Complete Stopage of Watering May Be Necessary If Citizens Continue to Disregard Zones

Complete stoppage of all watering of lawns, shrubs, etc., with City water may become necessary if citizens continue to abuse the watering privilege. Wednesday, more than 800,000 gallons of water were pumped from the station East of town. That is a record amount of water being pumped into the water mains any one day.

The city is divided into 6 watering zones. One zone each day has had the privilege of watering precious shrubs enough to keep them alive. City Water Dept. employees checked Wednesday and found people all over town watering from the City water supply. The City has an Ordinance controling the use of city water. A stiff penalty can be placed on those violating the Ordinance.

It is believed there is enough water for all necessary household and industrial needs, plus enough to permit limited watering to save valuable shrubs and trees. PLEASE, for the good of every one, help conserve water by observing the plan laid out by the City officials.

A bill to replace the patronage policemen

with real cops was written long ago, but nothing happens. It took little "daring" for these trigger-happy mobsters to make their way into the National Capitol, to their vantage point in the House Gallery, and there to openfire on their helpless victims.

Gun-toting in these premises should be discouraged. by professionals.

WE CAN'T WIN

Last February third, two Russian diplomatic aides, Commander Igor A. Amosov, assistant naval attache and Alexander P. Kovalyov, second secretary to the Soviet UN delegation were declared undesirable and ordered expelled from the US. On May 29, Lt. Col. Leonid E. Pinev, assistant aid attache, met the same fate. All three were charged with espionage.

But these matters were kept very quiet in hopes that Moscow might fail to return the compliment and kick out some of our embassy team. It seems it's not easy to get qualified Americans to fill these jobs in the Communists paradise. We are permitted to know these things now because Lt. Col. Howard L. Felchlin, assistant military attache, and Maj. Walter A. McKinney, assistant aid attache, have been chucked out of the US Embassy by the Russians in retaliation. The Russians say our men are

spies. The State Department says they are not. This diplomatic patty cake should point up the ridiculousness of trying to maintain formal, polite, stripped pants relations with the Soviet, and give fresh momentum to the effort to bring our boys home from Moscow and invite the Red envoys to leave Washington. It is worse than foolish to continue this one way pipeline for the Kremlin.

Texas Forest Fire Losses Last Year May Be Record

Forest fire losses in Texas dipped to a new low-at least n recent years, in 1953, it was Products Industries.

With a record of 2,125 fires and 40,148 burned over acres, he Lone Star State was second only to Virginia in low forest ire losses in the South, AFPI reported. The Virginia record was 2,517 fires and 35,197 burned-over acres.

The 1953 figures for Texas show a phenomenal improvement over the 1952 record of 5,264 fires and 503,083 acres During the past 12 years losses have ranged as high as 3,396,576 acres in 1948. This year's figure is the lowest since 1949, when the loss was 66,137 acres. Since 1942 Texas topped the million acre loss mark four times: 1943, 1,288,901 acres: 1946, 3,108,051 acres; 1947 3,254,670 acres and 1948, 3,396,-

Fifty-nine percent of Texas' 15,399,000 acres of forestland has organized fire protection. Careless smokers, careless brush burners and incendiarists were blamed for more than two-thirds of the fires last year on protected lands.

The new figures show 170,960 acres burned over in Louisiana, 773,620 acres in Mississippi and 188,079 acres in Arkansas.

"Forest industries of Texas are proud of their part in this low fire loss record," said Hursey, Trinity, chairman of the tee. It shows that everybody But we know from past experience that we cannot afford to rest on our laurels in this matter of preventing forest fires.
