The soup simmers for twenty four hours to be tops in flavor. The vats with chicken soup had three chickens simmering on top. Next was one of the largest automatic dishwashers in this country. Their kitchen handles about a million dollars in business a year. After seeing where the food was prepared and kept we were shown the large dining halls with tops in floor covering.

After lunch we went to the Fat Stock Show. As a group we went thru each livestock barn studying the breeds of sheep, swine, dairy cows and beef cows, noting the good and bad qualities of each for the production of meat, wool, milk and other products.

The first year boys, interested in poultry judging, went to the poultry barn where we could see the points discussed and how to select hens for better egg production.

The Rodeo was a sell out, leaving us without standing room, therefore we didn't get to see the large indoor performance.

After this time, we were free to see the horses and meet back at the bus. Coming home at 8:30 was a long trip but worth the time spent with good knowledge of what the judges are selecting for tops in our present trends in agriculture.

A NOTEWORTHY BIRTHDAY

We salute the Boy Scouts of America on its 45th birthday, now being observed during Boy Scout week, February 6 to 12.

Since its founding in 1910 the organization has enriched the lives of over 22,750,000 boys and adult leaders. Truly Scouting represents a living cross section of American life.

Boys of every race, religion and economic background are attracted to Scouting. Today we find 2,700,000 boys in its ranks. Add to that impressive figure the 960,000 adults of good character who give generously of their time and talents to serve as leaders of units, Merit Counselors and in many other capacities. There is hardly an American family that has not felt its influence.

Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, the Chief Executive, a leader in the organization since 1913, feels that it is of vital importance to train the boys of today to be ready for positions of leadership as they grow to manhood.

"Strong character, participating citizenship and physical fitness," he says, are needs of our boys and young men who are served by the program of Scouting in cooperation with the home, the school, the church, and all other community institutions actively interested in training our future citizens.

Scouting's purpose, stated in the Federal Charter granted by Congress in 1916, is to promote the "ability of boys to do things for themselves and others, to train them in Scoutcraft, and to teach them patriotism, courage, self-reliance and kindred virtues."

JACK WAS WRONG

According to the old nursery rhyme, "Jack Spratt would eat no fat."

The chances are that this aversion of Jack's had a deleterious effect on his health and, very likely, shortened his life.

We often see people trim all the fat off a serving of meat and eat nothing but the lean. Nutritionists frown on that practice. Studies carried on all over the world have shown that fat is important in human nutrition. It makes needed contributions to complex bodily functions. It helps to keep protein from being consumed for energy purposes. It also aids in storing the protein which must be supplied to the body each day. And it is required by children and teen-agers, as well as adults.

Another misconception is that fat hampers the digestive processes. The truth is that the fat in a properly balanced diet is easily digested by a normal system. In moderate amounts it interferes in no way with the digestibility of other foods, and it makes a definite contribution to the flavor of meals.

Nutritionists are not entirely agreed on just how much fat the diet should contain. But many believe that it should be enough to supply from 20 to 35 percent of the day's total calories.

Yes, Jack Spratt who ate no fat was wrong. So was his wife who would eat no lean. The human body needs both.

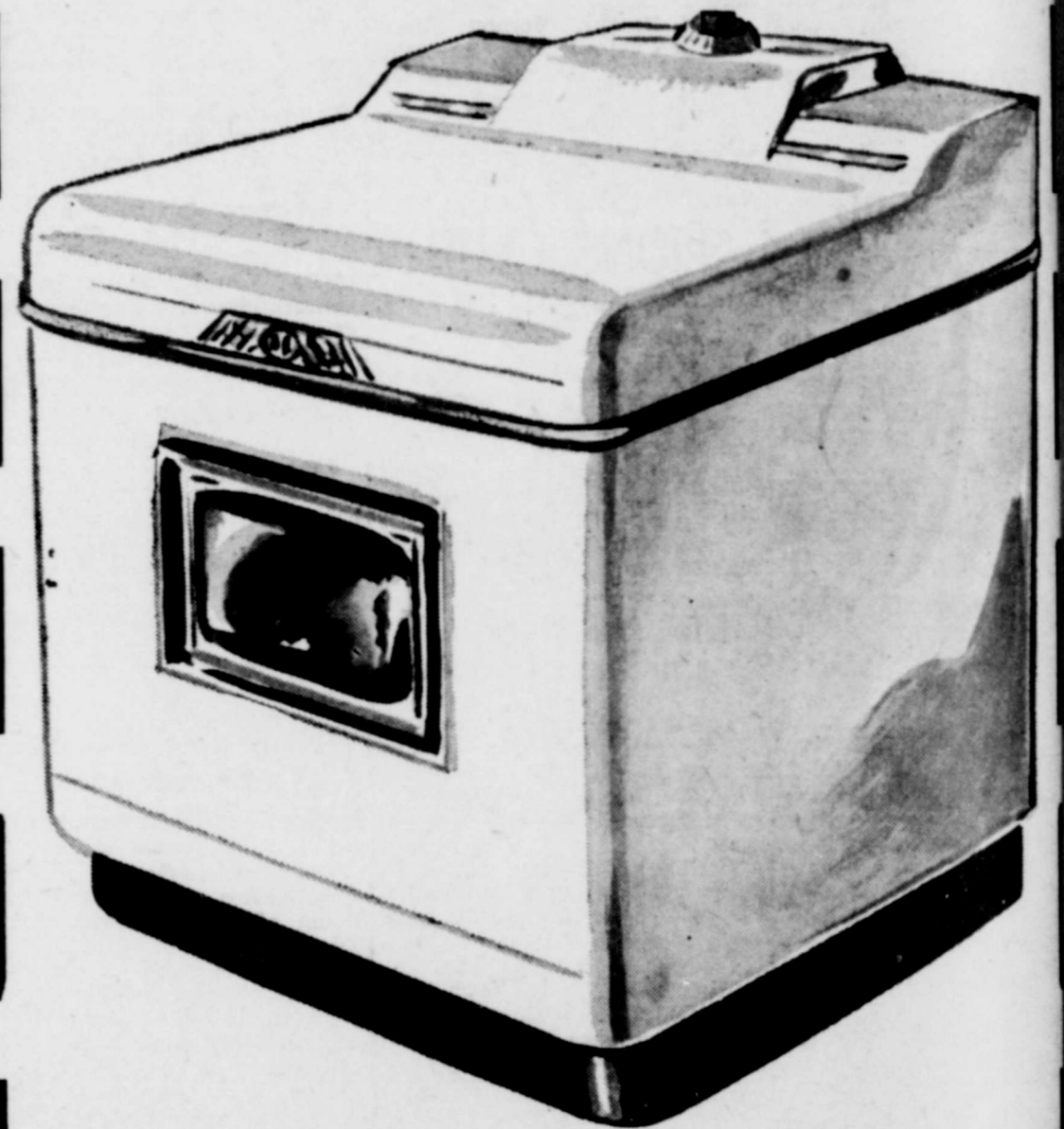

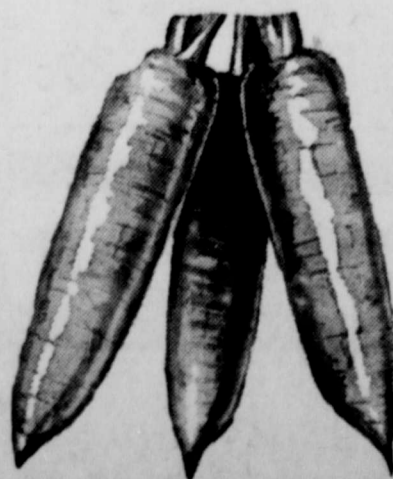
