GRASS ROOTS OPINION

"OIL, BULLETS and BEANS"

Ever since the oil industry was in swaddling clothes, crapehangers have been shaking their heads and forecasting that demand was due to outrun the supply in practically no time.

That was the talk way back in 1900, when a mere 8,000 horseless carriages were put-putting over the roads. Then the Spindletop well came in, the greatest in history up to then, and for a time the merchants of gloom were silent.

But by 1905, there were 77,000 odd cars in motion and other consumers of oil were in the increase. Again the shortage talk was rampant. The oilmen's answer was to bring in more and more producing fields.

The skeptics really had a field day during World War I. A US Bureau of Mines official forecast that our oil reserves would be totally gone within 27 years. What Happened? As before, the oilmen met words with deeds. In the last year of that war, we had both the highest production and the greatest proved reserves ever known up to that time.

So it went, with the shortage fear reaching another high during World War II—a war which, in the vivid phrase of Admiral Nimitz, was won on "Oil, Bullets and beans." Every demand was met, despite difficulties resulting from material and manpower shortages. After the war, consumption of oil reached levels far beyond the anticipations of anyone. Since 1945, U. S. oil requirements have jumped by more than 50 percent. Yet reserves have hit all-time high after all-time high.

If past experience is of any value at all the crapehangers should have learned a lesson by this time.

HEARD HIM THE FIRST TIME

Soviet Premier Bulganin's double-take on President Eisenhower's "summit" proposal for military "blue print" swapping and free aerial reconnaissance is one for the book—the history book.

Perhaps the history book will reveal who told Bulganin, after he had rejected the Eisenhower offer in his August fourth speech to the Supreme Soviet of the USSR, that he had put his foot in his mouth. But we need no crystal ball to foresee the futility of his speech of the very next day in which he told the very same body that he had been misunderstood. He did not either, he said, reject the Eisenhower disarmament suggestion. The Soviet government, he assured them, was studying the matter very seriously and would continue to study any ideas the President might have.

This is what is known in US legislative circles as "tabling" the measure, which is much more polite than just saying "nuts." But what the Premier said first is what will be remembered; and "study" of the President's idea is not likely to make it any more appealing to the Kremlin gang to whom concealment is an instinctive and natural law.

In his first speech, Bulganin observed that the Eisenhower idea was impractical because much of the nation's military activity, facilities and defense plants can be hidden. There is some truth in this. But undoubtedly the Premier's real concern was for the things that can't be hidden, except behind tightly closed borders, such things as misery and degradation, hunger and poverty, a whole civilization in the chains of slavery and terror.

President Eisenhower called for a show-down, and got it. Russia's "new look" turns out to be a phony as the false front, stage scenery villages that Potemkin built along the banks of the Volga for the inspection, at a safe distance, of Catherine the Great in her royal barge.

This is the real and only significance of the "summit" meeting.

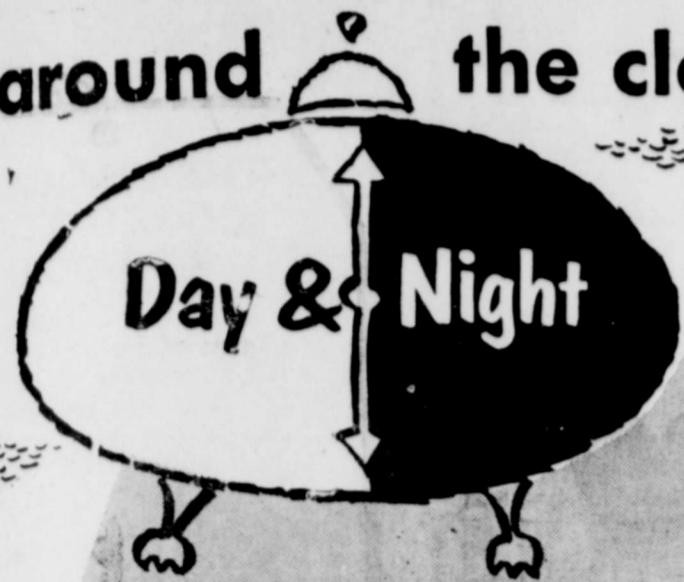

"The reason," explains the magazine, "is the introduction of a roofing application method that for the first time permits desirable, colorful roofing material to be used on a house of this style."

"Before this development, a house with a roof that sloped between 2 and 4 inches to each horizontal foot was in a roofer's non-man's land. Application methods which were technically suitable had been adapted from the flat roof used on industrial and commercial structures, and generally were unattractive."

"The range of colors was particularly limited. This was in contrast to the wide variety of solid and blended colors of asphalt shingles used on homes with more steeply pitched roofs."

