Burk Churches Co-operating In Religious Census

A number of Burkburnett churches will cooperate in taking another religious census during February. The plan to be followed will be the same as used last February. It is as follows:

On this next Sunday, Feb. 13, someone representing each family in attendance in Sunday school in the cooperating churches will be asked to fill out a family card. A sticker will be given to that family stating, "Census has been taken." This on the door of the home will later tell the census taker not to stop there.

We are asking the churches to send all the boys possible to the First Baptist church, Saturday, Feb. 19 at 9:30 A. M. These boys should be ages 9 thru 16 or up and should be accompanied by some parents or some one who has a car. The boys will cover the town with census cards. These cards should be filled out and left in the front door by 2:00 P. M. Sunday, Feb. 20. Census takers going out that afternoon would only have to pick that card up. It would save much time for the census taker and save disturbing the family. Any who are not to be at home will not be missed if the card is left in the door before the family leaves home.

Then on Sunday, Feb. 29 at 2:00 P. M. workers from all of the churches will assemble in the auditorium at First Baptist church for instructions and materials. These workers will then go out to cover the homes, picking up cards left in the door and contacting families where the card is not in the door. Each church should have a representative to remain at the church to sort the cards as soon as they are returned. Then we could use some to make copy cards where there is a divided family.

Burkburnett Beats Quanah 55 to 44

Consistent accuracy at the free throw line enabled the Burkburnett Bulldogs to trample the Quanah Indians here Tuesday night in a District 2A-3 basketball game, 55 to 44.

Coach Ted Averitt's Burk lads kept pace with the Childress Bobcats, who beat Wellington, with the relatively easy triumph over Quanah. Burkburnett plays at Childress Friday night for the District championship. Tonight (Thursday) the Bulldogs go to Wellington for a game.

Childress owns an 8-1 record and Burk a 7-1 mark in district play.

It was Quanah's sixth loss in district competition and their third defeat in four meetings with Burkburnett.

Burkburnett's ability to cash in on numerous charity toss opportunities—the Bulldogs hit 27 of 35 from the lane—was the big difference between the two teams Tuesday night. Quanah outscored the Bulldogs from the field, 18 to 14, but sank only 8 of 17 free throws.

Stanley Owen of Burk led all scorers with 18 points—10 of 'em free throws. Patterson tallied 14 and Ady garnered 10 to lead the Bulldogs.

He was a member of the North Texas Oil and Gas Association and the Floral Heights Methodist Church. He was active in youth work in this area.

Wills, a Navy veteran of World War I, was born in Deerfield, Kansas, July 19, 1895.

In 1920 he married the former Miss Marie Bush in Independence, Kansas.

Sunday Mr. Wills and his wife were near Mineral Wells looking at an oil well and decided to go into Mineral Wells for lunch. Following the meal Mr. Wills had a heart attack as they approached their car at the curb. He was brought to Wichita Falls and placed in the hospital, and died early Monday morning.

He is survived by his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Eugene E. Brock of Wichita Falls; a son, Donald H. Wills, a student at the University of Oklahoma; and four brothers, Earl Wills of Long Beach, Calif.; Leon Wills and Marion Wills of Independence, and Clarence Wills of Enid, Oklahoma.

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Warning Issued To Kite Flyers

Texas Electric Service Company appealed to parents to caution their children about flying kites near electric wires.

"The windy season brings kite flying time and this traditional sport is one that is lots of fun for the children if it's done safely," J. B. Ady, Texas Electric Service Company manager, pointed out. "Many youngsters don't realize the dangers in this innocent pastime if certain safety rules are not observed, the most important of which is to never fly kites where there is the possibility of them getting tangled in electric power lines."

Other dangerous practices in connection with the kite flying include using metallic cord or wire for the kite string, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton kite string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity and trying to retrieve a kite in case it does get caught in electricity wires, Ady stated. If your kite should get caught in Electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Company. They will send someone to get it down for you.

"Local youngsters who fly kites have been careful and cooperative in the past and we've had no serious mishaps in several years, but each year, over the nation, there are many cases of injuries to kite flyers," Ady said. If kites are made right and are flown right, kite flying is an enjoyable, wholesome sport.

Collection of 1954 School Taxes Now 95% Complete

According to Dow Estes, Tax Assessor-Collector for the Burkburnett Independent School District, 95 per cent of the 1954 taxes came in by January 31st. Of the 5 per cent outstanding taxes, some \$1500.00 will come in by June, as half payments.

Much of the delinquent taxes is owed by people who received their tax statements, put them aside and just forgot to pay up. Mr. Estes believes that practically 100 per cent will be in by time to send out tax notices next October.

Mr. Estes wishes to extend his thanks to the 95 per cent who paid up before the deadline. It makes his work easier, and it saves the taxpayer penalty and interest.

City Population Now Estimated at Close to 7,000

Burkburnett has been experiencing phenomenal growth in the past five years. A very conservative estimate is that the city now has 6,800 inhabitants. The 1950 U. S. census placed the population at 4516. In 1940 the census was 2814.

