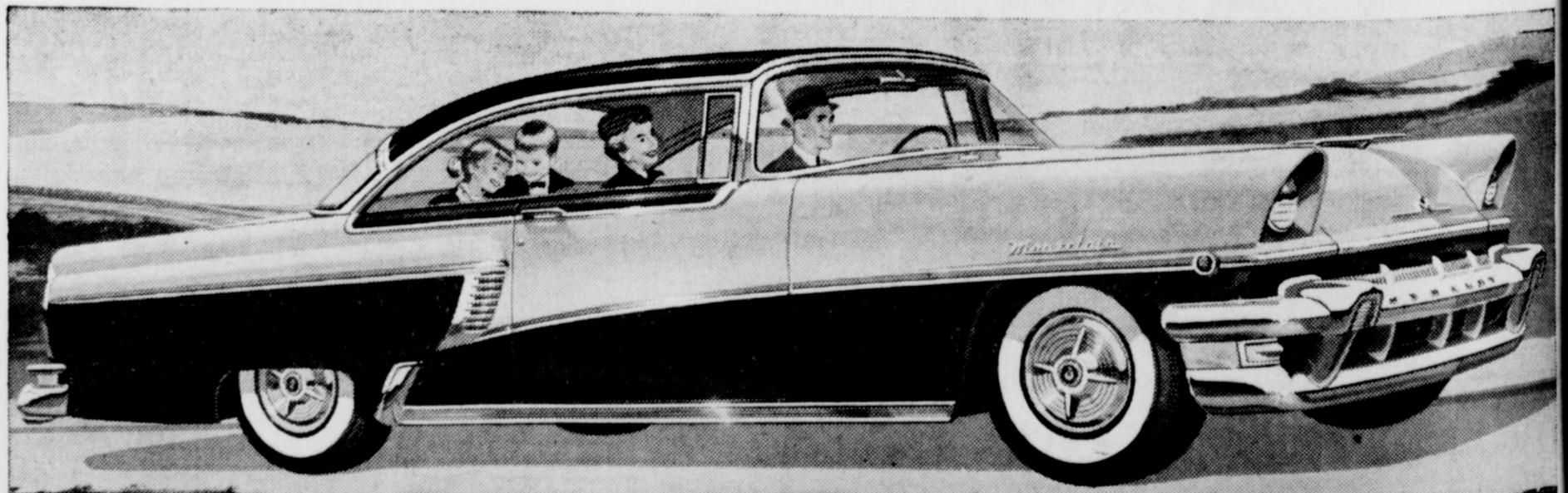

Information On Social Security

Farmers in Wichita County were reminded today by Erton Tate, Manager of the Wichita Falls District Office of the Social Security Administration that they should keep some type of record to show the amount of their earnings from the sale of farm products during 1955 and future years. This record will be needed to enable them to report their earnings for social security purposes.

"The time to start maintaining record of farm products sold was Jan. 1, 1955. If this record has not been kept, the time to start is now," Tate asserted.

For a self-employed farmer to become eligible for old-age and survivors insurance benefits, he must receive credit on his social security account for his income. And with just a simple journal to record his sales, etc., he can maintain a basic record which will make it possible to accurately report his annual self-employment income to the Director of Internal Revenue each year.

This report is filed as a part of his Federal income tax return. He pays a social security tax of 3 percent of his net income of \$400 up to \$4200 in the taxable year. Payment of the social security tax is required by law even though no Federal income tax is due. Tate points out that if the farmer fails to keep records and fails to make proper reports of his earnings, he stands to lose valuable insurance protection for himself in his own old age and for his family if he should die at any age. Farmers who desire information on new law should write to the Social Security Administration, 425 Post Office Bldg Wichita Falls, Texas for Booklet No. OASI-25d.

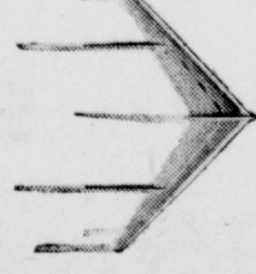

Texas Farm Bureau News

The plan was originally referred to as the "Hammond Plan" because it was conceived and promoted for many years by J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau. The state farm organization adopted the plan as its recommendation for a farm program in 1949 and has carried the idea to the AFBF convention each year since then. Last year was the first time that the parent national organization gave its approval to the plan.

Action of the AFBF in recommending the plan for study is aimed at getting the thinking of farmers and ranchers in all parts of the country so that consideration may be given to the plan at the 1955 AFBF convention in December in Chicago. The soil fertility bank idea is also likely to become one of the main issues at the Texas Farm Bureau convention which will be held Nov. 7-9 in Ft. Worth.

Hammond, president of the TFB for the past 16 years, began working on his plan back in

the depression days of the 1930's when farm surpluses almost ruined the agricultural industry. When World War II came along the idea was dropped because of the all out efforts to produce food and fiber for war needs. Surpluses were beginning to pile up again in 1949 when the TFB adopted the plan. However the Korean conflict alleviated any need for controlling production. By 1953 the problem of unmanageable surpluses was again plaguing the industry.

