Bulldogs Defeat Bowie Eleven 20 to 0 In Opening Football Game of Season

In the opening football game of the season here last Friday night, Burkburnett defeated the Bowie eleven 20 to 0. The Burk delegation was led on the offense by Quarterback Jerry Hodges. Showing up on the defense were Lowell Walkup and Billy Turnbow.

Early in the first quarter Burk scored on a pass play which covered 44 yards. The pass was from Jerry Hodges to End Otis Waddell. Louis McDonald kicked the extra point.

The second score was set up when Burk intercepted a Bowie pass on the 3 yard line. Charles Boyd picked up 59 yards on two tries. Short gains, adding to first downs, placed the ball on the two yard line. Boyd went over for the score. McDonald missed the extra point try.

Billy Ray Mize, playing at one of the halfback positions, scored the third and final touchdown. This time McDonald's kick was true, bringing the score to 20-0. Bowie threatened to score two times. Once they reached the 7 yard line and another time they went all the way to the 3, but lacked the scoring punch.

The game was marked by the lack of penalties. Burk received three for five yards each, one for offside and two for backfield in motion. Bowie was penalized one time for five yards, an offside penalty.

Bowie led in first downs 14 to 11. Burk had one pass intercepted, while completing three out of 7 for a total of 58 yards.

Bowie tried 17 passes; had one intercepted, and completed 6 for a total of 62 yards.

This Friday night the Bulldogs go to Holliday.

Local Church Lay Leaders Praised

GRASS ROOTS OPINION

SWANVILLE, Minn., News: "The measure of a man's living standard is how much he can buy with the proceeds of his labor. Taking the wages per hour of the average worker in three countries and equating them to the cost of things they buy, it is estimated that the free American can buy a suit of clothes for 15 hours work, while a Socialist-inclined Englishman works one and one-third weeks for a suit, and a Communist-controlled Russian three weeks."

AUXVASSE, Mo., Review: "According to a recent survey, the average service station is open and at your service 100 hours every week and seven days a week. When customers were asked their reasons for patronizing a particular station, the replies were: good service, location, friendship, with the dealer, and the brand of gasoline sold. Over 200,000 service stations in the United States compete for your business and 95 percent of them are owned or operated by independent local dealers."

MANSFIELD, Ohio, News-Journal: "In the long run American prosperity, not Marxist ideology and stagnation, will be the leaven that promotes world amity. Communist leaders fear this probability as they fear nothing else."

IF LADY LUCK SMILES

"Wish I had an oil well" is a thought that millions of us have had at one time or another. For an oil well has become a symbol of wealth on the big-league level.

It's true, or course, that vast fortunes have come out of the ground in the form of oil. But the hazards involved are mighty impressive.

If, for instance, you were going to dig a 10,000-foot well you'd need a rig costing \$300,000, along with all kinds of other expensive materials and tools. You'd have to employ 20 or 30 skilled workers on a full time basis, and around 100 more on a part time basis. And the cost of sinking that well would run between \$250,000 to \$1,000,000, depending on drilling conditions. Much shallower wells are high priced too, the average bill for drilling an exploratory well in a recent year was over \$100,000.

Once the money is spent, what are your chances of making a rich strike?

They aren't nearly as good as most of us probably believe. About one third of all wells turn out dry. In new field wildcat drilling, only about one well in nine is a producer. And many wells which hit oil produce negligible amounts.

Yet, despite these odds, men are spending freely of money and effort in the endless search for oil. They are doing it because the dream of the great strike is always there—whether it is destined to remain a dream or become an actuality. That can happen only under a system where a man can reap some of the fruit if fickle Lady Luck smiles on him.

WE'LL NEED IT MORE — NOT LESS

The Russians, who object to our requirement of finger prints on applications for visas to the US, says they are anxious for large scale tourist exchange with us, and are ready to permit "tens of thousands" of their citizens to travel in this country.

Secretary of State Dulles says he will talk about finger prints at Geneva when the foreign minister meet, and may recommend that Congress make some changes in our laws if finger printing remains a travel barrier.

If we are facing the influx of hordes of Communist visitors, some of whom might get lost in our great country, positive identification would seem to become both more difficult and more desirable. And, if it would soothe the Russian sensibilities, why not change our laws to require that travellers from the US be fingerprinted too?

STICKS TO THE RIBS

Molasses, we always thought, is a fine thing to put on pancakes and waffles and hot biscuits, and for making gingerbread. But our education seems to have been sort of neglected since we now learn it's good for 123 other dressing, chop suey and veal goulash as well as a slew of cakes, pies, cookies and drinkables.

It is also good for what ails you, it seems since it has almost as much available iron (that the body can actually use) as beef liver, and more than any other food, twice as much as whole wheat, three times as much as beefsteak and ten times as much as spinach. And considering the number of ways you can have your molasses compared with the fact that you can have liver, or liver and onions or liver and bacon, that old New Orleans plasma ought to iron you up approximately 41 times as much as the beef viscera.

