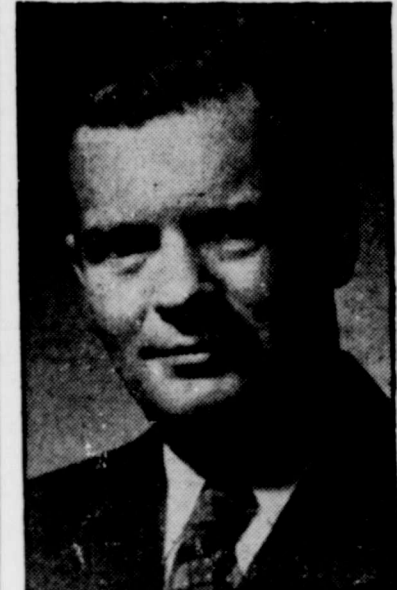

17 percent local support. If the local districts are to remain local control over the operation of their schools, which is of course very desirable, it follows that the local districts must contribute a reasonable amount to the maintenance of the schools. The 80 percent State support and 20 percent local support, less \$100 per teaching unit, certainly seems a reasonable compromise. At least, many thinkers felt that it was. It was an integral part of the plan submitted by the 25 member State-wide committee and, all things considered, this compromise was as near fair for all concerned as it was possible to pass. It is the best long range plan ever passed for the local districts. The original Gilmer-Aikin bill passed five years ago called for 25 percent local support and 75 percent support of the public schools by the State. This new 20-80 plan definitely does not mean an increase in local taxes unless a district desires to pay its teachers more than the minimum Statewide salary scale or to hire more teachers in the future than it now has.

I would be glad to receive comment on this entire subject between now and the next regular session in order that further changes may be made, if needed, at that session.

**Texas State

This is the time of year that most towns in Texas conduct their annual clean up campaigns. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, suggests that whenever such activities are planned to keep in mind the various measures necessary to get rid of rats.

Rats are noted carriers of disease. Some of the diseases transmitted by rats or their hosts are bubonic plague, typhus fever, dysentery, food infection, trichinosis, infectious jaundice and Rocky mountain fever. Rats are scavengers that live on filth as well as edible foods. They thrive in insanitary place such as garbage dumps, trash piles and sewers.

If you don't see rats it does not necessarily mean that they are not near you. Rats are not often seen but their destruction is evident wherever they have been. Sometimes they can be traced by their dirty runways. In storehouses, sacks and boxes of grain and food with holes gnawed in them and contents spilled are evidence of rat destruction. Occasionally rats start fires by gnawing and short circuiting electric wires or by chewing on matches.

The rat lives in filth. Almost any pile of trash, small piles of lumber, cluttered barns, garages, yards or homes afford harborage for him. Rat proofing is effective and permanent. However, even rat proofed buildings may become infested if rats are allowed through open doors or windows. It has been calculated that a pair of rats having plenty of food and shelter could be responsible for the production of 1400 rats in a single year.

Because of the danger rats bring to humans and because of their enormous destruction of food, crops and merchandise, the importance of getting rid of rats is apparent. In addition, home and communities are more enjoyable if they are clean and free of animals and insects that cause disease.

**News From The
Congress**

During the past few weeks, we have all been reading and seeing a lot about the most recent hydrogen bomb explosion in the Pacific. The awfulness of this new weapon was impressed on me when I saw the picture of this explosion a month or six weeks ago. These pictures have now been released to the public, and possibly many of you have seen them. After seeing the motion pictures of this terrible weapon and reading of its devastating effect, I am sure we have been startled to learn that one bomb can destroy large cities and that it ripped a hole in the earth where it exploded large enough to hold fifteen buildings the size of our Nation's capitol. In reflecting on the effect that this new development will have upon all of us, I have thought many times that momentous little word, "if" will be so important to all of us in the coming months and years. "If" is one of the shortest and yet most meaningful words in our language. It is written across every promise of spiritual guidance and enrichment. We are constantly assured that certain things will happen sure as the rising sun — if — if the conditions are fulfilled. If this new source of energy that man has stumbled upon is dedicated to the benefits of mankind, it will revolutionize our future and bring to us many advantages and benefits we have never before dreamed of. If it is dedicated to war, the advancement of our civilization is at an end, and everything that we know, love and cherish is finished. The great hope of our time then is that the "ifs" may be resolved for peace and humanity and that we as a Nation of people everywhere may continue to make a rational choice among the "ifs."

This week the House passed the Agricultural Appropriation Bill for the fiscal year beginning July 1st. This bill furnishes the funds that are necessary to carry on the agricultural program. Among other things, it made appropriation for agricultural research, the Agricultural Extension Service, forest development, soil conservation, agricultural marketing services, National school lunch fund, plant and animal diseases and pest control, upstream flood prevention, and other programs and services connected with agriculture. This bill placed considerable emphasis on agricultural research.