The original idea behind the soil fertility bank was to retire the percentage of acres that were causing surpluses and govern production through a system of variable price supports. Under the plan, the Secretary of Agriculture would determine the percentage of overproduction of all farm commodities. Then each farmer would be required to take out of production that percentage of his tilled acres. According to Hammond, this would average about 10 percent over a period of years.

Hammond charges that the present system of acreage controls discriminates against the South as it forces cotton, wheat, peanut, and rice farmers to bear the brunt of production controls.

-YOUR FARM BUREAU-
BY MARYE ECKELKAMP

Has your milk bill gone up recently? In most cases it has, and some three cents a quart. For the benefit of the milk consumers, I want you to know the producer milking the cows didn't get that increase.

Milk in bulk is sold by the 100 pound weight on a 4 percent butterfat content basis. The processors are now paying approximately \$5.25 per hundred with a 4 percent butterfat content. In our lingo, that means cream. In contrast with a 4 percent butterfat figure \$11.00 per hundred based on the state law of 3.2 percent butterfat. Figure it yourself, it takes 48 quarts of milk per hundred at 23 cents a quart. It might even surprise you to find out that a lot of the milk sold probably won't even test 3 percent content. Or, if, if you want it another way, the producer is selling for 11 cents a quart richer milk to the processor than you the consumers are getting at 23 cents a quart. This does not apply to Grade A Raw milk local dairies with retail routes.

When the milk price went up, the processor got an increase of \$1.44 per hundred, the dairymen got an increase of 25 cents. Besides that, you can find a big milk truck from Wisconsin at one of the larger plants almost

anytime. I have seen them myself.

Most of our city neighbors do not realize the full situation concerning the production of milk in this area. Although your milk price has stayed about the same the last ten years, the price paid the farmer has dropped as much as \$1.50 a hundred weight. You the consumer have never been given the decreased price in comparison.

To further stress what is happening in the milk industry in Wichita County, dairy after dairy have sold out the last few months. For instance, from Iowa Park the Parish Dairy, Stanley and Carl Williamson, Carroll Anderson, Ray Williams, Lehman and Lehman J. D. Chastain and Elgin Denny have either sold out or are selling; from Electra, H. J. Flusche Estate and John Lee have sold out; from Burkburnett, Morgan and Gragg sold out two months ago. Why?

Production times a low minus high costs of operation means a losing battle. Besides that for no more net income than it brings the dairy business is the most confining work on a farm. Bossy is usually milked around 4:30 a. m. and again around 3:30 p.

m. Oh yes, 365 days a year, including the Fourth of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas. Bossy doesn't believe in Holidays.

This is written as an effort to give our city neighbors a clearer picture of what the farmers are getting as their share of your milk bill.

This writer had just about given up as hopeless all efforts to inform friends and enemies of what the score really is concerning the farms and ranches and the folks that live on them and own them. But maybe it's not. Maybe somewhere, someone will read this and understand what I am trying to say.

I guess that everyone gets disgusted, aggravated and just plain mad at some time or another. Well, I've gone beyond the disgust and aggravation stage. I am just plain mad.

The Republicans and Democrats plan to play football again in 1956. Why? The farmers bless their hearts are the only segment of our economy that isn't blessed with so called prosperity. So the big politicians are going to shake our hands, pat us on the head and say "poor farmers, let us help you get your prosperity."

Well, I am tired of being the pigskin being shuffled around for votes. I am tired of hearing about a surplus that includes a pile of rotted wheat, oats, butter, cheese and anything else in storage that won't make decent rat bait. I am tired of cutting acreage allotments every year until you can not even find a cash crop to plant anymore. I am tired of hearing Dallas and Ft. Worth claim that they are entitled to all of the water that falls in West Texas and that the farmers should pay water taxes on all that they use.

I am tired of listening to politicians tell farmers how to find salvation that never sweated out a hail storm or saw his cotton drown in water. I am tired of Labor Unions wooing agriculture when they still believe in "Short Hours, High Wages and Cheap Food." I am tired of tariffs that have crippled exports in this country. But most of all I am tired of a patched up crazy quilt Farm Program that needs more than a face lifting.

I am tired of listening to the wrangling among the farm people themselves that can't make up their minds to get together and fight together. We can't even decide if we want to keep our independent birthright or let Washington have it. As long as

we won't fight our own battles, we will still be in the mess that we are in right now. No one can solve our problems, but us the people that live on and work on the farms.

I am tired of a lot of things, but I still have faith that some how, some way we will wake up and demand a farm program we can live under.

