Radar Now In Use
16 Highway
Patrol Districts
AAA AFFIRMS POSITION ON RADAR

W. J. Elliott of the Texas Highway Patrol has announced that Radar speed detecting devices will be in use in each of the 16 highway patrol districts. The Motor club is opposed to the basic idea of Radar in the enforcement of speed laws. Certainly the state needs a more effective control on speeders. The AAA, Texas Division, being a safety organization, does not believe speeding nor is it trying to protect the willful violator of the state speed laws. The AAA appeals to all motorists to help improve the traffic fatality record. Sound enforcement of speed laws must follow sound engineering and principles.

A recent survey made by the Texas Highway Patrol indicates that of the 17,137 vehicles checked on 25 spots on various U. S. highways throughout the state, 853 percent were exceeding the 60 mph. Toward the end of October traffic deaths in Texas were running above the period last year. Enforcement of sound speed laws should reduce the traffic fatality. The Texas Highway Patrol, as well as the AAA, wants to reduce the number of traffic fatalities.

The Texas Highway Patrol has the able leadership of W. J. Elliott and his boss, Col. Garrison. Director of the Department of Public Safety, has established rules regarding the patrol's use of Radar.

Uniform Radar signs are to be placed at all entrances into the state and will be posted on the outskirts of many cities. Radar signs are to be checked daily. The patrol commended the patrol's preparation but advised that the problem still had not been solved.

During 1953 the state of Texas had \$313,000,000 from out of state tourists. Texas tourists spent an additional \$414,000,000 on recreational travel with in state. As can be seen, the tourist industry is one of the most important in the state.

B. To provide for periodic re-checking of such approved devices to insure continuing accuracy.

C. To provide that uniform distinctive warning signs shall be placed at reasonable intervals in cities or parts of state where such devices are used so that a maximum number of motorists will be informed that this type of speed enforcement is being used, with the result that excessive speeds will be discouraged.

James Stewart In "Rear Window" Palace Sun.-Mon.

The man who can take an everyday situation and turn it into a sinister episode of dread and suspense is at it again. The man, of course, is famed motion picture producer-director, Alfred Hitchcock, and his latest venture into chill-filled celluloid is Paramount's Technicolor mystery thriller, "Rear Window," which is due to open next Sunday at the Palace Theatre.

Starring James Stewart and co-starring Grace Kelly, Wendell Corey and Thelma Ritter with Raymond Burr, the film is reportedly the best Hitchcock ever. Set against a background of New York's famed Greenwich Village "Rear Window," starts off placidly enough by introducing the audience to Mr. Stewart, a world renowned news photographer who is confined to a wheelchair with a broken leg which he suffered during the performance of his dangerous duties.

Jimmy has nothing in the world to do but while away his time in his Village apartment until his leg heals. He is visited by the insurance company nurse, Thelma Ritter and by his beautiful career-minded girl friend, Grace Kelly. Between these visitations Mr. Stewart idly gazes out of his window at his neighbors.

One dark night he sees what he believes to be a murder mounted with teeth-chattering terror fashion in the inimitable Hitchcock manner. It reaches a crescendo pitch that rivals anything that has ever been flashed on a motion picture screen.

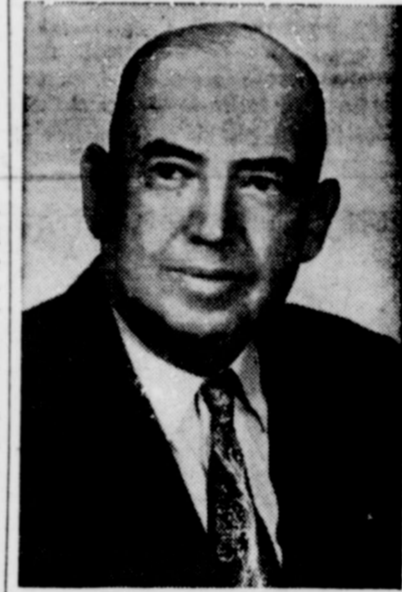

Fourteen boys had entries in the Broiler show, and won 13 blue ribbons, along with 11 red and one white ribbon. This junior broiler show is the largest market broiler show in the South and the competition is very keen.

John Wolf of Burk Burnett had the fifth place pen of pullets, Don Dwyer of Wichita Falls had the 7th place pen of cockerals and Linton Lowrance of Iowa Park exhibited the 9th place pen of cockerals.

Mr. Ray Wilson, manager of the Dallas show, recently sent the Wichita county agents, B. T. Haws and Glen Dunkle, premium checks in the amount of 93 dollars for distribution to the 4-H boys; also included was some 282 dollars which represented the sale price of the pens which were sold at auction.

Besides those boys already mentioned, others showing birds in the State Fair Broiler show were Harry Sargent of Iowa Park Garland Weeks, Olen Baley, Steve Ramming and Ralph Taylor of Friberg; Joe Belue Freddie Dwyer Edward Pennartz, Wichita Falls; along with Jimmy Wolf and Sandy Phillips of Burk Burnett.

SANDY PHILLIPS of Burk Burnett won a blue ribbon with his 5 broilers. The prize money was \$450. He also won a red ribbon with his pen of 5 pullets with prize money of \$300. The two pens sold at auction for \$21.65. Sandy had previously won a red ribbon at the County Broiler Show at Wichita Falls.

For the past two years now, feeding fine quality broiler birds for the State Fair, has gained in popularity among 4-H demonstrators. According to Haws and Dunkle, the purpose of this program is to afford 4-H members an opportunity to learn from experience something about feeding and management of poultry, together with disease and sanitation control measures, parasites control, marketing and distribution procedures and other information which will prove of value to the boys when they grow older and get into the poultry business on a larger scale.

