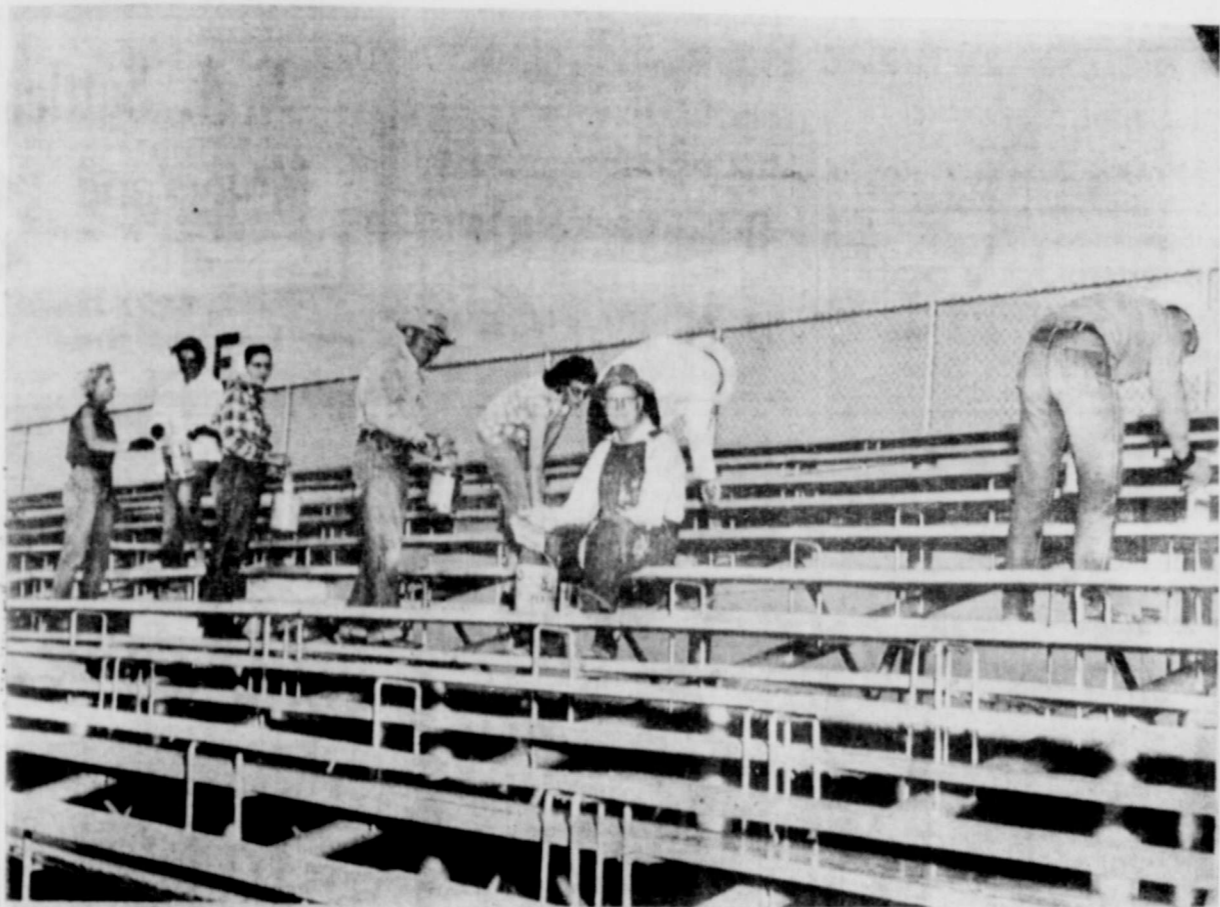

Parker Food Stores Celebrating Thirty-Eighth Anniversary This Week

Parker Food Stores in Wichita Falls and this area will kick-off a celebration this week. It'll be their 38th anniversary in Wichita Falls.

Because 38 years ago the first Parker Food Store was founded at 611 Indiana by C. H. Parker, more popularly known as Cy Parker.

It was just after the turn of the century when Parker, who was later to found the stores, came to Wichita Falls and went to work as a day laborer.

Today four of the Parker Food Stores are in Wichita Falls, with others at Burkburnett, Iowa Park, Archer City, Olney, Vernon and Bowie.

