## GRASS ROOTS OPINION

The result has been a huge continuing growth in the number of business firms, and in the number of productive jobs. Our living standards have risen over the years to the point where they are the envy of the world. But—the trend in America toward socialistic reliance on Big Government will destroy the fundamentals of the individual enterprise system which has given us so much in the past."

## DREAMERS DO WIN

Confusion and chaos seem to abound everywhere in the world today, but in Detroit this month a ceremony occurred that proves once again that America is still a land where boys can dream, and make those dreams come true.

In its 24th year of helping boys make their dreams come true, the Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild has bestowed hundreds of awards to winners of its annual model car competition. The several hundred state awards range from a \$25.00 US Savings bond to \$150.00 in cash. The forty-one regional awards included free trips to Detroit for the Guild's annual four-day convention, and eight university scholarships, with a total value of \$20,000. The prizes, in all, represent a grand total of \$90,000.

Pleasant as it is for a boy to receive one of these awards, the most important gift of the competition to each boy participant is the assurance that he can, no matter what his background, walk with his chin in the air his eyes on the stars, certain that his heritage of freedom guarantees him the opportunity to gain almost any goal in life if he has the talent and isn't allergic to work.

Equally important is the expression by Fisher Body, in sponsoring the competition of industry's responsibility to the society in which it is rooted. For this is a program that does some honest spade-work in preparation for America's tomorrow. Such a program helps develop Americans that are capable of effective citizenship in a highly industrialized world.

## THERE HAD TO BE A REASON

Three fatal blasts within a week, all of them in fire-works plants, engaged at the time on Government munitions contracts, may be a matter of pure coincidence. The latest of the three mishaps, at Cranbrook, N. J. killed three and injured at least nine, while the previous explosions at Chestertown, Md. and in Chicago brought death to thirteen more and injured to more than fifty.

There would seem no good reason why these relatively small plants would exercise less caution in their operations than the very largest. Death is just as permanent in either situation. But it is understandable that a security régime might be more difficult to maintain in the smaller factories.

But whatever the causes of these disasters, whether they follow a pattern or are totally unrelated, victims will have died in vain, unless every munitions plant in American checks up on processes, careless or uninformed workers, and loopholes for sabotage.

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## Texas State Dept. of Health

Dr. Henry A. Holle, M. D.

There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse, chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Holle. On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps.

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fog.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose. Since milk contains more salt than water, drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost thru perspiration Dr. Holle says.

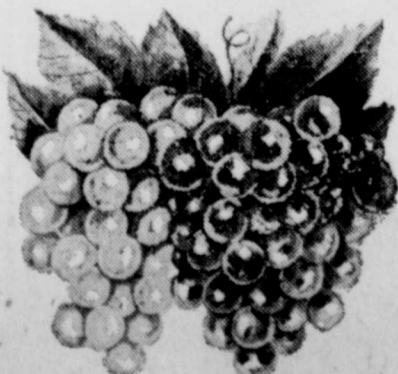

## Ralph Yarborough For Conservation

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough of Austin told a Central Texas farm and ranch audience this week that "action now" is needed to preserve Texas' "precious water and soil resources"— not "five more years of crippling limping delay."

Yarborough, speaking at Johnson City, only a few miles from the multiple dams of the Lower Colorado River Authority, said:

"One of the great governmental needs of Texas is a water conservation program of action now.

"Five years of delay in the midst of the worst drought in Texas history ought to be enough to convince everyone that action — not words — is needed."

The Austin attorney, a member of the original board of directors of the river authority, called for the construction of "50 great dams on the lower reaches of Texas' main rivers" for the two-way purpose of preventing flood destruction and conserving precious water.

He would supplement this basic program, he said, with the building of many smaller dams on the upper reaches of our rivers, and their tributary streams and ponds and tanks on our farms and ranches.

Yarborough added: "I think it tragic that Texas soil and water conservation has been crippled by the constant backbiting of the United States government by my opponent.

"I am opposed to burning the American flag to satisfy one demagogue. States' rights can be preserved in a co-operative harmonious local, state, federal conservation program."

gress will come. I wholeheartedly approve of the principle of full discussion of any proposed legislation. I have been disturbed by the fact that the extended debate on the Atomic Energy Bill, accompanied by day and night sessions of the Senate, delayed our taking up measures of great importance, such as farm legislation, social security, foreign aid, and others.