James F. Melton, acting director of the governor's economic advisory commission says that Texas' gain in manufacturing and employees, from 1947 to 1952 ranked among the nations highest, but that the tourist trade fell off sharply.

Melton says Texas is losing 800,000 visitors a year.

The state's economy expert estimates the state's loss of potential income as 77 million dollars for the past two years alone.

He blames the states constitutional provision which prohibits Texas from advertising for tourist business.

SHIVERS' HAT

Shivers donated the hat, a tie, and some aprons, for the schools annual harvest festival.

Final Election Returns

Final reports from the Texas election Bureau show that Gov. Shivers rolled to a 521,373 to 61,007 victory over Republican opponent Tod R. Crockett.

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson received 491,228 votes to Republican Carlos Watson's 85,079.

Mystery Blasts

Central Texas residents read of another "mystery blast" last week. This time it was at Granger. But as in the previous seven cases no cause could be found. First blast of the series came in September in Austin.

Cause of the blasts has been attributed to everything from jet planes breaking the sound barrier to small boys playing with dynamite.

Inductions vs Separations

More Texans left the service last month than entered. Separations numbered 5,365 while inductions totaled 4,691, including six Texas doctors.

Narcotics Big Business

Black market narcotics have been called "big business" in Texas by the Department of Public Safety.

TDPS report 20 big bootleg dealers and hundreds of peddlers as operating in the state.

"We believe that most of the Texas narcotics came across the Rio Grande and through coastal ports," said Chief W. E. Naylor of the Dept. of narcotics section.

Drink to Death

Records in the Texas Department of Public Safety reveal that drinking drivers were involved in 49 percent of all fatal accidents last year.

New Head For State Home

James A. Lands of Austin has been named acting superintendent of the Waco State Home for Dependent and Neglected children.

Announcing the appointment was John H. Winters, executive director of the State Department of Public Welfare, who had removed former superintendent Ben S. Peak on grounds that

the home's children could be better served by a change.

Mental Care

An 11 point improvement program has been outlined by the State Hospital Board for the care of mentally retarded children and adults.

Improvements, in general, will follow recommendations made to the board by the Texas Research League.

In its report, the League listed 5,865 mentally retarded persons as presently in need of state facilities, over half of whom are not in these special schools.

Also recommended by the League was a 5,000 bed increase over the present 3,000 bed system.

Housing Act Aid Building

Passage of the 1954 Housing Act has resulted in a flood of new applications for loans and has thrown the Southwest Texas FHA office four weeks behind in its work.

In speaking to Austin realtors Director C. T. MasLeod of the FHA's San Antonio headquarters stated that he hoped the jam could be cleared by January 1.

More than 1,000 applications, seeking new or additional construction, have poured in, he said. The law permits maximum loans ranging from \$20,000 to \$25,000 for home construction.

New Insurance Ruling

Policyholders of the new defunct Texas Mutual Insurance Company of Beaumont will not be responsible for paying company debts, the State Supreme Court has ruled.

Upholding of an identical but earlier decision by the court end attempts by the state to obtain an assessment on company policyholders.

Income Tax Forms

Federal Income Tax Forms for taxpayers in the Internal Revenue Services' southwest region office will be easier to read and decipher this year.

For instance, the well known Form 1040-A, formerly of one-sheet size, is now bankcheck size. Other forms will have color added as does the instruction booklet, printed in eye-pleasing tints.

More Lawyers

Texas gained 126 new lawyers on November 15 as the Supreme Court swore in those who passed the October bar examination. Seventeen listed Austin as their hometown.

Time To Control Lice On Livestock

Lice are busy with their annual invasion of Texas livestock. These pests will take a sizeable chunk of producer's profit again this year.

Lice appear in greatest numbers during fall and winter and losses can be reduced materially if control measures are taken now, says B. T. Haws, county agent.

Animals infested with the pests usually are restless, eat less and do not use feed which is consumed properly.

Haws says a spray or dip of 5 percent toxaphene will control both lice and ticks on beef animals. A combination of 5 percent DDT and 3 percent lindane or gamma BHC also gives effective control. One application should do the job.

Five tenths percent methoxychlor or .03 percent lindane will control the insects on dairy cattle. A single application of methoxychlor should be sufficient but two of lindane spaced two weeks apart may be necessary.

Irritation produced by lice on sheep and goats causes the animals to rub or bite themselves. The wool or mohair may become matted, pulled out or be of low grade.

To rid sheep and goats of lice the county agent recommends .06 percent gamma BHC or 5 percent chlordane, DDT, TDE methoxychlor or toxaphene. If the animals are dipped, Haws says use the same insecticides but cut the dosages in half. Lice infestations are easily detected, the adults are visible with the unaided eye and, if these are present, it's a good bet eggs and young lice also are present.

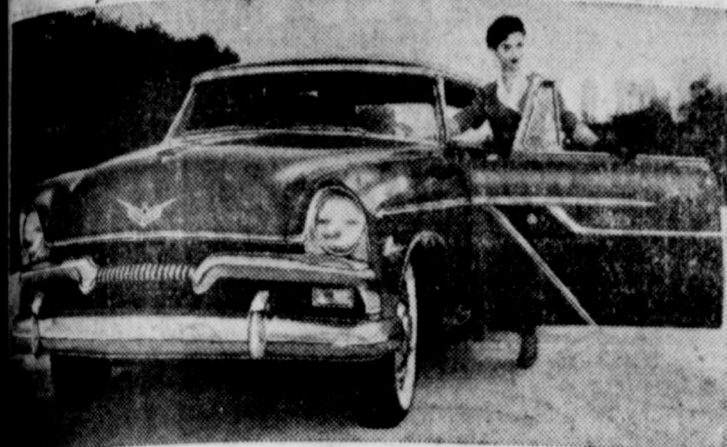

1955 Oldsmobile To Be Presented November 19

Oldsmobile for 1955 presents a new and more advanced concept of two-tone body color, important engineering improvements and a completely restyled appearance. The luxurious '98' Series and the high performance Super '88' Series both are powered by a more efficient 202 horsepower 'Rocket' engine with 8.5 to 1 compression ratio, it was announced by J. F. Wolfram vice president of General Motors and general manager of Oldsmobile Division. The 1955 Oldsmobiles go on display, Nov. 19, in dealerships throuout the United States.