And just in case you may be wondering how we got so smarted-up on this subject, it wasn't any little bird that told us. We got it straight from Brer Rabbit.

Revealed By Star Files 12 Years Ago...

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



Get The Cotton Then Destroy The Old Stalks

Boll weevils and pink bollworms, insect dollar grabbers of the cotton fields, are plentiful in most areas of Texas. The showery weather reduced the effectiveness of control measures and enabled the insects to increase to record numbers.

To stop a further increase, extension Entomologist F. M. Fuller says farmers should destroy all cotton stalks immediately after the harvesting job is completed. He recommends a shredder type stalk cutter be used and then followed with a plowing job that will get all plant material covered. A deepbig objective is to destroy the insects' food supply and thus force them into winter hibernation in a weakened condition. This will mean fewer survivals

and a lower emergence rate next spring.

Besides being the most economical control method, early stalk destruction also gets the soil in top condition for planting a winter legume crop and improves its water holding capacity.

Fuller says to be most effective, the stalk destruction program should be carried out on a county or area-wide basis. The larger the area the better, he adds. The biggest returns come when the stalks are destroyed just as far ahead of frost as is possible. But the practice is worthwhile, he explains, even if delayed until only a few days before frost.

He says reports from the southern part of the State indicate that counties in that area have met their deadline dates for having all cotton stalks destroyed and urges cotton producers in the other areas to do the job just as soon as the harvest is completed.





What Price Peace?

By R. D. Laney

Crucial problem that now every country is becoming involved in is to become involved in war. There are indications that a good many people of this world are getting fed up on this so it is good news. The preaching will not be against war as this idealistic, inglorious inclination to believe in "peace" claims of military nations, to be bled white and to be hooped for wars which accomplish whose devastation and whose devastation crushed countries is invariably for the victors.

as an air base for NATO forces and on her own account. On the other hand, it is important that the revolt against war if it is to accomplish anything of permanent and social value, be headed up by those champions, those preachers, those teachers and manifest the nature of peace and its relation to social progress. There has been in the past too much extolling of peace as an end in itself, the all-desirable beyond which, nothing. Far from being an end, peace is a mere first step. It is, however, a step that has to be taken. Peace is not merely the basic material condition. It is the basic psychological condition of human development. Wars, the threat of war, the personal conviction that war is a certainty, produce a defeatist psychology which paralyzes human endeavor. But in recent weeks a change of mood seems to have overtaken our world today, a change so sudden and so unusual that even the most optimistic and pessimistic among us find it difficult to explain. We seem to have come a long way from the anxious days of the Berlin lift, the disastrous war in Korea, the tense situation in Indochina and the explosive

atmosphere in the Straights of Formosa. And in evidence as to a changed attitude of the Soviet is the mysterious expunged from speeches; are such terms as war mongers and "enemies of peace." There's a marked absence of such phrases which are now eliminated and an atmosphere of cordiality is now being used instead. In looking back at development over the past six months and looking ahead at the likely developments over the next year or two it does appear that the danger of war are less than at any time in the last seven or eight years, and certainly less than they were between 1936 and the outbreak of the second World War. Under no circumstances will the western powers start a war. In other words, that war can only come thru communist provocation or aggression. It is not believed that Moscow's dropped any single one of her ultimate objectives, and in particular she hasn't lost her ambition to see the triumph of communism thruout the world, she has it is believed, accepted the fact that she can't expect to gain her objective thru war. The existing development of nuclear weapons and the almost certain development in the near future

of even more destructive force have persuaded the Russians that war today can serve nobody's interest and would destroy both sides indulging in such a war. One doesn't need to go over and list the various steps that have been taken by the Russians in the last six months, which seem to most people to indicate a more genuine desire for peace and there are the obvious ones like their readiness after many years to conclude the Austrian State Treaty. There was their meeting with Tito in Belgrade where they have rather eaten humble pie and there is the new Soviet Disarmament proposal. Those are three which come to mind immediately but more important, is the new atmosphere and being friendly atmosphere undoubtedly can aid in the search for settlements which the Geneva conference created. It is believed that the western powers perhaps came away from Geneva conference a little more convinced that the Russians, however wrongly, were afraid or had been afraid of a preventive war launched by the United States, that they were genuinely afraid of the possibilities of a resurgent rearmad Germany attacking them

If both sides can understand the other side's point of view clearly, an atmosphere will be built up from which settlements will ultimately, and it may be a long time, emerge. But some way must be found to secure peace. The hopeful ray in an otherwise black picture, a ray growing brighter all the time is that when the mass of people get tired enough of war they will demand that way to peace, a practical way that will work, will be found.
