Mr. R. D. Owens and Mr. J. H. Brumley first established the funeral home back in 1925 in connection with their furniture store which was organized in 1921. Mr. Owens came to Burkburnett in 1907 when the town was

first organized and Mr. Brumley came here in 1911 at the same time of the staking of the first oil well, the Schmoker No. 1. Burkburnett was only a small village then. Both these men saw Burkburnett grow into the thriving metropolis it was dur-

ing the boom days. The old landmark was torn down in 1937 and replaced with a modernistic two story stucco brick building. Mr. Brumley died on January 29, 1943 and Harold Van Loh, his son-in-law, became associ-

ated with the establishment immediately thereafter. Co-owners of the home now are: Mrs. J. H. Brumley and Harold Van Loh of Burkburnett and Mr. Owens of Wichita Falls. Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Rigby are local managers of the home.

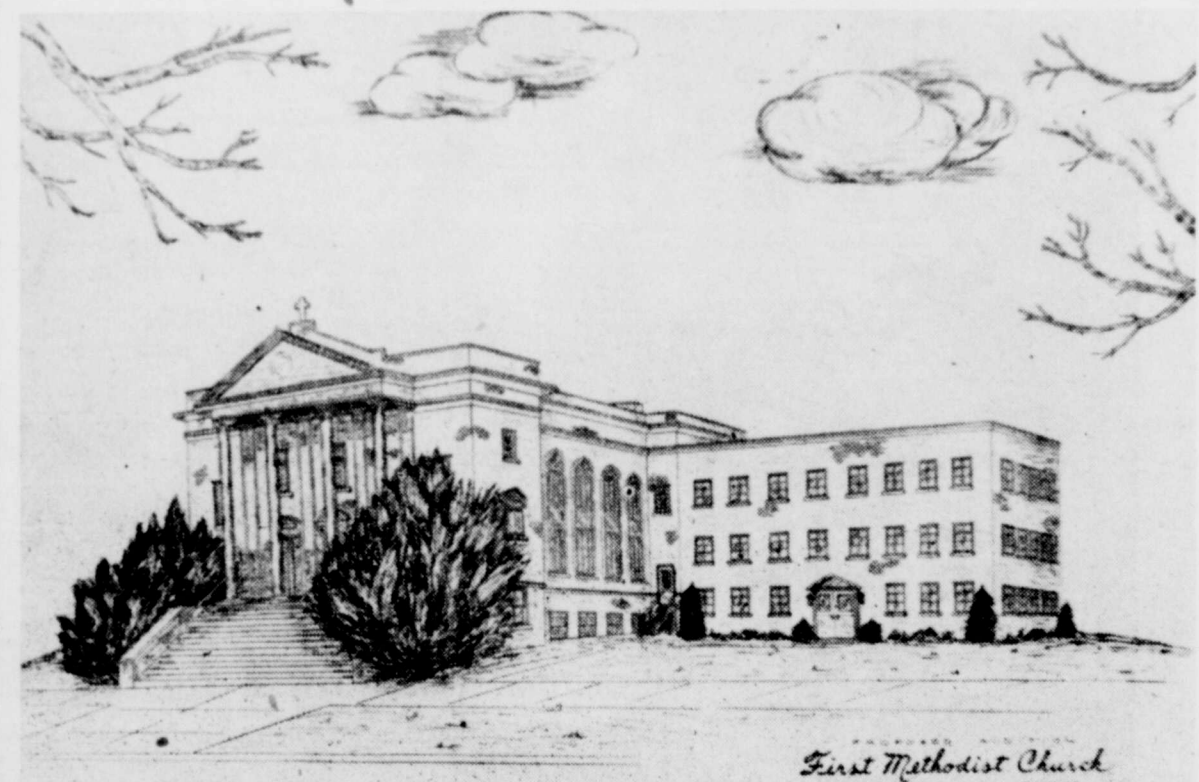

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

INDIO, Calif., News: "There is no good way for the Government to control the day-to-day affairs of a free people. Attempts to do so inevitably create greater and more menacing problems."