Oldsmobile's popular low silhouette and wide vision panoramic windshield are embraced by the flying color styling that Oldsmobile designers have incorporated in the 1955 models. Oldsmobile again presents three series of cars with a total of 10 body types. There are three Fisher body styles in the luxury '98' series, four door sedan, deluxe Holiday coupe and Starfire (convertible). The flashing Super '88' Series has four body types, four door sedan, two door sedan, Holiday coupe and convertible coupe. In the economy priced '88' Series are the four door sedan, Holiday coupe and two door sedan.

Distinguishing the front end appearance of the 1955 Oldsmobile are the recessed headlights, with chrome-lined caps that extend two inches beyond the lens at the top, the name Oldsmobile spelled out in chrome block letters across the upper bumper bar and a more rugged bumper that curves gracefully into the fender contours at each end of the grille opening. The familiar Oldsmobile world emblem on the hood has an aluminized background for the plastic ornament. The rocket ornament atop the hood is wider and two wind splits extend the length of the hood, merging with the base of the ornament.

Improvement of "Rocket" engine, torque and performance has been achieved thru newly designed combustion chambers, higher lift camshaft and valves, larger exhaust valves, cooler operating sparkplugs and full chrome top piston rings. Horsepower is raised to 202 h. p. in the '98' and Super '88' and to 185 h. p. in the '88' Series, with compression ratio at 8.5 to 1 in all series. Breathing properties of the "Rocket" engine have been improved thru modification of the combustion chamber around the valve ports to accelerate the fuel mixture and increase the valve lift by .034 inches with a new high lift camshaft. A new fuel pump efficient in operating has been designed.

A new feature in 1955 is the offering of the 202 h. p. "Rocket" engine as optional equipment at extra cost on the "88" Series. Standard equipment on the "88" Series is the 185 h. p. "Rocket" engine, which this year is equipped with a new dual Rochester carburetor. This new two barrel carburetor develops more power thru its free flowing characteristics and is internally vented to promote equal economy in the mountains or at sea level.

Riding qualities of the 1955 Oldsmobile have further improved thru incorporating direct-acting shock-absorbers that are mounted vertically within the springs and attached directly to the frame and the lower control arm. Tubeless tires will be standard on the 1955 Oldsmobiles. These tires have an improved safety factor, with greater resistance to punctures and blowouts.

Steering effort has been reduced appreciably thru use of new needle bearings on the steering pitman arm shaft.

A major styling change is the adoption of sweep-cut front fenders on the Super '88' and '98' Series. These fenders were introduced last year on the "98" Series and add a distinctive flair to exterior appearance.

Two-tone styling, which has proved so popular with the motoring public since its introduction by Oldsmobile in 1954, again plays an important part in Oldsmobile's appearance. The stainless steel side moulding that extends nearly the length of the cars in all body types is used for the color separation. This flying color treatment of two-tone hues is achieved by a graceful sweep of the moulding from the belt line rearward to a point near the rear wheel opening, where it connects with a horizontal moulding that extends nearly the length of the car at the level of the fender opening. This moulding serves not only as decorative trim but also protects the body finish from the opening of an adjacent car door.

Rear appearance of the 1955 Oldsmobile also is changed. There is a more massive bumper with license plate centered between the bumper guards. The new bullet shaped taillights incorporate horizontal chrome air-foils in each side in the "98" Series. The trunk lock is cleverly concealed in the new world emblem.

Series identification on the 1955 Oldsmobile is maintained by the model name of series number in chrome script or numerals on the front fender panel just ahead of the wheel opening.

Color again plays an important part in Oldsmobile's 1955 styling. Fourteen new color choices are being offered among the 19 available on the 1955 models. Eighty-nine conventional top and body two-tone color combinations will be available, along with twenty special two-tone combinations where the side moulding provides the color separation. Interiors of the 1955 Oldsmobile are as colorful and varied as the exteriors. Forty-seven different upholstery selections are offered in the three series of cars. Genuine leather, covert cloth, nylon cloth and morroccen are among the upholstery materials available.

Important changes have been made in the Oldsmobile air conditioning system, available at extra cost on all models. The distribution ducts now are located in the instrument panel and the entire installation is forward of the steering wheel. The compressor, evaporator and blowers are under the hood.

A new capacity compressor and improved temperature control are features of the new system. There are three cool air outlets in the instrument panel, those at the extreme ends being the directional type and the one in the center being fixed. Temperature level inside the car can be easily regulated by the control on the instrument panel.

Attorney General Studying Control Of Comic Books

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd informed his Austin office Wednesday that a New York meeting with Judge Charles Murphy "should help find a Texas answer to the objectionable comic book situation."

Shepperd sat for two hours with Murphy in the Judge's New York office Wednesday afternoon. Murphy is the new Administrator of the Code of Comic Books for the Nation.

The Texas Attorney General termed it "A revolution to me of the tremendous job Judge Murphy is doing. He has instigated a voluntary control program within the industry that is producing quick results."

Shepperd said Murphy estimated Texas comic book sales at \$500,000 per month, and figures that each book averages six or seven readers.

