



Such are the pranks of Fate that the stoning of US Congressman by a teen-age gang a few blocks from the Capitol in Washington could have global repercussions.

Gradually, through the years, hoodlumism has been growing in the National Capitol; the city of faceless people-who-do-not-count, because they have no vote; the city that is run by a Congressional committee that has not been too interested in an adequate budget for an overworked police department fighting an uphill battle against thugs and cutthroats and rapists and a towering wave of Juvenile deliquency.

But Representative Thomas B. Curtis, (Rep) of Mo., brought to the floor of the House one of the stones that was heaved at him and made a speech about what happened to him in front of his own hotel when he sought to aid a visitor to Washington who was set upon by ten or twelve young gangsters.

"I never saw anything like this in America," he told his colleagues.

And while this incident may finally result in making life-in-Washington less hazardous for its politically emasculated residents, we can hope too that it may turn the attention of our lawmakers to the plight of America among the international gangsters and those allies of ours who are so eager to deal with them and so ready to subsist on our millions while they do so.

Perhaps that Idaho-potato-sized rock that Mr. Curtis showed the Congress may symbolize the neglect with which we have treated our own problems while we sought to solve everyone else's.





### **GRASS ROOTS OPINION**

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, Minn., Daily Journel-"There's no denying that the money from Washington com es in handy for the state agencies and subdivisions of government facing ever-increasing demands for service and improvements. The fact remains however, that eventually all of the money for government functions come from the taxpayers. There's no magical factor in government financing. No agency of government has access to funds other than those which are paid by or levied against the credit of the American public.

ST. FANCISVILLE, La., Democrat - Jail. Socialism Communism. The welfare state. They're all the same same benefits,' same obligations, same 'rewards,' same pay ments. Keep on throwing bricks at the profit and loss system and you'll smash it; then you'll get your 'security.' But you won't like it.'

BEDFORD, Va., Bulletin - "Congress has enacted a law vastly increasing Federal aid in the construction of highways and President Eisenhower has signed the measure. There are always handling charges in Washington and never as much comes back as is sent in. We have no information on how this additional Federal aid is going to be financed, but in some way the states are going to have to dig in their pockets to foot the bill."

### YEAR ROUND PERIL

Perhaps, by the time you read this, Congress in its rush to get home will have passed the authorization bill for President Eisenhower's \$3,470,608,000 foreign aid program. Six hours after the President's special message, in which he described it as "one of our most effective, most practical, least costly methods of achieving our international objectives in this age of peril," reached Congress, the House Foreign Affairs Committee was ready to send it to the floor. They had, of course, lopped off a piddling seven millions, and voted down two motions regarding Southeast Asia. The first, by Rep. Margurerite Stitt Church of Illinois would hold up the bill until the Administration announced a Southeast Asian policy, and the second, by Rep. Burr P. Harrison, (Dem) of Virginia, sought to shut off \$800,000,000 in direct military aid to Southeast Asia.

Either or both of these motions would seem to make sense, except for the President's point that both the money and the authority to adjust its use to meet "rapidly changing conditions" are essential. When Congress plans to knock off and go home for five months during "the gigantic struggle now threating the world," the least it can do is provide the sinews for this who must stay on the job.

His company has pledged \$5,000 to the Foundation and a permanent hall of fame building. A bill providing for the incorporation of the non-profit foundation has been prepared and is expected to be sponsored in Congress by senators from the cattle states: It prescribes the methods of operation of the foundation and authorizes the establishment of permanent head quarters.

> So far no site for the building been selected, Reynolds has said. He hopes the final decision to be made by the trustees appointed to the foundation after it is incorporated, will come soon and construction started in the near future.

> Present plans call for two trustees each from North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Idaho, Utah, Arizona, Nevada, California, Oregon and Washington. Other trustees from the east and midwest will fill. out the board.

The bill provides that the governors of each of the western states be invited to serve as trustees. Most of them have already indicated they would be happy to serve.


