Stray Dogs Causing Lots of Complaints

Most of the complaints coming to the City Hall now concern stray dogs roaming around over town. The situation is so serious that City Manager T. R. McCasling said Tuesday something must and would be done about it immediately.

McCasling stated the season when rabies is most prevalent, is upon us. The presence of dogs which have not been vaccinated against rabies is a very serious threat to the lives of little children all over town.

Ordinance No. 162 was passed to take care of just such a situation as faces the city now. The Ordinance states in part that it is unlawful for dogs to run at large in the City Limits unless vaccinated against rabies, and a certificate of vaccination filed at the City Hall.

A dog may be vaccinated against rabies, but that is NOT ENOUGH. The Ordinance says that certification of vaccination MUST be filed at the City Hall. Failure to have your dog vaccinated, or failure to register the certificate of vaccination at the City Hall carries a stiff penalty to the dog owner.

McCasling pleads with dog owners to have the dogs vaccinated and register the vaccination at the City Hall. There is no charge for the registration. The cost of the vaccine is only about \$1.25 per shot. The shots can be administered by at least two men in town, without charge.

Dog Poisoners Playing With Fire

Nine dogs have been poisoned here within the last two weeks. The deaths were in a two-block area in the South east part of town.

The cruel, inhuman treatment shown animals by poisoners is disgraceful. But a far more serious matter is the fact that a child might get the poison intended for dogs. No one wants the murder of a little innocent child hanging over their heads.

Ways other than poisoning can be found to get rid of dogs making a nuisance of themselves on your property. Call the City Hall and let them take care of the dog situation.

City Takes Up \$22,000 In Bonds

The City Council voted Monday night to take up \$22,521.90 worth of tax bonds. After these bonds were taken up, the balance in the tax fund was sufficient to take care of the bonds and interest coming due October this year.

The bonds were taken up with city tax money. After the bonds were refinanced in 1947, all tax money goes to take up bonds and pay interest. The money can not be used for any other purpose.

The City now has approximately \$190,000.00 outstanding from the old bond issue. In 1947 when these bonds were refinanced the outstanding amount was \$298,000.00. All these old bonds are callable in 1957. At the present rate of tax collections, all these bonds can be retired by 1960.

City Councilmen Busy Monday Nite

Monday night was a busy one for City Councilmen. They took up and disposed of many matters.

One of the first things to consider was the hiring of new Chief of Police. They decided on Laverne M. Davis as the man for the job.

The sidewalk paving project on Main Street and Avenue C was accepted and payment authorized to the contractor.

The Council approved the purchase of 22 tax bonds in the amount of \$22,521.90. The payment was made from tax monies.

An amendment to the plat of Sunset Addition was approved. The amendment met certain specifications recommended by FHA. Mrs. Emery submitted the amendment.

A petition presented by Jewel Riley to make certain improvements on the steps in front of his building on the corner of Main and Avenue C was approved.

The stray dog problem was discussed and measures considered to enforce Ordinance 162 which prohibits dogs from running loose over town, and also requires that all dogs within the City limits be vaccinated against rabies.

Laverne M. Davis New Police Chief

Laverne M. Davis, member of the Wichita Falls Police Department for the past two years is the new Chief of Police in Burkburnett. Davis' appointment was approved by the City Council Monday night. He will take up his duties here April 1st. Burkburnett has been without a Chief of Police for the past several months.

Davis is 31 years of age. He has a BBA degree from Midwestern University, attended Rookie Police School in Wichita Falls, A. & M. Police School at College Station. Other than his experience with the Police Dept. in Wichita Falls, Davis was a Military Police two years while serving in the army, and had several months' experience in identification work in a Defense plant.

Mr. Davis is married and has two children, a boy 7 and a girl 3 years of age.

Make Courtesy Your Code of the Road

The popularity of books on etiquette indicates that, by and large, people are interested in manners. And a little observation of our friends and acquaintances will prove that most of them act courteously in the greater part of their dealings with their fellow men.

But there's one whole phase of courtesy that's sadly neglected—that phase is MOTOR manners.

When an individual opens the door of his car and slips behind the wheel, he too often changes from an apparently courteous, law-abiding citizen into an "auto-intoxicated" boor (i. e. a motorist drunk with the power at his command).