"These booklets are having a harmful influence on children for good or for bad. Judge Murphy is doing a good job to insure that these books are wholesome," Shepperd said.

"About 90 percent of the national comic book publishers have agreed to abide by the new code. Twenty six out of twenty-seven have joined Judge Murphy in his fight to eliminate undesirable publications," he pointed out.

The voluntary program in Texas will hinge on co-operation of those who handle these books, Shepperd declared. With 100 percent co-operation, the need for control legislation might be lessened, if not eliminated.

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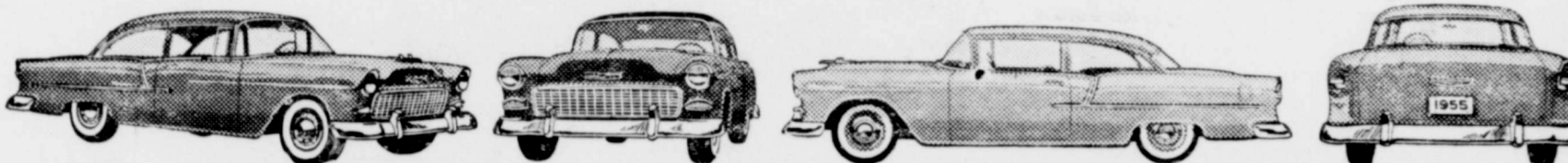

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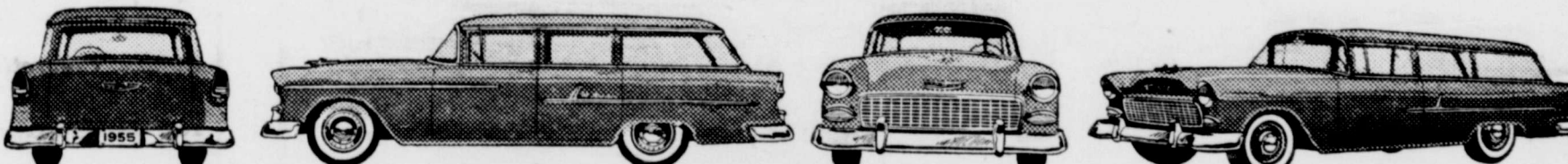

-YOUR FARM BUREAU- BY MARYE ECKELKAMP

Almost every farm report you see today shows a decrease in farm income, but not in the cost of living. A few weeks back, a senator from one of our neighboring states made the statement that since the flexible price support program had been approved some 50,000 farmers in his state were on relief. To me this is typical of the political propaganda that we have had thru all means of communication to the voting public.

It seems rather stupid to me for anyone to blame the present situation on the flexible prices considering that they didn't

even go into effect until next year. All of the drop in farm income has happened under the rigid 90 percent and there is no use in kidding ourselves that it hasn't.

Almost every wheat farmer in this county has had a cut in acreage that could be planted in wheat of from 20 to 40 percent depending on the history of cultivation for the last ten years. A lot of farmers think this a drastic cut and are highly disturbed over it. Since the acreage allotment is based on a ten year history, I began checking the planted wheat acreage for

these years. It was quite a picture. In 1944 with no allotments, the wheat acreage in this county was 54,000 acres. In 1949 still with no allotments, the acreage was 97,000 acres, a flat increase of 43,000 acres in five years, or 172 percentage wise. The 1954 allotment was 70,000 acres which still leaves an increase of 130 percent. Now during this ten year period, 1948, 1949 and 1950 crops were considered of the bumper variety. Are you beginning to see that we had a part in building up the present surplus. This is just one county, multiply this by the other counties in our state and the wheat growing states and you are beginning to get a glimmer of why we have a surplus problem, and the incentive for flexible prices.

It's not a complete picture until you include the loss of many of our world markets, a decrease in consumption, with some political sell outs mixed in. Whether we like it or not, we have a wheat surplus to move. I stole this, but "If farmers and ranchers would spend just one-tenth of the time in improving as they do in improving production, a lot of our present worries would 'fold their tents as the Arabs and as silently steal away."

OIL IN YOUR LIFE

How many times in the course of the day do you use some oil product?

The answer would vary, of course, from individual to individual. But it's a pretty safe bet that oil serves you and your family every single hour of the day and night.

So it goes, down a list which could cover pages. Oil is one of the most useful and most comprehensive of all our resources. Every year, the scientists discover more and more services it can perform, economically and efficiently. And, luckily for the national comfort and welfare, we have a great and high competitive oil industry to provide us with the multitude of products we need and want.

PORK ON THE HOOF

Did you ever think, rather wistfully, that it would be a good idea to buy a prime hog on the hoof and so get yourself some fine center cut pork chops at a bargain price? If you actually succumbed to the dream, and bought a pig from a farmer, the experience would be a disillusioning one.

Nowadays a choice pig weighs around 240 pounds. After it is dressed, the weight drops to 180 pounds. There is a further big loss in the cutting up process, only 135 pounds are meat cuts. And, believe it or not, of that a mere 10 pounds are the highly desired center cut pork chops.

You'd have on your hands large quantities of pork products for which you'd have relatively small use, such as lard and salt pork. All in all, by the time you wound up your experiment in buying a pig on the hoof, you'd have gone to a lot of trouble, you wouldn't have the expected results, and probably you'd have suffered a financial loss as well.

The packing industry performs the big job of seeing to it that the cuts of meat we want are available when we want them. It does that job at a profit which is so small that consumers could hardly notice the difference if it was eliminated. So there's nothing to be gained and much to lose in buying any meat animal on the hoof.