**Horticulture
Hints**

It is not too late to feed roses. Apply 1 to 2 cups of fertilizer over an area of 25 square feet. In very rich soil reduce to 1-2 cup. You may not need to use more than 2 1-2 cups anywhere.

Mulch to keep down weeds & grass & hold moisture. If you mulch with sawdust be sure to supply enough nitrogen fertilizer for bacteria, or they may take so much nitrogen from the soil that roses will have yellow leaves. It is best to use enough nitrogen to let them and the roses both prosper.

Dust the roses with copper-sulphur dust if you can get it. This will keep off blackspot, mildew and red spiders. If not available "flower-of-sulphur" may be used or a Bordeaux spray. Phygon and other effective fungicides may be available to you. Check at drug stores or seed stores.

During dry weather, water roses to a depth of 12 to 15 inches. Shallow watering will

cause the spits to grow near the surface which will cause them to suffer a great deal later on.

There are different rules for feeding trees. Even if you feed them during January or February it would be a good idea to give them some more. One rule recommends using 1 pound of commercial fertilizer for each inch in diameter. Measure the tree trunk four or five feet above the ground and put the plant food 4 to 5 feet out from the trunk of the tree where the feeder roots can get it. Still farther out would be better for large trees. No small roots are found near the trunk of large trees.

Any injury or deadlimbs should be cut off of the tree. Long, awkward limbs may be cut at the tip. Do not dehorn your trees.

Investigation

BY R. D. Laney

... have been the career agenda of the more re-investigating committees... Americans have for the storms of controversy... investigation in the twenty wall street, the municipalities, the TVA and investigations of the Pearl Harbor incident ago—to name a few of these.

... issues of the Communist Worker are filled with years of the congressional committees investigating... The Main Report of the Communist Party, USA, for refers to the "struggles witch-hunting investigation of the McCarthy-McCarthy of congressional committee and refers to "the Mc-

Carthyite cabal led by McCarthy, McCarran, Velde and Jenner." The reason for the violent communist campaign against the committees is obviously because they have been cracking down hard on the communist conspiracy.

For example, among the things accomplished by the 157 investigations conducted by the committee headed by Senator McCarthy during 1953 were 71 persons who invoked the Fifth Amendment, most of whom worked in strategic positions in defense plants or in various agencies of the government; the inefficient Loyal Panel of the Government printing office, that had knowingly cleared communist working with secret documents, was removed; top policy men in Voice of America program, a program that was supposed to be fighting communism, but who, when put under oath, admitted they knew little or nothing about communism and were actually using the work of well known communist in the program.

The investigation further, with the assistance and the cooperation of the State Department, resulted in the complete clean-up in the personal file system in the State Department, thus tightening the defense against risks; the exposure of a two Billion Dollar annual trade between our allies and Red China, and helping to cut that trade down by obtaining agreement from Greek ship owners

to remove 327 ships from such trade, which committee accomplishment was characterized by Secretary Dulles as being in the public interest.

The committee further exposed the transfer of American currency plates to the Soviet Union, resulting in the loss of \$225,000,000, while a Communist cell was in the government; the exposure of Korean war atrocities on American POW's by communist in Korea; the use of communist indoctrination material in the United States Army exposure of the strongest communist labor unions, and the hold they had on the plant and the local at the General Electric Company at Schenectady, N. Y.

For these and other reasons the committee are screaming loudest about congressional investigations. Full knowledge of this fact, on the part of everyone, that the communist are the one who are screaming the loudest will help make congressional investigations more effective. Within the last few months, it came to the committee's attention, that is the committee on Government Operations, of which Senator McCarthy is chairman, that Mr. Rothchild has been in his position for 14 years, that the FBI over a period of several years had furnished more than 40 informants that Mr. Rothchild was a member of the communist and that he was committing espionage. When Mr. Rothchild was brought before the committee and asked about espionage as of the present time, he invoked the Fifth Amendment.

Being more specific, Edward Rothchild was in charge of the general assembly portion of the government printing office. The committee had the co-operation of the head of the department the new public printer. Mr. Rothchild was removed from this sensitive position where, in the government printing office, he had access to secret documents.

ments, secret material pertaining to the Army, Air Force, and the State Department. Edward Rothchild was dismissed after he had invoked the Fifth Amendment, after more than 40 informants of the FBI, thru a period of years, had been presenting this material to the previous administration of the printing office.

The investigations often do take on a partisan trend of character, it's true, but again that's part of the great American system of government, enlightenment of the people letting the people know what is going on in the government.
