This year is electric light's Diamond Jubilee. Seventy five years ago Thomas Edison invented the incandescent lamp. In that period of time-only a moment as history is measured-electricty has utterly transformed the living and working standards of the American people.

This is true of the home, of industry, of the farm one of the industry's greatest achievements is that 98 per cent of all our farms are using electricity or have it available. And the consumers of power get far more for each dollar than was the case in the past-something that can be said of few other commodities or services. In 1953 for instance, the household user paid only one percent of per. his cost of living expenditures for electricity, as compared with 1.5 percent in 1929. Yet the average use of electricity in the home quadrupled during the intervening time

The electric industry has become one of the largest taxpayers at all levels of government; some 22 percent of its total revenues now go for taxes. It is in the midst of a multibillion dollar expansion program which has made possible the meeting of soaring demand even as reserve capacity has been increased. It is a fact of the utmost significance that the only power shortages have been in regions where normal private-enterprise development has been held back because of drives to socialize the business and create a political power monopoly.

The record speaks for itself. There is no conceivable power need that the industry cannot satisfy, at an amazingly low charge to the consumer.

PECULIAR INJUSTICES

Have you heard it charged that the proposal to give tax relief to people who receive income from stock dividends, which has been subjected to double taxation since 1936, is a shameful "help the rich" scheme?

If so, read what the Odessa, Texas, American, has to say: "It is a strange plaint when statistics show that of all 6,400,000 shareholders in this country less than 10 per cent can lay claim to any real wealth at all and roughly half have total income of \$4300 or less.

"We are inclined to peculiar injustices in this land when we want to tax double the thrifty who make possible the national prosperity.'

THAT UNSEEN INGREDIENT

Writing in Coronet magazine, Ruth Sheldon Knowles offered the striking idea that there is an unseen and unsung ingredient in the gasoline we use - liberty!

She said: "The U. S. has produced almost two-thirds of the world's oil to date, not because it has more oil than the rest of the world, but because it's explorers have been free to drill to one hundred times more wells looking for it. American oil resources are not controlled by government, as are those of every country. The development of a country's resources can be measured by the degree of freedom its citizens have to complete and put their ideas into use.

She then pointed out that in a recent year 2.9 per cent of all passenger car breakdowns on the road occured because they ran out of gasoline, due to driver forgetfulness. In Soviet Russia, she added, virtually no one ever runs out of gas" - for the simple reason that there is no gasoline available for the common people.'

What is true of gasoline is true of all the thousand o and one other oil products used in our homes and factories and on our farms. They are offered to us in almost incredible abundance, at prices practically all can easily afford. And in each, liberty is the unseen vital ingredient.

HOW ABOUT DICKERING?

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told the Joint Congressional Atomic Energy committee that, through "treachery and treason," together with scientific advance ment in Russia "our potential enemies have a knowledge vastly superior to most of the nations we count as friends Thus we should share our atomic secrets with our allies.

The five AEC members, also appearing at the hearing on relaxing the "total secrecy" of the Atomic Energy of 1946, urged "constructive peacetime uses of the atom". and revision to permit private enterprise to develope atomic power for industrial use.

Maybe the Reds have all our atomic secrets. But it would still seem, if our allies are so keen for nuclear know-how, that we could at least trade it for some active interest and cooperation in that European Defense Army, in that Asian Defense Pact (if that's what we think we want) and in cracking down on strategic materials shipments to the Reds.

But there can be no question that if we are to develop atomic energy for peaceful pursuits, American free enterprise shrould be given the job - as free as possible from the solf hand and the theoretical mind of bureaucracy.