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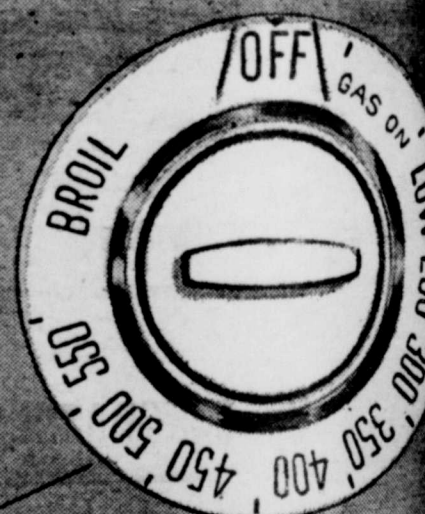
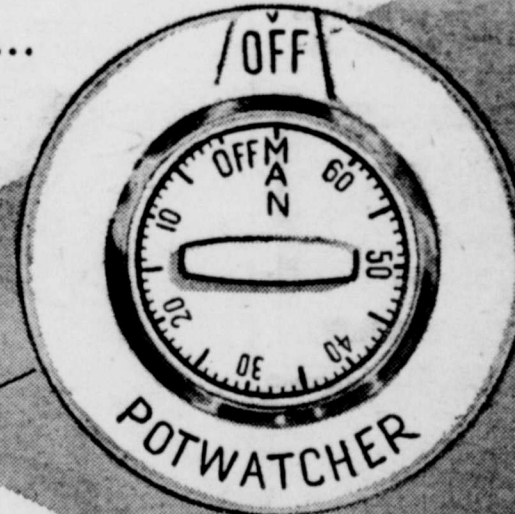

Deer Hunters To Give Deer Skins To TB Hospitals

Deer hunters are asked again this year to give TB patients in the state hospitals the hides from their season's kill.

Mrs. Mary Alice Coombs, occupational therapy director for the hospital system, says buckskin provided in this way last year is now going into Christmas gifts the patients are making for their families at home.

Austin Taxidermist, L. M. Rathbone, motor freight lines, sports editors, radio announcers and the hunters themselves teamed up with the Texas Tuberculosis Association in a statewide contribution of hundreds of hides, Mrs. Coombs said.

This year the collection is being sponsored by the newly organized Volunteer Advisory council for State TB hospitals. Mrs. Helen Smith of Austin, council chairman, asks the sportsmen to duplicate last year's generous gift to the patients.

Mrs. Smith says the hides should be lightly salted, marked "charity," addressed to the Austin Taxidermist Studio, 2708 South Lamar, Austin and shipped by motor freight. If this procedure is followed, she says, most of the motor freight lines in Texas will transport the hides free of charge.

Mrs. Coombs pointed out that for the first time in Texas history there are registered occupational therapists to supervise the patients' handiwork in all the state hospitals. TB Associations made this possible by supple-

menting the state salaries which had proved insufficient to obtain them, she said.

Under their direction, the patient are converting the buckskin into such items as baby shoes, belts, purses, moccasins for their own use of the Christmas stockings at home.

Veterans Information Center

Q—I am planning to apply for disability compensation. Since I have just had a physical examination at a recognized private hospital, would it be necessary for me to be examined again by the VA?

A—No, it would not be necessary for you to be examined by VA, so long as your hospital examination identifies your disabling condition and presents sufficient findings so that VA can properly evaluate the condition. Further, your examination must have been certified by the hospital's chief medical officer or his physician-designate.

Q—I am in the organized reserves, and I have been called to active training duty for two weeks. Will those two weeks count in lengthening my entitlement to Korean GI Bill training?

A—No. Training duty may not be counted in determining entitlement to Korean GI Bill training. Only active duty, as opposed to training duty, may be considered in computing entitlement.

Q—I lost my GI insurance policy. If something happens to me, will my beneficiaries still be able to get the proceeds of the policy?

A—Yes. The policy itself, which

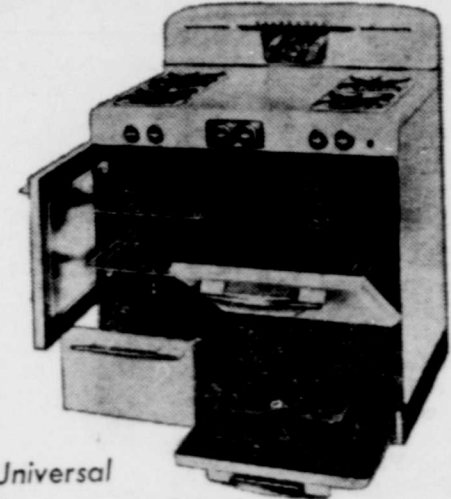
has been issued to you, is for informational purposes only. It is not necessary to produce the policy as evidence that the insurance is in effect; proceeds will be paid anyhow, so long as VA records show your policy was in force.

Q—I am attending a trade school full-time under the Korean GI Bill. I have been told

that I will be allowed 30 days of absences a year. Is this total prorated on a monthly basis, or are any number of absences during a single month permitted?

A—The absences are not prorated on a monthly basis. You are permitted to take your allowable absences at any time during your school year, according to your own needs.

