Judge Fillmore Pledges Support of Burk Hi-way Issue

The proposed road bond issue to be voted on Nov. 2nd, has been discussed many times in Burk Burnett during the past few weeks. The \$2,700,000 would be used for purchasing right-of-way in Wichita County. Of this amount, \$156,000 would be allocated to Burk Burnett Precinct No. 2.

If the bond issue carries, and the right-of-way bought, the State Highway Dept. would put in some \$50 million worth of roads in Wichita County.

A proposed toll road in Oklahoma, would stop at Randall. This road would dump an estimated 5,000 additional cars into Texas upon completion of the road. That would necessitate a four lane highway from Red River bridge South to Wichita Falls.

Burkburnett citizens want the widened road to follow exactly along highway 277 and 281, along the East edge of Burk Burnett. Judge H. W. Fillmore, president of the Wichita Falls Chamber of Commerce, in a meeting with Burk C. of C. officials here Monday night, pledged his support in prevailing upon the Highway Commission to allow the widened highway to follow the present right-of-way.

Burk Bows to Seymour 41 to 16

Burkburnett was humbled on the local gridiron last Friday night when the Seymour Panthers plastered them 41 to 16. The Bulldogs couldn't get their ground game rolling and their air attack was very ineffective. The Panthers scored almost at will the first three quarters, then sent in their 2nd and 3rd stringers for experience.

The Panthers scored early in the first quarter with a sixty-five yard touchdown march. The scoring play was for 27 yards, with Halfback Collie Milligan skirting his left end. Fullback Junior Beall went around right end for the extra point.

In the second quarter Milligan went 73 yards around left end with plenty of blockers clearing the way for another touchdown. Beall's kick was no good.

Still in the 2nd quarter, Halfback Charles Studer tried right end for 46 yards and a TD. This time Beall's kick was good. This march was for 70 yards.

Quarterback Bobby King added another six points in the 2nd quarter. His left end run was for 41 yards, with Beall kicking the extra point, 27-0.

Seymour scored twice more in the 3rd quarter. Beall galloped 78 yards across the goal line and Bobby King intercepted a Burk pass and ran 46 yards to Burk. Beall added both extra points.

Backed up on their goal line in the fourth quarter, Seymour had a bad pass from center which went over the goal line. Burk boys swarmed on the ball carrier for a 2 point safety. Later on a pitchout pass, Jerry Hodges passed 35 yards to Dale Boren for a touchdown to put the Bulldogs 9 to 41 following Lewis McDonald's successful extra point kick.

Burk used the same play to score once more: Gerry McCabe to Jerry Hodges, to Dale Boren. This scoring play was good for 45 yards. McDonald added the extra point, 41-16.

Peiping is having quite a social season. Following the festal visit of Britain's Clement Atlee, Chou En-lia, Red China's "prime minister" has just entertained his Indian opposite number, Jawaharlal Nehru at a lavish dinner. Mr. Atlee wanted trade at any price. Mr. Nehru wants "co-existence", presumably at the usual price.

In his plea for peace, Nehru admitted that China and India had their differences, but added: "We don't wish to impose our way of life on any one accustomed to a different way."

And this is certainly a sentiment to which every American would agree. But if it's still news to the Indian Prime Minister, the Reds not only wish to run things their way, but are determined to do so, in this country and in every country on the globe. It has also been noted by other students of our times that they are doing alright.

What Mr. Nehru is heading for is just plain, bare existence. There ain't going to be no "co".

INSEPARABLE

When the boys and girls go away to college, they remain interested in the personal items about their home town that only the local newspaper can provide. As a matter of fact, this is true with all of us when we are away from home.

As the Santa Paula, Calif., News expressed it, "News is a precious commodity and nothing quite satisfies the public appetite for it like daily and weekly newspapers."

The local paper chronicles the society news and club activities; publishes births and deaths; heralds the changes in the weather; records court proceedings and real estate transactions; keeps businessmen informed on economic issues and crop conditions; provides recipes and household tips; gives the latest women's fashions and styles; covers the doings in sports; and provides a handy display of the local shopping scene which can save the consumer many steps, a review of home town activity unobtainable elsewhere.

Last but not least the country editor is constantly on guard to preserve the freedom of the press, thereby helping to preserve our political and religious privileges.

The theme for National Newspaper Week this year was: "Freedom of the Press — What It Means to the Man on the Street." Without freedom of the press there would be no free men or free industry — one cannot exist without the other.