Following the establishment of his first store here, Parker set up a second store four years later at Electra and has continued enlarging and expanding.

Three of Parker's sons are associated in the stores with him now. Garnett Parker is supervisor of the stores. Jack Parker is supervisor of the produce department and Bob Parker is manager of Parker's Food, Inc., which handles distribution for the 10 Parker's Food Stores.

Another leader in the Parker executive staff is W. W. Slater, retail store supervisor. He handles markets, buys meat supervises the stores and handles most of the advertising.

Senior Employees

Truman Hufford, a Parker employee for 34 years, is manager of the Wichita Falls Wholesale Produce, another Parker enterprise behind his stores.

Six of the Parker employees have 22 years or more service with the firm. They are W. R. Colburn, office chief with the companies; W. H. Hall, manager of the Burkburnett store; Clay Simmons, manager of the Olney store; T. Clarence Newsom, manager of the Bowie store; Homer Lindsey, receiving clerk at the store at Ninth and Brook, and Mrs. Homer Lindsey, secretary in the central offices at 110 East Scott.

Nine more of the employees have more than 12 years seniority and 15 more have more than seven years service.

Parker's business policy has been a simple one, expressed in a few words, "We must sell our customers the best merchandise on the market for the least possible price."

Parker not only wanted to grow as a business, but wanted the cities in which he operated

"The Southwestern Bell Telephone Company and the Burkburnett City Council are negotiating a new rate schedule contingent on the provision of dial service for Burkburnett," J. H. Spence, manager said. In discussing this matter, Spence said he felt he could get his company to agree to withhold a slight rate adjustment until after the telephone system here had been converted to dial operation.

"About 85% of the company's telephones in Texas are dial, and in the next few years we hope to have all our exchanges with this new modern type of service," Spence said.

