

The City Commissioners and the City Manager are grateful to Burkburnett citizens for their cooperation during the period of water rationing. By strict observance of the rules no one was out of water at any time, and everybody had enough water to do limited irrigating in their yards.

## OIL DOWN ON THE FARM

American farmers work only six percent of the world's tillable land. Yet they produce 45 percent of the world's meat, 65 percent of its corn, and similarly high proportions of other basic foods.

So outstanding a record is the result of various factors. one is the progress made in scientific land conservation and utilization. Another is the superbly efficient and economical machinery produced by the farm equipment industry. And another is something that every American uses every day in one form or another - OIL.

The farmer is the world's largest user of trucks and tractors. He commands more mechanical horsepower than is used in all the rest of industry - but he'd have none at all if it weren't for gasoline and lubricants. To put the situation another way, a geneartion ago each farm worker had about 2.2 horsepower at his command. Now he has some 5 horsepower -and oil is the fodder that makes those particular horses go.

And power doesn't tell the whole story of oil's work EFFEN HE'S CONNA FIGHT TH' RAIL ROAD in agriculture. Loss and damage from weeds, insects and HE SHOULD GIT INSURED WITH plant diseases is very heavy on the farm, running into the billions annually. This waste has been materially reduced in late years through the use of sprays and dusts which are derived from oil, and are called petrochemicals. Agriculturally derived fertilizers are other important

Next October, Oil Progress Week will be observed. The achievements the week is to commemorate have beneficially touched us all-and some of the greatest of them have been in agricultural fields.

## PROGRESS AGAINST HANDICAPS

People in the United States enjoy the greatest retail service in the world. It is easy to see why after reading examples or regulations under which Western European retailers live, and described by David Carson of the School of Retailing, University of Pittsburg.

In the Netherlands a store keeper has to get approval of local Chambers of Commerce before opening a store. In Norway he must notify the police if he plans to advertise o a clearance sale, other than the two seasonal clearances permitted by law. In West Germany scores are permitted to give away only souvenirs that bear promotional messages, and they are prohibited by law from advertising the event.

In Switzerland, in 1933 to 1945, that country prohibited establishment of new department and variety stores. A discriminatory tax against large stores has been in effect since 1940, varying on gross receipts from 3-4 of 1 percent on cooperatives and specialty stores to 2 1-2 percent for department and 4 percent for variety stores.

In spite of it all, however, Mr. Carson says new developments are taking place because "of the increasingly closer integration of the people of the free world." But there can be little question that the government regulations and controls are slowing progress.

The United States has seen political agitation against chain stores under the guise of helping independents. Fortunately, both for consumers and independents, such legislation was killed and retailing forged ahead in all its branches, as in no other nation.







## \$5,000,000 Lost By Farm Fires

Texas farmers could add as much as \$5,000,000 to their annual gross income by reducing fire losses, an Austin insurance executive says

Norris W. Parker, manager of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, a trade association which compiles statistics on fire losses, said that fires in 1953 destroyed at least \$5,000,000 worth of farm buildings and crops. The figures for 1954 may be even higher unles ssomething is done to reduce farm fires.

Nationally, the picture is even worse. Fires across the nation last year cost farmers \$100,000, Three safeguards are suggest-

ed by Mr. Parker to help reduce farm fires: 1. Use care and forethought

in the construction, maintenance and use of all farm property with view to eliminating all needless fire danger; 2. Equip farm homes and out-

guishing equipment to enable ndividuals to extinguish fire before they reach the serious stage; and

3. Organize farm community fire fighting brigades equipped with more effective equipment than an individual farmer can afford to fight larger fires.

Farmers throughout the state are being urged to check their fire defenses as a part of the national observance of Fire Pre vention Week. October 3-9.

Benson said today. Loans made and insured by the agency totaled \$292,452,800, an increase of about 28 percent over the \$228,701,000 advanced in fiscal 1953, the year ending June 30, 1953. The 1953 total had been the largest amount loaned in any one year by the Farmers

Approximately 131,000 farm agency during fiscal 1953 compared to about 108,000 in fiscal 1953. Including farmers who already had loans, some 243,000 worked their farms during 1954

with FHA credit. About two-thirds of the money advanced during 1954 was used by small framers to improve their farms and farming operations. About one-third of the funds loaned were used by cattlemen and other farmers who continue their operations. No loans of any type were made to be met by banks or other lend-

vances were made to veterans and other young farm families who are establishing better farm set ups. and whose greatest needs were for adequate credit and some in developing sound systems of farming and adopting efficient farm management prac