This lightning-like change has been the subject of some very funny jokes, cartoons, and stories. But there's nothing funny about its effect on traffic safety. The driver suffering from "auto-intoxication" is a menace on the road.

What causes "auto-intoxication?" There's no adequate answer to this question. But it seems to spring from a strange quirk in some people's thinking—a quirk that sets driving apart from other phases of living, making it some thing to which the ethics governing ordinary living do not apply.

As long as there are individuals who think this way, Texas will be plagued by senseless traffic accidents—accidents that could be avoided if the people involved would look at things from the other fellow's point of view.

Courteous conduct on the highway is far more important than courteous conduct in the living room. It can mean the difference between life and death.

During March the Texas Safety Association is making an intensive effort to bring this fact home to the people of Texas. We urge all to support the Code of the program the Texas Safety Association is sponsoring in cooperation with the National Safety Council, the Inter-Industry Highway Safety Committee, and the National Committee for Traffic Safety. This program will be a success if everyone will take to heart the slogan: "Make Courtesy Your Code of the Road."

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

CUERO, TEXAS, Record: "In an effort to expedite deliveries, postal authorities are urging business firms to deposit their out-going mail two or three times a day. Postal authorities insist it is as important to send out mail frequently as to collect it several times a day."

That tells the story."

The number of security risks separated from the Government payroll was placed at 2,200 in President Eisenhower's State of the Union Address. Newsmen asked for a breakdown indicating the number dismissed for disloyalty, perversion, drunkenness or other causes. Attorney General Brownell refused such details — and the heat was on.

State Department Security Chief R. W. Scott McLoed in a speech at Mitchell, S. D., referred to the breakdown demands as a "numbers game" the Democrats were playing. "So far as these firings go," said McLoed, "I don't think people are concerned with any breakdown — they don't care if they were drunks, perverts or Communists. They just want to get rid of them."

This is a refreshingly new angle. Up to now, no one has thought of us people. Our function has been merely to get up the payroll for a bunch of untrustworthy no-goods of assorted weaknesses, abnormalities and ideologies. Come to think of it, we should be able to fire a public servant who is merely incompetent.

