PREPARATIONS FOR THE "NORTHER"

Gathering and delivering this gas to your and over 600,000 other homes is controlled by a central dispatching staff. This staff knew from Weather Bureau reports almost the minute the "Norther" would strike your community.

In 40 control points along Lone Star's system, dispatcher alerted hundreds of specialists in compressor, pipeline, gas measurement and production departments. Specialists who operate distribution systems in cities and towns were alerted.



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

We've tried something new in our kitchen the last few weekssampling the hot weather dishes of India, which are as spicy as the climate. We've discovered that curried dishes are as good hot weather fare here as in India and easy to make with some American short cuts as described in LOOK.

Speediest short-cut of all, even if it isn't orthodox, is to warm canned boned chicken in canned tomato soup diluted with 1/2 can consomme and seasoned with curry, paprika, ginger, thyme and pinch of cinnamon and cloves. Serve this with rice (pre-cooked variety) for a quick and differ-

Most fascinating dish we tested must have come from a Maharaja's palace: you might want to try it for a picnic sometime. First, we pierced holes at top and bottom of raw eggs, and blew the insides out. Then we beat these with salt, pepper, ginger, curry, mustard, a little but ter-and poured them back into the shells. Yes, it's possible— and LOOK'S recipe folder on Indian foods tells how. After the eggs were replaced we set them to cook for twenty minutes. like any good hard-cooked eggs
- and peeled them when done, for a deviled egg with the "devil" built in, and unusual new tex-

Your family will probably want to top off such spicy fare with a tall cool drink. At our house, we like to vary the colddrink menu by diluting frozen concentrated juices with carbonated drinks. Talking about mornings, try our candidate for the coolest breakfast in town: half a chilled cantalope, the lower filled with ready-to-eat cereal (take -your pick from an assortment of small packages) and top with floating milk/cream.

There never was a month like this for salads. We've been ex-perimenting with new salad dressings to add fun to our favorite vegetables and greens. Successes you ought to sample: French dressing with a ripe ava-cado mashed and beaten into it: French dressing with leftover pickled beets cut in.

For our summer picnic outings, the children choose "cooky sandwiches" for dessert: grahams with peanut butter and honey spread between or cookies made with packaged cake mixes-and extra dried fruits cut into the


Speaking of cake mixes. have you ever seen anything as pleased as the smile on unexpected guests' faces when you pop a cake (from packaged mix) into the oven to serve warm and fragrant before they leave?

LOOK gives sandwich suggestions from around the world, but there's nowhere else where you can find any kind of bread you like and pick a filling from any country — as you can (and probably do) here. With all this, ny small boy's favorite is still likely to be peanut butter.

You can't do better by a sandwich meal than to offer what the Pennsylvanians call "Seven Sweets and Sours." Set up a relish tray with a variety of pick-les, gerkins, pickled vegetables, olives, tart jellies, mustard, horseradish - or what's your favorite variety? Let every one choose his own sandwich accompaniment, for happy munching. And When your jars of pickles are empty—try using the leftover juice to flavor salad dressings, or meat stews or sauces . . . it's too good to waste.

Here's an extra booster for a sandwich meal-tuck some carrot sticks in with the children's sandwiches, and an extra slice of cheese for a protein bonus. For a man's lunch, the cheese is natural and ripe, but the young-sters like the milder processed type-cheese taste seems to grow stronger with the years.

You ought to try a "drink buffet" to round out sandwich meals. We use our insulated stacked beer, cola drinks, collins mix (the children like this with some crushed berries), root beer and lemon lime - among others. The boys have a new version of the "black cow"—they fill a glass half full of milk, top it with root beer, and gleefully take two glasses of this to get their milk quota at a meal. Which reminds us—why doesn't someone bottle "soda-milk"?