BOOTHBAL HARBOR, Me., Register: "Many administrative positions in government do require men who have been especially trained. But it's not true that every aspect of government should be run by experts, by the select few. Those who would have it so lack faith in the people. They would turn their backs on democratic ways and would open wide the doors to totalitarianism and dictatorship."

HILLSBORO, Ore., Argus: "There is a great deal of logic in President Eisenhower's belief that terms of office for members of the U. S. House of representatives should be for four years instead of the present two. On a four year term basis the congressmen would be in a position to do a better job because under present conditions they must devote too much of their time to campaigning and too much thought to what effect their votes on issues will have on their re-election."

Traffic Safety Paying Off

While 1954 saw a slight decrease in the nation's automobile accident toll, nearly two million casualties were recorded.

Even with the slight improvement over the more than two million reported in 1953, the results are staggering.

The Travelers Insurance Companies of Hartford, Conn., report 35,500 persons killed and 1,960,000 injured in 1954. Excessive speed was the most dangerous driving mistake in 1954. Speed killed 12,380 people and injured more than 659,000.

Weekend crashes accounted for 13,980 killed and 678,000 hurt during 1954. Thirty-nine percent of the deaths and 35 percent of the injuries occurred on Saturdays and Sundays last year.

Three out of four auto accidents happened to passenger cars driving in clear weather on dry roads, and 78 percent of vehicles involved in fatal accidents were traveling straight ahead.

These are grim statistics. The above figures point out that accidents are heavy, even though state and community authorities have spent millions of dollars in an effort to provide safer and better roads and saner driving.

Insurance companies and other private firms are spending millions for safety education. State, county, local and parkway police are constantly patrolling streets and highways. More and better engineered thruways are coming off the drawing boards. It appears to us that almost everyone is concerned with this needless slaughter and its accompanying waste of human and property values.

Almost everyone, that is, but the drivers. Traffic regulations were set up as a proper guide for the handling of traffic, and need the cooperation of all drivers. The problem starts and could ideally end with the drivers. Who are the drivers?

Each one of us knows the answer to that question. It is sincerely hoped that by continually reminding drivers of safe driving through newspaper messages, television, radio and literature that traffic accidents will be reduced in the coming years. It can be done. We are the drivers and it is up to us to see that it will be done!

ALL CARTELS ARE BAD

A staff group working for a body called the Economic Commission for Europe has produced a paper attacking the American oil companies which are operating in the Middle East. All kinds of charges are made concerning prices and profits and other important matters. The solution proposed is the establishment of government cartels.

One of the American Oil companies which pioneered Middle East development has refuted, with actual facts, these claims. In addition it observes: "When one considers the recent accomplishments of these companies which, at the request of their respective governments, reached an agreement with Iran that thwarted a possible communist coup, and when one considers also the contributions these companies make to the economic and military strength of the free world, one is perhaps justified in questioning either the motives or the wisdom of the paper's authors." On the question of cartels, it says: "A government cartel is no better, and may indeed be worse, than a private cartel. We are opposed to both. Our long business experience both at home and abroad, convince us that, given equal opportunity, a competitive business can do better for consumers than a cartelized business anytime."

This is an accurate reflection of the attitude of the American oil industry—including both the companies which have overseas interests and those which confine their operations to this country. And it is the attitude which has brought almost unbelievable progress in oil development, here and abroad alike.

Top-Of-Stove Controlled By Thermostat

Thermostatically controlled top-of-the-stove cooking is now available on a gas range.

Called the "Governess," this new gas cooking device promises to mean as much to the culinary arts as the invention of the oven thermostat in 1913.

The new feature in gas cookery is a thermostatically controlled fifth burner in the center of the top surface of the gas range. An aluminum sensing element, located in the center of the burner, measures temperature of food inside the cooking vessel and automatically keeps the temperature constant, never varying, for the period needed to cook the food.