"The new application method results in a watertight roof and is the most economical of several possibilities considered by the technical research staff in charge of the work. Panels of asphalt shingles applied according to the specifications passed 'violent and rigorous' tests in a specially designed storm machine."

From Your STATE CAPITOL

By VERN STANFORD Texas Press Association

Whether a special session of the legislature is called on school integration apparently hinges on a Texas Supreme Court decision still to come.

Filed by the anti-integration Texas citizens council in a district court at Big Springs, the suit seeks to bar payment of state funds to bi-racial schools.

Atty. Gen., John Ben Shepperd says the court decision holds the key to whether Texas laws must be changed immediately or already integrated schools must back-track. Decision by the district court can be carried directly to the Supreme Court and possibly be settled by the time school starts.

Should the court hold payment to integrated schools can be made under existing laws, there apparently would be no urgent need to change them, at least in that regard.

Shepperd said he welcomed the Big Spring suit since it promises to clear up the difficult legal situation.

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BURKBURNETT, TEXAS

Gov. Allan Shivers says he will call a special session if necessary. He apparently was awaiting three developments:

He asked his newly formed citizens' advisory council on school integration to investigate and report to him on several questions, including the need of special session.

He asked Shepperd to prepare an official ruling on legal questions.

And the decision in the Big Spring Court case may set up conditions to determine need of session.

In July the Board of Education voted to continue regular payments to local districts, whether segregated or not. It left racial policy up to local officials.

Since then, some 30 districts have announced whole or partial desegregation plans. A university of Texas student committee also has taken on the segregation problem with a poll of student opinion on acceptance of Negro students outside the classroom. Graduate courses have been open to Negroes since 1950. Regent have ordered full desegregation in Sept. 1956.

KKK Talk Challenged
Attorney General Shepperd's claim that efforts are underway in Texas to revive the Ku Klux Klan brought a challenge last week.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips called on Shepperd to name names, but Shepperd declined. Names will be given prosecutors and grand juries when sufficient evidence is gathered for conviction, Shepperd said.

State Senator Killed
Death of State Senator Wayne W. Wagonseller of Bowie cost Texas liberals one of their leaders.

Wagonseller, killed in a three-

car collision in Ft. Worth, was buried last week in the State Cemetery at Austin with full military honors. Services were held earlier in the Senate chambers.

A World War II veteran, he served two terms in the House before beginning his Senate career in 1951. Friends in Tyler recently had boomed him as a candidate for attorney general. He had been associated with Loyalist Democrats and had supported Ralph Yarborough in the latter's two unsuccessful races for governor.

Giles Pleads Guilty

One of the biggest news breaks of last week was Bascom Giles' plea of guilty in criminal court at San Antonio to two charges in connection with a Bexar County block land deal.

Giles' guilty plea concerned charges of consenting to accept a \$30,000 bribe. He pleaded not guilty to a third count, of accepting the bribe. The state waived this charge and Judge Buck Jones imposed a six-year prison sentence. It is to run concurrently with a three year sentence given Giles earlier at Austin on a charge of theft of \$6,800 from the veterans' Land fund.

Giles has appealed the case, which affords at least 90 days' delay in final disposition of the sentence.

Awaiting trial in San Antonio were Arthur McKenzie and C. V. Wynn, San Antonio land operators, indicted for offering the \$30,000 bribe to Giles.

Other suits now pending against the former land commissioner are a civil suit at San Antonio, seeking of recovery of \$35,000 and nine additional charges in Austin, no other transactions. He also faces trial in Zavala County on another land case.

Stevenson Reply Awaited
Adlai Stevenson is slated to speak in Austin on Sept. 28. At that time he may reply to Gov. Allan Shiver's repeated refusal to support him for president.

During the national governor's conference in Chicago, Shivers said he would again, as in 1952 refuse to support Stevenson if he were Democratic candidate for president.

Stevenson withheld comment "until I am in Texas." Shivers, he pointed out, was a "guest in Illinois."

Stevenson's Austin appearance was arranged by the University of Texas great issues committee. It is billed as "non-political."

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Woman of the Year



Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby of Houston, who served as the nation's first secretary of Health, Education and Welfare in the President's Cabinet, will receive the State Fair of Texas' first "Woman of the Year" award Oct. 19, Women's Day at the 1955 Fair. The award will be presented annually in recognition of constructive achievement of national importance.

Subjects of his talk will be "America, the Economic Colossus."

Too Much Money
Overpayment of drivers license fees has created a problem for the Department of Public Safety. DPS staffers remind the public that increased charges voted by the 1955 Legislature do not go into effect until Sept. 6th. At that time charges will jump from \$1 to \$2 for an operator's license, \$2 to \$3 for commercial licenses, \$3 to \$4 for chauffeurs. Meantime, the lower rates apply and the department has quite a task returning excess money.

"It's a sign of good judgment to know and obey the Signs of Life!"

