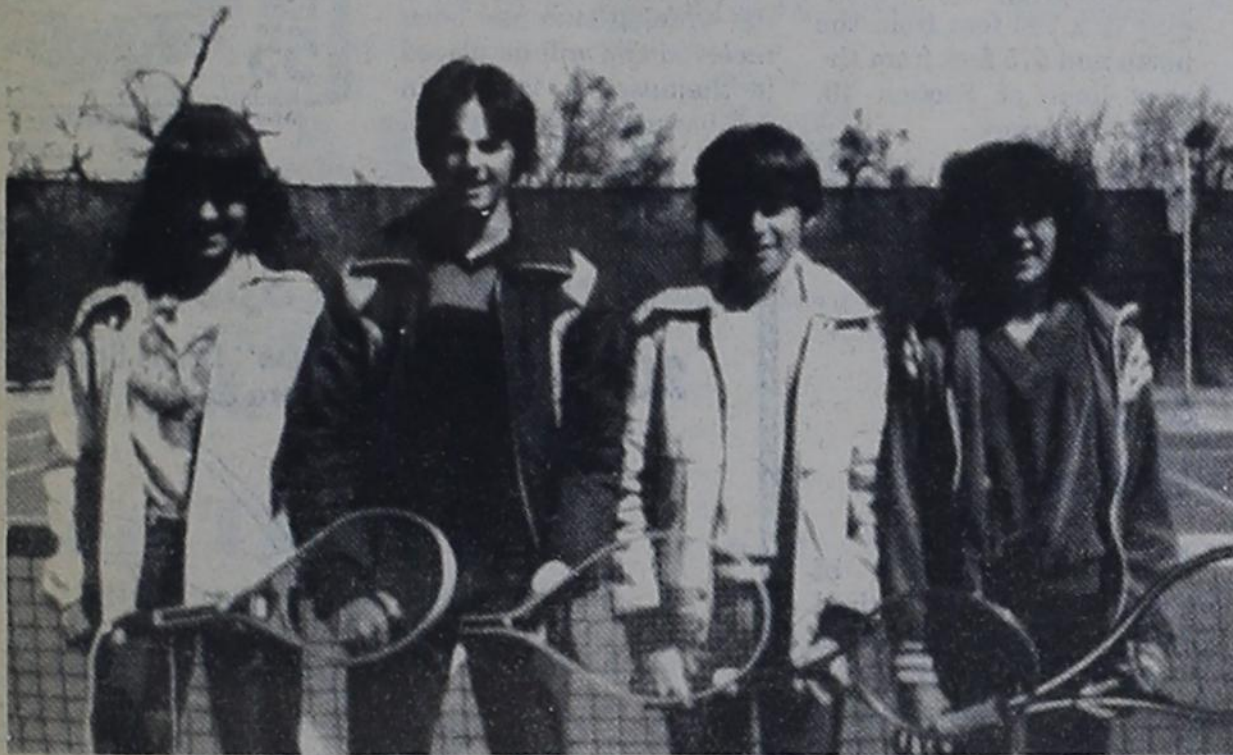

The goal is \$1,000.00. Colonel A.E. Dyer Jr. is serving as chairman of major gifts for the campaign.

Hart, an active scout leader points out that the local scout units depend on the council for such things as: 1. organizing and rechartering units; 2. training of leaders; 3. a camp used by boy scouts and cub scouts call Camp Tonkawa; 4. council activities such as camporees,

pushmobile, cub day camp, summer camp, etc.; 5. the council service center where advancement records, promotional material, etc. are handled.; 6. full time professional staff who give year round help and service to local scout leaders.

The council budget for 1980, is \$156,758.00. By comparison, some other community goals are, Abilene, \$113,000.-00; Coleman, \$4,000.00; Tuscola, \$1,800.-00; Clyde, \$2,000.00; Winters, \$2,000.00; and Cross Plains, \$1,000.00.

Money raised in excess of the goal will be used in improvements to Camp Tonkawa which are not included in the operating budget.

New latrines and septic tank systems are being constructed at Camp Tonkawa.