The sixty-eight hundred estimate is a conservative figure. Over the state, population figures are estimated at four persons for each service meter. Burkburnett has more than 1700 gas meters, and the water and light meters each total more than 1700. Based on the meters, one could very easily arrive at a figure near 7,000 people here.

People have moved to Burkburnett because they found so many things that permanent families desire—good churches, fine schools, good water, friendly people and many other advantages offered. One of the most desirable inducements to home owners here is the low taxable value on real estate and the low tax rate (\$1.50 per \$100.00 valuation). Other cities the size of Burkburnett have double the tax valuation, and tax rates up to \$2.90 per \$100.00 valuation.

Local Auxiliary Helping Sale Of Savings Bonds

American Legion Auxiliary Unit 264 of Burkburnett has pledged its help in expanding the U. S. Treasury Department's School Savings Program in Burkburnett, according to Hope Buford president. Recently the Merchants Committee met and agreed to give away a 12' upright deepfreeze in March, in addition to the regular \$150.00 awards to Trades Day.

The Membership committee has secured 165 active members thus far. The committee is still working on other prospects.

Based on service meter connections, Manager Oglethorpe announced Burkburnett now has sixty-eight hundred estimated population.

THE STATE OF RETAILING

The state of retail business is of obvious moment to all of us. For the volume of consumer spending is what makes the wheels go round.

Last year retail trade was excellent—not far below the all time-high. And prospects for the future are very encouraging, according to retail spokesmen.

There are other good signs too—signs that argue well for the consumer. In 1954, Chain Store Age reports, the chains reached a new high in construction and modernization expenditures. A survey covering 1,059 chain companies, operating 27,686 stores, showed that spending for these purposes was up 10 percent over 1953, with some 7,000 new stores built and more than 11,000 undergoing remodeling.

The magazine also finds that construction and modernization budgets will show another 10 percent jump this year as compared with last. All types of chains, foods, general merchandise, variety, drug and so on, are expending and improving their physical facilities.

This means we will get better service all down the line, along with improved displays and more efficient and attractive methods of operation. No business on earth is more competitive than retailing. None works harder to meet the desires of consumers. And none does a better job.

Incidentally, this job is done for an amazingly small profit, as little as one cent for each dollar of sales in some lines of retailing.

P. A. Y. G. BEATS I. O. U.

When Virginia's Senator Harry Flood Byrd was 15, as the legend goes, he made a pay-as-you-go deal with the station agent who was holding the Byrd newsprint for express charges, so that the family paper, The Winchester Star might continue publication. His subsequent rescue of the family fortunes may well explain his dedication to pay-as-you-go.

Later, as the state Senator, young Mr. Byrd was a prime mover in establishing state highway system for Virginia, whose only paved road connected Washington and Richmond. This too, at the insistence of Senator Byrd, and then Governor Byrd was a pay-as-you-go operation, and still is. No bonds, no debts, and for years now a system of roads as adequate as those of any state to the needs of its citizens and visitors.

Today, Senator Byrd warns against President Eisenhower's ten year highway program, expanded by his advisory committee in record time from 50 to 101 billions. Dollars, that is, instead of loading this additional debt on unborn generations, with an additional 11 billions, of interest, the Senator would repeal the Federal 2 cent gas tax, give it back to the states to do their own road building, and finance the present Federal aid program with a new half-cent gas tax on lubricating oil.

We are told that our present state governors, all 48 favor the Clay committee plan, proving, no doubt, that 101 billion dollars can't be wrong. But perhaps we'd better listen to former Gov. Byrd. We can't think of a better qualified witness.

THERE AREN'T ENOUGH RICH

Does anybody still believe that we maintain the government by soaking the rich, as the old-time agitators used to claim?

Well, here is what the Tax Foundation has to say about that. If the federal government took 100 percent of everybody's taxable income above \$10,000, the gain in revenue would be less than \$5,000,000,000—which would not pay government's costs for a single month.

If it took all taxable income above \$4,000, a figure which is certainly a far cry from riches these days,—the Treasury would benefit to the tune of \$13,000,000,444. But that's only one-fifth of our current annual federal spending.

There just aren't enough rich or well to do people to meet the costs. So the burden of government is borne by the masses of people and always will be.

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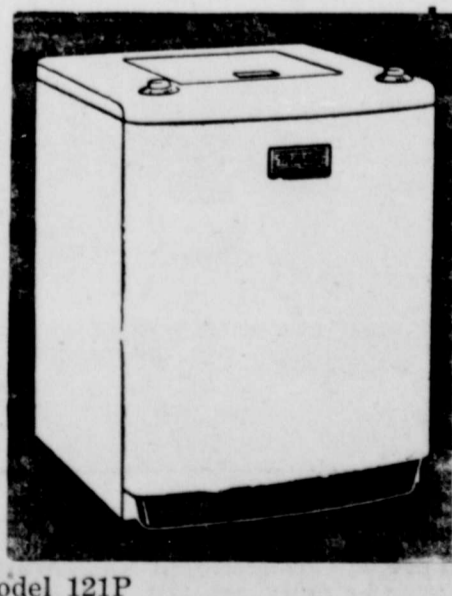
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News From The Congress