It is to be hoped that a final rush for adjournment will not result in these serious questions being given inadequate consideration.

**SMALLER DEFICIT:** The Federal government operated at a deficit during the 1954 fiscal year, which ended June 30, but the deficit was smaller than it has been during recent years. Expenditures outran receipts during the 12 months by \$3,029,000,000. The deficit for the preceding year amounted to \$9,900,000,000.

Actual expenditures were cut \$6,500,000,000 under the level of

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the 1953 fiscal year. Tax cuts approved during the present session of Congress are estimated to total approximately \$7,500,000,000.

**DEFENSE EXPENDITURES:** Proper economy in the conduct of the Government is greatly to be desired of course. But some observers feel that the Administration has cut too deeply into expenditures for defense.

Outlays for national security programs mounted to \$46,200,000,000 last year. That was a reduction of 170 and one half billion dollars.

According to a statement from the White House, this cut reflects greater economies in operations, re-examination of military plans, reduced stock levels less Atomic Energy Commission spending, and delay in the delivery of materials for stockpiling.

Only history can show whether the reduced military expenditures in this period of continuous world turmoil were justified. Certainly it is of the greatest importance that we remain strong. In the military and economic strength of the United States lies the only hope of maintaining freedom in the world.

**WE MUST BE READY:** A horriying example of the perils we face in these times was given by the action of the Chinese communists in firing on American aircraft engaged in searching for possible survivors of the Cathay Pacific Airliner shot down by the Communists.

We seem continually poised on the brink of disaster. When the first announcement

came of the attack on our aircraft, I made a brief statement in the Senate, pointing out that this is a time above all times for Americans to unite.

The Chinese communists are shooting at our men, I pointed out. There can be no partisanship or divided loyalties on such an issue.

We must await the facts to determine the next step. But meanwhile, we must also resolve to be cool, decisive and ready to act as Americans must always act in the face of danger.

I feel confident that those are the sentiments of the people of Texas.

**TEXAS DROUGHT:** Reports of drought conditions in many Texas counties continue to be disturbing. We were able to get the President to declare 23 counties as a drought disaster area, making them eligible for some assistance in the matter of feed for cattle.

But the program at present authorized is inadequate to meet the serious situation that exists. Texas' able Agriculture Commissioner, John C. White, is giving his best efforts to this whole matter. I certainly shall be of any assistance I can.

**PERSONAL:** I would be ungrateful indeed if I did not say how deeply I appreciate the confidence Texans showed in me on July 24. I want all of you to know that your faith in me will make me work harder than ever to give you, the people of Texas, the kind of representation you deserve to have in the United States Senate.

Lady Bird and I thank you. Thank you from the bottom of our hearts.

The Texas Safety Association is talking this month about a Signs of Life traffic safety program.

The title is a catchy one, but more than that, the program is important to the business of saving lives on our streets and highways. With last year's traffic death toll at 39,300 there is certain need for improvement on the part of every individual driver and pedestrian.

The Signs of Life program focuses attention on the importance of knowing and obeying traffic signs and signals. The main point of emphasis is placed on the five basic traffic sign shapes and their individual meaning.

The signs of Life program points up the need for a universal sense of individual responsibility in the fight for life on our highways.

A knowledge of traffic signs, signals and pavement markings will help save lives. The fact that the eight sided traffic sign always says "stop and nothing else is of more than academic interest. Any driver approaching such a sign can know immediately what its message will be long before he can see the wording.

The other basic traffic sign shapes include the oblong sign that state traffic laws and regulations; diamond-shaped warning signs that indicate the approach to a highway-rail intersection; and the crossback at the highway rail crossing.

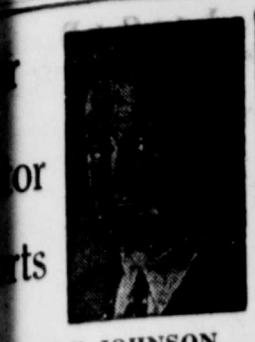

### Veterans Information Center

Q—To complete my Korean GI Bill training in dentistry, I am required to take an internship in my specialty. May I do this under the GI Bill?

A—Yes, provided the internship satisfies the educational requirements for certification by a Dental Specialty Board. The dental internship may not exceed one year.

Q—My GI insurance has lapsed and I have been told that I must take a physical examination in order to reinstate it. My brother is a doctor. Could he give me the examination?