The "Governess" operates as simply as an oven thermostat, with heat markings in infinite steps from 200 to 400 degrees to insure consistently good deep-frying, pan frying, boiling or griddle work without special separate appliances.

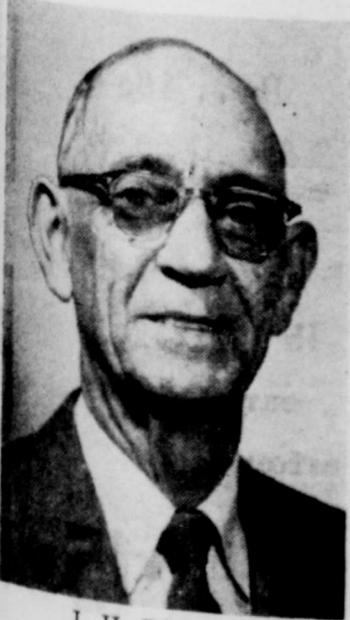

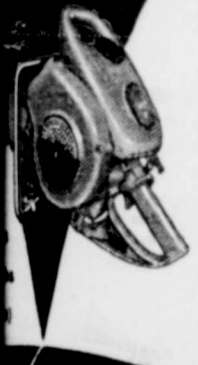

This week the Senate approved and returned to the House for final action the Treasury-Post Office Appropriation Bill, which is the first appropriation bill to have been acted on by both Houses.

So far, during this session, few bills have actually been passed by the Congress and signed by the President. In fact, as of the first of this week, there were only about twenty-two, a few of which are as follows: a bill to plug the loopholes in last year's Internal Revenue Code and to provide penalties for violations of the Narcotics Act, pay increases for career people in the Armed Services, an increase in the FHA Mortgage Insurance, an increase in the allotments of Durum Wheat, a bill dealing with G. I. educational benefits, and a resolution authorizing the President to defend Formosa.

to happen in Washington in a long time was the delivery here of several thousand pounds of onions by the growers of the Rio Grande Valley. They provided each member of Congress with a sack of onions and did an excellent job of selling Texas as well as their product here in Washington.

I know while at West Point he will carry on the fine tradition that has been established there by the Texans who have received their education there.

Kitchen Comment



POTATOES ITALIAN STYLE

If yours is a family that demands potatoes nearly every meal, probably you are always looking for different ways to serve this staple dish! Here is a new recipe for preparing the Irish potato Italian style!

- (Six Servings)
6 medium potatoes
2 tablespoons margarine
2 slices diced Canadian-style bacon OR ham
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
2 bouillon cubes
Boiling water

Scrub potatoes well. Pare off a thin strip of skin all around middle of potato. Melt margarine in skillet or saucepan with close-fitting lid. Add bacon or ham and fry gently 5 minutes, stirring several times. Add parsley, then potatoes. Dissolve bouillon cubes in 1 cup boiling water. Pour over potatoes. Add more water, just enough to cover potatoes. Cover pan tightly and simmer 1 1/2 hours, or until potatoes can be pierced easily with fork. If desired, potatoes may be baked in covered container in moderately hot oven (400° F.) 1 1/2 hours. Serve in vegetable dish with sauce, or serve sauce in separate bowl.

(Note: One No. 2 can small potatoes may be used instead of uncooked potatoes. Drain liquid from potatoes, heat and dissolve bouillon cubes in hot liquid. Reduce cooking time to 20 minutes.)