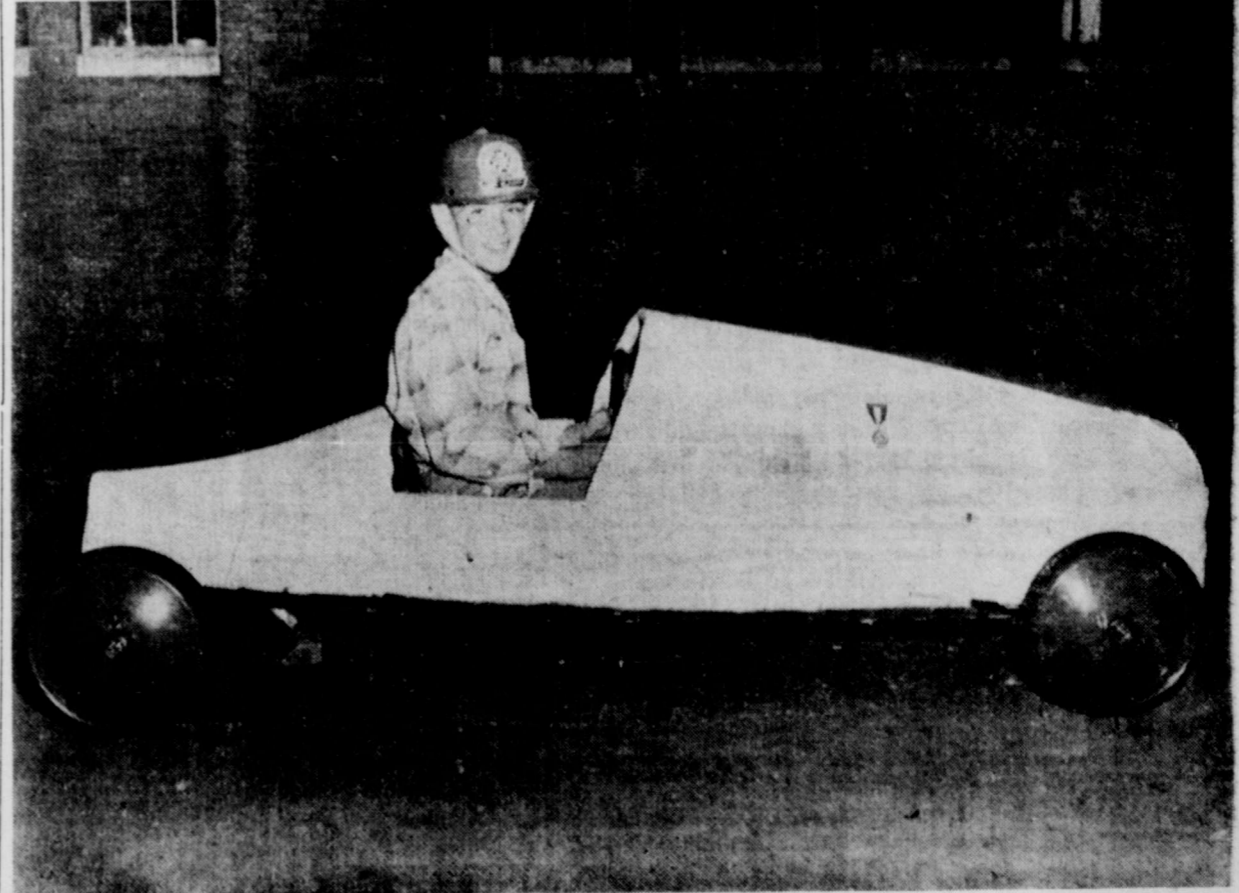

Albert can add some 80 pounds to his auto and still come within the limits permitted under the strict regulations. Each boy must build his own racer without any outside help, and he must hold his expenditures for materials down to \$22.50, which includes the cost of the wheels and axles, \$14.50. Albert is the 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Koller, Sr., 105 Avenue F, and is in the eighth grade. The Kollers came to Burkburnett in July, 1954. Mr. Koller is Field Service Representative at Sheppard Air Force Base for The Glenn L. Martin Company of Baltimore, Md., manufacturers of B-57 Aircraft.

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

HAMPTON, N. H., Union: "We firmly believe that teaching like all other professions, should be rewarded on a merit basis—a principle which has its very roots in the American way of life—To pay all teachers of a given number of years experience the same wages is not only against all truly American principles of incentive, but also tends to nurture mediocrity in the teaching profession."

PAMPA, Tex., Daily News: "We oppose every brand of socialism, whether it chooses to call itself Communism, Fascism, Fabian Socialism, or New Dealism. We oppose socialism in factories, schools, churches and in the market place. We do not believe there is any such animal as 'good political socialism,' either on a local, national or international scale. We don't believe in initiating forces for any reason, even though the cause is a 'good one.'"

INTERNATIONAL FALLS, Minn., Daily Journal: "It takes about \$12,000 invested in buildings, equipment and tools to make just one job in the average U. S. manufacturing industry. In some cases the investment is much greater—that money comes, basically from the savings of people who have invested in the hope of profits from which dividends are paid."

LONG-SHOT PROPOSITION

Most of us, in our day dreams, have thought wistfully how wonderful it would be to strike oil and see black gold come gushing out of a hole in the ground.

And it would be wonderful—but, unfortunately, even the organizations and individuals with the best in know-how and other resources find the search for oil a long-shot proposition, in which winners come in at rare intervals.

A speaker who addressed the American Association of Petroleum Geologists told part of the story. All over the country, in order to keep our oil reserves high and at the same time to meet the huge demand, a search for oil is going on in areas which formerly produced little or none of it. Only one out of every 44 attempts to find oil in previously untested territory results in a discovery of a 1,000,000 or more barrels of ultimate reserves—and 1,000,000 barrels is sufficient to supply U. S. needs for only 3.1 hours. Only one attempt in 950—about one tenth of one percent—discovers a field capable of producing 100,000,000 or more barrels. And nearly 98 percent of the holes drilled in new areas locate nothing at all or are abandoned because the deposits are too small to be profitable.

According to the spokesman, these figures represent the findings of 20 years of intensive study of oil-drilling activities. He added, "They provide overwhelming proof of the wisdom of the 27 1/2 percent depletion allowance which Congress has provided for companies engaged in searching for oil." No man will take risks unless good profits provide the dollars and the incentive to do so.

NEWS GET AROUND

Everybody eats food—everybody is interested in it. Any substantial change in the price and supply situation of a major food comes under the heading of news.

A good example of that occurred a short time ago. The American Meat Institute reported that pork prices had reached the lowest level in two years. The most popular retail pork cuts have been selling between 10 and 25 cents a pound cheaper than a year ago. Pork has been in plentiful supply since last fall and it is expected that for the next several months marketing will be well above the comparable 1954 levels.