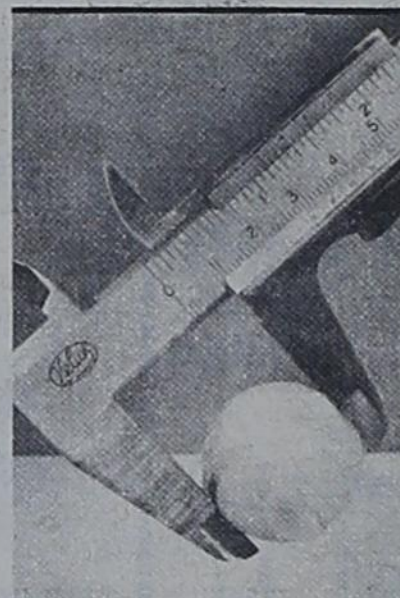
Elliott Honored With Luncheon

A wildcat producing from the Duffer, has been completed three miles south-east of Putnam in Callahan County.

It is Brazos Resources Inc. of College Station No. 1 J.R. Shirley.

Location is 853 feet from the south and 2,173 feet from the east lines of Section 8, BOH Survey.

Absolute open flow was 1,700,000 cubic feet of gas daily with a gas-liquid, hydrocarbon ratio of 117,-636-1.

Production is from perforations at 3,786 to 3,836 feet, treated with 2,000 gallons of acid. The pay was fractured with 40,000 gallons of fluid and 60,000 pounds of sand.

Operator set the 4½-inch casing at 4,052 feet, three feet off bottom.