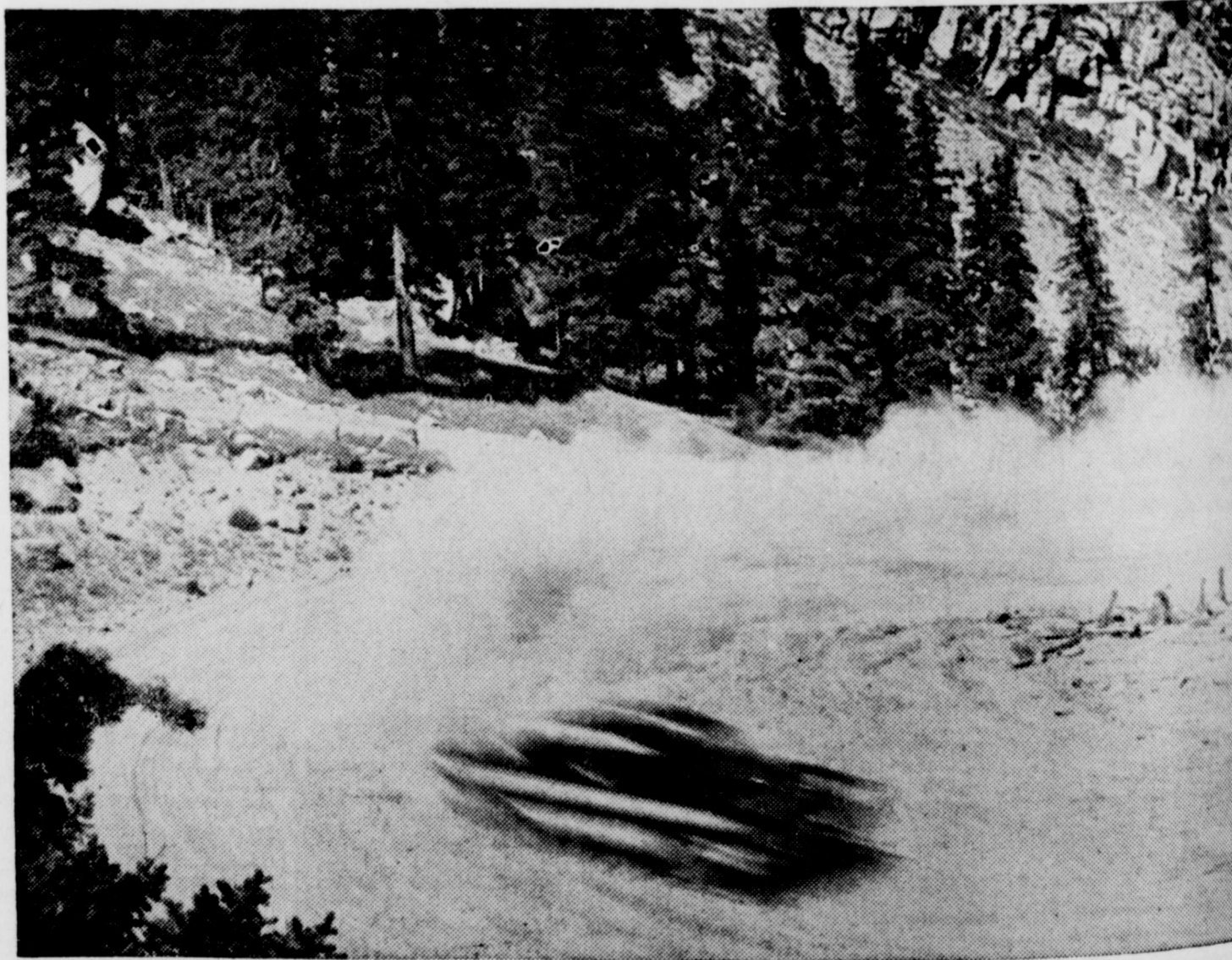

Story of TVA

But I am getting a little fed up with the methods that are being used to expand the advantages of the Tennessee Valley at the expense of the rest of the country, including the taxpayers of the Second Congressional District of Indiana, in whose welfare I have a special interest.

We have heard a lot of irresponsible talk about the Dixon-Yates contract including shameful attempts to cast reflections on the integrity of the President of the United States in connection with this program to build a \$100 million powerplant with private instead of public funds.

The President has now ordered the contract canceled for the good and simple reason that the city of Memphis has agreed to build the needed plant itself. Had such assurances been given earlier, there would have been no necessity for the Dixon-Yates arrangement, and contract termination expenses, whatever they may be, would have been spared the Federal Government.

Meanwhile, however, a desperate attempt is being made by public-power advocates, an attempt generated, if I may use that term, by extreme TVA partisans, to create the impression that there was something dishonorable about the Government's dealings with the Dixon-Yates deal.

The purpose of these efforts is to create, if possible, a political issue by discrediting President Eisenhower and the Republican administration.

The attempt is doomed to failure. The Dixon-Yates contract was a good one, honestly arrived at, which would have benefited the Government, the people of the Tennessee Valley, and the taxpayers of the whole country.

If there is an issue at all, it is that the trend toward the socialization of electric power in this country has been halted under a Republican administration and that the demands for further subsidization of one small segment of our population at the expense of the rest of our people have been successfully resisted.