By **WANN KARD**

No legislation has reached the floor of the House yet. The Committee on Ways and Means continues its hearings on the question of extending the Reciprocity Trade Act for a period of three years. This week several witnesses from Wichita Falls appeared before the Committee. They were J. P. DeGroot, President of the National Stripper-Wells Association, J. C. Norwood,

President of the North Texas Oil and Gas Association, and George Anderson, the new executive vice president of that group. They were pointing out the disastrous effect that excessive oil imports would have on the domestic oil industry. The impact of excessive imports would have a greater effect in Texas probably than any other state. Since we produce about 50 percent of the oil produced in this country, we would have to absorb a greater proportion of the imports in our market. Since 1941, the imports of oil have risen from about 10 percent of the domestic demand to a level of 27 percent in 1954. If imports continue to increase they can have only a deadly effect on our domestic industry.

This week the House almost unanimously approved the President's request to draw a line which we would defend in the far East. This action is good. I think it that it should be clear evidence to the world that the United States will not vacillate and appease aggressive Communism. I hope, however, that the Resolution will not be construed by anyone as setting a precedent that the President must come to Congress before he can deploy our troops. Constitutionally, there is a little doubt as to what the President can move our forces as he thinks best for the well-

fare of this country. It would be a sad day if it were thought that he does not have this power because a situation could easily arise where he would have to act at night or instantly without having time to consult anyone.

This week the House also unanimously voted to continue for two more years its special committee whose job it is to investigate the problems of the small business man insofar as they relate to the Government and to suppress unfair competition. This Committee will be an outstanding job.

the various state agencies. But appropriation measures designated \$198,580,000 from the general fund, whereas, according to the comptroller, present taxes will produce only \$148,869,000 That indicated the necessity of taxing the people to the tune of an additional \$50 million.

Gov. Shivers' budget office had previously estimated that additional taxes in the amount of \$65 million would be required.

BUDGET BOARD
Legislative Budget Board members have presented their recommended general fund appropriations for the next two years.

University of Texas appropriations were set at \$15,338,946. The amount is \$5.7 million less than the University asked. It is \$2 million more than was appropriated in 1953-54.

Other recommendations called for a \$7,515,000 boost over present expenditures for the state hospital board; a \$345,000 increase for Youth Development schools; \$2.2 million more for the State Health Department; and

\$440,000 more for the Texas Prison System.

SENATE CHAIRMAN
Senate chairmanships announced by Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey include Sen. Crawford Martin of Hillsboro for Finance; Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Angelo for state Affairs; Sen. Johnnie B. Rogers of Austin for Insurance; and Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas for Labor.

SMITH MAKES HISTORY
Rep. Max Smith, of San Marcos made history when House Speaker Jim Lindsey appointed him chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

Rep. Smith is the second man in Texas history to be twice-named head of this all important committee and the only man to serve consecutive terms as a chairman.

Rep. Travis Henderson from Lamar County served as Finance Committee chairman (now called the Appropriations Committee) in 1893 and again in 1899.

More than 60 appointments to state positions by Gov. Shivers, will soon be due.

Included is the naming of a new secretary of state, a highway commission member, two members to the State Board of Public Welfare, one member to the State Board of Control, three new University of Texas regents and three A&M college directors.

Shivers is expected to reappoint Major General K. L. Berry as adjutant general and Mark Wentz as State Fire Insurance Commissioner.

INSURANCE
Bills to give Texas insurance company policy holders and investors better protection are

pouring into the House and Senate.

Primarily, they are asking for higher capital requirements for new companies, stricter examinations and licensing laws, and placement of insurance stock sales under state regulation.

LABOR CONTROL BILLS
Three labor control bills, all by Sen. Parkhouse of Dallas, have been introduced in the senate. One house labor bill has been sponsored.

Parkhouse would:
1. Stop unemployment compensation payments to persons on strike or idle from a strike by a union that they belong to.

2. Ban picketing of an establishment if the union does not represent a majority of the firms employees.

3. Assess fines from \$15 to \$500 and a six-months jail sentence for violation of the law.

The House bill would set up state supervised elections to determine whether employees want union representation. It would also create a state Industrial commission as a dispute mediator

WHOOPIING CRANES
A permanent Texas winter home for rare whooping cranes would be provided by a House bill.

Sponsored by Rep. Charles L. Sandahl, Jr., the bill would provide islands and marshland areas on the Gulf Coast for the Audubon Society, which looks after the birds.

LAND BOARD
The Veterans Land Board has tightened up on approval of state loans for veterans wanting to buy land.

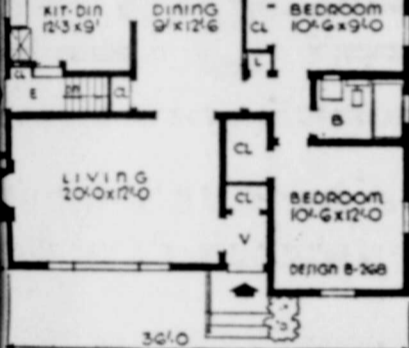
Applications for loans showing relationship between the buyer and seller are being held up. Appraisers have been asked to submit full information on all applications submitted to the board.