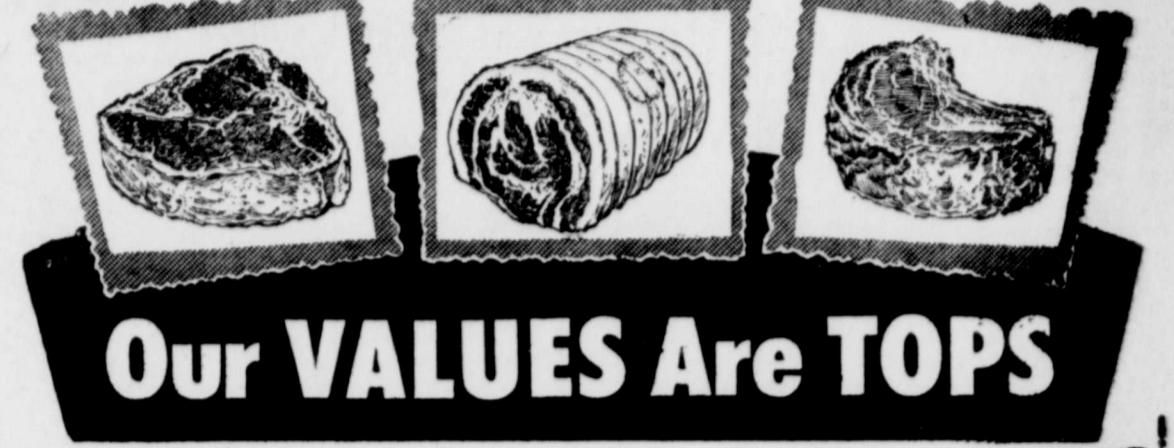

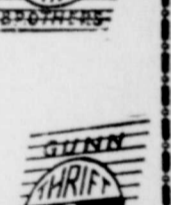

News From The Congress

Probably the biggest news story to come out of Washington in recent months was the shooting up of the House of Representatives by four Puerto Rican Nationalists. I know that by now all of you are well acquainted with the story and have read it in your newspapers and have heard about it over the radio and television. Because it was one of those incredible things, and happened with complete surprise, it caught everyone on the Floor of the House completely off guard. Few of us realized what was happening until it was all over. I was sitting approximately in the middle of the House and looked up and saw the four people shooting down on the Floor. My first thought was that they must be firing blanks for it was impossible for me to believe that anyone would stand in the Gallery and shoot live ammunition at the Members on the Floor; however, this conclusion was changed in just a split second when I heard the bullets crashing into the seats and paneling in the House Chamber and saw several of the Members fall after they had been hit. It is hard to understand the thinking of the people who would commit this crime. Their excuse was, of course, that they did it to attract attention to the fact that their native land, Puerto Rico, is not free; however, this is a senseless excuse since this country has repeatedly told Puerto Rico that we would grant them their freedom any time they wanted it, and just recently they have, by popular election, refused to accept their freedom.

The shooting also raised the question of what kind of security should be provided for the Members of the House. There have been all kinds of suggestions made. It seems to me that you can never protect people in Government from fanatics such as these four were, no matter what precautions you take. It is, I believe of utmost importance that the citizens of this country be able to come and go in the Galleries of the House and the Senate freely and to see both of these Bodies function. My guess is that after all the shouting dies down and the confusion ends, that we will continue to do business as we have in the past.

House has left depletion alone, but the fight may be made to lower the depletion allowance when the tax bill reaches the senate. Many people not familiar with the oil and gas industry, which includes many members of Congress, simply do not understand how vital the 27 1-2 percent depletion allowance is to the industry. It is the only thing, of course, that keeps the small independent producer in business, and he is responsible for about 85 percent of all of our oil and gas discoveries.

The secretary of Labor has endorsed a compulsory FEPC bill. Mr. Mitchell testified in favor of an FEPC measure introduced by Senator Hubert Humphrey of Minnesota and Senator Ives of New York. A bill of this kind raises its ugly head every once in a while. It is always disappointing to see the Executive Branch of the Government, regardless of whether it is Democratic or Republican, come running to Capitol Hill to testify in favor of such a measure.

This week Capt. Tom Hickman of Gainesville was in Washington. He and I appeared before the Agriculture Appropriations Subcommittee concerning the development program of the Elm Fork Watershed Association. The Appropriations Committee indicated a great interest in this program which is so essential to Montague, Cooke and Denton counties.

Enemies of the United States must take comfort in the way Americans allow what President Eisenhower called "useless and unfortunate incident" to distract and divide them. The need for unity is great, and the most recent and spectacular clash of Senator McCarthy with the administration should awaken citizens and cause them to ask where lies the best hope for unity — with the President or the Senator?

It is doubtful whether the kind of political action called "McCarthyism" can be made a partisan issue. In much of his speech at Miami Adlia Stevenson appeared to recognize that all Americans are affected by and have a responsibility to combat unfair committee tactics, smearing, and the demoralization of services. But then he tried to pin the blame on the Republicans and on the President specifically.

Much that Mr. Stevenson said was in the best tradition of opposition statesmanship. On foreign policy and defense measures he raised pertinent questions, and he was on firm moral ground in his warnings that when "democracy and deceit become a national political movement" all Americans are in trouble.

It was fair political battling also to contend that the Republican Party is a house "divided against itself." It is reasonable too to ask the President for leadership, but it is to be questioned the charge that Mr. Eisenhower has been persuaded that "McCarthyism is the best Republican formula for political success."

Some of President Eisenhower critics have complained that he gave up much in his press conference statement on the Stevens-McCarthy clash. They say he retreated too far in not limiting rights of congressional committees to investigate the executive departments. But the public senses that the administration has been doing an effective job in screening out suspected communists.

Mr. Eisenhower is willing to walk his second mile in cleaning up communism in the Government, and while doing so to maintain unity. He stated, "That he will answer for cleaning out the Communist, but it is not in the national interest to have his subordinate pulled and hauled by this kind of acquisition." The President has again drawn the line and emphasized the fair play. He is aware of the American people's concept of many people he speaks for having the same concept—and is expected to make it effective in government.

It will be unfortunate now if at Mr. Stevenson and try to Republicans merely strike back present his anti-McCarthyism as pro-communism. For the Republicans are in power, and theirs is the chief responsibility. The position of the Republican leaders in the Senate is particularly poor. They assured the President they were taking steps to clean up committee procedures;

the public should make it clear that it wants reform.

