## Death Claims W. A. Roberts

W. A. Roberts, 65, a long time civic and business leader of Burk Burnett, died about 11 a. m. Saturday in an Austin hospital. Roberts, who had lived in Burk Burnett since 1907, was taken to the Austin hospital about three weeks ago. He was a former city manager of Burk Burnett and organized the volunteer fire department here in 1927. He had been a member of that organization 25 years. Roberts had served many years as a director in the chamber of commerce and was active in a number of civic affairs. He was born Oct. 23, 1888, in West Plains, Mo. Funeral services were held here at 2:30 p. m. Monday at the First Methodist church under the direction of Owens & Brumley Funeral Home of Burk Burnett. Conducting the services was Rev. F. M. Crutchfield, former pastor of the church. He is now pastor of the McFarland Methodist church in Norman, Okla., assisted by Rev. T. M. Jensen, pastor of the Burk Burnett church. Rev. Crutchfield's grandfather was the circuit rider for the Methodist Church when Burk Burnett was settled and the first church, a Methodist church, was founded at the corner of Ave. C and 5th Street. As a young man, Mr. Roberts heard the Rev. Crutchfield preach many times. Mr. Roberts' parents, J. L. and Mrs. Roberts, were the founders of the First Methodist church in Burk Burnett, with Mr. L. Roberts serving as the first pastor. Mr. Roberts' father, J. L. Roberts, was the first pastor in the new church. That church was the one in which the present church bell was installed. ## Lone Star Gas Co. Wins Safety Award

The National Safety Council announced today that Lone Star Gas Company has been presented the Council's Award of Honor for its excellent safety record.

The award is presented only where an establishment's record satisfies rigid requirements laid down in the Council's Award Plan for Recognizing Good Industrial Records.

Ned H. Dearborn, president of the National Safety Council, in a letter of congratulations to D. A. Hulcy, president of Lone Star Gas Company, explained that Lone Star qualified for the award because of its low injury rate in 1953.

The company's injury frequency rate was 46 per cent better than its "par" rate, and its injury severity rate was 80 per cent better. "Par" rates are computed by the National Safety Council from the company's experience in other years and from the rates of the industry's classification to which the company belongs.

Hulcy, in a letter to Lone Star employees, said: "Ours is one of only six gas utility companies to receive the award. To point up the significance of the presentation, there are 424 gas utility companies operating in the United States. All were eligible to receive this award.

"I extend my heartfelt congratulations to all of you for this outstanding achievement in the field of safety," Hulcy concluded.

## Holiday Game Scores

After winning the opening game 41 to 19 against Bowie, the Bulldogs dropped the second game to Holliday, 20 to 7.

It was hard to realize that the same team which faced Bowie could be humbled by the small school of Holliday. The game last Friday night was featured by the lack of blocking on the part of the Burk Burnett boys, and the total lack of the old spirit which makes any team click. Only once or twice did the team break out of the huddle on offense when they appeared they might go some place. And, on those rare occasions, nice gains were made.

No credit should be taken from the Holliday team. They had a fine team and seemed to have complete charge of the situation all through the game. One of their linemen, Wortham, No. 20, was in Burk's backfield on practically every play and smeared many plays which might have otherwise gone for good yardage.

Score by Quarters

Holliday scored first, in the first quarter. Left Half Ray Swift plunged over from the 3 yard line. Fullback Jerry Evans kicked the extra point to put them out in front 7 to 0. Holliday began their scoring march on Burk's 42 yard line, where they had taken an out-of-bounds punt.

In the second quarter Burk Burnett covered 84 yards to score with Quarterback Gerry McCabe making the final one yard. Louis McDonald made good his kick for extra point try, putting the Bulldogs on even ground with a 7-7 tie.

The second Holliday score was in the third period of play. Jack Erwin ran around left end with plenty of blockers to protect him for 68 yards and a TD. Erwin missed the kick for extra point.

The final blow came in the 4th quarter when Durwood Stone for the Eagles intercepted a Burk Burnett pass and went all the way to the one yard line before he was overhauled. Jerry Evans found a hole and dived through for the touchdown. Jack Erwin found the uprights and made good the extra point.

## THERE'S NO OTHER WAY

In a speech before the National Security Industrial Association, General Matthew B. Ridgway, Army Chief of Staff warned that warfare with atomic weapons will require more troops, not less.