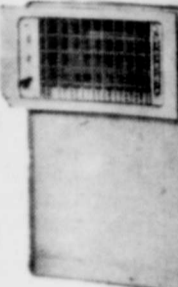

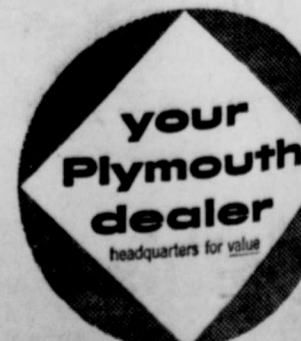

SPRING

By R. D. Laney
Just thinking that the spring, as I have known it in the past several years, is that it does not last long and is so much all with cold wintry days and high winds culminating in storms, try as you can concentrate on the spring. It cannot be said, that it literally sneaks up on you unexpectedly; you are watching for the first sign of warming and for days we have been around saying "This weather just like spring," and one day it is just like spring.

etuous of the year. It can be capricious and unpredictable. It can be a month of violent winds and severe cold. Winter's sharpness can cling persistently to these days when the discontent may seem to rise and tighten with the persistent foul weather and continued cold.

On the other hand, March sometimes brings a delightful break in winter's siege of the woods and hills. It can herald the hour when the season starts to relax its frigid grip on the slopes and streams. It can yield a milder flow of air and a warming sun. It can free the land of ice and snow. Mild days, toward the end of the month, can turn the silent brooks into song when the melting snows stream like teams of happiness down the faces of the fields. Even the robin and the bluebird have been known to issue their carols and melodies over the southland before the month has been brought to a close.

Spring, as we know it in our capricious Texas climate, is all about us. The crocuses gleam amid last fall's leaves. The scillas spread their magic blue carpet. The elm, a sharp steel etching against the leaden skies of winter, suddenly becomes a hazy mezzotint. Life is about us, but it is life revived, not life new born. All last summer, plants that had dropped their blooms in the spring spread their leaves to the sun, nourishing new

bulbs that the laboratories still cannot duplicate. The elms do not die in winter. They sleep as the bear sleeps in his den, breathing slowly, waiting for the sun.

On the warm, dry hills of Judea this season has a different quality, as it had twenty centuries ago. There the fields are green. The new life sprung from the seed, drives irresistibly upward to a sun already high above the horizon. The tiny roots of the new plants will split rock, such is their tremendous energy. Thousands of years before the first Easter there were celebrations of spring. To our skin clad ancestors in the forests of Europe it was the season at which time the sun escaped from monster that had dragged it lower and lower thru the winter. To the priests of the more sophisticated religions that tied the daily lives of their followers to the cycle of nature, it was season of birth, the holiday of the seed of fertility.

The Life that came from Death on Easter morn was something more than the life of the lilies beside the tomb. It came from a seed that had existed since the Creation. And the seed lies within all of us, tho in some it is

more stubborn than in others. In the sun of grace, it can burst into life.

The Pageant of Spring, it has been called so often that the expression has become trite, but trite expressions are apt. There the great parade proceeds to the sound of hilarious bird songs, to the colors and fragrances of all the wild blossoms, Spring goes galloping with me, vainly trying to keep up with it.

Midway thru spring, watchers of the northern sky regretfully bid farewell to a close and constant friend. For with the end of April the most majestic of all constellations, Orion the Hunter, disappears from view below the horizon. Having stridden the very heights of the frosty winter heavens, belt, sword and cudgel agleam, with the softer air of spring, he sinks from sight, not to appear again until stirred by the hunting-horn in the near bright nights of fall. With his going we can well imagine that "the bands of Orion" may have at least been loosed in "the chambers of the south" and that his mighty huntsmen has sunk his native Boeotia in Greece.

Perhaps no other phenomenon of nature has so inspired mankind with as deep and reverent

feeling for divinity as have the heavens. And what more magnificent promise has ever been given to the upright than that recorded book in the Book of Daniel: "And they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that are righteous as the stars for ever and ever."

Nearing Time to Control Mesquites

More rain is needed in the Texas mesquite country this spring for aerial applications of herbicides to give good kills of mesquite. Moisture is believed adequate in post oak and blackjack areas for a high percentage kill.

Without proper soil moisture, the use of aerial sprays may be disappointing, says B. T. Haws, county agent, adding that large kills also rest heavily upon timeliness of application. Spray mesquite when the plants are in full leaf, usually 50 to 80 days after

leaves appear in the spring, he explains.