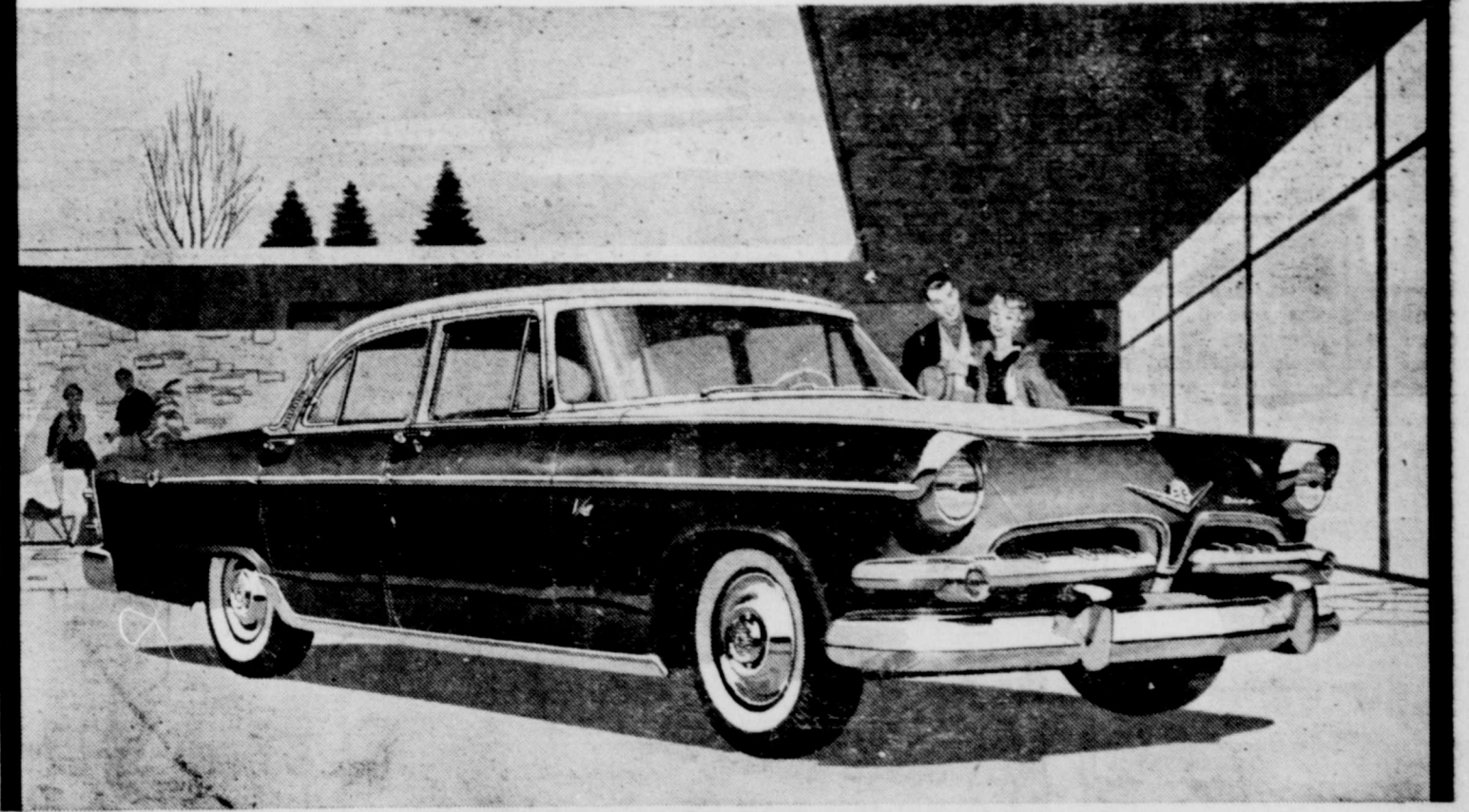

Acheson & Powell

Dean Acheson, who was Mr. Truman's secretary of state, is confining his interest in the execution of foreign policy to the academic, and not the operating end. He contributes an essay on the subject to the autumn issue of the Yale Review. Mr. Dulles is now secretary of state, and if the policy looks much the same as usual, it must nevertheless be accounted something of a gain that Acheson isn't still around, refusing to turn his back on Alger Hiss.

To nobody's surprise, Acheson is in full agreement with the outlook that the President should have full and unimpeded decision over foreign policy. A President who does not care to exercise this power, is, to Acheson, a "weak" president. He cites a few Pierce, Buchanan, Grant, Harding, and Coolidge. It is hardly coincidence that these particular Presidents, who did not care to throw their weight about in foreign affairs, all managed to get thru their administration without war.

We are given to understand by Acheson that the three Democratic Presidents of the century, Wilson, F. D. Roosevelt and Harry Truman, were strong Presidents, and, as these were the three Presidents who all involved the United States in long, difficult, and costly wars, the mark of a "strong" president would seem to be his ability to embroil the nation in foreign war.

In this connection, Acheson pays a left handed compliment to Truman by saying that his method in conducting foreign relations was marked by meticulous regard for going thru "channels." That is, Acheson would suggest that he never took a step in foreign affairs without due consultation with all of his designated advisors, and, we would be justified in assuming without proper respect for the constitutional prerogatives of Congress.

Yet nothing could be further from the fact. We have heard of the two evening conferences at Blair House in June, 1950, which resulted in American intervention in the war in Korea. The testimony is uncontroverted that, altho the military chiefs were in attendance, they expressed no recommendation, and that the decision to go to war was Truman's personal decision, with the secretary of state merely seconding the motion that no one chose to dispute.

This would hardly seem to correspond with a meticulous care for going thru channels, and the significant fact is that the channel ended right there American forces were in action before Congress heard of the order altho, the Constitution reserves to Congress the sole power to declare war. Acheson seems to suggest that such intermeddling

abroad is quite in the order of things, as the conception of "Fortress America" is a myth, because the incidence of power pressure occurred outside it. Acheson argues that "it is there, where the pressures focus, that the United States must exercise its capacity to mold and shape the future."

This is akin to saying that there is no such thing as American foreign policy for Americans must always, under all circumstances, be governed by foreign pressures and influences, so that it can never adopt a decision strictly of its own initiative or in its own interests. It must always succumb to external power pressures.