His remark may be considered as underscoring President Eisenhower's announcement in his recent address to the American Legion convention that we do not have a "strong, ready military reserve in which we have believed, or professed to believe for 150 years", and that we must now build and maintain such a force.

"Wishful thinking and political timidity," the President told the Legionnaires, "must no longer bar a program so absolutely essential to our defense. Establishment of an adequate reserve, will be a number one item submitted to the Congress next year."

While our public figures shun the ugly words "Universal Military Training," this is never the less what we shall be facing up to. The draft, as we have known it, will no longer provide for our security needs, and at the same time leave adequate man-power for our economy. Nor is the draft, with all its regulations, interpretations, discretionary powers and loopholes as fair as a system that recognizes the responsibility of every able-bodied to undergo training, and to remain for a reasonable time in a reserve unit, fit, ready and available to defend his country, yet free for the greater part of his time to work at his job and live his own life.

But when Congress tackles the new rules next year, we hope the gentlemen will bear in mind President Eisenhower's promise to the Legionnaires that: "This reserve will not unfairly burden men who have already served."

## 42,000 COMPETITORS

Charges that the oil industry is pretty much of a monopoly are made at almost regular intervals by some group or other. It's probably true that a good many people, who haven't had an opportunity to see the facts, believe that, at the least, oil is dominated by a relatively small number of concerns.

The truth is that there are more than 42,000 businesses engaged in the production, refining, transportation, and wholesale distribution of petroleum and its products. On the retail end, the businesses involved are virtually innumerable.

It is true that some oil companies are very big. They have to be, in the light of the enormous costs involved in many of today's oil operations — for example, each exploratory well represents an outgo of something like \$100,000. But there is plenty of room for smaller concerns and there is plenty of opportunity for them to grow, as the industry's past and present history abundantly attests. And competition is intense all along the line.

Per capita consumption of oil products in this country is about 20 times that of the rest of the free world. We account for 62 percent of the free world's total consumption. The price we pay for gasoline and the other products is generally far less than in other nations. Only a free competitive system results in abundance coupled with moderate price.

## TOPPERS

The tall stores of the week are both from New York. The new and irrepressible board chairman of the New York Central, Robert R. Young, announced the railroad was planning to build the world's tallest and largest office building on the site of the present Grand Central Terminal and Thomas E. Dewey, 52, three times Governor of New York and twice a candidate for the presidency, announced that "the time has come for me to return to private life."

Mr. Young may build his skyscraper. And Mr. Dewey may swear off the governor habit this fall. Since he handed his mantle to Senator Irving M. Ives (who can run for Governor and return to the Senate if he loses) we accept Mr. Dewey's statement that "I shall not under any circumstances be a candidate for any public office this fall."

But "private life"? The cows and chickens? After all, there are public offices in Washington for which you don't have to be a candidate.

## Hairy Vetch Winter Legume

Hairy vetch is a valuable winter legume which is being planted every year, according to B. T. Haws, county agent. It is well adapted to the sandy soils which are found in some parts of the county. Its five main functions are soil protection, soil improvement, grazing, seed production and hay.

more satisfactory grazing than vetch alone.

A firm, smooth seedbed is important. The seeding of a mixture of 10 pounds of hairy vetch and 20 pounds of rye has proved satisfactory. When other winter grains are used with vetch the following rates are suggested: oats or wheat, 20 to 40 pounds per acre; barley, 45 to 50 pounds per acre. These last three named grain crops may be seeded with hairy vetch, but they are not as desirable for a supporting crop for vetch seed production as rye. If vetch is to be used only for grazing, these grain crops are satisfactory in the combination. In such cases a somewhat heavier rate of seeding of both vetch and winter grain may be made than when a seed crop is desired.

It is recommended practice to use 200 pounds of 0-20-0 per acre. Apply commercial fertilizer according to recommendation from soil test. Inoculation of seed with the proper inoculant is very important. This may be purchased locally from your seed and feed dealer.

## Texas Safety Association

Lot owners or prospective purchasers who plan to build homes should make certain that adequate sewerage facilities can be installed, declared Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer. Many land buyers are not aware of the fact that public sewerage facilities are not available or would have to be installed at high cost to the owners.

Even if public sewerage facilities are available, there are many cases where a sewer from a private home cannot readily be connected to such lines. Where public facilities are not available, or not accessible owners are required to dispose of sewerage by private methods.

