

The Senate has finally voted to add two new stars to the flag-but the fate of Hawaii and Alaska are still in to prevent further serious damthe hands of the House, where the going will be admittedly rough. It has seemed to us all along that both of these territories shrould be given statehood, and at once -for the benefit of the entire United States.

The Alaskans, of course, are even more emphatic. "Our present status," says the Fairbanks New Miner, "is literally an insult to American citizens. We can not vote for President of the United States, and we can not elect our own governor.

"We pay more taxes per capita to the Federal Government than the average citizen of the U.S., yet we have no representation in Congress-Here in Alaska, we live at the whim of Federal agencies, and exist according to the will of Congress. We are disfranchised, helpless American citizens living under a form of oppression almost as disheartening and tyrannical as that which brought about the Boston Tea Party, and the glorious American Revolution of 1776."

No doubt the Hawaiians feel just as warmly on the subject, and with equal justice, except that the Alaskans, who have been Americans since 1867, have had more time to come to a boil.

If our Representatives follow the example of their colleagues in the Senate, all America will applaud their statesmanship.

FIRST AID

We can sympathize with anybody who has to be chairman of a meeting or president of a club. It seems as though there's nothing in the world as static as a group of people who get together to attend some kind of program.

Unless the subject is hotter than a two-dollar pistol, even the most intelligent will sit glumly silent or yawn. They seem to be daring the chairman to wake them up, make them mad, make them cry or make them laugh.

How to do it? Even if you don't have a burning issue to discuss, there is a way to spark up meetings of civic, church, school or farm groups. All the program committee or chairman has to do is borrow or rent a 16 millimeter projector and show some free films.

That's right, theyre free. And they cover most any subject you can think of. To name a sample or two. there is "Flying With Arthur Godfrey" showing, in color, how a super constellation plane works; "Via Port of New York" explains the complicated comings and goings thru the world's greatest port; "Sculpturing is Fun" tells how to express yourself with a bar of soap.

These and dozens more, are made by various business and industries and are distributed thru film libraries all over the country. United World Free Film Service can tell any program chairman what films are available and where to borrow them.

If your programs need first aid treatment, prescribe free films.

## RSVP

The Western allies, including US, seem to be in a considerable tizzy over Russia inviting herself into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. In Washington, a State Department spokesman announced a flat rejection with incredible speed. London was reported hysterical, Paris scratching its head.

The USSR's Foreign Minister Molotov (for it was indeed he)said that not only would this country join NATO but he would form a club of his own and let Western Europe, even British and America join it.

There can be no doubt that Russia would really OPEN A SAVINGS ACCOUNT HERE - NOW! make a going concern of NATO. We've had a terrible time trying to get our allies to come up with some soldiers for it, whereas Molotov would probably be glad to put in the full 50 division we've been trying for years to raise. He might give them guns and bullets too. And maybe we could get the soldiers to eat up all that butter we have in stock. As NATO troops, that should be perfectly proper.

Actually, we wonder whether Russian membership in NATO would be any more ridiculous than Russian membership in the United Nations. In case you've lost count, Russia just recently celebrated her 58th UN veto. giving her practically perfect score in blocking the efforts of the free world to minimize throat slitting and general geo-political mayhem.

Anyway, US, Britain and France, says our State Department, will get together "soon" to write an official reply to Kremlin. It's quite a 'chore to say "nuts" formailly.

## From Your County Agent

Warm weather brings new roblems to dairymen. Higher bacteria counts in milk are sure to show up unless strict milking and sanitation practices are followed, says B. Haws, extension county agent.

Producers should make sure their cooling facilities are in top condition for rapid cooling. Flies become more aboundant with warm weather and should be controlled with approved insecticides. Haws says. Eliminate all breeding places and remove all manures from the milking area, he adds.

The bothersome hornflies are readily controlled with sprays or washes containing five-tenths percent methoxychlor. Such applications, he says, are usually effective for two or four weeks and, in most areas, two or three treatments in the spring and one in the fall will give ample control.

The entrances and interiors of barns may be sprayed with a mixture of two and one-half percent DDT and two percent chlordane as a means of conrolling house flies.

Wash the walls of milking sheds occassionly before puting on the spray application. ure, too, he says.

Finally, it's time to plant sudan grass of a sudan cowpea mixture for summer grazing. Plant at least one acre per cow and use plenty of fertilizers.