Clyde L. Powell, who has a 29 year record as a New Dealer and an even longer one as a criminal, has been in hot water ever since a senate committee started looking into the give-aways in the federal housing administration loan program. Powell was assistant administrator of the FHA. A number of promoters who were interested in FHA loans have testified that they gave him large "loans" or gifts. There has been evidence that he threw lots of money across gambling tables. But Powell isn't talking. Three times he was called up before the committee and each time he invoked the 5th amendment, refused to testify for fear of incriminating himself.

More recently Powell was brought before a federal grand jury, which has been trying to find out what he did with the acts in office. Again he refused to talk, and Federal Judge F. D. Letts sentenced him to a year in the District of Columbia jail for his refusal. From the available evidence it looks as if anything that Powell told the grand jury might speed him on his way to prison. We presume, however, that Judge Letts had sound grounds for the contempt citation, perhaps in the facts that surrendering official diaries can't be called testifying against one's self.

What we miss here is the committee to protect civil rights by

defending Clyde L. Powell. Why are the communist pickets in front of Judge Letts' courthouse? Why are the editorials in the Daily Worker? Where is Sen. Flanders? Why isn't Sen. Margaret Chase Smith circulating a declaration of "conscious" Cab Eleanor Roosevelt remain silent longer?

Powell is a suspected crook, but not a suspected traitor. He is thus profoundly uninteresting to people who defend traitors.

October Time To Fertilize Home Lawns

Lawns of Bermuda and St. Augustine grass will enter the winter in a more vigorous condition if fertilized now. Added vigor will keep lawns green longer into the fall and winter and will lead to faster earlier growth next spring.

Apply a complete fertilizer with a 2-1-1 or 1-1-1 ratio at the rate to supply two pounds of actual nitrogen for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area, says B. T. Haws, county agent. This is the quantity of nitrogen in 20 pounds of 10-5-5 or 10-10-10, or in 25 pounds of 8-8-8. 16-20-0 commercial fertilizer is the one most commonly used for lawns in Wichita County.

State Meeting Waurika, Okla.