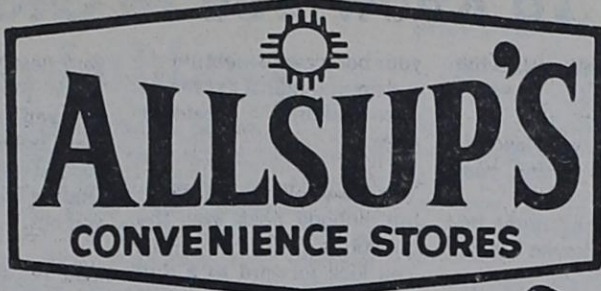

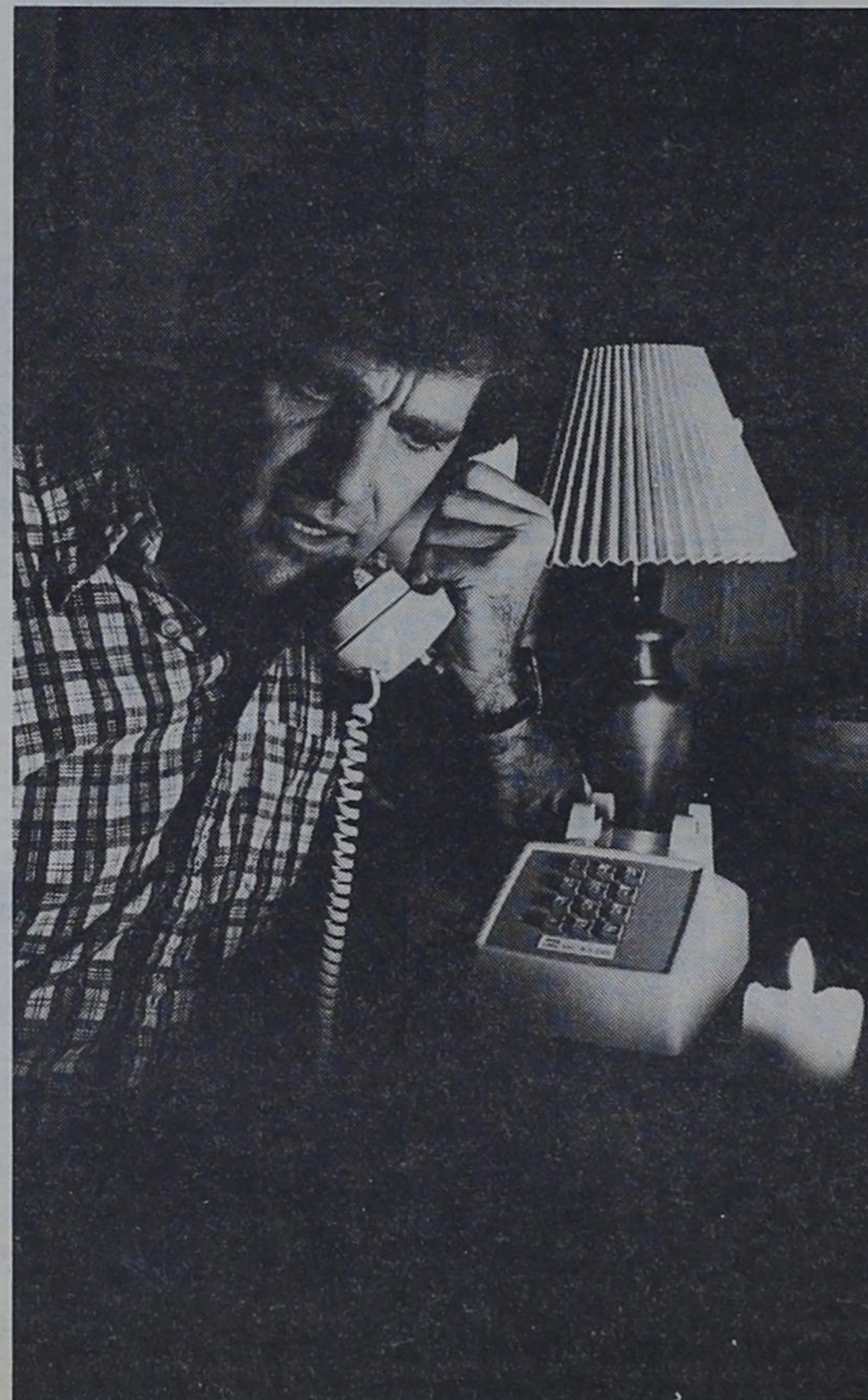

Clyde's rates are for a standard residential with nothing special. These figures tell a different story from what you are being told about Baird.

During my 31 years living in this area I have seen the above described tactics employed time and time

again, but, this time it won't work. With the passage of time and through natural attrition the rands of the "Light Plant Clique" have deteriorated. Another BIG loss in those ranks has been in the people who have said (and I quote) "I voted to keep the Light Plant but they lied to me. If I could vote on it now I would sure vote for the sale of the Plant!" It is quite obvious this sentiment has been detected and for that reason the two petitions presented to the City were ignored. They could foresee the outcome so they sat on the petitions. My guess is that if that referendum were held today the vote would be about 80% for the sale and 20% against.

Another sad situation is the fact that in the last two years all the City's activity has been devoted to the electrical system with neglect to streets, water & sewer, etc....More deterioration.

Before I close I would like to ask a question...Why is a TV reporter asking questions about the City's financial operation and particularly, it's purchasing policies? If illegal purchases occurred and all the implications therewith, will the money be refunded to the City for the full amount of those illegal purchases?

science through the Community College of the Air Force.

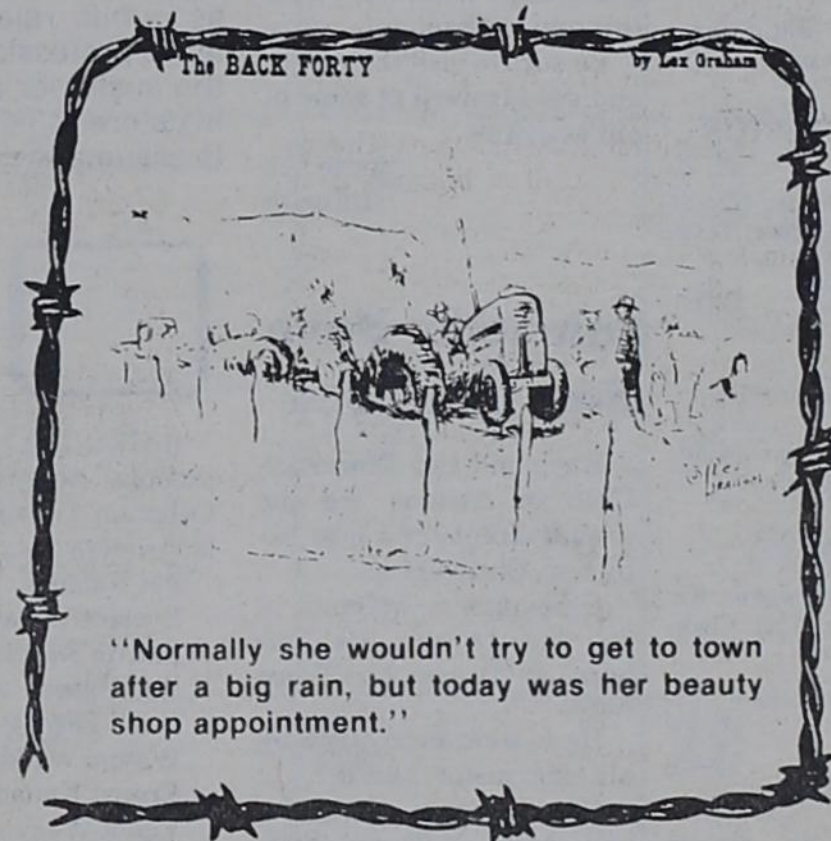
Airman Hinojosa, learned how to inspect and repair the intricate aircraft fuel systems. He is being assigned to Dyess Air Force Base, Texas.