SAVING THE LAND

People who fly over the United States can learn a lot about good and bad farming. That is the theme of a brief article by Elmer T. Peterson which appears on the editorial page of the Saturday Evening Post of September 18.

Looking down you can see two very different landscape features. One looks like a tree with many branches. In rainy seasons these features become watercourses which create gullies, carry away good soil, and increase flood hazards. They are the results of excessive pasturing and other destructive farming practices.

The other feature, Mr. Peterson writes, "is made up of a series of strips which are almost invariably curved producing a crazy-quilt pattern of billowy lines and wavy panels. This—is farming on the contour," and the pattern usually is made of terraces, strips of contrasting vegetation and other devices. It is the soil conservationist's system for stopping water where it falls, so that it doesn't start gullies and produce floods."

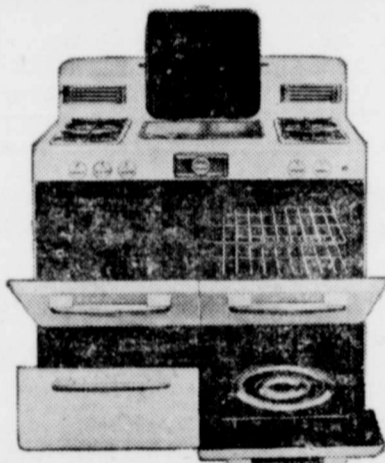

Eleven Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted On November 2nd

Widespread interest is gradually being developed in the 11 proposed amendments to be voted on at the general election, November 2.

No organized opposition has appeared against any of the proposals. However, campaigns are being pushed for several of them. Reports from over the state indicate somewhat of a draw between active support of various amendments and a general tendency to vote against some or all of them because the proposals are not understood or because of some question as to the rewriting of writing such changes in the Constitution.

Amendments are discussed in the order in which they will appear on the ballot.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 1 authorizes the Legislature to increase State spending for Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Dependent Children, by \$7,000,000 a year. Comments from some members of the Legislature and other people familiar with the program indicate that if the Legislature appropriates the additional money, new taxes will be required. Some say that most of the money would be used to add people to the rolls, rather than providing more money to those now on the rolls.

This amendment also would require the Legislature to enact laws making names of those who receive such aid available to the public. These are fighting words to some people who claim such action would embarrass those now on the rolls and their relatives.

Proponents of this provision argue no one should be embarrassed except those who have children or relatives well able to support them, and that these people ought to be exposed.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 6, permits a person who has served some time as a teacher and accumulated credits under the Teacher's Retirement System, and also some time as a State employee, with credits under the State Employees' Retirement System to count his accumulated credits under both systems in determining his retirement pay. Apparently but few people would be affected. However some opposition is being expressed by members of both retirement systems to the idea of intermingling the two systems in any way.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 37, provides that proprietary employees of the States' subdivisions may be covered by Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance.

Other municipal and county

employees may now be covered under that system under an agreement between the State and the Federal Government, and in many cases have been.

But the Attorney General has ruled that the State has no authority to make an agreement covering proprietary employees without a constitutional amendment.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 10, would create a State Building Commission with broad authority, subject to Legislature direction, to erect buildings for State purposes.

A State Building Fund would be created by transferring to it the surplus from the Confederate Pension Fund.

The present 2c ad valorem tax provided by the Constitution, for Confederate pensions, returns far more than is necessary to take care of the one Confederate veteran and more than four hundred widows of veterans now receiving such pensions from the State. Therefore the fund is accumulating a surplus of well over \$600,000 each year. It is anticipated that if the amendment is adopted, nearly \$6,000,000 will be available for transfer to the new State Building Fund in January of 1955.

This amendment has the support of the State Bar of Texas. The first building, if the proposal is adopted, must be a State Supreme Court Building and it must be dedicated as a memorial to Texans who served in the armed forces of the Confederate States.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 5 would increase compensation of members of the Legislature to \$25 per day for the first 120 days of any session.

Texas Constitution now provides \$10 per day for the first 120 days and \$5 per day thereafter.

There is strong support and little or no opposition to this increase in pay which most people think would about cover legislators living expenses while in Austin.

Included in the same amendment is authority for the Legislature to set salaries of the Governor, Attorney General, State Treasurer, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Secretary of State, and Commissioner of the General Land Office.

The Governor's salary is now set by the Constitution at \$12,000, the Attorney General's at \$10,000, and the other four officials involved are paid \$6,000 a year.

Under this amendment the Legislature could not reduce salaries below these amounts, but could set them at higher rates.