In letters sent to retail food distributors operating more than 28,000 stores thruout the country, the Institute said: "Consumers, many of whom lost the pork-buying habit during a period of reduced supplies and relatively high prices, probably need some urgent reminders of the values existing today. It added that the meat packing industry, the National Live Stock and Meat Board, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture are working to help improve pork sales.

As said before, this is news. And newspapers in all parts of the nation, in small towns and in the biggest cities alike, have been printing articles featuring the availability of pork at highly attractive prices.

NOT ENOUGH MILLIONAIRES

Do you ever hear it argued that the way to solve the tax problem is to soak the bloated millionaires harder?

In a recent year, the Internal Revenue Service reports 171 individuals had incomes of \$1,000,000 or more. They earned a total of \$344,640,000 of which the federal government alone took \$213,564,000 in taxes. If it had taken it all, it would have amounted to less than one percent of the government's revenue that year.

Family Integration

By R. D. Laney

Writers claim that chaos in the American family is inevitable, if the integration of moral responsibility and faith are directed toward the family character. I think we can all agree that the danger is partly external, but the danger is partly internal, too. Partly, however, our family life is being pulled apart by the forces of security and the forces of risk, even at the expense of the worship of the relatively low which we hold the truth within ourselves and the difficulties.

unity. Others emphasize the inability of mothers who are too beset by conflicts and insecurity to provide the child with the love, understanding and freedom which is necessary for the development of men of integrity and good will.

There are three convictions on these important issues. The first is that our family life is part and parcel of our whole cultured life, it is as much a symptom as a cause of whatever is unhealthy about our present society. The second is that the cure for our present ills is not a return to the family life of the last century. It is not only impracticable, but undesirable, to turn back the clock. The third is that anything we propose in the way of a remedy at the present time is hardly more than a guess. We do not know enough about personality and the way it develops to have any sound basis for the action.

But we have the experience of an age preceding us when things were different, when rape was not committed in a ratio of one to three by juveniles; when burglaries were not committed in a ratio of three to five by children, when other heavy crimes were not commonly committed by our children. Now, what home and family conditions existed then that now are lacking? We must also consider, of course, the changing conditions, conditions that are present now that were not present then. But we do have this basis of general and racial and cultural experience, so that we are not quite so lost in the next step ahead as one would presume.

There is evidence to support the fact that delinquents do tend to come from homes where there is insufficient supervision. On the other hand, the danger of accepting this without recognizing another aspect is that we will supervise too strongly and too arbitrarily, because the same evidence that suggests supervision is serious also suggests that too severe punishment is serious. In order for us to give children a sense of responsibility, we first of all have to have children that

love us as parents, and we cannot produce this love by being uniformly disciplinarians, altho to be sure, we have to have disciplining when the occasion arises.

The home has been pushing over increasingly, to the school, and in measure to the church, the responsibility that rested with the family of a generation ago. Some of this may be inevitable in view of the shifting of our whole economic and social order. It is, however, a trend against which the family should contend, and attempt to do for the child all that is possible in these areas of informal education, character education that the family can do, rather than easily surrender to outside agencies these important functions of training for their children.

The senior campers live in covered wagons at Camp Letoli. Junior high girls go as junior campers. The junior campers live in tents. You swim, ride horseback, camp out and learn handicraft at Camp. You also learn to get along with other girls. A session at Camp is invaluable in the experience of learning to like other people and getting them to like you.

There is also a Counselor-in-Training course at Camp Letoli. A certain number of girls are selected to go to camp under the CIT program. Ten girls have been selected this year and four of these girls are junior students at Burk High School. They are Pat Bernethy, Dana Riddle, Wanda Redman and Marilyn Felty. The CIT program is a two year course in which the girls learn to be counselors. After two years of the CIT training, they can go to camp as Counselors. You have to be 16 years of age to apply for the CIT course.

Plans are now underway for a day camp for Camp Fire and Blue Bird girls. It is to be at Harrell Park in Wichita Falls from June 5th thru June 8th. It is to be from 8:30 in the morning till 2 o'clock in the afternoon and transportation will be provided for the girls to and from the day camp. So if you would like to go to camp but can't possibly get away for a week, then take advantage of the day camp.