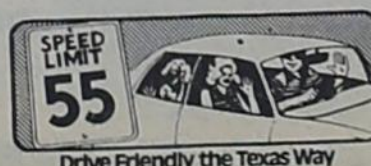

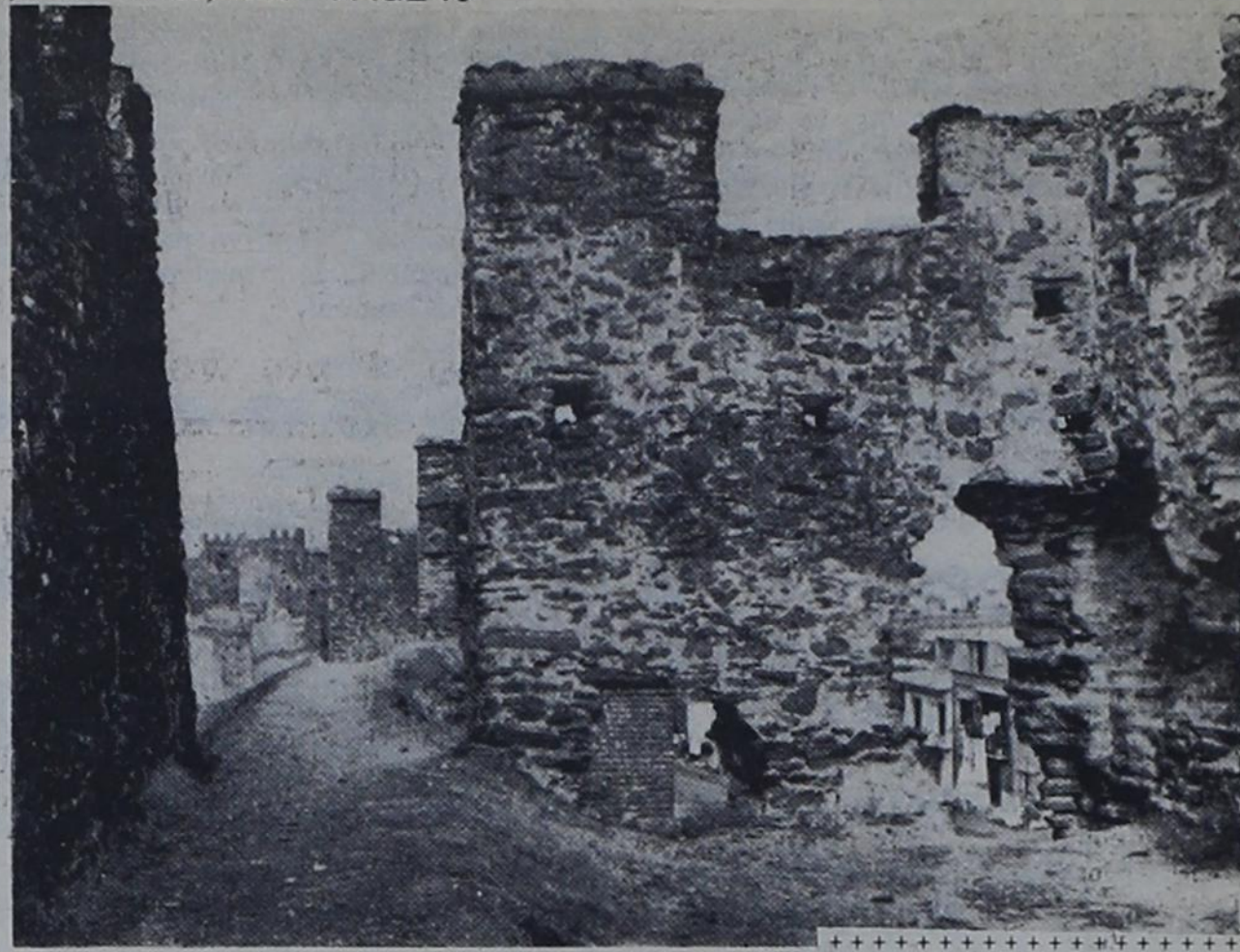