Opinion does not appear to be so nearly unanimous about this part of the proposed amendment. Some people are troubled by the apparent power of the Legislature to change the salaries at will, and they point out that the Federal Constitution and many other state constitutions prohibit a change in salary during the term to which an official has been elected.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

No. 14, prohibits use of the credit of the State or any grant of public money for construction, maintenance or operation of toll roads and turnpikes.

Purpose of this amendment is to write into the Constitution a prohibition now contained in the law, but which could be changed by future legislation.

It has the support of the Texas Good Roads Association and many other people particularly interested in the State Highway System, and no known opposition.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 16, would require women to serve on juries.

There are only five states including Texas which do not permit jury service by women.

This amendment would require women to serve under the same rules for jury service as apply to men. It has the active support of many women's organizations.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4 has to do with the terms of elective district, county and precinct offices. It would change all those which have two year terms into four year terms.

It has the support of the county Judges and Commissioners Associations of the state, and the organizations of many other county officials.

The terms of a great number of district, county and precinct offices would be changed immediately if this amendment were adopted. Other such offices are designated to change to four year terms in 1956 so that, while all of them would be four-year

terms after 1956, only about half of them would appear on the ballot every two years.

Wording of this proposal has resulted in confusion as to its effect on the terms of representatives in the Legislature. Many lawyers are of the opinion that the proposal would require four year terms for members of the House and other lawyers have said that at least it presents a problem which can only be solved by court interpretation.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 2 would authorize creation of county wide hospital districts in Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Galveston, Harris, Jefferson and Tarrant Counties.

The amendment is permissive and, if adopted, would not create any such districts itself. It simply provides that the property-owning taxpayers of the named counties can vote on such a proposal at a later date.

An active campaign for this proposal is being carried on by

a statewide committee composed of mayors, county judges, members of hospital boards, and prominent citizens of the counties involved and some other parts of the state.

Members of the armed forces of the United States or component branches would be allowed to vote under HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 10.

They would be required to pay their poll taxes and could vote only in the county in which they resided at the time of entering the service.

The last proposal on the ballot will be **HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 8**, which is a permissive type of amendment allowing taxpayers in counties of less than ten thousand inhabitants to vote on the question of whether they would prefer to have a separate fulltime office of tax assessor-collector.

Duties of the tax assessor collector are now performed by the Sheriff in these counties.

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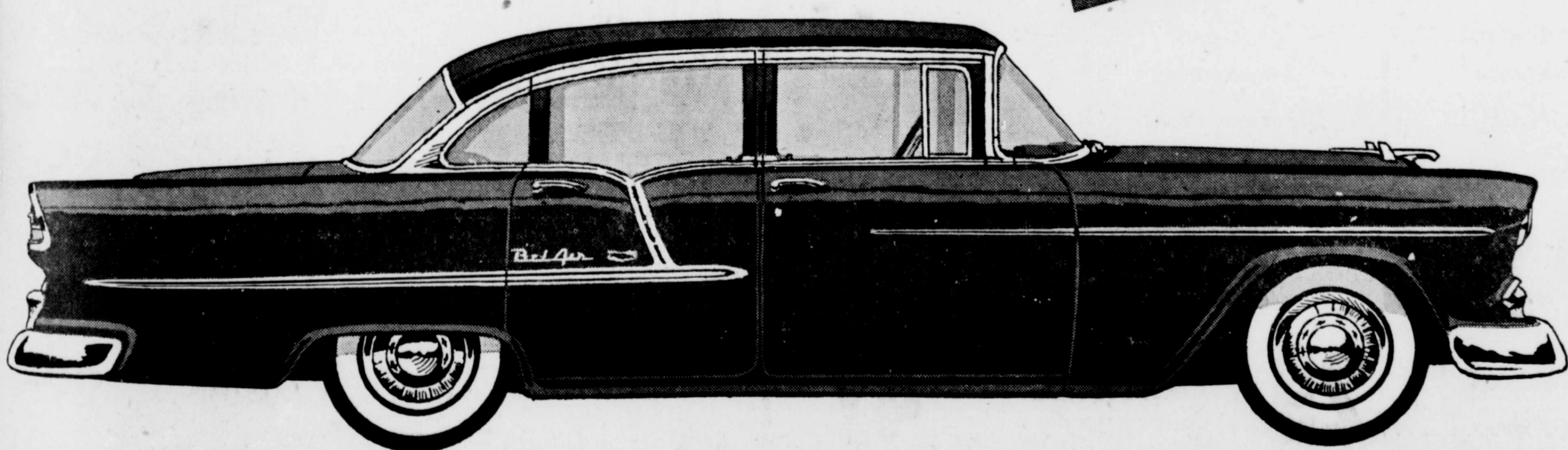

A Boy Of 16

In answer to "Army Captain", who cited reasons in favor of punishment for prisoners of war who collaborate with the Communists, I say that all is not as black and white as he would have us believe.

