More Than 7 Inches Raintall Since Saturday

Reports from unofficial rain gauges in three different parts of the city places rainfall since last Saturday above seven inches. This moisture has fallen slowly, sometimes several hours without interruption. The soil probably has the best season in a great number of years.

Wheat Looking Good
The wheat prospects in this area are brighter than in several years. Some three or four weeks practically all hopes for a wheat crop were abandoned. Then the rains came; gently, to the tune of five or six inches. Yellowed wheat took on a new green look and began filling out. Several fields will produce an estimated 30 to 40 bushels, which is some 20 bushels above our average yearly yield.

Harvest will be delayed this year, no doubt, but some wheat will be harvested around the 25th of May if no more rain falls and the sun shines.

Red River Rolling
Red River is again rolling, almost bank to bank, which is seven-eighths of a mile under the bridge. The rise here shows the effects of a swollen Pease River, which empties into Red near Vernon. Rains around the Altus, Okla. area have sent creeks rampaging into Red River also.

May 18, 1935, Red River bridge was swept out. A 120 ft. span broke when the railroad bridge above washed out and lodged against the highway bridge. A car containing four persons was on the span when it was washed out. Three of the people were drowned. One caught a passing log and was washed on to an island some three to five miles down the river. The bridge went out shortly after 7:00 P. M. The lone survivor was rescued the following afternoon after spend- ing a horrible night on the island with thousands of snakes fleeing the high water. One of the drowning victims has never been found.

May 17, 1950, fifteen years almost to a day, Red River was again lapping at the floor of the bridge, but this time it held. Hundreds of people lined the banks all afternoon, wonder- ing if the fifteenth anniversary of the bridge wash-out would bring a repeat perform- ance.

On this May 13th as the Star goes to press the water is still some 12 or 15 feet from the bridge level. But, the big rise has not reached Burk Burnett yet. It is expected this after- noon or tonight, or possibly to- morrow. Lots of water has passed under the bridge since it was opened to traffic in 1926.

Rodeo Consumed Time at Monday C. - C. Luncheon

Plans for the approaching Rodeo and Home Coming Celebration, June 23-24-25, took up most of the time at the monthly business session luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce held at Town Hall Monday noon.

The C. of C. voted to pay \$25 to the first load of Texas wheat and \$25 to the first load of Ok- lahoma wheat coming into Burk Burnett this year. This is a custom followed for many years.

The group also voted to pay the water bills at Morgan Rodeo Stadium, and also at the Lions Club sponsored baseball field adjoining the rodeo grounds. T. R. McCasling, City Man- ager, reported the City had completed six water wells east of town, and three more would probably be ready for the pumps soon. The new wells all produced 40 gallons per minute without lowering the water level in the well. McCasling warned that the new wells would NOT solve Burk Burnett's water shortage problem, but would help out in furnishing water for minimum needs. Mr. McCasling also stated that work on finding other water would proceed. In his opinion a more reliable source must be found to provide adequate water for this city's need.

C. A. Morgan, general chair- man of the rodeo, reported he and his ground crew were get- ting everything in readiness. Rains this week have delayed the work, but Morgan gave as- surance that everything would be in order in plenty of time for the rodeo. Floyd Marten, parade chair- man, reported present plans are for the parade to start at the South end of Avenue D, proceed North to 3rd Street, then West across the railroad tracks. This change in route was proposed to favor those who wish to take pictures of the parade. Hereto- fore the parade had passed along 3rd street going East, which forced photographers to shoot into the sun, resulting in poor pictures.

Paul Browning's Home-com- ing committee met Monday and made plans for sending out in- vitations to all former residents of Burk Burnett, inviting them to return for the Celebration this year.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

CUERO, TEXAS, Record: "Americans just can't ever seem to remember somehow, after the shooting stops, that a strong, ready and efficient merchant marine is essential to national prosperity as well as national defense. Chairman Thor C. Tollefson (R. Washington) of the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries, reminded the Congress the other day of some of the facts of life. In World War I, he said, we paid three billion dollars for ships that could have been built previously for 840 million; and in World War II, emergency construction cost more than 14 billion, instead of the pre-war price of four billion! In each instance, of course, we would also have saved priceless time—which in this jet-bomber age means more than ever before.

NORWALK, Conn., Hour: "Dr. Detlev W. Bronk, president of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, and also head of the National Academy of Science asked thoughtful men to shed their fear for the future, adding, 'Weary, bewildered men covet security —' In other words, the explorers of today are the imaginative scientists and the reward is new worlds undreamed of by Columbus and his colleagues. Dr. Bronk's is a clarion call for courage and faith in the future."

GREAT FALLS, Mont., Leader: "We have evidence there is a brand new philosophy being promoted in Washington. It comes from Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey. He says: 'The people can spend their own money for their own account and in their own way for what they want much better than the government can spend it for them.' For more than 20 years the people have been given to understand that only in Washington had all the answers."