Haws recommends use of either a low volatile ester of 2-4-5-T or silvex, at rates of one-half to two-thirds of a pound in one gallon of diesel oil and three gallons of water to an acre.

For control of post oak and blackjack, sprays of one and one-half to two pounds of 2, 4, 5-T or silvex in three gallons of water and one gallon diesel oil are recommended. Additional treatment one to two years later may be necessary to kill back sprouts.

Aerial herbicide sprays usually are the cheapest form of mesquite and oak control. But once the brush is gone the job isn't done. Haws says if the permanent benefits of brush control are to be realized, deferred graz-

ing and proper stocking of livestock is essential.

More information on the chemical control of hardwoods is obtained in bulletins L-127 revised "Chemical Control of Mesquite" and C-33C "More Grass from Controlling Hardwoods." These publications are available from the offices of the County agricultural agents.

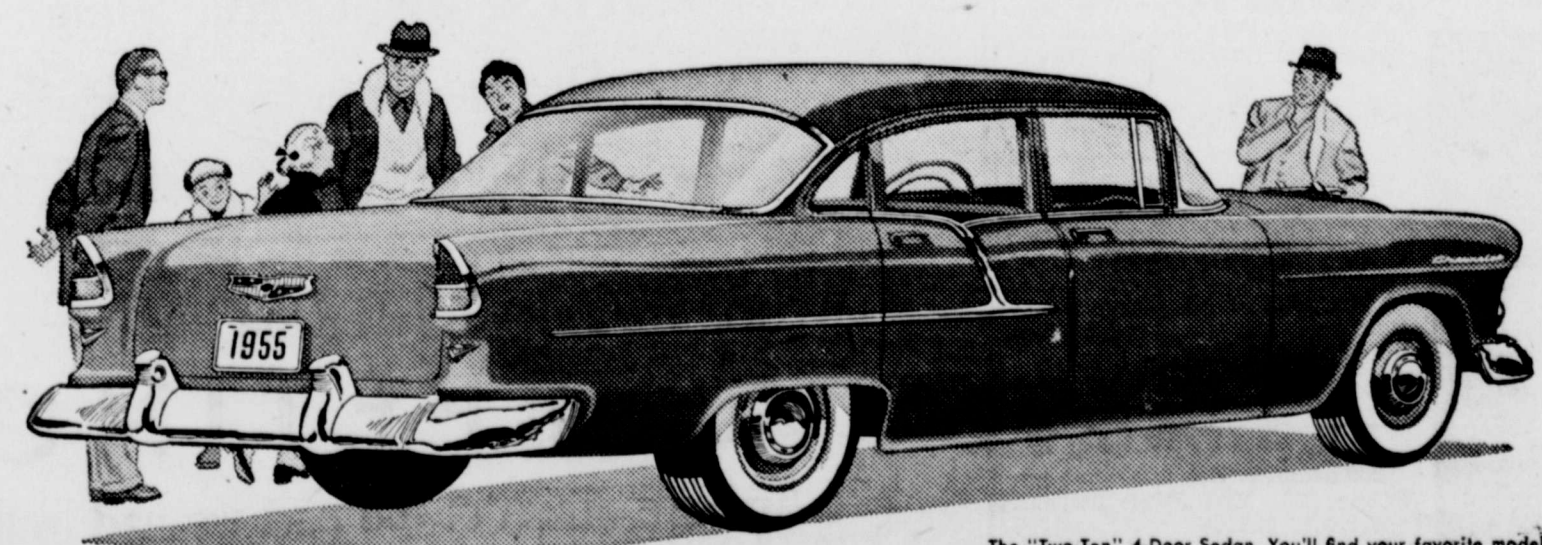
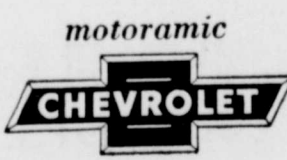