For example, along the highways of our nation, we often encounter bridges of light construction whose signs warn truckers and motorists not to exceed the weight to be borne in safety. The same is true of minds of men, in that some are not as sturdily constructed as others, and are apt to collapse under too great stress.

Especially is this true of any 16-year old lad, like the young corporal recently sentenced to life imprisonment, who volunteered for Army service at this tender age.

Our military courts should remember that our laws do not grant the right to vote to persons under 21, for it is generally believed that they lack mature ability to sift and weigh facts themselves; that they do not have sufficient experiences in living to develop strength of conviction, or adult moral ideals.

It is further assumed that their opinions can be swayed to easily by unscrupulous politicians.

Why then do our military men believe that a boy of 16 years has had time to develop deep personal integrity, enough to sustain him during extreme hardship, to help him withstand the punishment of 38 months of the horrors of war, loneliness, harsh imprisonment and Communist brainwashing?

A teen-age boy should be a member of his high school glee club and not the United States Army; his reading material should be Tennyson's "Idylls of the King," not Red propaganda leaflets; his activities should consist of building and flying his own gas-modeled airplanes on a neighborhood lot not crouching in fear of a Russian MIG on the faraway continent of Asia. His uniform should be khaki of the Boy Scouts of America, and the only "Red" he should know is the gay kerchief of his troop. His ribbon of valor? Let it be a Merit Badge!

Since my son was struck and killed by an automobile on July 7, I view our precious youth with new eyes. Each young son of our nation is precious, the one with mental and spiritual strength of course, but also the one that goes astray. He needs our help and rehabilitation, not condemnation.

of the fact that our face will find us out and will always be used as a credit or liability against or for us in the minds of those with whom we are associated.

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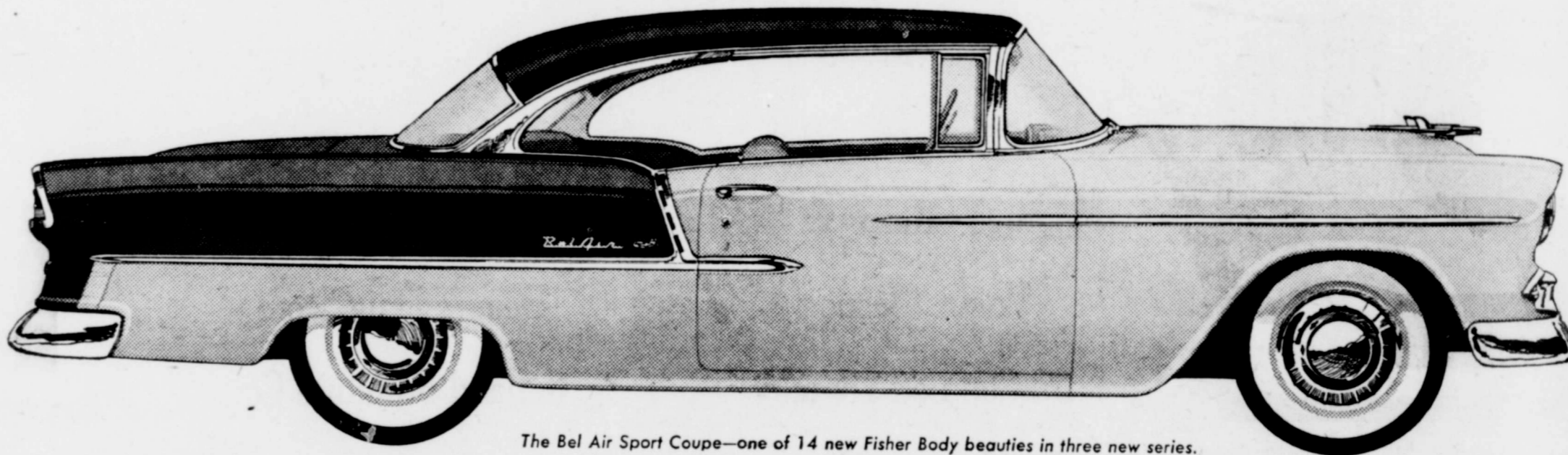

Reds Score Again

By R. D. Laney

The departure of Francis P. Carr as staff director contributes to the immobilization of McCarthy's permanent investigations subcommittee. The McCarthy committee has been at a standstill since last February, when Carr was ousted by a series of attacks upon Sen. McCarthy.