A—No. Physical examinations for GI insurance purpose may not be made by physicians who are related to the veteran, either by blood or by marriage.

Q—I am the widow of a World War I veteran and I am drawing a monthly VA pension. I have a small part-time job. Recently, I was injured on the job and as a result, I am receiving workmen compensation pay. Do I have to include my workmen's compensation, in figuring my annual income for VA pension purposes?

A—Yes. Workmen's compensation payments are considered as income for VA pension purposes. However, you may deduct medical expenses that you have had to pay out because of your injury.

Q—I recently graduated from the U. S. Military Academy at West Point. Would my service there entitle me to Korean GI Bill training benefits.

A—No. Under the law, time spent at any of the service academies may not be counted toward Korean GI Bill entitlement.

### Nation's 4-H's Seek to Cut Death Toll of Farm Folk on Rural Highways



Look out, young feller!

CHICAGO—(Special)—"Make Safety Your Number One Crop," the slogan of several million rural boys and girls throughout the nation since its introduction in 1945, continues to be fostered by more than 615,000 4-H Club members. They are taking part in the 1954 National 4-H Safety Program being conducted in 46 states for the tenth consecutive year. Participants receive training in farm accident and fire prevention, which includes checking and removing hazards of every conceivable nature.

These surveys are credited by safety experts as being a valuable contribution to the nationwide campaign to reduce the tragic annual toll of 18,000 lives and 1,225,000 disabling injuries to farm folk.

In conducting their surveys, the 4-Hers are looking for such safety hazards as loose or floppy clothing worn about moving farm machinery, cluttered stairways, oily rags, frayed electric cords, broken ladder rungs and sharp tools.

What is becoming an increasingly serious problem is that accidents to farm people on motor vehicles now account for nearly one-fourth of all deaths and injuries that occur on highways. Also, 700 of the involved wheel tractors reported involve persons under 18 years of age. One case in a child under 5.

To help correct this, the 4-Hers are giving safety demonstrations to farm groups and over 100,000 displays in town and booths at county fairs.

The 1954 National 4-H Safety Program is conducted by the National 4-H Club in Chicago to the day. Eight of the latter will be selected as national winners receiving a \$500 scholarship.

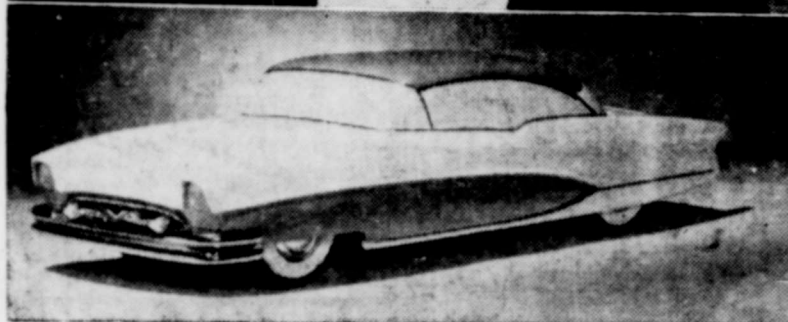
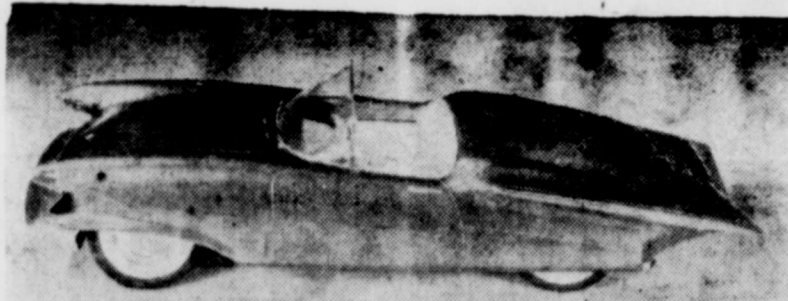

### Demagogues

It was Senator McCarthy who dug out the Institute of Public Relations material which has been a treasure trove in the quest for subversives. He was elected to the Senate from Wisconsin and by no skippy majority. This is the instance of a citizen duly elected by his fellow citizens to the highest legislative body in this nation. This week the House acted on the Tax Bill, Military Housing Bill, Atomic Energy Bill and Mutual Security, which leaves only two major pieces of legislation, the Agriculture Bill and Social Security, to be finally acted on before adjournment.
