The most versatile clown in rodeo show business will be in Burkburnett for the Home-Coming Celebration Rodeo June 23, 24 and 25th. Wilbur Plaugher has been panicking rodeo fans: for many years with his acts of comedy and his daring bull fighting episodes.

Plaugher's biggest trick is a real startler. A cardboard phone booth is set up in the middle of the arena. The clown enters it. Then a speeding truck careens into the flimsy structure and flattens it. There's no sign of Plaugher.

While his companions make much ado over the mock tragedy, the clown shows his face in the upper deck of seats.

Very few persons know how the trick is worked and many a papa is red-faced when Junior demands an explanation.

Dog and Duck Trick Plaugher's dog and duck act probably comes next in popularity. Four ducks are set loose at one end of the arena. A border collie herds them to the other end in a matter of seconds and corrals the ducks into a sack held by the clown.

Circus Stunt Another gag is a variation of the familiar circus stunt in which an auto disgorges an extraordinary number of passengers. Plaugher drives a sedan into the arena and out come 33 youngsters, 2 clowns and a

THERE'S A MORAL

While we wait to learn the outcome of the big British butter deal now under negotiation, we might reflect on its possible object lesson to Congress and the American

people. The sale of forty million pounds of the Government surplus to Britain would be at the world price of butter, which is about 47 cents a pound, compared with the prepresent reduced price of 63 to 69 cents at home. Obviously if Americans could have bought this butter for 47 cents at the time it was made, there would have been no mountainous surplus-and a lot of American children might be better nourished.

To say that we can't make and distribute butter for 47 cents a pound is no answer. Nor is it any answer to make butter to sell at 80 to 90 cents when people won't or can't pay the price. But somewhere in between there is a price at which this traditional spread can again become a profitable item of trade - to the farmer, the creamery, the retailer and the consumer-instead of a wicked, rancid sacrifice on the altar of politics.

We think that is part of what Secretary Benson means by "flexible support's. And we think the people, who had to pay in taxes for butter they didn't get to eat, will be looking for such changes.





Give Silage A Chance

It is still not too late to plant a silage crop this year. A number of Wichita County livestock producers are planting silage crops but more are needed. Silage doesn't cost! It pays, according to B. T. Haws, county agent.

Many good silage crops can be grown in Wichita County. These crops include corn, grain sorghums, sweet sorghums and legumes. Some of the best varities of sorghums to plant are: Straight Neck, Early Hegari, Sumac and Sweet Sudan. Several farmers in the coun-

ty are at present cutting alfalfa The part that is played by good Vetch and Oats and putting this in a silo. This makes good silage. It is recommended that pre servatives be used with fresh cut legumes. 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
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

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