Carr has had enough of the job in private business where his abilities will win him the respect of the present administration. He followed the McCarthy committee's lead, Roy M. Cohn, out of McCarthy's office. Refusal of Carr to give security clearance to two committee investigators further undermined McCarthy's effectiveness. Sen. McCarthy himself has been halted by a pending recommendation of censure. The whole effect of the campaign against the committee has been to grant a reprieve to a Red field day. The McCarthy committee has been reduced to a mere shadow. The destruction of its effectiveness was the first item on McCarthy's political agenda for the present year. Carr and McCarthy's colleagues in the administration palace have accommodated the McCarthy committee.

Sen. Jenner has remarked, "There are a few tests that ought to be applied to all those who are recognized as the need for these activities but are not to be recognized as such. Mr. Jenner advises that they ask themselves: 'Why do we oppose the McCarthy committee?' Did they oppose other committees? Did they use the same methods to handle matters that had nothing to do with communism? Why oppose any such committee?"

Think that Americans who

apply these simple tests are going to come up with an illuminating answer. And when they think of what has happened to Sen. McCarthy, to Mr. Cohn and to Mr. Carr, perhaps they will start wondering who, in the future, can be induced to take up the job of keeping tab on the Communist, for the recognition and the regards can hardly be called gratifying.

Having lost his staff director, Frank Carr, as a result of the incessant attacks upon his permanent investigations subcommittee, Sen. McCarthy turned to his staff for a replacement. His choice was James Juliana, who has had an impeccable record with the FBI, is an officer veteran of the navy, and has had extensive experience investigating Communists and subversives.

Yet the three Democratic minority members of the McCarthy subcommittee, Senators Symington, McClellan and Jackson, immediately objected to the appointment of Juliana. They had originally approved his employment as a member of the subcommittee staff, and they cited not a single reason for opposing his promotion.

It becomes more and more evident that the Democrats have adopted this dog in the manger attitude for the simple reason that they don't want any investigation of Communists at all. They will object to any appointment, altho the one chosen may have the most unblemished record and possess the highest qualifications, as Juliana has.

Much of the same motive may be seen in the Democratic attack upon Sen. McCarthy, upon Roy Cohn, his former chief counsel, and upon two of his staff investigators. There is still too much buried in the New Deal record of attachment to Communists for the Democrats willing to expose themselves to the possibilities of detection. It is their deliberate intention to keep

the McCarthy subcommittee from ever getting going again.

All this has relevance to the congressional election next month. If a Democratic majority should recapture controls of Congress, a Democratic chairman will replace McCarthy and a Democratic majority will rule the subcommittee. And how much investigation of Communists could anyone expect then?

We learn from hearing the left "liberal" commentators over the radio that Sen. McCarthy's enemies, chiefly Communists, Democrats, and New Deal Republicans, figure that he ought to be embarrassed about his finances. Some of them are "demanding" that he make a public accounting, suggesting that they haven't the goods of him but they would like him to supply them with the goods if any exist.

While the lefties are demanding that McCarthy confess, we wonder what they have to say about a couple of Democrats, whose finances seem somewhat more puzzling, altho there is no particular mystery about them, the senate banking committee having exposed the intriguing facts.

The first case involves Rep. Clayton Powell, Jr., Democrat of Harlem district in New York City. He got a "loan" of \$3,000 in 1952 from a builder erecting a large cooperative housing development in New York on a mortgage guaranteed by the federal Housing Administration. No part of this loan has been repaid, altho Congressman Powell hastened to give the builder a \$30 check for "interests" when

the FHA and the senate began investigating the FHA "windfall" scandals.

Congressman Powell termed the testimony a Republican attack on "nonsegregated housing. The senate committee also turned up the fact that Rep. Price H. Preston, Jr., Democrat of the 1st Georgia district, realized a \$47,000 profit as a silent partner in a housing project in Savannah built with the aid of an FHA guaranteed mortgage. Preston's investment was \$2,333 and his name did not appear in the partnership, his one-third interest being held in the name of the mayor of his home town of Stateboro, who was a partner.