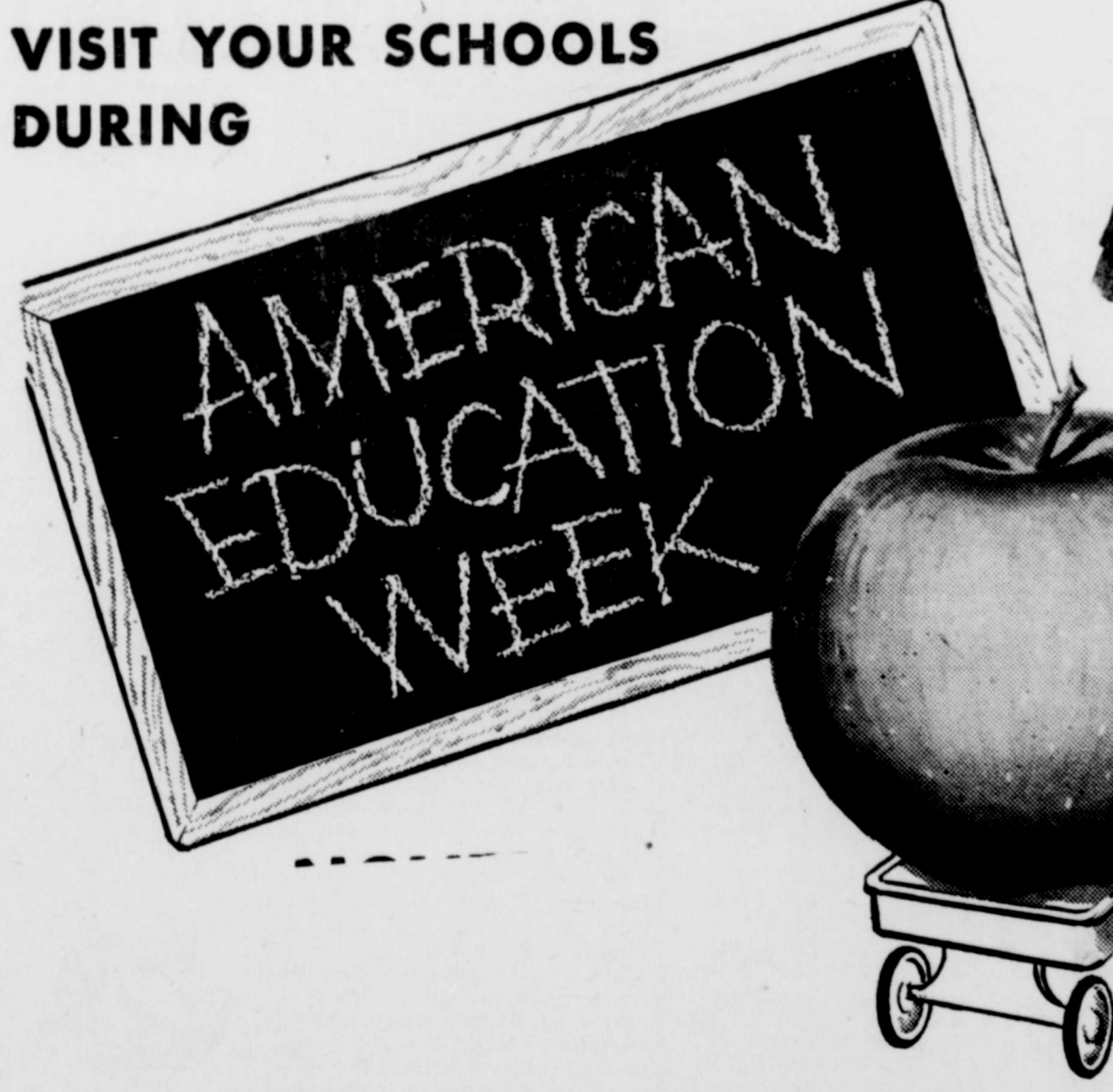

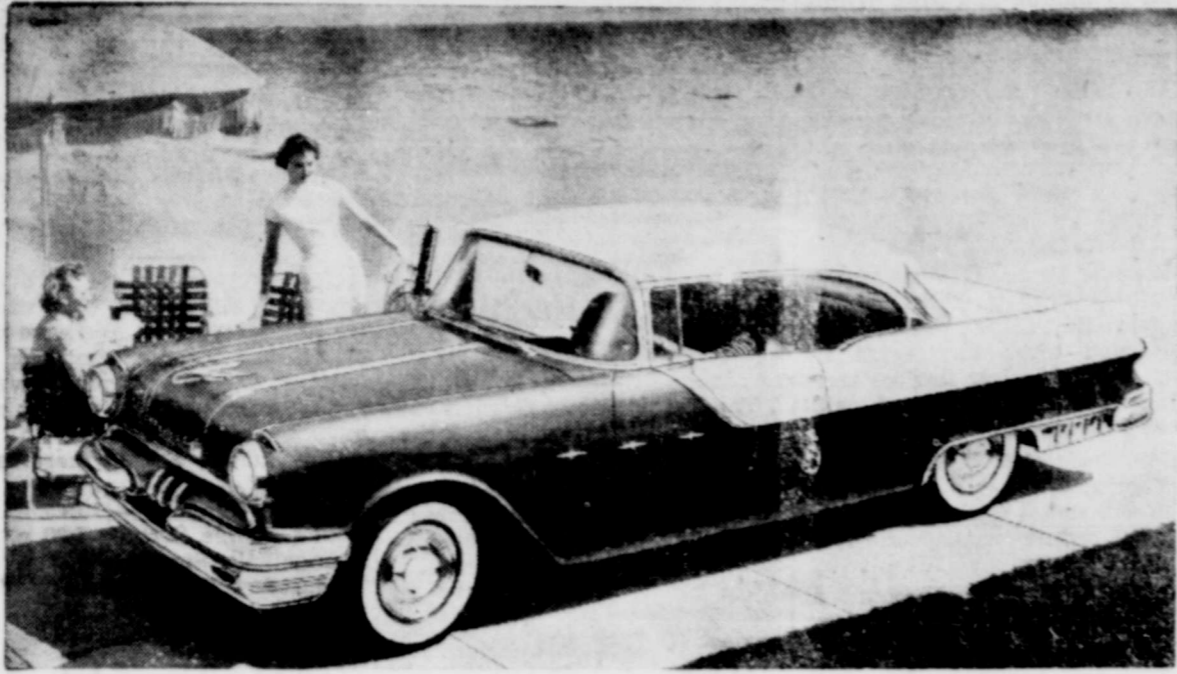

Beef Cattle Need Plenty Roughage

Roughage, and a lot of it, will be needed to carry beef cattle thru the winter. Consider both the amount and quality of rough

age you feed, says B. T. Haws, county agent. Roughage in some form should be available to livestock at all times. This doesn't necessarily mean it must be of the highest quality, but the higher the feeding value the better, Haws says. Roughage very low in nutritive value can be fed with success if adequate supplement, about two pounds of cottonseed meal, is supplied each day. Cotton burrs, peanut hulls and corncobs fall into this category. Haws cites specifications based on years of research and study which are recommended for feeding in Texas. Use about four pounds of legume hay with 14 pounds of cottonseed hulls or oat straw for each animal daily. If corn or sorghum silage is available, feed 40 to 50 lbs of either and 1 pound of cottonseed meal or cake daily.

Texas State Dept. of Health

Dr. Henry A. Holle, M. D.

You catch a cold from a person who has a cold when you take in more of his cold germs than your body defenses can destroy. This is apt to happen when you are tired, and somebody is coughing or sneezing around you, says Dr. Henry A. Holle, State Health Officer.

Avoid taking in large masses of the germs by staying away from the person who has a cold; by staying out of crowded places during a cold epidemic; by washing your hands before you eat and after contact with a cold-infected person, or articles he has handled.

Keep your general health high by getting plenty of sleep; by eating regular well-balanced meals and drinking plenty of water; by getting some outdoor exercise every day; and by letting sunshine and fresh air into your home, office or factory.

Don't lower your resistance by getting too tired, over-heated, or chilled. Avoid sitting in dried out, smoke, dust or chemical laden air. Dress according to the weather and the temperature in which you must work.

Go to bed if you possibly can at the first sign of a cold. If you can't stay in bed, get as much rest as possible. Protect others by covering your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze, and by washing your hands frequently, especially before handling food, cooking utensils or dishes.

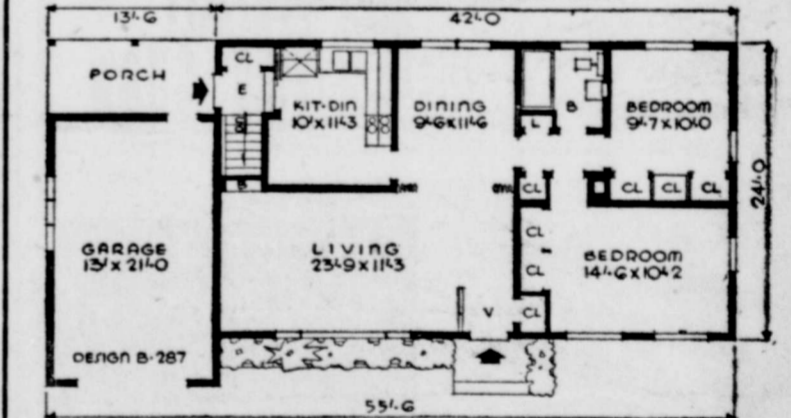
