls, and perhaps it may be true of more now than

before. Yet there are more girls before. Yet there are more of them studying in schools and colleges than ever before. Perhaps these girls are no worse off chasing around in search of excitement and activity than the girls of a former generation were in sitting around in their homes in an idle way. Anyway, the modern girls are in most cases working, and work is a wonderful cure for frivolity.

The mere fact that these girls are tremendously active is not

alarming. Were they to tolerate loose conduct then their point of view becomes a menace. But let us not be discouraged merely because these youngsters want to keep going most of the time. This is one sign of power.