SAVINGS BUY TOOLS

Time was when a man could, and did, buy his own tools. But, what locomotive engineer these days could buy his own locomotive, what punch press operator has his own press?

The average job in industry today requires a \$12,000 investment to buy the tools and machines and supplies and all the other things a working man needs.

Not many people can afford to invest that kind of money alone. But together they can, and do. Today there are almost 9,000,000 Americans who have saved their money and bought shares of stock in companies—shares of the machines, tools and supplies needed for today's high production and living standards. — Daily Leader-Times, KITTANNING, PA.

Statesmanship on the Production Line

A visitor to England tells of an interesting experience while working through the Jaguar Automobile plant at Coventry. When the noon whistle blew a great majority of the workmen continued to finish some operation they were on rather than lay down their tools on the instant. In fact several minutes after the whistle quite a number here and there were still putting on finishing touches. Inquiry disclosed that the men were working on a pay schedule plus production bonus. An air of interest and efficiency was apparent.

In our country the production workers of a major Toledo, Ohio automobile manufacturer and their UAW-CIO union deserves commendation on the announcement that they have voted themselves a put cut in order to bring their company's labor cost into a better competitive position with other automobile manufacturers. It is stated that the almost-unanimous vote may cost the workers as much as 10 percent of their present pay, part of which they may recover later if a new bonus pay plan can be worked out.

What was observed in England could well result at this plant. It's a healthy sign when labor takes this kind of an interest in management and it is to be hoped that in this case and others like it that all concerned will win.

Native Grass Seedings For Eroded Land

Native and adapted grasses are being planted in the Burkburnett area of the Wilbarger Wichita soil conservation district. E. E. Clack and Matt Riley have planted a sandy-land grass seed mixture consisting of bluestems, blue grama, side oats grama and sandlove grass. Joe Frazier has planted a different mixture of grasses that are recommended for hard or tight soils. This mixture consists of buffalo grass (known by a quite a few farmers and ranchers as mesquite grass) blue grama and side oats grama.

Special type drills are needed to plant the above grasses as the ordinary grain drills do not handle the fluffy type seeds very well. The drill that the Burkburnett FFA chapter has custodianship of, has double disc openers with depth bands welded on each side of the disc to prevent the small seed from being covered more than one-half inch in depth.

Control of weeds on new grass plantings is very important for the first two years. Mowing, or the use of the chemical weed killers are recommended.

These plantings are fenced so that grazing won't be permitted until at least the end of the second growing season.

Other farmers desiring to retire eroded cropland from cultivation should plan now to plant grain sorghams on the area to be seeded so that a protective cover will be available for next years plantings.

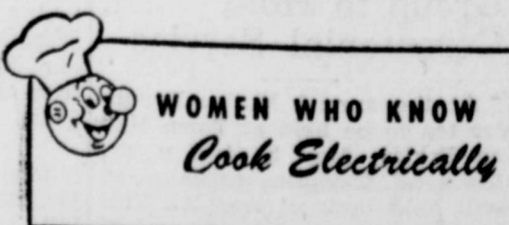

is no excuse for ignorance on this point," Col. Tilley said. According to Col. Tilley, a driver should keep checking his car constantly for the more obvious danger points. "This is easy and simple," he said. "A quick walk around the car can show if the lights are working. The windshield wiper, the horn and the mirror can be checked from the driver's seat. A brief examination of his tires will disclose excessive wear. Loss of brake efficiency shows up in ordinary driving. "But no driver," he said, "should be satisfied with these surface checks. He should have his car checked regularly by a qualified mechanic. On these checks," Col. Tilley said, "the following points should be carefully checked: headlights, rear and stop lights, brakes, tires, steering mechanism, windshield wipers, muffler and exhaust system, window glass, horn and rear-view mirror."