Those who want the President to wage personal war on the Junior Senator from Wisconsin will not be satisfied. But those who perceive that the issue of fair investigations is larger than any one man, and who appreciate the problem of team leadership facing the President will applaud the forthright steps he has taken. He has refocused attention on moral issues and a positive program. This course is the only one which the bulk of Americans can unite and it deserves our active support.

-YOUR FARM BUREAU-

BY MARYE ECKELKAMP

Farmers North of the Canadian River in Texas, having weathered four years of severe drought conditions, are beginning to turn to irrigation as a road to production. They have found that their chosen route is not without problems.

During the past few years Plains farmers have invested heavily in machinery and equipment, all of which has produced little return from farm operations. With more than 3,000,000 acres of land facing permanent damages, the natural swing was to irrigation, particularly after geological surveys pointed to adequate under ground water.

On May 1, 1953 there were 150 wells in the North Plains area. The number had increased to 250 by January of 1954.

The big blow to the farmers came on September 1, 1953 when major gas-production companies informed farmers that gas which had been used for irrigation well fuel in the past would no longer be available for irrigation purposes. In most cases the farmer owns one-eighth of the minerals where the irrigation well is located, yet under the new directive he no longer is allowed to use a portion of the gas being produced in the operation of his irrigation pump motors.

That fact is of serious concern to them because cheap fuel is absolutely necessary when pumps are required to lift the water from 225 to 375 feet.

The area producing gas companies said that all gas now produced has been dedicated to the pipeline companies now serving Eastern states markets. An estimated 49 percent of all natural gas produced in Texas goes for out of state consumption.

Should gas be made available to these farmers at reasonable prices, there would be at least 4,000 wells drilled in the area during the next five years. The total irrigation potential of the Plains area de-

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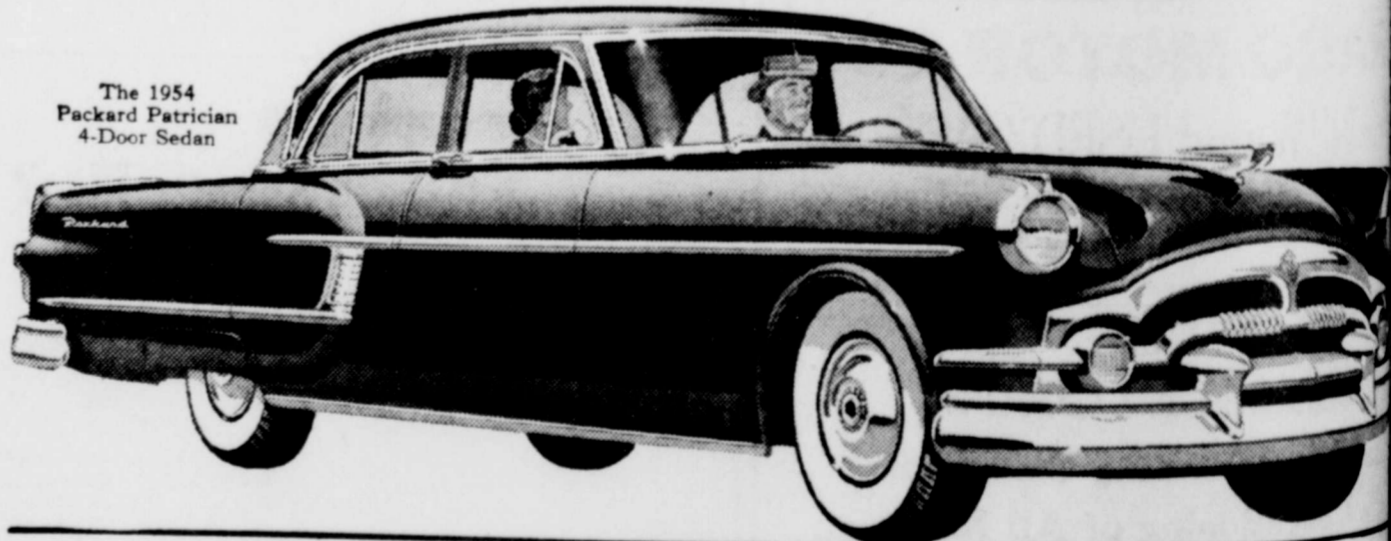
