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



An air of interest and efficiency was apparent.

In our country the production workers of a major Toledo, Ohio automobile manufacturer and their UAW-CIO union deserves commendation on the announcement that they have voted themselves a put cut in order to bring their company's labor cost into a better competitive position with other automobile manufacturers. It is stated that the almost-unanimous vote may cost the workers as much as 10 percent of their present pay, part of which they may recover later if a new bonus pay plan can be worked out.

What was observed in England could well result at this plant. It's a healthy sign when labor takes this kind of an interest in management and it is to hoped that in this case and others like it that all concerned will win.