Mr. E. C. McFadden of Dallas, Vice president of Employers' Casualty Company and President of the Texas Safety Association, Inc., made that remark today in discussing the current Signs of Life program the Texas Safety Association and the Department of Public Safety is sponsoring in cooperation with the National Safety Council.

"Signs of Life are the traffic signs and signals erected for the protection of motorists and pedestrians," Mr. McFadden explained. "It's their job to warn of conditions ahead, and drivers who don't heed their warnings are likely to run into trouble."

"The traffic trouble caused by such heedlessness is indicated," Mr. McFadden said, "by the fact that more than half the drivers involved in fatal traffic accidents are violating one or more traffic laws at the time of the accident. Violations most frequently committed are:

1. Exceeding speed limit.
 2. Failure to keep right of center line.
 3. Improper passing.
 4. Disregarding warning sign.
 5. Disregarding stop sign.
 6. Disregarding signal or officer.
- "On the matter of speed," Mr. McFadden said, "driving too fast for conditions often causes drivers to miss traffic signs or signals or to be unable to slow down in time if they do see them. "Whenever you drive," he said "remember that it's dangerous to be a Hurry Bug. Slow down and live!"

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Veterans Administration Questions & Answers

Q—I have made arrangements for my GI insurance payments to be paid to my beneficiary in a lump sum. In case she doesn't want a lump sum, does she have the right to change the method of payment?

A—Yes. Under your lump sum designation, your beneficiary may elect to receive GI insurance payments under any of the installment plans available.

Q—I am taking a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill. What does VA consider as the official beginning and ending dates of my course?

A—The beginning date is the date the school supplies you with your first lesson. The ending date is the date the school services your final lesson.

Q—I am receiving disability compensation payments, and according to a statement by my physician, my condition has become worse. Would that statement alone qualify me for increased payments?

A—The evidence provided by your physician must be verified by an official VA physical examination. If VA finds that your condition has become worse, the compensation increase may be made effective as of the date VA received the evidence from your physician.

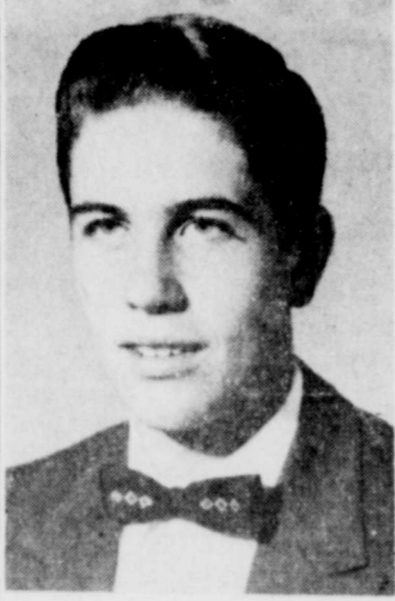

crowds that besieged the court-
house in which the trial was be-
ing held.
The late Star Reporter, Irvin S.
Cobb, who covered the famous
trial, wrote as follows, "White,
cold and outwardly calm in her
little plain, blue frock, her white
turned down collar, her big
school boy tie, her black velvet
hat, she slipped into the big oak
chair like a tired child. Her
hands dropped into her lap.
There was something pitifully
small and weak about the girl
sitting there ready to crucify
for the sake of her husband."
The historic trial of Harry
Thaw for the murder of Stan-
ford White lasted several weeks.
He was vigorously prosecuted by
District Attorney, William Traver-
ers Jerome, Jerome, Brilliant and
eloquent was a cousin of Prime
Minister Winston Churchill of
England, and was destined to be-
come a big figure on the political
scene, but he never realized this
ambition, and died in 1934.
During the momentous trial,
Evelyn told for all the world to
hear, the story she tearfully
whispered to her husband before
they were married. She testified
that she arrived in New York

from Pittsburg with her mother
and a younger brother, while she
was only 15 years old and her
mother was sure that she, Evelyn
could support the family by
modeling or appearing on the
stage.

She told how she met the 50-
year old Stanford White, Famous
architect, Wealthy man about
town. She described her many
visits to his gilded studio, where
he dressed her in gorgeous ki-
monas, had her photographed on
a white polar bear rug and feast-
ed his eyes on her youthful
charms while he pushed her
back and forth in a red velvet
swing. And finally, she told the
world how Stanford White had
lured her to his mirrored bed-
room, persuaded her to drink
champaign, which later turned
out to be drugged.

Evelyn's story, which had driv-
en her eccentric and wealthy hus-
band to commit murder undoubt-
edly saved him from the electric
chair. The jury acquitted him be-
cause they believed he was insane
at the time he committed the
crime. Harry Thaw died at the
age of 76, after serving a num-
ber of years in hospitals for his
insane.