Mr. V. M. Ehlers, Chief of the Bureau of Sanitary Engineering suggests that those thinking of buying a lot contact their local health department to make certain both sewerage and water can be provided on the particular lot. This would avoid a great many difficulties on the part of the buyer who fails to consider the matter until the lot has been purchased or the home built.

The size of the lot or its location frequently has little bearing on whether adequate systems can be built. In some cases where private systems are the only means of disposing of sewerage, the soil is of a non-absorbent nature and eventually the waste materials will come to the surface or even to the house and create a public health menace.

The Texas Dept. of Health has regulations regarding private water sewerage facilities. In conforming to these regulations the public will be protected from water-borne diseases caused by improper facilities.

## VETERANS Administration Questions and Answers

Q—I was seriously disabled in a train wreck while traveling under orders, to an induction center. Even though I never entered military service, would I still be entitled to VA compensation payments for my disability?

A—Yes. Under a recent law, your disability is considered to have occurred in active military service, provided it was not the result of your own misconduct.

Q—Since I am rated as 60 percent disabled, I am receiving extra compensation pay because I have a family. I understand that my basic compensation check will go up five percent as of Oct. 1. Will the extra pay for my family also increase on that date?

A—No. The law did not provide for a five percent increase in the extra payments made to veterans for dependents. Only your basic compensation will be increased.

Q—I expect to get out of service within the next few weeks. What is my deadline for starting Korean GI Bill training?

A—Your deadline for starting Korean GI training will be three years from the date of your separation from the armed forces.

Q—Is it necessary to apply for the five percent increase in compensation payments, recently voted by Congress?

A—No. The five percent increase will be made automatically. It will be included in checks mailed at the end of October. It goes in effect Oct. 1.

## Austrian Peas And Alfalfa Two Of Best Legumes

Austrian winter peas and alfalfa are two major legumes in Wichita County. Many farmers have their seed bed prepared for the planting of these legumes. Some are planting and waiting for that rain that we are supposed to get soon. There will probably be more of these two legumes grown in the county than any other, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

The best time to plant Austrian winter peas is September 15 to November 15. The planting rate is 30 to 40 pounds per acre drilled alone, 20 to 25 pounds per acre drilled with small grain 15 pounds per acre put in 3 foot rows. The seed should be covered to a depth of 2 to 3 inches. Inoculate all seed before planting. Apply commercial fertilizer according to recommendation from soil analysis.

The best planting date for alfalfa is September 1 to November 15. The planting rate is 15 to 20 pounds of seed per acre, drilled in. Apply commercial fertilizer according to recommendation from soil analysis. Be sure to inoculate your seed.

## Turnip Greens Planting Time Says County Agent

It is time to start spading if you plan to grow any turnip greens to go with your cornbread this fall. Many cool weather vegetables can be planted now and will give plenty of good eating before frost, says B. T. Haws, county agent. However, some kind of irrigation must be available to start any kind of garden. These vegetables which can be planted now are turnips, mustard, radishes, lettuce, spinach and beets.

Usually germination is not as good in the fall as in the spring, so more seed per row foot need to be planted. The success of any garden, spring or fall, depends a great deal upon the preparation of the seed bed. A firm seed bed is necessary. Cover seed lightly. The best fertilizer to use is manure, and if this is used, an application of phosphate should be used with it. If no manure is used, 16-20-9 is recommended.

The autumn nights bring a cradle of darkness that is masterly and serene. The winds are expected to be keen and sharp, whether they are west winds presaging snow or cold and icy rains, or whether they are northwest winds that herald the bright clear days after a winter storm.

Nowadays, when life is easier and houses warmer, we are less in awe of winter and more quickly recognize its individual charm. Knowing that we can retire behind solid walls when the cold

becomes unbearable, we see that the flaring sunsets of December can hardly be surpassed and linger to enjoy them in a way in which our forefathers would have thought foolhardy. Similarly, what can outdo in beauty a sheet of water whose cold sheeting of ice has been turned to lime green by the sun of a December afternoon, on the black outline of leafless limbs against a gray horizon.

What event of spring or summer, or fall has the power to excite a child like the first fall of snow upon which he gazes with enraptured eyes. Or to gaze at night in the limitless valor of the sky where the universe of stars sparkled and shone.
