LEADS NATION IN NEWSPAPERS

The Lone Star State has more newspapers in its 250 counties than does any other single state in these United States. And, believe it or not—almost as many as the entire Dominion of Canada.

There are 656 daily and weekly newspapers in Texas. Of this group exactly 100 are daily newspaper establishments. The balance is composed of 543 weeklies, 12 semiweeklies and one tri-weekly.

Five out of seven of the dailies, weeklies, semi-weeklies and tri-weeklies belong to the only statewide business organization representing both groups—the Texas Press Association. Headquarters of the TPA are in the capitol city, Austin.

CONSERVATION IS THE THEME

This year Oil Progress Week will be observed October 11-16. Special emphasis will be placed on conservation on what the industry is doing to obtain maximum benefit from our petroleum supplies. The strictly negative approach in which a hole is drilled and then pumped until it goes dry has been out of date for over 50 years.

One of the best conservation methods was hit upon by accident in Pennsylvannia when water trickled into oilbearing formations and pushed oil into old wells which were supposedly dry. Since that time water has been pumped back into oil fields with amazing results. Often the second crop of petroleum has exceeded the first. Natural gas is used instead of water to repressurize some fields.

Largely, as a result of such conservation methods, more than half of the oil wells drilled in this country since 1859 are still producing. New methods of recovery are being developed which promise even greater results.

Today in oil company labortories all over the country some I5,000 researchers are constantly at work on the other important phase of oil conservation—getting the most out of the oil we take from the ground. More than \$100,000,000 a year is spent on such research and it has resulted in new petroleum by-products which are the source of drugs, plastics, resins, varnishes, wrapping materials, fabrics and many other valuable commodities.

The oil industry is less than 100 years old. It is a monument to the effectiveness of competitive free enterprise.

THE RIGHT TO WORK LAWS

Fourteen states have passed right to work bills, Alabama being the latest. These bills vary in details, but all of hem provide, as the Los Angeles Times expressed it, 'that no worker may be denied employment or discriminated against because he is or is not a member of a union. The right to join a union is thus protected, and the corollary right not to join is also protected.'

Both of these rights are vitally important to free labor, union or nonunion. Under the closed shop or the union shop, the individual is powerless-if he is to hold his job and support his family he must stay in the union and pay it dues whether he wants to or not, and regardless of what he may think of the caliber and policies of union officials. Under the right to work idea on the other hand, where union membership is voluntary, union officials must please their members and give good service if they are to maintain the organization and hold their own jobs.

In signing Alabama's bill, governor Persons pointed out that there are many national and regional organizations which have performed signal service for veterans, farmers, business groups, and others- and that in no case is membership compulsory. Then he said, "In my opinion all of our labor unions will be far stronger and the members in them will have a far greater interest and respect by the Rev. J. C. Johnson. Traffic Hazards Increase Late In Evening

"Night must fall, but must countless pedestrians in Texas fall with it?"

That question was asked today by Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, President of the Texas Safety as he discussed the importance program currently sponsored by the Texas Safety Association and the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Col. Tilley said, "That from October through March, onethird of all pedestrian deaths occur between 5 and 8 p. m. hours that are usually dusk or dark during these months. He blamed combination of darkness and arelessness.

"Unfortunately, we can't change the laws of nature," he said. "Darkness is here to stay. But we can do something as far as human nature is concerned. Many pedestrians meet their deaths in night traffic because of their own thoughtless walking habits.."

He warned pedestrians that it is difficult for motorists to see them at night and urged them to observe the following safe walkpresident, conducted a short ing rules.

1. Always walk on the sidewalk. If you must walk on