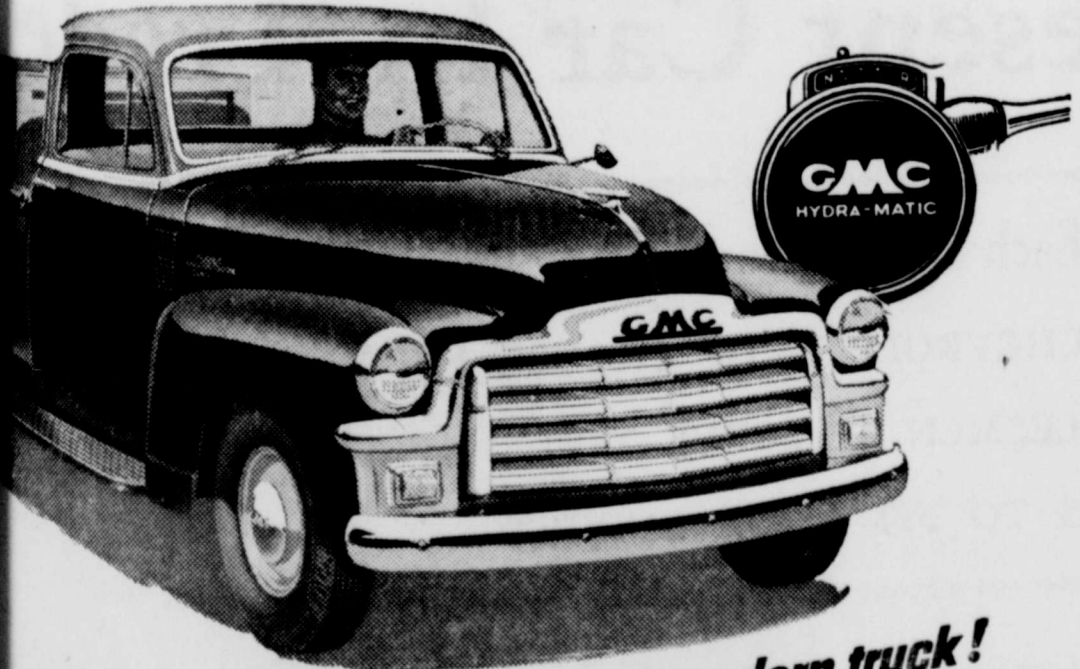

But the outcome of the hear- ings is certain to leave deep marks in the public mind. It is not a situation that can be hushed up or glossed over, all the less with the advent of Pvt. G. David Schine. It is too early to say how Senator McCarthy's prestige will emerge, noting the solicitude which he has highly shown for the reputation of Schine when charges were being made concerning special favors granted him as an inductee at Ft. Dix, N. J. and there was no immediate opportunity for Pvt. Schine to take the stand and defend himself.

For many days now, a great number of American citizens—in a gravely uncertain world situation—have watched or read about these hearings. One would be inclined to believe that most of these citizens have been griped by the drama, though most of us may have been bored at times. But one also would be inclined to believe most of us feel there must be a better way to do these things. If this be so, then it is up to each individual in watching this hearing on television, or hearing major ex- cerpts on radio, or reading text and news accounts, to look at it not for the spectacle and the circus, but seriously to judge the issues and glean the les- sons therefrom. This nation, as a world leader, cannot afford such a distraction from crucial decision, unless there develops a real and significant contribu- tion to nationwide enlightenment. The hearings are likely to go

on for weeks. They may well remain just as intense as they are now. What an amount of valuable time, what an amount of energy they are consuming. The weight of the national au- dience the tens of millions of people hanging on every word and attitude, is just too heavy. It makes actors out of every participant. It is not conduc- tive to clarity, to sobriety, to speed, to fairness. Almost any- thing can happen to reputa- tions, however, if the hearings stretch out interminably, as seems likely, other nations of the free world are perplexed at this big washing of extremely dirty linen in public.


It is, however, a very rigorous and searching business. Secre- tary of the Army Stevens has been on the stand for most of the ten days of hearings to date. When has any one had such a long and widely publicized or- deal of this sort? Perhaps the other principals in the contro- versy will have equally long and strenuous ordeals. And this un- der circumstances in which the rules of a court room and of evidence are not enforced, and the whole nation is waiting on every word. There must be bet- ter ways of doing these things.

Yet one must still ask, was this Roman holiday necessary? Is it a result of policy or of a breakdown of policy? Could it have been avoided if President Eisenhower, weeks ago, had spoken out vigorously against it? He is reported to feel as strongly on this subject as on anything which crosses his desk. It is open to question whether the President should speak out now, with the hearings in mid- career. But the White House, which is remaining so visibly aloof from the proceedings, realizes that their outcome can have a telling impact for or against the President's national leadership.

Thus far, Secretary Stevens has been unable to convince the committee that Senator McCar- thy and his chief committee counsel, Roy M. Cohn and others had exceeded the bounds of pro- priety and ethics in their con- duct of investigations and in their efforts to obtain certain favors for Private G. David Schine, both before and after he was drafted. Many persons who have followed the proceed- ing casually in the newspapers or on television, or over the ra- dio, now have sort of a mental picture of the case.



No Chemical Will Keep Mulberry From Bearing

Many wonderful new chemicals have been developed, but there is none which will prevent the mulberry tree from bearing fruit, according to B. T. Haws, county agent.

Spraying with some of the Dinitre compounds will kill the flowers and leaves and new leaves will come out. Unfortunately, new flowers and fruits will also develop. Thus, spraying is not the answer yet.

Most mulberries are dioecious that is, one tree is female and bears fruit and the other is a male and bears only flowers which fall off early and do not cause the mess that the berries do. If one were growing or starting mulberry trees, he should start them from hardwood cuttings of male trees. Cuttings are made similar to those of roses or grapes. This would insure a male tree. Unfortunately many people plant trees without thought as to their sex and many result in female trees.

The most permanent way is to top work the female tree to a male tree. The method used is the bark or in lay graft and the procedure followed is the same as used in top working pecan trees.
